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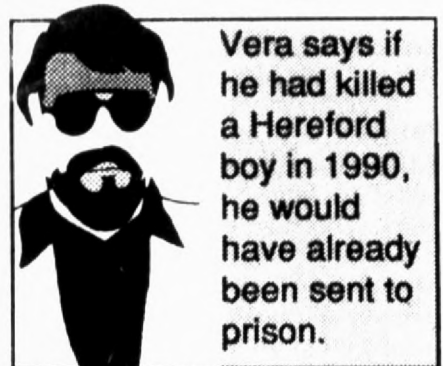

Gang member hopes for changes for kids



Vera says if he had killed a Hereford boy in 1990, he would have already been sent to prison.

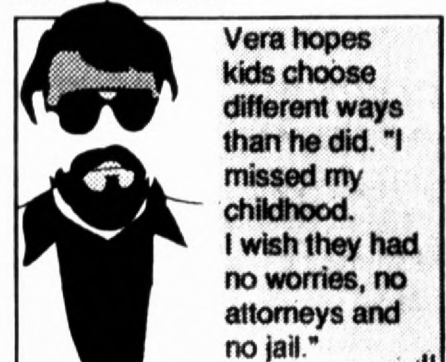

Joe Vera looks like any typical upwardly-mobile 20-year-old. He speaks with the vocabulary of a college graduate. He's well-groomed, well-dressed, and has a hardbody build. You wouldn't know that Joe Vera considers himself one of the meanest of the mean, baddest of the bad, in Hereford. He doesn't come across as a gang member. He says he doesn't go out looking for trouble. He gets plenty of trouble coming to him.

I met Joe Vera last weekend during a disturbance at Shiloh Apartments. There was a group of 25 or so people yelling and cursing at another group of 25 or so in the parking lot. The police had been called twice in 30 minutes to quell a conflict. During the second run, Joe Vera was there shooting off his mouth, yelling at police officers about how they wouldn't do anything, how bad they were, how they were unfair. Vera was challenged to talk to me. I told him if he really wanted to visit with me to come by the office on Monday. I didn't think he would take me up on the offer. He came by Monday.

"Before any great change comes great revolution," Vera said. "I saw that in Los Angeles with Rodney King, and you saw a little of it last Friday night." Vera explained that the two calls to Shiloh Apartments and another call behind the swimming pool at Dameron Park were related. It's all, Vera said, the beginning

of a long, hot, possibly violent summer. The Friday night battles started over something at school that day between rival groups, with the Palacios, Medeles and Regulator groups having words with the Garcias and Mendozas. The NAVagators were in there, too.

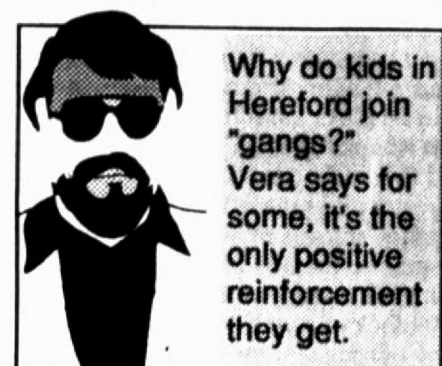


Vera hopes kids choose different ways than he did. "I missed my childhood. I wish they had no worries, no attorneys and no jail."

"Those aren't all the last names of the group members or anything," Vera said. "Sometimes, it's family against family. Their rivals among themselves. Sometimes it's pretty hilarious." The younger ones carried their day-long arguing to Shiloh. One

group took off, then another left. They went to Dameron Park, where one group attacked the other with tire tools and other "arms." The group that was attacked left for a few minutes; they came back with a Suburban and rammed the other group's car, then jumped out and beat in the windows. The two rival groups filed charges against each other. Another man, who said he was a gang member, said: "That's just the start. The weather's just getting warm, and they've built up frustrations and stuff all year long at school."

Vera says the situation is brewing just like it did two years ago. That's when Johnny Joe Martinez, 15, was killed on Sept. 2. His body, burned beyond recognition, was found outside a farmhouse just southwest of Hereford. No one has ever been charged with that murder. Sheriff's deputies, Texas Rangers and others have interviewed over 100 persons. They've used high-tech equipment to look for clues. They know who killed Martinez.



Why do kids in Hereford join "gangs?" Vera says for some, it's the only positive reinforcement they get.

A bunch of people, probably kids that same age. To find out exactly who, may never be known. "If I had killed that little kid, I'd have been in jail a long time ago," said Vera. "I know who did it, too. It was a bunch of them. If they're waiting for someone to snitch on someone, it'll never happen." "That was all gang stuff. Johnny Joe spouted off one time too many and he paid the ultimate price."

