Herd Trounces Irish 62-41 Here Friday

The old shooting Hereford Whitefaces, after a shaky first three quarters, finally managed to down the juckless Shamrock Irish 62-41 Friday night in Whitefaces gymnasium. Shooting for both teams was pathetic for the first three periods, but Hereford finally started to open up in the latter stages of the game.

The hapless Irish, who have lost to Phillips 100-23 this year, were plainly outclassed, but the Whitefaces were unable to open a very wide lead. Hereford hit around 20 percent of their shots, and Shamrock's percentage was well below that point.

Hereford's fine all-around athlete, Francis Boyd, was cold. Boyd scored only 15 points, his lowest total of the season, and had only seven markers at halftime, but Hereford scoring was fairly well distributed. Two other Whitefaces climbed above the 10-point mark.

Much of Hereford's lead was via the three throw lane, until the final three throw lane, until the final moments of the contest when the Herd finally began to sink some field goals. Shamrock hit only seven free throws out of over 30 attempts.

The first quarter was slow and the scoring was extremely low,

both teams unable to find the hoop. Hereford scored only 14 points, compared to the Irish' seven, but the Herd had the Shamrock team 8 points down before they started the scoring column.

The second period was much in the same fashion, Hereford managing to widen their surprising small lead by only one point. Again unable to find the mark, the Herd's main source of points came from the free throw lane, where their shooting was also off considerable. Score at the end of three periods was 28-20.

Hereford continued to widen their lead, still by very small margins, in the third quarter. The Irish showed apparent sign of weakening, but Hereford still could not find the range. The Whitefaces gained three points on the Irish to make the score 41-30.

Play picked up a bit in the fourth period, as Coach Wayne Stark of the Whitefaces emptied his bench. Depth paid off for the Herd as Shamrock faltered and Hereford gained 10 points on them. However the Whitefaces didn't open up the 20-point lead until the final three minutes of play.

Homer Hershey relieved Francis Boyd of his duties of high-point man by scoring 16 points. Boyd had 15, and Richard Hagar had 12.

High for Shamrock was Donald Francis with 10. Smith had nine, and Collingsworth had eight.

Hereford met Perryton Saturday night at Perryton. The game should be close, but Perryton may be given a slight edge.
