### Community Builders

A lover of music and one who has done a great deal toward raising the standards of music in this community is Mattie Mae Swisher.

Miss Swisher, a native of West Virginia, never thought much about Texas until one of her closest friends insisted that Miss Swisher was the one to take her place here, teaching voice, choir and various music in public schools.

Miss Swisher's first trip to Texas in 1919 was made possible by Mr. and Mrs. G. A. F. Parker, who offered to pay her salary if she would teach music in the Hereford School system. Miss Swisher, contrary to the wishes of her mother, came to Hereford to teach in 1919 and 1920. She taught Bible and also organized the first glee club in Hereford Schools. At the time she was asked to come, Miss Swisher was finishing a music course in Chicago, which she completed first.

In the fall of 1934, Miss Swisher began giving private voice lessons. She has sponsored "The Messiah" each year up until 1954 when she dropped the activity, having too many other responsibilities confronting her.

Miss Swisher has directed the Methodist Church Choir here for

the past 20 years.

She also organized the first choral clubs in Canyon Schools and organized junior and youth choirs all of the time.

When Miss Swisher started out seeking a career, she chose the evangelistic field in which she served for many years. While in the church college in West Virginia she was music director and also did evangelistic work in 100 or more outside churches during one summer.

She attended the University of California, Berkeley in New York, the College of West Virginia and then studied in Chicago, doing practical work on the side for credits, such as visiting shut-ins, and similar activities.

Some of the clubs Miss Swisher is associated with include the Federation of Music Clubs, Music Study Club, since 1919, Hereford Civic Chorus; she was the student secretary of the Northwest Texas Conference of Methodist Churches, Panhandle Music Teacher's Association for seven years; she has been in charge of the Music Inter-scholastic League at W.T.S.C. and has been judicator at many festivals. She has always taught voice in connection with these activities.

Miss Swisher was born in Grafton, W. Va.

As a hobby, she has always dearly loved to cook, especially dainty little dishes. She loves to travel, also to take pictures. Miss Swisher toured Europe in 1930 and has visited almost every state in the United States.

As a community builder, her opinion of what Hereford needs most is summarized as follows: "I believe that the seat of everything would be the home. I honestly believe we need more home-life and more home training for the generation of children to come. The training of parents while young is worth a lot more to the children if they have proper training. I believe that it would take care of a lot of things that should not happen in a town, community or our schools. Next to the home, of course, is the church."

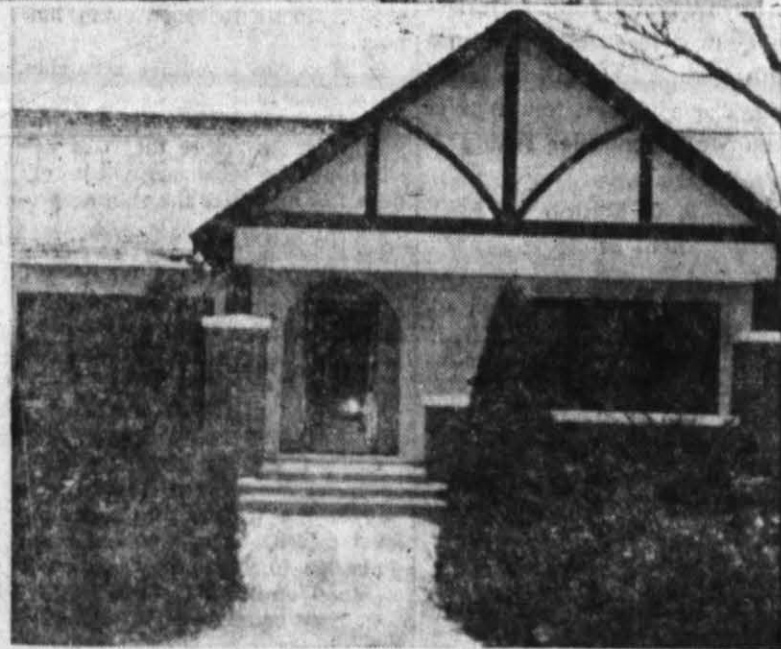

### 'Yard Of The Month'

There's beauty the year round in Mrs. W. E. the year. The Dameron yard was selected because it shows what good landscape design can do for a yard, even in winter.