Why gangs? Vera says it's the local youths answer for organization, for respect,

for pleasure and recognition. It may be the only tangible support system for them. "Politicians' butts are on the line, and they take action and go through processes to take care of problems," Vera said. "We just bypass all of the processes." Vera is beyond going out and looking for trouble. His problems are enough with trouble finding him. "A little kid came up to me the other day, eight years old, over by West Central telling me that someone told him he kicked my butt," Vera said. "That's wrong. This guy had to have surgery. They came and picked him up and took him straight to the hospital." "But I guess he wanted this kid to look up to him so he lied to him. I hate these kids growing up too fast. I missed my childhood. I wish they had no worries, no attorneys, no jail. They would be better off, believe me." The kids learn the tough life. "You don't say anything, anything, unless you can back it up," Vera said. Police Action

Hereford stays busy day and night for police

It's 9 p.m. Friday, May 8 in Hereford. The first really warm Friday night of the spring is Fright Night for the Hereford Police Department. It's time to roll into action. If you've never ridden with the Hereford police, you're in for something unexpected. You can't imagine how a town alleged to roll up the sidewalks pretty early can be so alive so late into the night. Officer Terry Brown hasn't been on the street much lately. He's the DARE officer, part of the police department's commitment to try to nip crime early. Brown plays a large role, going to every sixth grade class in the county each school year to teach the DARE program. He's also a regular in programs like SOS, PALS and WHO in other grades. He misses the street. You can almost feel his adrenaline level go up as we roll down Lee

Street, wondering what the night will hold. The kids seem to like Brown, and Brown likes the kids, so we head for the parking lots at West Park Plaza. We ride around the crowd a couple of times to see if there are obvious problems. Then, Brown and I get out and walk around. "Just checking to make sure everyone's okay," Brown says. While we're there, his radio crackles. The clerk at EZ Mart has called asking police to chase away some unwanted persons in the parking lot. Instead of walking, we get back in the patrol car. Brown explains you feel much less naked with a ton of steel around you. "We've had a call from the folks here. They want y'all to move out of the parking lot," Brown tells a car full of youngsters. "Wait!" exclaims one girl. "We're just sitting here. Why don't you go bust (name deleted). He's got beer in his pickup."

We get a description of the pickup and where they may be parking. Brown thanks the kids and takes off. We've gone less than a block when Lt. Ronnie Henderson reports over the radio he's already stopped the truck. Officers found four cans of beer. A quick field sobriety test confirmed the kids, 17 and 18, had been drinking. One had lied about his age, saying he was 16. He gave the right name, and when it was checked, his proper birthday came out. "Why did you lie to me?" Brown asked. "Because I'm in the SOS class," the youth sheepishly replied. "I'm already on probation for this. I didn't want to get in any worse trouble." He, and the other one, are ticketed for minor in possession. Their beer is taken away. What will happen to the kid on probation? "It's up to the judge. He might get off, he might get fined \$500, who knows," Brown said. "All we can do

is find them and right them up. After that it's pretty much out of our hands." By the way, West Park parkers: Another officer told me later Friday that police find it funny that some of the kids think the police are spying on them from the roofs of surrounding buildings. The officer told me what they do, and it is funny. I had to take an oath I wouldn't tell. But, no one is fining or narking or anything... We're going down East Park Avenue, right in front of the city swimming pool, when dispatcher Kim Klos reports a fight behind the swimming pool. "We're 23," Brown says. That's radio lingo for "we're there." "I can't believe this," I tell Brown. "Yeah, it's always on the other side of town," Brown said. "It's never in front of you. This must be for you." Instead, it's a special one for (See POLICE, Page 2A)

City water boss says lack of rain hurting the system

That time of year has arrived when water consumption in Hereford begins to climb at an accelerated pace as homeowners irrigate their lawns and gardens. In general, people just use more water. In 1991, the average daily water consumption in Hereford was slightly more than 3 million gallons. Last Tuesday, the highest total for a day so far this year was recorded when the city water department pumped almost 6 million gallons. Ted Ray Coleman, city water production superintendent, fears use will climb even more if rainfall does not pick up. Although some moisture came toward the end of the week, evaporation when the temperatures are high tends to reduce the benefits of Mother Nature. The city water supply comes from 31 wells that provided 1.095 billion gallons of water for customers in 1991. And, that was a year when rainfall averaged 28.4 inches in Hereford. Coleman collects rainfall totals from gauges placed at three locations

and averages the amounts for his records. By using this method, Coleman will report a different amount of rainfall than the official weather station. "The difference is the weather station has one gauge at one place and I use three at separate locations," said Coleman. For his purposes, he believes his approach tells the overall rain amounts better. Value of the rain on the water supply is reflected in the smaller drop in the wells' water tables. Coleman checks both static and pump levels of wells in February every year and again at the end of the summer. The static level is the point reached by the water when the well is not being pumped. He said the static level drop last February for the 31 wells was an average of .35 feet, or about four inches. In 1991, the static level had fallen 2.1 feet and in 1990, 2.7 feet. The 1992 picture could be much bleaker if rainfall amounts don't improve measurably. (See WATER, Page 2A)

