

Loss was estimated between \$12,000 and \$15,000 when fire broke out shortly after 2 o'clock Saturday afternoon in the rear part of the home of Mrs. Ollie Forbus, 1013 Park Avenue. Comprising most of the loss was the death of 18 chinchilla, which were housed in the back room.

Eiremen said that the blaze, in all probability, started from an extension cord by which a light had been placed under one of the cages to keep the animals warm. Sev eral of the animals were burned beyond recognition, some had their legs burned off and others were killed by intense heat which built up in the room as a result of

No loss on the chinchilla was covered by insurance, according to Mrs. Forbus, who said that in surance was not available on the animals. The incident wiped Mrs. Forbus out of the chinchilla business, except for two males which were not at the home when the blaze broke out. Damage to woodwork and cages was estimated to be around \$500

Mrs. Forbus started with four chinchilla around two years ago and has been carefully nursing and tending them until the brood had reached its size at the time of the fire.

The Hereford Fire Department had the blaze under control from the time they arrived and broke a large picture window to gain entrance to the building. Neigh-bors also eyed the blaze critically in view of high winds, which could naily have spread the fire over

# HOME REPAIR DOs and DON'Ts

By Andrew C. Lang FIXING A DOORBELL

DO. . .unscrew the pushbutton first, since one of the most comnon troubles is a loose connection at one of the terminal screws. DO. . . test the power source by touching both terminal screws at the same time with a screwdriver blade-which will make the bell ring if the current is operating all

DO. . , if the above test shows that the current is working properly, clean the contacts of the old pushbutton or buy a new one.

DO. . . check the battery or transformer if the current is not coming through, using a volt-meter to do the checking unless you are experienced in making a test with-

DO. . check the bell and the bell wire as a last resort, but the chances are you will have found the trouble long before that.

DON'T. . . be afraid to work around the pushbutton while the electricity is still on, since the amount of current necessary to ring a doorbell is not harmful.

EDITORIAL COMMENTS

### Probable In 1955 Four Bond Issues

If the "needs" listed at a recent community breakfast are any criterion of the future, tax payers of this area had better get ready to dig into their-pockets. Six substantial suggestions were made at the breakfast -- and success of three of them hinges squarely upon bond issues.

One of the proposals a community center, is already in the mill, following its presentation and endorsement by the Lions Club, which indicated that the organization will take the lead in petitioning the City of Hereford to call a \$250,000 bond election. An adequate airport, also proposed at the breakfast, likewise hinges 100- percent on success of a bond issue, probably on a county-wide basis. The third proposal was additional grade school facilities, which would require another bond issue within the Hereford Rural High School district.

It is also possible that continued growth will result in a series of revenue bonds for expansion of water, sewer and fire facilities on a city-wide basis. The City of Hereford, so far, has made these expansions from its regular budget, which reflects excellent operation, but which cannot possibly continue in the face of further expansion and growth.

There are, of course, several ways to look at these proposals. Some people will fight

### Expansion Seen In Hereford Business

Hereford's residential growth has been phenominal during the past 24 months. Now the trend is about to be reflected in business expansion.

Appearing this week are three petitions for change of designation from existing areas to business areas under the zone ordinances passed by the City of Hereford on Sept. 7, 1954. In total, the expansion program will call for an outlay of approximately \$400,000 before it is completed, resulting in improved service for residents of the community.

It is also interesting to note that all three of the projects have veered away wn Hereford, and are seeking locations in semi-residential sections. For a long time people have wondered which way the business area would move, blocked on North Main by churches and taxed heavily by high real estate prices on Third and Fourth Streets. The current trend may, perhaps, hold the answer.

In addition to these possible improvements, landlords report a constant appeal for adequate Main Street locations. Several sizeable businesses have abandoned plans to locate here during the past year, due to failure to secure adequate headquarters. What's more, they say, the demand has increased sharply during the past two months.

The situation, after all, is only logical. When you have more homes, you have more people and, when you have more people, you just naturally create opportunity for more business firms. No merchant ever appreciates another competitor -- but most will admit, even that, is better than having half of the buildings in town vacant.

them tooth and nail, as an increased tax expense; others will consider them in view of increased values of property which they now own. There is only one answer -- and it, will have to come from the election

Meanwhile, we have only one observation. Those communities which keep abreast with progress seem to be the ones which grow and prosper. You have only to visit some areas of the lower Panhandle to find scores of vacant buildings, no construction and sluggish business conditions. Whether\_ this area needs all of the proposed improvements is for the voters to decide. However, if we cannot have them all, we should certainly study conditions carefully, and select those which will contribute most to the general welfare of the area.

### A New Era For Basketball Fans

Basketball, a hitherto neglected sport in this area, may undergo radical changes with occupancy of the new high school super-gymnasium. Also supporting this theory is the fact that Hereford is forecast with a better than average team.

For several years basketball has topped all other sports in attendance over the United States. However, limited seating capacity in the old gym would not allow such a possibility in Hereford. The fact that the old gym was non-acceptable for regulation tournament play also had a tendancy to dispel interest in the sport.

Another championship team this year might, of course, send attendance soaring in 1954-55. However, it is more logical to expect attendance to show a steady increase over a period of four or five years, until it reaches the status now enjoyed in Hereford by football, which is unquestionably the area top sport.

There seems little doubt that interest will increase sharply this season, though, and that it will continue to become more and more popular as the years pass.

### If There's Doubt Call The Police

\*Lock your doors! Do not go out alone at night! Call the police in case of suspicious noises or curcumstances!" Such is the advice of police officers these days, following an unpredicted attack which occurred this week on Avenue F.

The situation doesn't sound like Hereford, we admit. Nevertheless, it did happen here, and more of such attacks could occur. Too many of us, lulled by a sense of easy-going security, are prone to fail in observing these common-sense fundamentals, which are the best possible precautions against serious trouble.

City and county officers report that people seldom call, because most of the suspicious sounds turn out to be false-alarms. However, they believe that the few real cases which turn up will more than offset the scores which turn out to be false alarms.

With such voluntary cooperation from the police officers, there is really little excuse for taking chances, especially in view of the recent incident which might follow the pattern of outbreaks seen in other Texas rising in a read months.




