Household Hints

Add a little poultry seasoning to buttered bread cubes; use as a topping for a creamed chicken aserole.

Pretty pastry shells, in individual size, are easy to make. For each shell cut out four 2 1/2-inch circles from pie dough. Overlap the circles in muffin-pan cups and bake in a very hot (450 degrees) oven about 15 minutes. Use stick-form piecrust mix for the pastry because it won't toughen as you roll to cut the "small" circles for the shells.

Young people love this soda: put a couple of tablespoons of chocolate-flavored syrup (the kind that comes in cans) in each glass. Add cola beverage and a scoop of vanilla ice cream. Stir a few seconds with a long spoon to combine the chocolate syrup and the cola, then serve to appreciative youngsters.

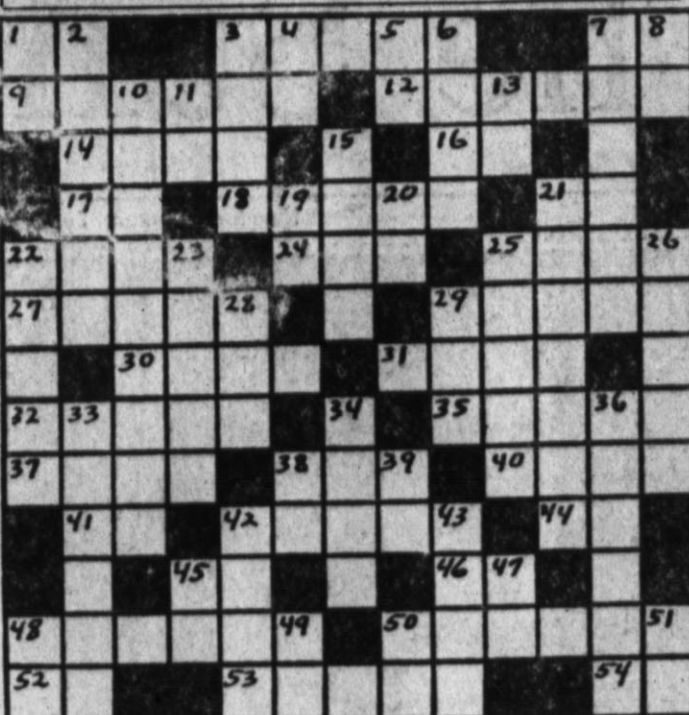
Add chopped cooked shrimp along with chopped green pepper and scallions to scrambled eggs just before the eggs set. Serve on toast for lunch.

Your family and friends like garlic bread with spaghetti and tomato sauce or a creamed chicken casserole? Then try this variation on an old theme: mix lots of minced parsley with the butter and crushed garlic used for the bread, before heating as usual.

Add minced chives and fresh basil to olive oil, vinegar, salt, freshly-ground pepper and prepared mustard for a French dressing to serve over sliced red-ripe tomatoes.

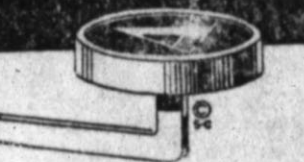

Pigs Rally For Victory In 8th

After trailing for the complete game, the Piggly Wiggly Pigs tied the game in the seventh and went ahead to take a 7-6 victory with one more in the eighth to stun Hotel Jim Hill and lengthen their lead to three full games.

The Pigs were never ahead until they won the game in the eighth. Jim Hill put together good hitting and good fielding to open a four run lead in the first two innings. But Don Morgan, who was wild and pounded at will in the early innings, had it when he needed it most. After adding their sixth run in the fifth Jim Hill didn't score another run or get another hit.

Hotel starter John Winkler put on a sterling performance for the first three innings, giving up only one hit and not giving up a run. He gave up seven hits throughout the entire game. Morgan gave up eight safe blows, but Jim Hill bunched at least two of their hits in three innings. Piggly Wiggly managed to bunch two of their hits in only one inning.

Kenneth Brock's tremendous home run might have been the turning point. Brock's homer, probably hit farther than any so far this year, came in the sixth inning and put the Pigs within one run of Jim Hill. An error in the seventh tied the game for Piggly Wiggly, and an error in the eighth won the game.

Morgan fanned nine in picking up his fifteenth victory against only two losses. John Winkler whiffed only two in a losing cause, but Winkler was backed with fine fielding until the latter innings.

Piggly Wiggly scored at least one run in each of the last five innings. Jim Hill scored two in the first, let up for an inning, then scored one each in the fourth and fifth. The only time Piggly Wiggly scored in the same inning as Jim Hill was the fourth.