Poppy Day is Wednesday



Poppy Day is proclaimed

Mayor Tom LeGate proclaims Wednesday, May 20, as "Poppy Day" in Hereford and urges citizens to support the American Legion Auxiliary in observance of the day. Ruth King, left, vice president, and Clara Trowbridge, Auxiliary president, were present for the proclamation signing. The Auxiliary will distribute the traditional red poppies Wednesday and accept donations to help disabled veterans.

"Poppy Day" will be conducted by the American Legion Auxiliary here Wednesday, and Mayor Tom LeGate has officially proclaimed May 20 as a day of observance for the memorial poppy.

Auxiliary members will be distributing the lapel poppies and accepting donations on that day. The funds are used for the rehabilitation of veterans and their families. One-third of the money collected goes to disabled veterans who make the poppies, according to Clara Trowbridge, president of the Hereford Legion Auxiliary.

The Hereford unit of the American Legion organized the Auxiliary in 1929, and the first Poppy distribution for donations was conducted in 1930.

"The memorial Poppy, on a lapel, in a corsage or wreath arrangement, is as meaningful today as it has been since its inception at the end of World War I," said Mrs. Trowbridge.

The flower was first promoted in 1918 and were distributed to the 32nd Division soldiers from Milwaukee, Wis., at a homecoming in New York City. This marked the beginning of the poppy program and nationwide distribution began in 1921. By 1924, the Legion turned over responsibility of the program to its Auxiliary.

The Poppies for Texas are made at the Temple Veterans Hospital, and the poppy makers are disabled and hospitalized veterans. The Department of Texas Auxiliary furnishes the crepe paper and green stems used in making the poppies.

Coleman's moisture averages so far this year, by month, are .55 in January; .30 in February; 2.8 in March and .43 in April. May had a half-inch, or less, of moisture reported.

In looking over a "facts sheet" recently, during Water Utilities Awareness Week early in May,

Coleman found what he believes to be important information for the water consumer to realize:

-- In the home bathroom, an average shower requires 40 to 50 gallons of water and one toilet flush consumes five gallons.

-- Washing dishes is a 20-gallon job.

-- A car wash consumes 40 gallons of water, on average.

-- A homeowner will use an average of 200,000 gallons of water on the lawn during a summer.

-- Watering an acre of land the equivalent of one inch uses 27,000 gallons.

-- Each individual uses an average of 125 gallons of water daily.

Summertime water use climbs, especially, said Coleman, in three areas -- lawns and gardens; recreation, such as swimming pools and hot tubs, and cleaning and washing cars.

He has some suggestions that will help Hereford residents conserve their water supply.

"One thing we can do is keep the grass a little higher -- about one and a half to three inches -- so the roots are shaded, instead of scalping the lawn," said Coleman. "You don't have to mow as often either."

Another conservation practice that he recommends for lawns is to measure the amount applied and stick to an inch of water per week. Investment in some gauges that can be pushed down to ground level will help measure the water sprinkled on the grass.

Early morning is considered the best time of day to water lawns but Coleman said the next-best is late afternoon and early evening.

"Evaporation is less during those hours," he said. Late night water application often is bad because the moisture lingers on the grass, promoting plant disease.

A sprinkler that distributes large drops low to the ground is more efficient, Coleman continued, than one that sprays water high and increases the chance for evaporation.

He said a major consideration is setting the sprinkler for maximum effect on grass and "not on the sidewalk or street."

In the home, Coleman said a major conservation effort should be made by repairing leaks.

"An aerator on a shower will reduce the amount of water but still provide a good shower, too," added Coleman.

A little rainfall goes a long way toward reducing water consumption from the tap.

For example, in June 1991, Coleman recorded an average of 4.6-inches of moisture. The city system provided 118 million gallons to utility customers that month. In the same month a year earlier, rainfall was significantly less and the department pumped 200 million gallons.

The difference in the two months is revealed in the 3.9 million gallons pumped on a daily average in '91, and 6.3 million average in 1990.

Since West Texas cannot depend on rain to water lawns and gardens and for all the other human and animal uses, conservation practices are the only answer to protect a dwindling underground supply, Coleman said.

