## Life Guard Class Completed By 24

Two Senior Life Guard classes and one Junior Life Guard Class were completed under Jack Ramey, authorized Red Cross instructor, at the Municipal Swimming Pool during the summer. Twenty-four persons completed the courses.

From the Senior group, Water Safety Chairman R. G. Lewis thinks there are some good prospects for other instructors next year. Classes in this phase of the work will be taught at various centers, with the local chapter paying expenses for possibly two or more interested in the work.

Ramey said that such a course is usually taught at West Texas State College in April or May each year. The exact date will be announced later. The course will be under a Red Cross representative, and will be free of charge. Other schools, which will carry the same course, will also be announced later.

## Court Reporter's Salary Raised

County commissioners raised the salary of the district court reporter, heard monthly fee reports, and heard that money paid by the school district to the ex-officio county superintendent, County Judge Horace Schloss, is going into the Officers' Salary Fund of the county, at their regular meeting Monday.

Raising of the court reporter's salary was done in accordance with a law enacted by the 53rd Legislature. Deaf Smith County's part of the raise in salary is \$1,260 per year, or \$105 a month.

In Comparison This compares with \$135 a month from Dallam County, \$50 a month from Hartley County, \$135 a month from Moore County, \$34 a month from Oldham County, and \$41 a month from Sherman County. The reporter's total salary is now \$6,000 a year.

Judge Schloss reported to the commissioners that he has received the sum of \$612.50 as ex-officio County Superintendent of Schools, and that this money will be reported as fees of office on his September fee report and turned over to the county treasurer.

This money was received for the period from January 1, 1953, through August 31, 1953.

The money is being turned back to the county in accordance with an opinion from the Attorney General of Texas to the effect that the ex-officio County Superintendent here is in a position to receive the salary, but is not in a position to retain it.

While waiting for an opinion on the matter from the Attorney General, Judge Schloss had the funds in a special bank account, which he designated as that of "Horace L. Schloss, County Superintendent."

## Seven Day Jail Sentence, Fine Is Penalty Given In DWI Case

It was an unlucky Sunday the 13th for Jonah Lee Lytle, who was arrested about 3:15 o'clock that morning as he drove toward Hereford in his pickup truck.

Lytle was stopped by Sheriff Lowell Sharp and Deputy Sheriff Neal Young, and charged with driving while intoxicated, a charge to which he pleaded guilty in County Court Tuesday.

Fine, Jail Sentence Judge Horace Schloss assessed a fine of \$75 and costs and gave him seven days in jail.

The arresting officers testified in court that the pickup was heading east, and they were driving west when they saw it. When the truck veered across the center strip, they stopped it, and found a beer case containing five cans of beer.

In court, Lytle said that he had drunk three cans of beer from the case.

Given Credit Lytle was given credit for the three days he had spent in jail before he was tried. He did not have a driver's license, but was informed by Judge Schloss that when he does make an application for a driver's license, the Department of Public Safety will not grant him one for a period of six months from the date of his conviction for driving while intoxicated.

Arresting officers mentioned during their testimony that the Sheriff's office has received various complaints about traffic on Harrison Highway at night, and particularly that part of the traffic coming from Grady, N. M.

## Four Cars Are Damaged In Two Collisions In City

A two-car collision on Catalpa Street Monday evening resulted in approximately \$575 damages to the two vehicles.

Worley Gracy Harper was driving east on Catalpa in a 1951 Ford pickup and Robert M. Hicks, driving a 1949 Plymouth, was going west on Catalpa when the two vehicles collided.

Hicks was attempting to make a left hand turn in the middle of the block when he collided with the right front fender of the Ford pickup. Hicks stated that the sun was shining in his eyes and he did not see the other car, according to police reports.

Damages Estimated Damages were estimated at \$400 to the Plymouth and \$175 to the pickup by investigating officers.

Hicks was charged with failure to grant the right-of-way.

In another accident Tuesday afternoon damages totaled \$225 according to investigating officers.

Miss Virginia Nell Green, driving a 1951 two-door Hudson, was going south on Miles and J. I. Pevely, driving a 1951 Ford was going east on Second Street when the two cars collided at the intersection.

### Mrs. J. F. Ward Creates Trust

## Section Of Land Given Methodists

Without any fanfare for the actual presentation, Mrs. J. F. Ward turned over the deed to a square mile (one section) of land in Moore County, Texas, to Dr. Earl G. Hamlett, representing the Amarillo district of the Northwest Texas annual Conference of the Methodist Church, last Sunday.

Net income from the land, or from the investments or reinvestments after the sale of the land, is to go to five beneficiaries

of the Ward Trust, as it will be known. The land is valued at more than \$60,000.

The beneficiaries are the Waco Methodist Home, McMurray College Student Loan Fund, the Board of Missions and Church Extension of the Northwest Texas Annual Conference of the Methodist Church, the Board of Conference Claimants of the Northwest Conference, and to the Board of Missions of the Methodist Church, for use in Africa.

Open To Change At the same time, Mrs. Ward did not tie the money up to such an extent that it could never be used for other purposes, regardless of changes in conditions, but left it open for the board to change percentages or uses if they deemed it necessary.

