Safe 'n Sound

In 1951, 12,518 Americans died in fires. Many of these deaths were caused by panic. On the other hand many people apparently trapped by flames managed to save their lives because they understood what to do in case of fire. Recognizing the possibility of fire in your home, decide now how you would be able to save your life. Figure out two possible routes to the ground from any upstairs bedroom. It is unlikely that both escape routes would be cut off by flames during the early part of the fire. If a fire starts make it your duty to arouse everyone in the house by making as much noise as possible, and see that everyone gets out. Then call the fire department. What you should not do is to rush out into the hallway as soon as you smell smoke. First make this little test: Place the palm of your hand against the door. If the door feels hot to your hands, that hallway already is filled with deadly heated gasses. In that case either escape through the window, if you are on the first floor, or wait at the window for the fire department. Also make sure you've got adequate fire insurance. Track Team Enters Four Meets

About 30 boys turned out for track workouts which began right after the completion of basketball season. According to Coach John Poindexter, a few more can be expected to turn out, and workouts will begin in earnest as soon as work on the new track which is being built where the old auto-racing track was completed. The Whitefaces will enter all events, but Poindexter said that it was still too early to determine a regular squad, but plans are being made to carry a large squad.

Here on March 18
The Herd will compete in four meets, among them will be a meet scheduled to be held in Hereford March 18. The eight team field in the meet will consist of Olton, Farwell, Canyon, Dimmitt, Muleshoe, Tulin, Friona, and Hereford, with Canyon probably being top-seed

beforehand. Other scheduled meets are The West Texas Relays at Odessa March 25, Panhandles Relays April 2, and the district meet which will be held on April 15. Some of the Whitefaces will probably go on to the regional meet the week after.

The present squad consists of a few Veterans, but the Herd will probably be plagued by inexperience. Wayne Smith, sprint man deluxe, holds the district record for the 100 yard dash and the 220 yard dash. Smith stepped the 100 in 10.0 and the 220 in 21.8 to set new records at the district meet last year. G. C. Merritt, Danny Elliston, and Pat Elliston will also be entered in the 100, while Merritt, and D. Elliston will compete in the 220.

Good Relay Prospects
The Whitefaces' 440 yard relay team should be above average. On the team are Smith, Merritt, D. Elliston, and P. Elliston. Smith and Merritt are juniors and both Ellistons are sophomores, so the Herd can also look to success in future years.

In the 180 yard low hurdles Merritt and D. Elliston will be entered, while Charles Edwards and Houston Boyd will compete in the

120 yard high hurdles. Merritt was third in district last year and should be up among the leaders this year.

"Inexperience will hurt us, but I think with hard work we can field an above average team," stated Poindexter in regard to Hereford's chances of taking a district crown this year on the cinders, but at any rate, the Whitefaces should furnish plenty of competition for JAA opponents.