Brown. His pay for volunteering to come in and chauffeur me around is six hours of filling out reports as eight juveniles explain an incident eight different ways. Brown, I find out the next day, is at the police station until 6 a.m. filling out paperwork. The next night, Brown tells me the average cop will spend almost half his time filling out reports.

Since Brown is busy and someone's supposed to be taking me around, I get shuffled from patrol car to patrol car the rest of Friday night. We get called twice in a half-hour to Shiloh Apartments. Things have gotten out of hand.

There are four or five little groups standing just outside apartments or in the parking lot. They're yelling and screaming at one another. It seems like half have a beer in their hands.

One man called us to his apartment. "I want these people to leave," the man said. I don't want them in my apartment.

"Then tell them to leave," said an officer.

"I don't want to. I might make them mad."

The police explain they can't really make anyone leave unless the man wants them out. He doesn't really want them out, so the police have to say, sorry.

When we go back later, the man and his "guests" are in the middle of turmoil in the parking lot. We call for backups, with two sheriff's deputies joining four policemen and two Hereford EMS attendants.

A man breaks away from one of the crowds and starts badmouthing the cops. He tells them how bad they are and how they never do anything and blah blah blah. Everyone's watching him, making sure he's not going to do something crazy when all of a sudden bloom! goes glass near one of the groups.

Paraphrasing, leaving the cuss words out, someone screams, "I guess you didn't see that!"

Well, yeah, you're right, we didn't.

Everyone blames everyone else for throwing what turned out to be a huge beer mug. Everyone gets told to go somewhere other than out here in the parking lot.

Will Congress pull plug on excess cost?

When the federal government "reaches out to touch someone," it puts the touch directly on the taxpayers. And whether taxpayers are being touched far too much is the focus of a debate on Capitol Hill over changing the government's largest civilian contract, the PTS 2000 procurement program for long-distance telephone services.

Here's how the program works. The government requires federal agencies to use FTS 2000 for all their long-distance phone service. AT&T and Sprint are the only two vendors the government allows to provide basic long-distance services for the FTS 2000 program under a policy of "mandatory use." The policy was based on an assumption that the huge volume of government phone traffic, coupled with long-term contracts, would generate the lowest prices available.

The results have been just the opposite—higher prices. By excluding all but two competitors, the mandatory use policy compels federal agencies to ignore the availability of cheaper and more efficient phone services for other companies. Investigating just one of the six long-distance services AT&T and Sprint provide for FTS 2000, the General Accounting Office (GAO) found that the government is paying \$148 million over comparable private-sector rates during 1991 and 1992. Over the course of the program's ten-year contract, this figure can easily spiral into billions.

GAO also estimated that the government's cost on the other FTS 2000 services may be 60 percent higher than commercial costs for the same services. Critics noted that these windfall over payments are a large taxpayer subsidy for the much lower rates given to large corporate customers of AT&T and Sprint.

Reaction in Congress has been mixed. When GAO's findings were brought to the attention of Senator John Glenn (D-Ohio), chair of the Senate Governmental Affairs Committee, he stated that "we simply cannot tolerate this form a system that is suppose to save money. This is one senator that will not support a system that is wasting millions of taxpayer dollars."

In contrast, the House Government Operations Committee proceeded to report out a comprehensive government procurement bill (H.R.3161) which included provisions to make the mandatory use policy permanent. House committee hearings never even reviewed the mandatory use provision the committee adopted. The companion bill in the Senate, introduced by Senator Glenn, contains no mention of mandatory use.

Given massive federal budget deficits, numerous government procurement scandals, and the savings ad loan bailout mess, critics are sounding alarms about the House procurement bill at its FTS 2000 mandatory use provision. Editor's challenge

It is our policy not to respond to a letter to the editor unless the writer asks for our opinion or invites our participation. We adopted that policy because we don't want writers to think we will be critical of their letters. We like to get letters from our readers!

Four letters, all from junior high teachers, are included in the "Letters to the Editor" column on this page. The letters are critical of editor John Brooks' article concerning Police Chief Don Brush's remarks at the Teenage Alcohol Awareness meeting Tuesday.

We are happy to get constructive criticism. In fact, we are quite accustomed to hearing the bad and not the good. That's human nature—just as some readers think we only report the bad and not the good. That's human nature.

But, there are some points we'd like to comment on from our side of the fence:

First, the police chief's remarks may or may not have deserved a "sidebar" story. That's a question of news judgement and every reporter would write a different article on the meeting. And, we should point out, that a number of people personally complimented Brooks on the articles, but didn't write letters.

Secondly, we're sure Brush's remark about hoping for a small crowd was a reference to being uncomfortable in speaking to a large group. If that was his meaning, it probably should have been explained better.