The formal planning of the public area has enough evergreen material to create interest and beauty through the variety of foliages in shape and color. The brick planter, which was originally a fountain, and the path leading to it establish a good garden axis which can be seen from the living room and also from the double windows in the bedroom.

**Ties In With House**  
Material and design tie in well with the architecture of the house. The bricks used in the planter match those of the chimney against the west wall and the round design of the planter is accentuated by the arches at the entrance to the house.

The space around the planter is used as a cutting bed thus by the use of the planter itself becomes ideal space for two flower beds which lend varied color and beauty to the yard in the summertime.

The path to the planter is bordered with mandarin and dwarf hedge plants and the trees and other plantings located in the service area give enhancement in the early morning sun's rays shining through the barren branches to cast shadows on the walls. Tall stately poplars at the extreme west of the yard are silhouetted against an evening sun-streaked sky while elms and cedars shade the west side of the yard. The yard leads back to high trellises at the north behind which flourish various types of fruit trees.

The carefully prepared lawn which now is a lifeless brown, will turn green again in the spring when the temperature climbs above the icy level. This return can be hastened by a thorough watering of the lawn as soon as

the freezing weather is over.

It should be remembered that the grass draws nourishment from the soil at a time when the ground is normally dormant and accumulating strength for spring and summer. Therefore, for the summer grass to be assured, it is sometimes necessary to re-seed and to again fertilize in the spring.

During the late Mr. Dameron's life, the five of them did most of the work themselves and they found out that a yard with a design costs much less in upkeep than the yard without a planned landscape design. The Dameron's were fortunate when they first began to beautify their yard in that they had the aid and advice of her father, the late A. W. Gregg, whose hobby was horticulture and whose influence is still seen in parks, yards and gardens all over town. One has only to visit Gregg Park in the west part of town to remember his enthusiasm and joy in growing beauty spots.

**Lemon Spongette**  
**CREAM TOGETHER:**  
 1 cup sugar  
 4 tablespoons flour  
 2 tablespoons butter  
 pinch of salt  
**ADD:** the juice and rind of one lemon  
**SEPARATE:** 3 eggs; beat the yolks lightly and add 1 1/2 cups of milk and then add to the above mixture. Last fold in beaten egg whites.

Pour into custard cups or a casserole and set in a pan of hot water in oven. Bake at 350-F degrees for 45 minutes. Custard will remain in bottom and cake will rise to the top.  
**Note:** If cooked in one dish it will take 10 or 15 more minutes of cooking.

