### Beauty At Home



#### LINCOLN TOMBSTONE FOUND

SPRINGFIELD, Ill. (AP)-The lost tombstone of Eddie Lincoln, son of Abraham Lincoln and Mary Todd Lincoln, has been found after being missing for 89 years. Dr. Harry E. Pratt, Illinois State his-'torian, says the white marble slab was found face down and serving as an entrance stone to the burial plot of Gov. Ninian Edwards, Illinois' third governor, and his descendants in Oak Ridge Cemetery. Edward Baker Lincoln died Feb.

1, 1850, a little more than a month before his fourth birthday. He was buried in Hutchinson's Cemetery, eight blocks west of Springfield's public square. In 1865, following the assassination of President Lincoln, Edward's body was, moved to the temporary Lincoln tomb in Oak Ridge, beside the bodies of his father, and brother, William. When the present tomb was finished it was paced there.

Mrs. Lincoln, later in 1865, gave Eddie's original tombstone to her eldest sister, Elizabeth Todd Edwards, wife of Ninian Wirt Edwards, son of the governor. Mrs. Edwards had it moved to Oak Ridge and the name "Edwards" engraved on it, Dr. Pratt said.





#### Farm Bureau To Seek Grain Plant

At a recent meeting, the Form Bureau of Hereford considered some 30 resolutions upon which they will base operation of the organization during the next year. Most of the resolutions, despite their value, were overlooked, by the average person in view of wide - spread interest in proposed irrigation water methods recommended by the organization.

One such recommendation, worthy of more than passing interest, reads: "We recommend that efforts be made to secure one or more grain sorghum 'using' plants or manufacturing establishments for our area."

Honestly, we believe that the Farm Bureau hit the nail square on the head with this proposal. This area has everything to make such establishment a success. We have an abundance of grain sorghum. We have adequate storage to handle it industrially on a year-round basis. We have good freight and truck facilities -- and ample natural resources.

All that is needed to make such a plant a reality is promotion, and we do not necessarily mean the Chamber of Commerce. Such an industry, like any other, requires general cooperation to secure, and more cooperation to maintain. Since the recommendation was made by the Farm Bureau, it is natural to expect that most of

### New Amendments Alter Way We Live

Approval of the eleven Constitutional amendments by voters of Texas last Tuesday will naturally affect, to some extent, the way people in this community live.

The most discussed amendment, No. 7, which requires women to serve on juries, will be the first to be felt here, as in other areas. Amendment No. 11, which concerns separation of the sheriff's office and Tax assessor-collector offices, will also have a definate effect in this county, since Deaf Smith is a typical example of why the amendment appeared on the ballot.

Text of this amendment specifies that the Commissioner's Court shall have the power to call an election in order thatpeople of the county may choose as to whether they will leave the office in its present state, or whether the two should be separated. It further specifies that the office of Tax Assessor-Collector be filled at the next general election, in case the voters choose to make the separation.

Our interpretation of the new amendment would be that no action can be taken toward filling the new office prior to the next general election (1956), since no provision is otherwise made in regard to appointments or temporary posts. However, it is possible that the Attorney General might rule otherwise, or that some precedent might establish a different action.

The movement, we feel sure, will be given equal support from merchant members of the organization.

. All in all, the plan is one which demands area - wide support. There is no reason why it might not become a reality. The idea is well worthwhile but, like all good ideas, it must be carried out before any benefits are achieved. We hope the Farm Bureau will not stop with passing the recommendation. If they let the project die, as many others in the area have perished, the time has been lost. If, on the other hand, they pursue it to a final outcome, the entire community, (farmers, merchants, and professional men), will have made a definate step forward in 1955.

#### Those 1954 Yields

Everywhere people are reporting exceptional grain sorghum yields for 1954. This is true, especially in the irrigated areas, where water application has been controlled -- and this makes us wonder.

It may, perhaps, remind most growers of the Old Maid, who tells a mother of 14 children how they should be reared, but we have yet heard no good explanation of "Why those yields were made in 1954."

Some investigating at this period might, possibly, lead to similar yields each year. If the County Agent's Office checked the time of planting, times watered, fertilizer applications and similar data -- and made it available to all farmers of the area, -it seems logical that the 1954 yields could be repeated from year to-year, at least on a partial scale.

Growing conditions, no doubt, will be the final answer. However, without the proper research, these conditions cannot be simu-Jated except by sheer luck. The area's 4-H and FFA boys, already interested in the subject, would porvide an excellent means of collecting such data, and, at the same time, would learn some valuable lessons in

Maybe, it's too scientific. Maybe it's a pipe-dream. But the 1954 yields were wonderful -- and we would like to see them repeat again, and again, and again.