But I certainly take issue with the statement that "this is not the first time Mr. Brooks has gone to great lengths to make Hereford look bad." As an editor, Brooks has to report some bad news, but in no manner is he out to make the community look bad.

For it is uncomfortable to be the center of a controversy. Because a small-town editor personally knows individuals and may be involved with them on a social level, it places him under a narrow kind of obligation—to be forthright and honest in his evaluations of their performance as citizens, or public officials.

We all like to be loved, but there is usually someone who doesn't care for us. If an editor is beloved by every member of the community, he usually is not doing his job. If he is completely happy praising all the good things about his community and completely ignoring its faults, he is failing in his responsibilities.

There is a genuine challenge to this sort of journalistic responsibility in that we have to learn to accept people as individuals, even while differing vigorously on occasion with their public actions.

Brooks had his feelings hurt by some of the criticism. I passed along some advice that a wise man gave me when I was a young editor: "The small-town editor must learn to 'speak the truth in love', as the New Testament phrases it."

Otherwise, he might speak judgmentally, or even vindictively. If he can maintain that "truth in love" philosophy, the editor will fulfill, in the highest sense, his function as a journalist and a human being.

Riot jolts government to action

WASHINGTON (AP) - Sometimes, the senator observed, it takes a kick in the teeth before the government gets the message.

This time, and not for the first time, the message with the kick came from Los Angeles. Jolted by the deadly rioting there, President Bush and Democratic leaders of Congress agreed to seek urgent action on legislation to deal with the ills of depressed inner cities, and the black and other minority Americans who live there.

The initial installment: Bush announced \$600 million in loans for low income housing on Wednesday. And the House moved swiftly to provide funds for about \$600 million in emergency business loans and disaster relief.

Longer-term federal efforts to deal with urban problems remain an agenda, not yet an answer. In other times, with other leaders - but the same, unrelenting problems - much of what's happening now has happened before.

Bush and the Democrats did not settle on specific bills, or on how to pay for tax incentives, jobs programs, education, housing and law enforcement aid.

The president said no new taxes; Democrats said it might take taxes and a shift of defense savings into domestic spending to do what's needed.

Those are familiar differences. The impasse of a politically divided government seldom has involved goals but, rather, how to get there, how much to spend, and how to pay.

Now such questions are to be handled urgently, despite the rivalries of the presidential campaign season. "Americans need to know that their president and Congress, whatever their differences, can work together to meet urgent national needs," the Democratic leaders said in a letter to Bush before they met on Tuesday.

Bush said much the same as he campaigned, unsuccessfully, for his economic recovery plan early this year. The Democrats pushed their own version, and the result was impasse.

In this situation, another stalemate would carry political risks for both sides. They're all incumbents, after all, most of them seeking new terms from a skeptical, frustrated electorate dissatisfied with job performance in both Congress and the White House.

So the mood, by all accounts, is for action.

Would that be so but for the riots sparked by the police acquittals in the Rodney King beating case? "I doubt it," said Senate Republican Leader Bob Dole of Kansas.

Nor, he said, would government programs insure against trouble in depressed cities elsewhere. "This just isn't Los Angeles," he said. "But it

does indicate that sometimes you need sort of a kick in the teeth before we get the message."

Dole and the Democrats talked of enacting legislation within a few weeks or a month, top speed for Congress, an institution Bush once said could slow the aging process. No deadlines were set, but bipartisanship won't last long into the summer of the national political conventions.

Nor, as Dole noted, will the sense of urgency. "We need to do this fairly quickly before something else happens either here or around the world that would shift the focus," he said. "So we have maybe 30 days, because people do lose interest."

Interest has faded before - after the Watts riots in Los Angeles in 1965, the city violence in 1967, the riots and destruction that erupted after the assassination of Martin Luther King Jr. in 1968.

Each time, the appraisal of underlying causes - unemployment, poverty, educational and housing needs, crime, racial discrimination - was the same. Indeed, a New York commission that looked into racial rioting in Harlem in 1935 saw the same set of problems behind the unrest.

The government tried to deal with them, through the Democratic social programs of Lyndon B. Johnson's Great Society, with federal grants to cities under Richard M. Nixon. Unresolved, but relatively quiet, the troubles of the cities slipped down the priority list.

While Democrats said periodically that Ronald Reagan and now Bush were ignoring urban policy, none of the national candidates, in either party, had talked much about it in this campaign.

Until now.

