How many layer cakes, cookies and cream pies will have to be sold to raise \$1500 for the promotion of Little League baseball? Hereford Little League mothers will get a partial answer to this question when they will hold Bake Sales on Saturday, which, like thunder showers, will be widely

Cardinal and Yankee mothers will display their baked specialties at Piggly Wiggly. Mothers of Dodger players will be at Furr Food while the Giant mothers will hold their sale at Coopers'

Proceeds from the three bake sales will go into a fund to aid in the operation of Little League baseball. Cost of operating the Little League ball park is about \$10

It is estimated that \$1500 will be needed to keep Little League Baseball functioning smoothly. The money is also used to keep the Little League baseball park up to standards set forth by the National Little League Headquarters.

According to Ray Cowsert, president of the Little League, players sometimes break as many as four bats a night. "These bats have to be restocked from time to time," he says, "and each bat costs around two dollars." One source of income for the

YIELD MULTI-MILLION **Prices Ranging** Up To \$7.25 On First Loads

Price 5c Per Copy

A potato crop bonanza! Good yields and the best price in the history of Hereford potate production had growers, who be gan digging the spuds on Monday and Tuesday, wearing big smiles and fingering big checks.

A multi-million dollar harvest i strong possibility.

Light showers that fell Monday evening delayed harvest in many fields and had growers', packers' and brokers' blood pressure soar-

Seven dollars per hundred and up for No. 1 potato is seen as "just too good a price to keep." But some brokers forecast the top price can be held for one week, perhaps three.

"It will be up to the growers to spread the period of high pricesto hold the market" one handler declared. "If they harvest mature potatoes, bring them in in good condition and try not to overload the market, we may be able to decent average prices throughout the season.

Early in the week, the recent meeting of brokers on price standards was apparently bearing good results. The potato men agreed to set a minimum price of \$7 for number one spuds, \$6 for number twos. The minimums were being held firm, with some loads moving at prices up to \$7.25.

John Paetzold at Associated Growers, one of the first sheds to start processing, said "Yields and quality are both above expec-

Elmer D. Cook, who brought in the first loads at Associated, figured his yields at 158 sacks of number one Red Sports per acre. Adding the yields of number twos at only slightly lower prices than the top grade, early fields stand

to gross over \$2000 per acre. Many growers are expected to regain their losses of 1955-when the bottom dropped out of the market-and more. Much

some cases. Acreage devoted to potatoes in the immediate Hereford area has been estimated at 3500. This total last year's acreage.

The smaller acreage is reported to be well adjusted to current market needs. "We won't have a burdensome supply for the demand, though the price is bringing some resistance' from buyers," one processor noted.



Therefore he was Cards eligible to pitch only 17 outs in Friday night's tilt.

Other Little League pitching rules which may be noteworthy are: 11) A pitcher shall not pitch in more than one game in any Dodgers 11, Glants 4 one day, (2) A pitcher shall not pitch on two consecutive days, (3) A pitcher having pitched in four or more innings in a game shall be ineligible for further pitching duty until he has three calendar days rest, (4) A manager shall not use more than five pitchers in any one game and (5) If a pitcher is removed from the mound, even though he remains in the game at another position, he cannot return to the pitching position.








Locally, his office reports that business is about normal with an average number of requests for workers and the men needed to supply the jobs.

Trend is Statewide This reflects a trend of the statewide level, there being jobs available throughout Texas, both for skilled and unskilled labor.

Women, After 50

Argen Draper, CHDA, points out that extension foods and nutrition specialists say probably both men and women need more protein and iron and less fat than most people get in their daily diet.

These are some of the conclusions indicated by a recent University of California study of nu-

Men in the study had less vitamin C in their blood than the women, even though they ate more heartily of foods generally and thus had a higher vitamin C intake. Lack of vitamin C in the diet often is the cause of tender, bleeding gums and subsequent loss of teeth. Such troubles were found among a number of the older people in this study whose blood tested lowest in vitamin C.

Values of cholesterol, the fatty chemical found in excess in the middle and inner layers of artery walls in persons afflicted with the artery disease, arterosclerosis, were low in men who were 20 per cent or more underweight. They were high in those who were 20 percent or more overweight. There is no clear-cut relationship of this