In the earlier innings the Jim Hill barrage was consistent. They jumped to an early lead and almost had the game tied down before the Pigs realized what was happening. To lead off the first Wendel Burdine lined the first of his three hits to right field for a single and Dick Ross was safe at first when a throw trying to get Burdine at second was late. Howard fanned, but the runners went up a base on a wild pitch. Stan Barrett sliced a single to right to drive in the two markers.

They also scored two more runs in the second to widen the lead to 4-0. Winkler flied to center as a lead off man, but Hale drew a base on balls. Suttle struck out, then Timberlake lashed a double to put runners on second and third. Burdine smashed a solid single to center to score the runs.

Do garden clubs make their communities better places to live in, for the entire citizenship? Take a quick look about Hereford today and you will have the answer to that question.

Civilized man has been planting from the very beginning, first in an individual way, and then in community planting. For generations Americans have helped to beautify the streets and squares of the towns and villages by planting them with trees and shrubs.

At present the field for community planting is a large one—and garden clubs are usually the active agents in what is done, for now that life has become more complex, the individual cannot do the whole job.

Locally, garden clubs have worked with individual gardeners to in-

terest city administrations and have brought about gratifying changes in neglected public areas as well as providing inspiring examples for individual property owners.

Hereford has three active garden clubs. The Hereford Garden Club was organized in 1937 and since its beginning has kept the club motto "Civic Beauty is a Civic Duty" uppermost in its endeavors. Its members sponsored the organization of The Garden Beautiful Club in 1946, which has for its motto "Civic Improvement and the Bud To Blossom Club in 1947 which works under the motto "A Thing of Beauty is a Joy Forever."

Civic Interest
How have these garden clubs gone about these beautification projects? They have adopted a

practical approach to the individual problems of this area in their aspirations to give a touch of nature's beauty to the mechanical framework of the community. They began a systematic study of trees and shrubs which take kindly to this locality, and they began the cultivation of beautiful flowers and how to grow them and then they made an extensive study of landscaping. They planted public areas with shrubs from their own gardens and took over the landscaping of the hospital, school and park grounds. They started a process that transformed many of the yards and premises of the city and have staged many flower shows which not only prove what can be done, but serve as inspiration to others to improve and beautify their home grounds, and to

Community Pride

There is a community spirit behind this planting interest which has spread over the entire area. Hereford citizens have caught that spirit and have joined in the effort to beautify the town. Today the well landscaped public areas, home places and parks, as well as literally thousands of blooming shrubs and the cultivation of almost every known flower, have become the pride of the community.

What a beautiful place Hereford could be if this spirit of civic pride launched by the Garden Clubs of the city, could invade every individual's line of thinking to the extent that they would seek to match these transformations on neglected areas and in home grounds with examples on his own premises.

July Yard Of Month Is Both Liveable, Lovely

Intimacy and privacy are afforded in the lovely "outdoor living room" of Mr. and Mrs. Norman Moore, by a complete enclosure of ornamental shrubs and trees and grape vines. Against this background, peonies, cannas, lavender and hybrid tea roses glow with blossoms to give an effect of a small fairy-land in flower.

The Moore place was chosen by the Hereford Garden Club committee as the "Yard of the Month" for July, because of its design and development which emphasize the architectural design of the house and ties it to its surroundings. Shrubs, trees and vines have been chosen with the proportion to the

house, ultimate height and breadth of the planting and its appearance four seasons of the year, in mind. It is the delightful, walled-in living area back of the house that gives the home its greatest charm. The view from the garden entrance intrigues the visitor with glimpses of well planned beauty. The planting at the west end located near the wall of the garage is the focal point. The wall is almost completely screened by the arbor over which the bitter-sweet vine climbs to give a cool effect. On either side of the arbor tall tapering evergreens help make it an integrated unit, while other shrubs in shades of red and green against which

four-o'clocks bloom and wind their way along the garden path leading into the garden. Rustic benches inside the arbor offer a seat in the shade and a pleasant view, and the setting is further enhanced by a garden statue, a deer, which serves as a focal point in this natural location.

Meals are enjoyed in the yard in the summer. Tables and benches of stained wood are placed conveniently near the hamburger grill and wide spreading umbrellas lend shade, comfort and privacy. The eye goes then, to the high red cedar hedge at the back with the red Paul Scarlet and Blaze roses of red and green against which