Saturday will start with a western poetry brunch at the Big Texan Steak Raach in Amarillo where the

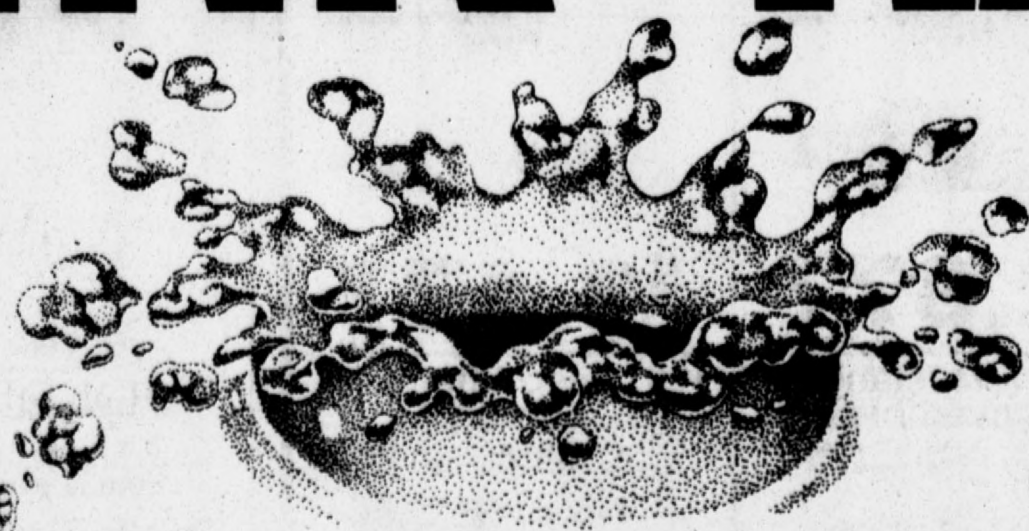

Sellers raises \$2,400 with 75 hours of tennis

Torey Sellers, who advanced to the regional tourney playing for the HHS tennis team, doesn't complain to his big brother about long matches.

That's because brother Trent Sellers recently played for 75 straight hours while breaking a world record in a benefit "Ten-a-thon" that raised \$2,400. Trent is a minister in the Baptist Student Union at the University of Iowa. He donated half the money to the BSU and half to the Iowa City Tennis Association.

Torey, who was presented a Media Award for tennis at the All-Sports Banquet Monday night, is proud of his big brother but doesn't necessarily want to break his marathon record.

"About one-third of the way through, I really started getting tight, but now it seems like I could do it again," he told the Iowa City Press-Citizen shortly after finishing.

Trent is the son of Sandra Sellers of Hereford and David Sellers of Pampa, and his grandparents are Norman and Pete Hodges of Hereford.

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Hubbard plans horse track for Fort Worth

 DALLAS (AP) - R.D. Hubbard's office in downtown Fort Worth looks east toward suburban Grand Prairie, and the plot of Trinity River bottom where he'd like to plant his flag, one more time, on American pari-mutuel racing.

The sport already bears his mark in many places. Dogs and horses run at Hubbard tracks in Kansas, California, New Mexico and Oregon. His racehorses have won more than \$10 million. He's been heralded as savior of a sinking industry, a man with vision and the money to make it reality. A glass manufacturing magnate, he's a bottom-line businessman whose personality nevertheless seems suited to the flamboyance of racing - as better, horse owner, track owner and, maybe, empire builder.

With those credentials, some people wonder why the Texas Racing Commission doesn't just hand Randall Dec Hubbard the license for North Texas' first major pari-mutuel license. His application to build a \$96 million track near Belt Line Road and Interstate 30 appears better financed than any of his three competitors. His group, Midpointe Racing Ltd., has money, management experience and top names in Dallas business and in Texas racing.

"He's a dynamo," said friend and partner Dr. Ed Allred, who also runs a chain of family planning clinics in California. "There's nobody I know that can take a new racetrack, have the people and expertise to put it together the way he can - nobody comes close. That should be the only thing anyone really cares about."

But Hubbard also has detractors, both in racing and in the glass business. Despite various accolades from racing organizations, he and his business methods have come under criticism from industry members in Kansas, New Mexico, California and Texas. His Ruidoso, N.M., and Kansas City tracks are facing tough times. A bitter fight for control of California's Hollywood Park track raised questions about his relationship to a massive pari-mutuel conglomerate with a racketeering conviction.

And a lawsuit filed last summer by former glass company workers alleged that Hubbard and his firm, AFG Industries, improperly helped Michael Milken and Drexel Burnham Lambert take over other companies.

Many of the complaints against him have a common theme: that Hubbard plays to win, regardless, sometimes, of the cost to others.

His success elsewhere may prove a handicap in Texas. Some players in the racing game believe he represents a perilous trend for their industry: control of racing in fewer hands. They fear that some tracks would be reduced to closed-circuit betting parlors with no live racing.