#### Let's Have Radar

Most people immediately accept the fact that "speed" is the No. 1 killer on our highways. Most people also feel that everyone should "slow down," -- except them-

For this reason the Department of Public Safety is installing Radar Speed Control devices. Tests in other states have proven the efficiency and, more important, the effectiveness of Radar Controls. Out in the wide - open spaces of this country, it is expected to be of exceptional value.

We cannot, for the life of us, understand why a man will stan day the same in view of a probable \$15 or \$25 fine, yet he will possibly face death and risk destruction of a \$3,000 automobile without a quibble. Perhaps, it is one of those queer quirks of human nature.

Anyway, they say the radar controls do stop fast driving, and, in turn, save lives and public property. When you add up six lives lost in Deaf Smith County during the past year, along with some \$200,000 in property damage, there can only be one

"Let's get those radar machines as soon as possible."

I know as much about football as I do Constitutional law or the life cycle of the boll wevil, but I've been noticing lately that more and more fans are coming away from football games each week unsatisfied with the results.

At any given game, you know beforehand half the fans are gonna come away unhappy over the outcome, and I never have figured out how an enterprise with such odds against it could survive. On the other hand, most winters I've never figured out how my cows could survive on the feed they've got, but somehow they always make it.

A year or so ago I figured out a plan where both teams could win, everybody could come away from a game feelin' elated and the coachin' profession wouldn't be any more hazardous than farmin', but I never got anywhere with it.

I have been thinkin' about football some more though -why shouldn't a farmer advise on football, everybody else advises farmers on farmin' -- and was interested in readin' about a situation up in the east a few Saturdays ago. It seems the middle and the middle of the game and the fans were almost helpless. This is a serious situation, but it can be overcome, and the angle I was thinkin' about is this: one thing football needs is more elaborate scoreboards. As it is now, fans keep one eye on the field and the other on the score board, and it keeps their heads turnin' like it was a tennis game, while at the same time they keep an ear cocked to hear the public announcer's voice tell who carried the ball, who made the tackle, what the penalty was far, where the ball is now resting, etc., but under the plan I've worked out it wouldn't be necessary to watch the players at all. All you'd have to do is listen to the stadium roars and keep your eyes glued on the score board. In addition to showing how many yards was just gained, what down it is, how many minutes left to play, etc., the scoreboard easily could be enlarged to show little moving electrical figures representing all the players on both sides, manipulated by experts in the press box, with each play accurately represented on the board, which would be in the form of a football field with yardage stripes across it, etc.

The electrical sign business is at such an advanced stage that showing players running up and down on a scoreboard shouldn't be any trick to achieve.

If you think this idea has any merit, I offer it to you free. By the way, I have another idea worked out to allow fans from both sides to come away from every game a lot more satisfied than they are now, and I'll write to you about it next week in case you're interested. May do it anyway.

The agreements signed at Paris on Oct. 23, which, if ratified, will change the status of West Germany, were protocols to three treaties, as follows: (1) Protocol of Accession of the Federal Republic of Germany to the North Atlantic Treaty. (2) Protocol to the Brussels Treaty. This will bring Germany and Italy into the Brussels Treaty and will provide the machinery with which to control armaments. (3) Protocol granting sovereignty to the Federal Republic of Germany. The 14 NATO countries and the Federal Republic of Germany are involved in these agreements.

No new commitments were made by the United States in the Paris agreements. However, we have, a general commitment under the North Atlantic Treaty to the effect that an armed attack on any one of the NATO nations will be considered an armed attack on all. Another, which has not yet





State legislators and employees asked that question this week as the problem of meeting increased state expenses became a topic that int well dominate the 1955 legislative picture.

The Texas Research League, at request of Governor Allan Shivers. started a survey to determine how much is needed, checking state income, spending, and sources of additional revenue.


Considered as eliminated from the prospect list are only a gen-, eral sales tax and a state income tax, both opposed by Shivers.

However, legislators going back to jobs in January are expecting plenty of taxation recommendations to fly. Major taxation may be held until the League makes its report.

Governor Addresses League Speaking before the annual meeting of the Research League, Shivers stressed that Texas is entering an era of greatly increased spending. Advance planning is needed to get the most of each dollar spent and to prevent hurried spending in which the full dollar value is not obtained, he said, complimenting the research group for its report on the hospi-

tal system. Shivers also commented that Texas has fewer jobless than other states, plus a State Treasury surplus of \$39,000,000 and a very low debt, in contrast with deficits in many states.