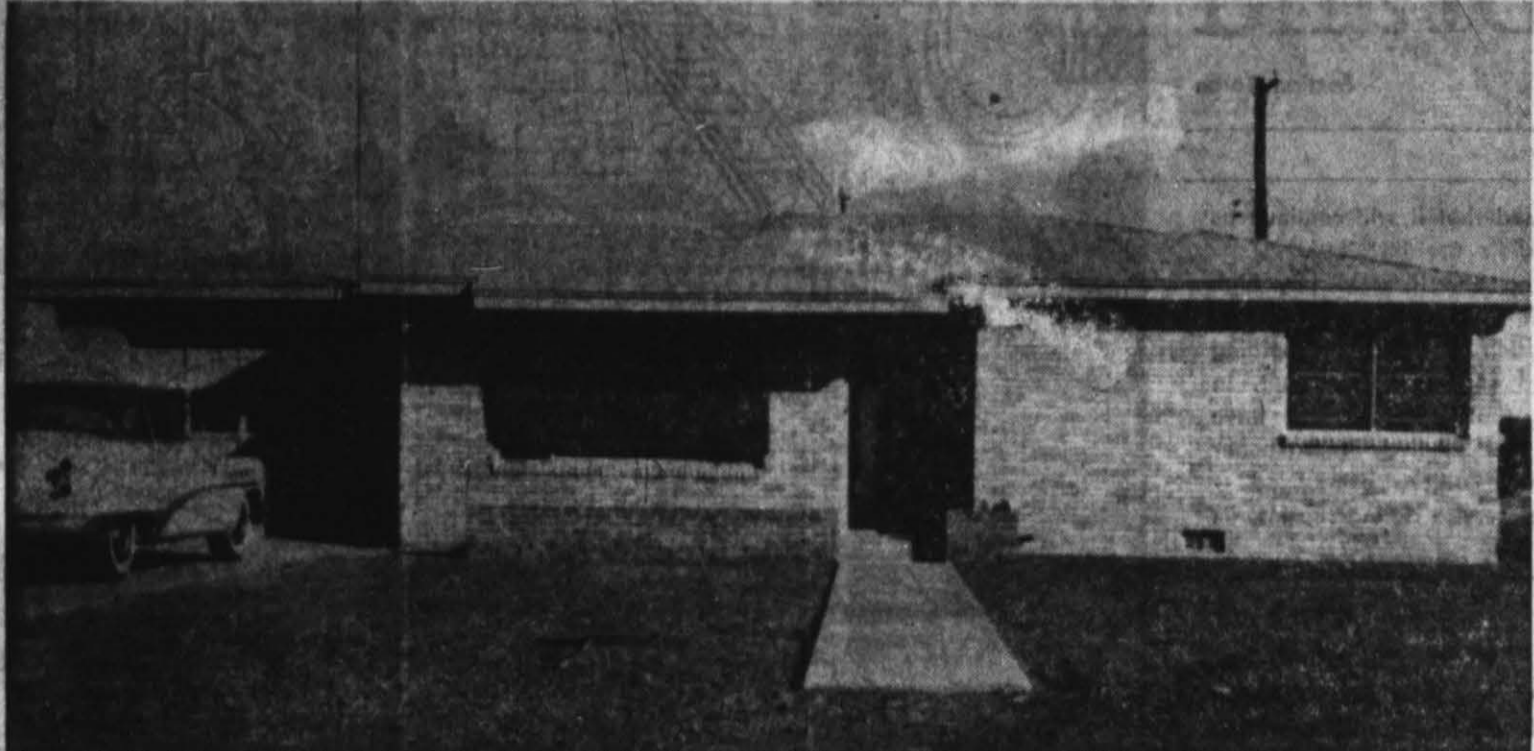

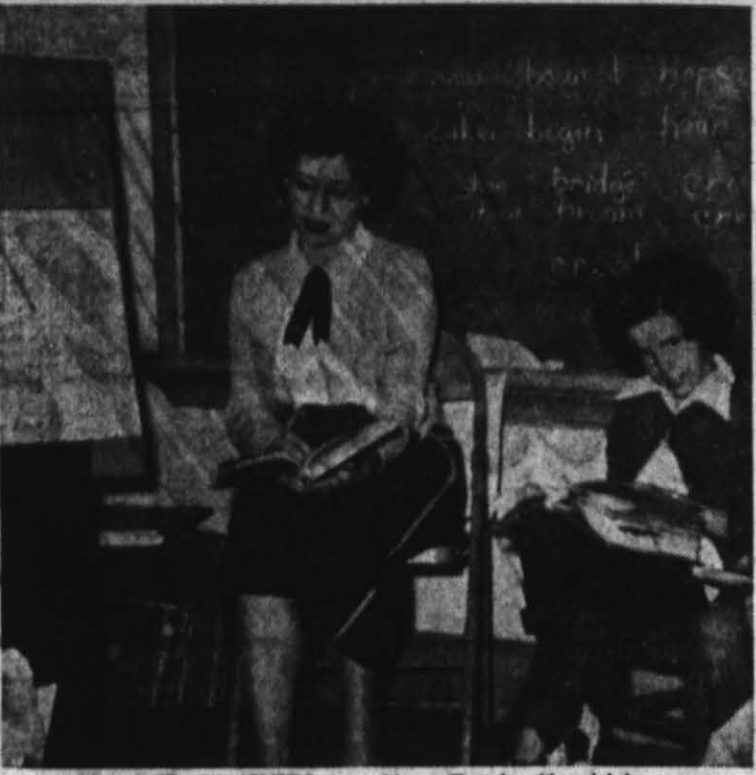

### Household Scrapbook

**White Felt**  
To clean a white felt hat, mix a quart of cornmeal with 1 cup of each of salt and flour. Rub well into the surface of the hat, let it stand over night and then remove by brushing.