Royalties from oil and gas leases on the land are to go to Mrs. Ward during her lifetime, but are to go with the rest of the fund after her death.

Division Of Income In dividing the income, one-eighth, or 12 1/2 percent, is to go to help children in the Waco Methodist Home, Waco, until such time

as there may be established by The Methodist Church in the Northwest Texas Annual Conference an institution or institutions for children, at which time that part of the income is to go to children in such institution or institutions.

Twenty-five percent of the income is to go to the McMurray College Student Loan Fund, for making loans to ministerial students or Life Service volunteers in training at McMurray College.

Another 25 percent goes to the Board of Missions and Church Extension of the Northwest Texas Annual Conference of the Methodist Church, to be used by that Board as deemed necessary.

For Pensions A third 25 percent goes to the Board of Conference Claimants of Northwest Texas Annual Conference of the Methodist Church, to be used for pensions to retired ministers, their widows, and their children, according to the regulations of the General Conference of The Methodist Church.

Church for use at the African Congo Belge Mission, unless that mission is discontinued. In that event, then the money is to be used by the Board of Missions for other African Missions.

**Main Fund To Be Kept**  
 According to the terms under which the gift was accepted, the main body of the trust fund will never be invaded, in so far as is practicable and possible. The board can change, by un-

animous vote, percentages as set forth in the trust if they decide that the beneficiaries which were named do not need that amount, or they may change the beneficiaries.

While Mrs. Ward is alive, she is to receive a yearly report on the Ward Trust, showing receipts, disbursements and reinvestments. "This is not only a workable trust, which does not tie up the money for some purpose regardless of changing conditions, but is one where the donor can see, during her lifetime, the good which is being done with the money," Miller said.

The second event, one fall with a 20 minute time limit, was won by Dory Funk when Abbott was disqualified after wrestling five minutes.