"Our industry (racing) is just in the early stages of consolidation," Hubbard responds. "Like any industry in trouble, (racing) will go through a consolidation period and be better off for it."

He likens it to the glass industry, in which he merged two marginally profitable businesses and made them into the second-largest glass company in North America.

But the comparison may be unfortunate. AFG Industries has been losing money for two years. The corporation is seeking new investment to help pay off debts on which it otherwise may have to default, according to a stock offering prospectus.

In both glass and racing, Hubbard prefers to play cards close to the vest. But does he have a plan for increasing his control of the racing industry?

"If I did," he says, "I wouldn't tell you."

At 56, Hubbard is quick-tempered and fast-moving - a consummate salesman still looking for the next win, the next challenge.

By some estimates, he is worth more than \$100 million. With his wife, Joan Dale Hubbard, he founded an art museum in Ruidoso and a private charitable foundation. He owns more than 170 racehorses and has homes in Fort Worth, Ruidoso and La Quinta, Calif.

His natural habitat, however, seems to be a plane or hotel room.

"I travel about half the time," he said. "I like it."

Home originally was the small town of Smith Center, Kan. He spent two years as a junior high school basketball coach and teacher before joining

Safelite Industries in Wichita, Kan., in 1959. His job was soliciting windshield business from insurance agents. Hubbard's boss there sparked his interest in horses.

By 1968, Hubbard was president and Safelite was one of the country's largest auto glass manufacturers. Then he and his partners bought the companies that would become the nucleus of AFG Industries. In 1988, Hubbard led a buyout of stockholders and took the mammoth glass company private.

It was a big year in racing, too. Hubbard and Allred, who had owned horses together, bought Ruidoso Downs. With another partner, Hubbard won the license for The Woodlands dog-and-horse track in Kansas City, Kan. He owns 60 percent of each track.

Then Hubbard went after Los Alamitos, a smaller Southern California track. When he and Allred were outmaneuvered for full ownership, Allred settled for part ownership, financed by a \$7 million loan from his partner.

In 1991 Hubbard acquired 15 percent

the stock of Hollywood Park, a larger track north of Los Angeles. In 1992, he completed purchase of a dog track in suburban Portland, Ore. He also owns a "minimal" amount of stock in Santa Anita, a premier California Thoroughbred track.

In the last five years, Hubbard has invested more than \$58 million in racetracks, not to mention the \$9.75 million that would be his share of Midpointe's cost.

"I got into Ruidoso because we felt if something didn't change, they (the track) would be out of business," he said. "Once I got involved, and saw we could make a difference ... I sort of liked it."

One of his greatest assets, in running racetracks, Hubbard believes, is his willingness to change.

"If racing ... keeps trying to do things as they were done 40 or 50 years ago, it is going to suffer all the more," he said. "It is very important ... to change our way of doing business."

He wants to transform racing into the kind of household tradition that football and baseball have become - by making it easier for the casual bettor to understand and by getting racing back into the television market.

Hubbard hopes to create a national league of horse racing. Fans would follow league standings throughout the season, developing loyalty to favorite horses, jockeys and stables.

The American Championship Racing Series, of which Hubbard is a director, is a step in that direction. Horses compete in a series of stakes races, and owners this year will take home more than \$7.7 million in prize money.

Hubbard also emphasizes the need to take care of customers. At Ruidoso and Hollywood Park, he has been

praised for spending millions on improvements from barns to grandstands. Hollywood Park now offers a Las Vegas-style incentive system for frequent bettors.


Admirers say one reason Hubbard is a good track owner is that he is a gambler himself. In a 1990 lawsuit over acquisition of a racetrack, he testified to having wagered at least \$30,000 and maybe as much as \$100,000 at his tracks in the preceding year.

"There's nothing I enjoy more than seeing my own horse run and win," he said recently, although Texas law will prohibit him from running his own at Midpointe if the Grand Prairie application wins a license.

Hubbard's investments of cash and creativity have been a feast to a fan-starved industry made lean by recession, increased competition for the gambling dollar and tax law changes that have pushed many breeders out of the business.

But controversy has been a companion to his relentless shopping expedition.

At Ruidoso, the questions began in 1969, when Hubbard became a 24 percent owner in Newco Industries Inc., which bought controlling interest in the facility.

According to records, Newco officials failed to tell the New Mexico State Racing Commission that their purchase had been made with a \$600,000 loan from Emprise Corp. In return, the firm was to receive a 20-year concession contract.

Even then, allegations were being made that Emprise was involved with organized crime. Three years later, the corporation would be convicted on a federal racketeering charge for conspiring to help organized crime figures gain control of a Las Vegas hotel and casino.