**Garbage Can**  
Put a piece of pitch in a new garbage can and slowly let it melt enough to cover the bottom of the can. It will dry hard, making the can last much longer and be much easier to clean.

**Shoes**  
For squeaking shoes, place the shoes in a pan of water at night,

just enough water to cover the soles.

**Chickens**  
In order to judge an old chicken from a young one, look at the skin of its feet. The skin on the feet of young chickens is tender and there is little fat, while in an old chicken the skin becomes hard and the feet are scaly.

**Blood Stains**  
Soak in cold water over night. Then wash in soap and water, to which add 1 teaspoonful of kerosene oil. Let it stand a few minutes, then wash in cold water.

**Testing Buttons**  
A good way to test metal buttons is with a magnet. If they can be picked up, it is an indication that they will rust when washed.

**The Dry Cleaner**  
When sending soiled garments to the dry cleaners, search for the

bad spots that might escape the notice and outline them in white thread. The thread will attract the cleaner's attention and it is easily removed afterwards.

**Lettuce**  
Lettuce should be kept in a cloth or paper bag, and then placed in a tight pail. Set this pail in a cool place and the lettuce will keep fresh and crisp for a week.

**Grating Nutmegs**  
Nutmegs will grate much easier if the start is always made from the blossom end.

**Dandruff**  
When troubled with dandruff, try rubbing pure olive oil into the scalp for a few nights. Shampoo the hair every two weeks and rinse well in cold water.

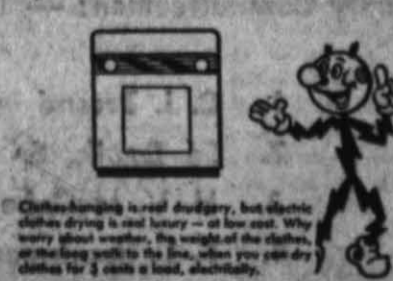
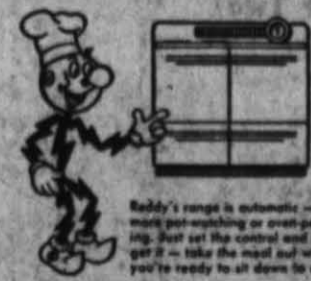

# Highlights and Sidelight FROM 40th State CAPITOL

AUSTIN, Tex. — A CIO blast at Governor Allan Shivers and Attorney General John Ben Shepperd has been answered by the latter. Shepperd said "certain fanatics in CIO have never yet admitted that they made a mistake in bringing the Communist DPOWA into Port Arthur in 1953."

At a CIO convention here, John V. Rife, executive vice president of the national CIO, called for an immediate settlement of the Port Arthur strike. He sent a telegram to 11 Port Arthur businessmen asking for a "peace conference."

Port Arthur people declined to meet with the CIO.

Rife said he hoped to find an end to the long dispute while he was in Texas. At the same time

he asked Shepperd "to use his good influence" to bring about a settlement.

Shepperd stated that he and Governor Shivers were willing to meet anywhere at any time with labor and management representatives to seek a settlement of the strike.

Meanwhile the CIO set aside \$200,000 to finance continuation of the 13-month-old labor dispute.

**Land Board**  
A decision on what to do about \$1,167,758 of South Texas land deals said to be fraudulent was delayed by the State Veterans Land Board.

Three South Texas land companies had offered to assume liability on that amount of land transactions which the firms promoted during the last four years.

Attorney General John Ben Shepperd, who said the land sales showed evidence of fraudulent misrepresentation, told the Land-Board that acceptance of the offer would violate the State Constitution.

The Board agreed to a one-week investigation period before announcing its decision.

**Mental, TB Patients**  
An increase of 1,100 beds for Texas TB patients and better treatment of mental cases has been urged by Governor Shivers.

Two other steps advocated to a state hospital advisory committee by Shivers included:

1. Making provisions for at least

50 beds for children under six suffering from tuberculosis.

2. Abolishing procedure of trial by jury to determine a person's sanity, with admission to mental hospitals based instead on medical examination.