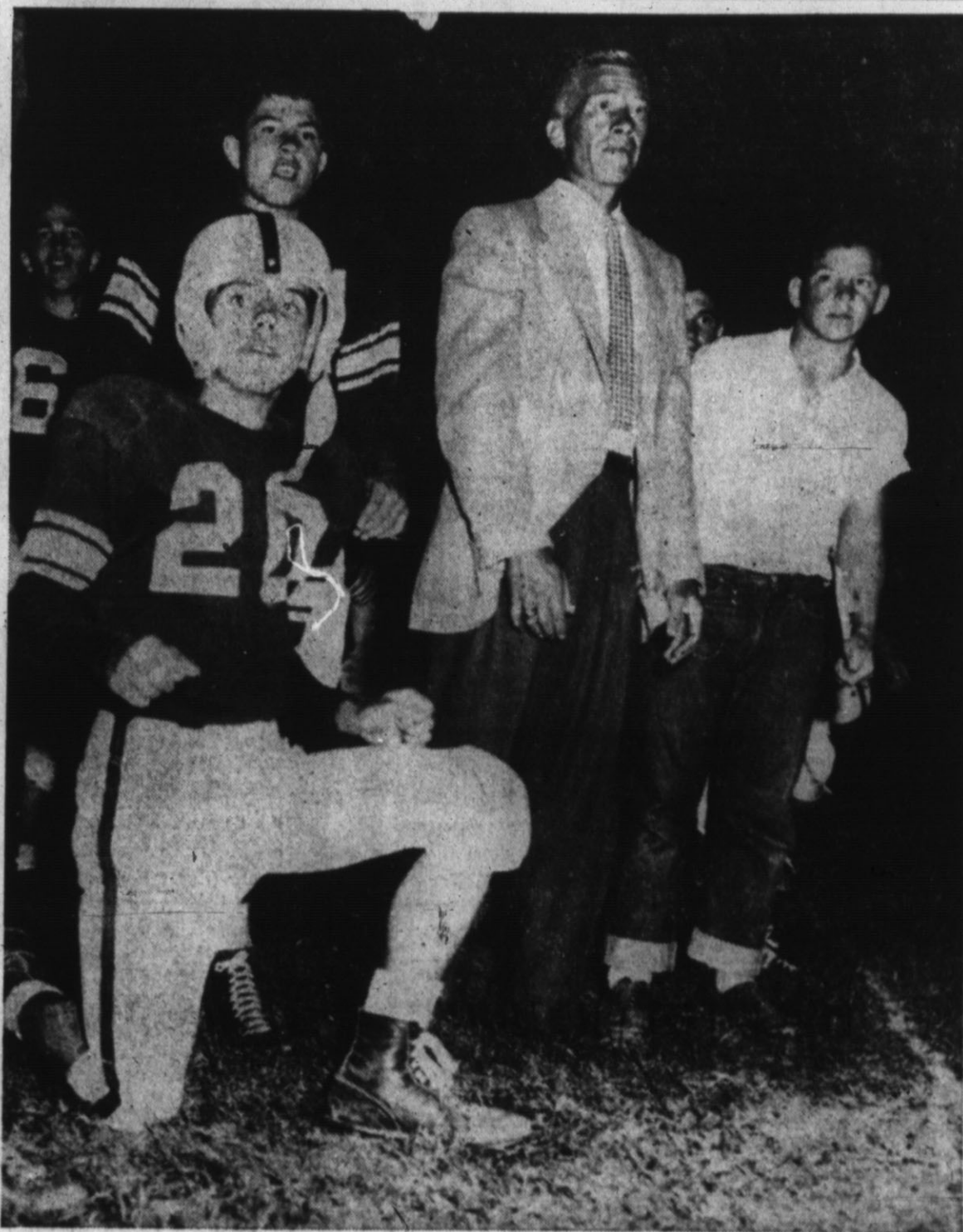

Coach L. B. (Scat) Russell of Hereford said his team made a lot of mistakes last week that they shouldn't have made, letting the Mules get too many first downs when they should have been forced to punt rather than surrender the ball.

"Our blocking and tackling wasn't too good, so I am working on the line men this week, trying to get them to hit harder, but you can't tell what they will do," Russell added.

First In Eight Years

For the Whitefaces and the Wildcats, it will be the first game in eight years, so only a comparison of wins can tell much about the teams.

Last year Hereford won four, lost four and tied two, while the Wildcats won seven, lost two and tied one.

Brownfield beat both Hereford and Littlefield, but Hereford only tied Levelland, which was beaten by the Wildcats.

Ten Lettermen

Littlefield has about 10 lettermen back this year, while we have eight," Coach Russell commented. "They always do have a rough ball club."

A report from Littlefield is that the Wildcats offensive machine is both slow and sloppy, as it showed up in two scrimmage games, one against Denver City and the other against Amherst. However, their defense is said to be better than it was last year.

Outstanding Tackles

Two tackles, Fred Martinez and Bob Hoover, are the outstanding men in the Wildcat line. Martinez, a former fullback who was ineligible last year, was switched to the line position to put some weight there.

Backfield men are reported to be bad on their timing, but that could be straightened out before they meet the Whitefaces Friday night.

Wingback Bobby Mears, the only senior in the Cat backfield, is said to be deadly on catching passes, and Dan Howard is improving his throwing arm, a combination that the Whitefaces will have to look out for.

There are only five running backs on the Cat team—they are Howard Mears, Tommy Shelby, Milton Vaughn, and Paul Williams. Williams is the biggest one of the group, but his "hustle and bustle" comes in spurts and sputters. In the game against Amherst he showed some good sprinting once he got past the line of scrimmage.

### CONGRESSMAN WALTER ROGERS SAYS:

## Realigning Of Tax Procedures Expected During Coming Year

The First Session of the 83rd Congress passed 208 bills. Nine of these were vetoed by the President. Many important bills were left on the calendar or pending in committee. These will no doubt be some of the first measures to be considered in the 2nd Session of the 83rd Congress, which begins in January, 1954. The present status of the tax laws will almost necessitate some kind of tax legislation early in the session.

This does not mean higher taxes, but it will no doubt mean a readjustment and realignment of taxing procedures. Much thought is being given to a general sales tax, which will be in addition to the individual income taxes, but is supposed to replace some excise taxes and other special tax items. The proposal has been to set this up where it can be collected at the source, that is, from the manufacturer. This for the reason that it is supposed to save much administrative costs and reduce some tax evasions.

The expiration of some excise taxes plus the automatic termination of the increased individual income taxes has caused much concern in Washington circles. These expirations will reduce tax income revenue by between ten and twelve billion dollars. If present expenditures are continued (and I hope they will not be), these expirations will mean a larger deficit. There are two ways of balancing the budget. One is to increase taxes

and the other is to reduce expenditures. Frankly, I am a strong supporter of the latter.

### Tough Sledding Ahead

THE UN: The UN can expect to be in for some tough sledding as long as employees whose activities have been suspicious are kept on the pay roll. The recent decision to reinstate some of those who had been suspended does not meet with the approval of the American people who are paying most of the bill. In fact, they strongly condemn it. UN employees, like Caesar's wife, should be without suspicion.

The sooner these questionable people are removed from these places of international importance, the greater will be the chances of the relaxation of the original purpose for which the UN was established, that is, the promotion of world peace.

It will assume the duties of the former Small Defense Plants Administration with expanded authority in other fields of small business as well as the small loan functions of the RFC. 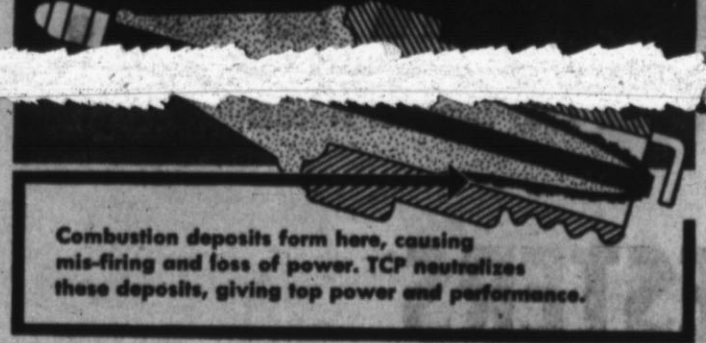
