



Salk vaccine, in addition, is designed to immunize from all three types of polio,

"In case a child has already had polio, it is definitely recommended that he be administered the shots-because there are still other types of polio which he might acquire." Mr. Hyre added.

Attending the meeting were Paul Plarvey, county chairman for the National Foundation, superintend ents and principals from the varlous schools involved. County Health Officer R. R. Legal 'Booby Trap' Hampers Justice

Laxness and inefficiency on the part of the Texas Legislature cost the people of Deaf Smith County something like \$500 in jury fees and court expenses during the past week. Warse still is the fact that a legal "booby trap" still exists in our state laws to further hamper justice and bring unnecessary expenses down upon the heads of other tax payers in Texas' 254 counties.

The circumstance centers around two points in Texas laws. One was passed by the People of Texas as a Constitutional Amendment in 1954, providing that women shall have the right and duty to serve on juries in Texas. The other point, existing on the statutes when the amendment was passed, specifies that in a trial involving capital criminal cases the jury "must remain together in a body at all times" during the trial.

Deaf Smith County jury accommodations are not the best in the world, for sure. However, had they compared with the finest hotel suite in New York City we doubt sincerely if any district judge would confine a mixed jury of men and women into "one body at all times" for several days and nights as specified by present laws. Even Legislators, it seems, would have

Life, it seems, is frequently plagued with little problems. The Commissioners Court met Monday, for instance, and generally expressed great dissatisfaction over the large number of beer bottles, beer cans and liquor bottles which are constantly scattered along the right-of-way of Deaf Smith County roads.

In addition to presenting some cloud of reflection upon the "dry" status of Deaf Smith County, the commissioners also said that the circumstance is costing tax payers of the county quite a tidy sum of money each year in the matter of collecting bottles and cans from the right-of-way. Furthermore, they point out that it is impossible to grade and maintain the county roads until such

Final outcome of the situation is employment of a man who takes a pick-up and polices the grounds ahead of county graders and maintainers.

The fact that throwing of trash (including beer cans and old bottles) along the roads is subject to a fine of \$200 appears to make very little difference, according to the commissioners. No more difference, in fact, than the heavier fines concerning "possession" of intoxicants made in the

Despite all of these things, the situation does exist. It does present quite a problem. It is costing the tax payers considerable sums of money each year. Furthermore, it bids to become an even greater problem as the area population grows from year to year. The final outcome will, no doubt, lead to filing of charges and levying of fines before people cease to litter the roads. Then and then only will people take the trouble to dump such trash and litter in the dump grounds.

Tex., we might not have had Jesse for a community builder this week Stanford is the co-owner of Black Furniture Co., since 1948. but has worked there for Mr. Black for many years before that time. Active Methodist

A member of the Methodist Church since he was eight years old, he has served in every capacity from the Official Board president to the job of janitar, which he hired out for when he was going to college. Just about the only thing he hasn't done is that of acting as the minister. He has been on the Official Board since he was 21, and was the treasurer for 20 years.

Of that time, he served as president of the board for 11 years. He is modest, however, and would be the last to admit that he has done better place in which to live.

FUND TO AID TRIPLETS

Three little boys were born Sunday, August 1, 1954, to Mr. and Mrs. Frank Sitton of Hart, and but for one exception, all were born as normal, healthy infants. That exception being an eye disorder which left the babies completely blind. The Sitton triplets, Don Frank, Lon Ray, and Jon Jay are considered an unusual case and as far as can be ascertained the only such case in the United States today. The Sittons, who farm four miles south and four west of Hart, were unaware of their babies' fate until the triplets were six and onehalf months old. They had the three little fellows examined by four eye physicians before the disorder was diagnosed by an Amarillo eye specialist. They were told then that there was no hope for their recovery. The triplets will not be eligible for any type of aid from the state until they reach school age. Therefore at least six years of skilled training, costing several thousand dollars, will be needed. A fund has been started by the Hart residents; and a committee from the Dimmitt Lions Club has been appointed to investigate the needs of the triplets relative to starting a fund for finan--The Castro County News cial and material aid.

I'm opposed to double taxation all right, but if I could get by with only that little I'd get off the air and keep quiet from now on.


Double taxation? Why, we passed double taxation in this country a hundred years ago and quadruple taxation fifty years ago and quintuple twenty-five years ago and are now

Last Supper Pictures In Original Setting

JERUSALEM, Israel - A "Last Supper" by a well-known Israel artis tis the first in which the setting is the assumed hysioric site the Cenacle on Mt. Zion.

The oil painting differs from the usual representation of the great religious drama. Austrian born painter, Ludwig Blum, 64 a resident of Jerusalem since 1923. worked on the 4 by 19 foot canvas for over a year. It was commisioned by an American Quaker, William Kretzer of New York, a building contractor. He plans to harg it in the entrance hal! of his new house in Flushing.

Experts say the authenticity of the site of the Cenacle is very probable. It is the traditional location for the house of St. John Mark where the Last Supper and later the meetings of the first Christians took place. Soon afterward a church was built on the

spot. In the course of history tre church was destroyed and rebuilt several times but the location of the "Last Supper" hall remained the same. Today, "The Chamber of the Last Supper" is a spacious chapel with Moslem prayer niche on one side and with a stone in the northern wall which is marked as "The Seat of the Master." The chapel itself has a Cothic ceiling supported by two high columns. This style of building is still typical of many Oriental houses.

Blum's preliminary studies led him not only to the Cenacle but to archeological and other museums here where he found historic details such as glasses and costumes for the picture.

"The discrimination against jazz music is over," Warsaw's Zycie Warszawy announced. At the same time, the paper assumed the sponsorship of four jazz concerts in the Polish capital.

But the Communists are not admitting their change of heart in good grace.

"Jazz music is not simply Negro music with wild rhythms," one Red newspaper wrote, "but rather it is the music of American Negroes, who are people threatened with mass murder and longing for

"Jazz must therefore be considered something like a social bill of indictment against the American rulers," the paper said.

Other papers gave what apparently is the real reason for the permission for jazz. "Our youths are not content with only political songs or music depicting the progress of the working class, they also want music which amuses them," one paper said.