**Turnpike Funds**  
Texas Turnpike Authority members have authorized the issuance of \$58,500,000 in revenue bonds to finance the Dallas-Fort Worth toll road.

Members voted to make an offer to the Republic National Bank of Dallas to be one of the three trustees for the bonds.

After approval by the Attorney General, the bond issue is expected to undergo a Texas Supreme Court test to determine its legal validity.

**Oil Money**  
Financial problems facing the Texas legislature have been slightly eased by oil production booms.

A 257,367 barrel increase permitted for January in oil allowances brings to about 400,000 barrels the total booms allowed since October.

As a result, state tax revenue will be \$1,500,000 a month higher.

**Oil Outlook**  
Prospects have never been brighter for the state's oil industry than in 1955, says Railroad Commission Chairman Ernest O. Thompson.

Thompson said that heavy demands for gasoline and distillate fuels were responsible for the optimistic outlook.

**Marriage Ban**  
Abolishment of Common Law marriages in Texas has been asked by a State Bar committee meeting in Austin.

Judges on the executive committee of the Bar's judicial section said the law would reduce the problem of illegitimacy and would help save welfare funds.

**Insane People**  
"Not all the insane people are in the asylums" says Mrs. Richard Berger, coordinator of volunteer activities for the Austin State Hospital.

As proof, Mrs. Berger submits evidence of some of the gifts sent mental patients for Christmas. The gifts include unwashed underclothing, dirty neckties, ripped dresses, shattered plaster plaques, cigar butts, used facial tissue, worn-out gloves that don't match, soles shoes covered with paint, lots and lots of junk costume jewelry and some lewd articles. . . all of which came wrapped as Christmas gifts.

More than one-third of the 6,000 gifts sent the patients were of this nature.

"Some people apparently think the hospital is full of nothing but raving maniacs who don't know the difference between a decent gift and a piece of junk," says

## Household Hints

Have you ever wished you could change the cutter on your can-opener for cleanliness' sake? Well, it's possible now because there is a new can-opener available with an extra cutter that is easy to put on and take off. If you reserve the extra cutter, for canned sardines or tuna, you can make sure your other canned foods won't taste fishy.

Cooking Brussels sprouts? Count on a pound yielding six half-cup servings.

If you enjoy making food look pretty you'll be interested in these basic garnishing rules. Garnishes should always be edible. They should complement the flavor and color of the food they are accompanying. Garnishes should never be overhanded or allowed to crowd a platter or other serving dish. Odd numbers of garnishes are usually the most effective. Garnishes should be placed so that the food they accompany can be served easily.

Fill toast cups with creamed oysters and garnished with sliced hard cooked egg. Delicious for Sunday night supper with cooked green peas and a salad.

Add tiny cubes of jellied cranberry sauce to a grapefruit aspic. Delicious with roast meat or baked or broiled fish.

Melt semi-sweet chocolate and mix with crisp ready-to-eat cereal. Drop spoonfuls onto a baking sheet and allow to get firm. Serve to small fry with glasses of milk.

Surface mold on salami may be cut away and the meat used. But if the mold has grown right into the salami, it should not be eaten.

Add minced parsley to waffle batter when you are planning to serve the waffles with creamed chicken, turkey or ham.

Take-it-easy cooks who are having round boneless ham a good choice. Such a ham, weighing about six pounds should be heated in a slow (325 degrees) oven for about two hours. For a buffet supper serve the ham with creamed potatoes, a raw vegetable salad and condiments such as mustard and pickled relish.

If you have an aluminum tea kettle (of the non-whistling type) empty it and dry the inside after the last meal of the day; then rub the inside with ordinary steel wool and soap three or four times a week. This treatment will keep the inside surface free of small deposits of minerals contained in the drinking water in some communities.

New filling for old-fashioned sponge-cake roll: Chop figs and dates fine and mix with currant jelly.

Orange juice, brown sugar and butter or margarine make a wonderful syrup with which to glaze cooked sweet potatoes or yams.

Apple-and-bread stuffing for a roast duck takes on new interest when it is seasoned with grated lemon and orange rind and nutmeg or cinnamon. This stuffing is also delicious with roast goose.