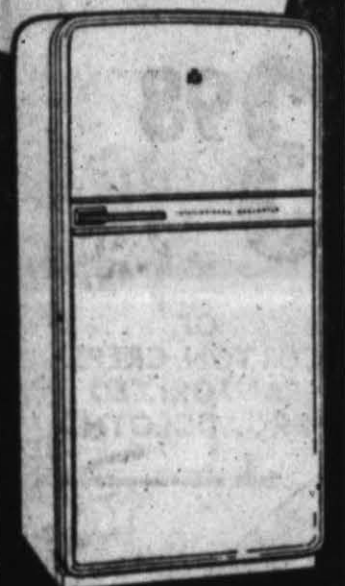

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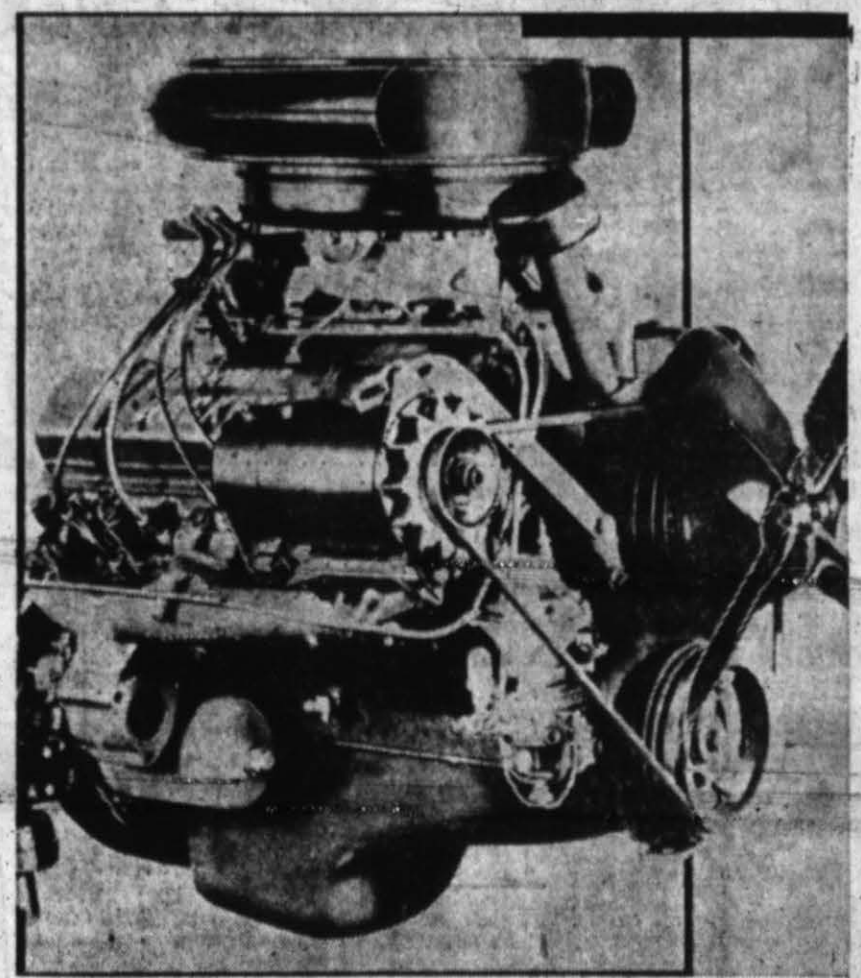

ILLUSION OF HEALTH

ANN ARBOR, Mich. (AP)—You don't have to feel sick to be sick. That was the finding of the University of Michigan medical school in examinations of 500 business executives who got company-paid checkups at University Hospital.

Forty-one percent of the 500 were sick and didn't know it, and 25 percent of these needed treatment immediately. About 45 percent of the sick men were found to have stomach disorders, while another 24 percent were found to have cardio-vascular heart or blood vessel trouble.

Four of the executives who thought they were perfectly healthy were found to have cancer, and one was found to have tuberculosis. Three were diabetic, 12 had gallstones, and 16 peptic ulcers.

And a medical school report said: "significant new disease appeared each year in 13 to 20 percent of the subjects."

Old Potato Sack May Unite Hereford Man With Relative

"Hereford Potatoes" have contributed much to this area in the form of increased revenue, national publicity and diversification. Now, it seems, they may even unite two relatives who have never before seen each other.

The interesting story came to light recently when John J. Paetzold, widely known farmer of this community, went to the Hereford Red Cross office with a problem which he felt they might help solve.

It all started around three years ago, when a man in East Germany got the name and address of Mr. Paetzold from a sack in which the Hereford man had shipped potatoes. He is not sure if the man received potatoes in the sack as part of the government overseas program, or if the sack was used, after being emptied, as wrapping material and thus made its way into the East German Zone.

The German lived in the same part of the country from which Mr. Paetzold's family migrated—and he possessed a name which also indicated relationship between the two men. Too, there were other circumstances which the Red Cross does not wish to disclose in view of protecting other members of the man's family.

Through continued correspondence, Mr. Paetzold learned that this, his possible kinsman wanted, more than anything else, to come to America. The man finally made his escape into West Germany from the East sector and, in time, managed through some government contacts to migrate to Canada, where he has been working for the past year.

The dream of coming to the United States—and especially to Texas—has never left him, however, and during his year in Canada the kinsman has been diligently saving his money toward fulfilling that ambition.

This is the point where Mr. Paetzold sought aid from the Red Cross. The man says he can pay his own transportation and has enough money to carry him through emergencies. Mr. Paetzold says that he will give the man employment.

The local Red Cross chapter, following this angle, helped fill out papers for the would-be resident of Hereford, including affidavits and financial responsibility.
