

Commercement exercises this week saw the delivery of high school diplomas to 88 boys and girls of this community. As parents, neighbors, tax payers, friends and acquaintances, we are proud of these youngsters and the accomplishment they have made.

They are mothers and fathers of whom every graduate can be justly proud. They have set a standard which the future will, find it difficult to equal, or to overcome.

It is a pleasure, therefore, as we congratulate the graduates that we also say, "Hats Off to Morn and Dad."

A Ray Of Hope For Christian Nations

Talks by Marshall Formby in Hereford this week revealed a situation which came as a definite surprise to most residents. The fact centered around the existence of wide-spread religious organizations in Russia and other Iron Curtain countries.

The situation also emphasized another of Formby's points, when he declared that the Russians appear to be "good-people." He was careful to point out that although the Kremlin leaders had sought in the past to kill out religion that it continues to flourish and expand. Perhaps the most encouraging observation of all, though, is the fact that the present regime which controls the Iron Curtain countries appears to have the attitude of allowing Russian controlled peoples the right and privilege of worship.

This circumstance is highly important, not only to the Russian, but to the people of Hereford and other. American communities as well. Through the spread of Christian world its teaching socially rests the future existence of the world. Despite the fact that Christians in Russia are probably in the minority at the present time, their in-

fact that Christians in Russia are probably in the minority at the present time, their influence will be exerted and felt throughout the country. The very fact that Christianity did continue in the face of privation and persecution indicates that the leaders of its forces are strong, willful people. It further indicates that under present conditions Christianity will spread on a much greater scale behind the Iron Curiain.

Communism, on the other hand, flourished on a small scale in this country but, instead of expanding, it now appears to be diminishing over this and other democratic nations.

We have always felt that the battle between Communism and Democracy was nisnamed and misplaced. From the very start,
it was "Communism vs. Christianity". The

the Iron Curtain, therefore, includes the
greatest hope seen throughout the world
during the past quarter of a century. It is

Community Builders

By MARGARET ALSTON

"I consider that my life time embraces the most important events and inventions of the world," said F. H. Oberthier when being interviewed this week for our Community Builder. "Also," says Oberthier, "the steam engine was born and put aside during my life time."

Oberthier was born August 1, 1869, in Rusk County, but soon moved to Commanche C o unty where he attended an old country school. Four years before he was born, was the end of the Civil War, of which his father was a Confederate veteran. Also the last Indian raid in North Texas, where he was born, occurred just before he was born, occurred just before he was born. Oberthier could tell many pioneer stories as you can see from his past experiences.

Having attended a business school at Waco in 1889, he then went to work in the First National Bank at Dublin. In 1890, he moved back to his home town, Commanche, and went to work at the bank there. While working in the bank, he was also in the ranching and trading business and in 1904, he organized the Communche Cotton Oil Company.

Oberthier owned a ranch in Castro County, south of Dimmitt, so with his family, he moved here to take charge of it in 1908. At that time the Hereford Christian College was established in Hereford, which was another reason why he moved here, so he could put his children in school.

After moving here. Oberthier was granted a franchise to build an electric light plant, which he did in 1908 and operated until 1925. That company is now known as the Southwestern Public Service Company although there were two others who operated it at one time.

Having sold the electric company, he then went into the business of selling and dealing with electric and refrigeration appliances; this he did for 17 years. While in this business, he also

While in this business, he also was building two elevators, one at Black in 1929 and the other at Dawn which he built in 1930. He was manager of both of them until 1946.

A member of the First Christian Church, he was a deacon for many years. He is also a member of the Knights of Pythias Locge and the Chamber of Commerce. After coming to Hereford, Oberthier served on the school board when the grade school, Central, was constructed.

In 1894 Oberthier was married to Miss Amanda Holmsey, the daughter of a confederate veteran and a pioneer, in Commanche. They had four children, three of which are alive, Mrs. Louise. Gaines of New York, Mrs. Elizabeth Lawrence of Tyler and Mrs. Francis Houston of Hereford.

Oberthier believes that Hereford could not have prospered nor been settled had it not been for the underground water, supply, the board well, windmill and the barb-

When he moved here, he believed Hereford would soon become a city, a dream that was not being realized until recently. He also believes that Mereford is a good community to live in and that Hereford is well supplied and prospective.

Editor's note: The Bootleg Philosopher has an interesting idea this week, but he won't get anywhere with it. He never does.

Dear editar:

You take all the baling wire off my farm and two-thirds of the fences would fall down, all the gates would swing open, the tail gate would fall off my trailer, my tractor would scatter parts from the backdoor to the north end of the farm, and I'm not even sure my pants would stay up.

If though the visitors insist on coming by my place, I'll be glad to show 'em around, and will give each one a small handfull of Johnson grass seed. If we can get it back to Russia and dropped in half a dozen places, in five years we'll have 'em begging for mercy.


