

PAN AMERICAN **ROAD RACE FILM TO BE SHOWN HERE**

The first public showing locally of the 11/2 hour color sound movie of the 1954 Pan-American Road race is scheduled for the New High School Auditorium Tuesday, June 14th at 8 P.M.

The movie, covering the entire 5-day race, was made by K & W Products, Inc., automotive chemical manufacturer. K & W sent a 9-man crew to Mexico to cover the race from start to finish. 



SALK VACCINE The Salk Vaccine argument, of course, continues. We hope to have it settled in time to make the safe innoculation of many children in this nation possible before the polio season sets in. The Interstate and Foreign Commerce Committee of the House, of which I m a member, is considering a bill that will implement the Presijent's suggestion that this vaccine hould be made available to all hildren regardless of their econcmic status. As I told you in a previous newsletter, the Congress has kept a vigilant eye on the distribution of this vaccine and will not tolerate the exploitation of the American people through such a medium. Frankly, I had hoped that the entire program could be handled without the exercise of any jurisdiction over the subject matter by the Federal Government as such. However, the situations that have arisen have required that the Congress step into the picture and keep a tight rein on the handling of the program. It was recently pointed out by a member of the United States that this Salk vaccine is the result of research paid for in a large degree by the dimes of children contributed in the annual March of Dimes can:paigns. Certainly these children and their parents should be protected from exploitation at the hands of any unconscionable individual or group cf individuals. 