The Racing Commission first refused but then granted Newco's license. Soon after, the company sold the New Mexico track.

Emprise Corp. eventually became New York-based Delaware North Cos., the country's largest pari-mutuel operator. Hubbard's dealings with Emprise and Delaware North and his friendship with its chairman have been questioned repeatedly over the years.

When Hubbard returned with Allred in 1988 to buy Ruidoso, the Racing Commission granted their license. Hubbard put \$3 million into improvements for the shabby track, and wagering and attendance increased.

In Kansas, Hubbard's unsuccessful rivals for the track license charged in court that he was given an unfair advantage by ties to the state attorney general, whose office advises the state's Racing Commission and oversees the agency that investigates track applicants' backgrounds. Several years earlier, Hubbard acknowledges, he had given \$10,000 to help a longtime friend and former business associate settle a sexual harassment suit.

State courts upheld the license award. Hubbard points out that the harassment settlement occurred two years before pari-mutuel racing was legalized in Kansas.

Perhaps his bloodiest acquisition was Hollywood Park, which he first considered trying to acquire in 1986. Four years later, he began buying its stock and challenged then-chairwoman Marge Everett for control. Lawsuits and personal attacks followed.

At one point, Hubbard bought a half-page newspaper ad to claim he had won the proxy fight. A federal judge found the claim to be false and ordered him to buy another ad to set the story straight.

In preparation for Texas licensing hearings this summer, Hubbard said Midpointe offers "demonstrated and proven abilities in all areas" of racetrack management.

But that doesn't mean he's a proven success in racetracks. Few track owners are in the 1990s.

The Woodlands horse track lost about \$5.4 million in 1991, although its dog track profits covered that. Some Kansas horse breeders have accused Hubbard of bad faith, saying he reneged on promises to provide 101 nights of summer racing, night lights and an air-conditioned grandstand. It currently has a 62-day fall season, no night lights and no air conditioning.

At least three Kansans are so angry that they are opposing Midpointe's application.

Hubbard says he never promised lights or air conditioning.

Kansas Racing Commission executive secretary Dana Nelson agreed that The Woodlands "probably" kept the promises it made on paper to the commission. However, he noted, the original application "listed 100-plus days with a 7 p.m. post (starting time) ... Anyone with a modicum of intelligence would figure there would be lights."

Dan Fick, senior director of racing for the American Quarter Horse Association, gives Hubbard significant credit for building The Woodlands, bringing quarter horse racing to California's Hollywood Park and buying Ruidoso, where the richest quarter horse races in the country are run.

"I don't think you can measure the contribution he (Hubbard) has made over the last five years" to quarter horse racing, he said.

Despite Hubbard's investment at Ruidoso, the track is losing money - about \$700,000 last year, according to its owner. A nearby hotel project in which he and Allred invested is stalled.

Hubbard disagrees, but other observers and horsemen say that Texas' Class 2 tracks have cut sharply into the number of horses racing in New Mexico.

"It's going to be tough," Allred said of Ruidoso's future. "As a business enterprise it totally doesn't make any sense at all ... It's a labor of love."

Hubbard apparently is hoping that his Texas track will help his New Mexico track. At a recent meeting of the Texas Quarter Horse Association, he proposed a racing circuit of major tracks in the Dallas area, San Antonio, Houston and Ruidoso.

Bob Blakeman of Fort Worth, a top Texas racehorse breeder, and other association members oppose the idea. "I love racing at Ruidoso,"

Blakeman said. "But we've got to have racing for the state of Texas. We've got to keep our horses here, keep our money here."

Hubbard believes he has no more problems with horse owners and trainers than any other track owner. "The two people who should be working the closest together, with the most to win or lose, are the racetrack owners and horsemen. For some reason they seem to be the ones at opposite ends, always fighting," he said.

Horse owners and trainers often feel like captives of track owners. They fear, rightly or wrongly, that if they anger management, they will not be allotted stalls in the racetrack barns the following season or will be otherwise penalized.

The concerns increase with Hubbard because of his multitrack ownership, his strong views on limiting live racing and increasing simulcasting and especially because of his association with Allred.

"I've trained for R.D. and had a lot of dealings with him. He's a Number One, first-class person," said Blane Schvaneveldt of California, who regularly tops the national standings for quarter horse trainers.

"He took some bad places and helped them, but I don't think one person should control all the racing," he said. Hubbard "is getting his fingers in a lot of places."

Schvaneveldt points to Allred to illustrate his fears. "One person has control of all the quarter horse racing in California, and look what he's done to it," he said. "He doesn't listen at all to horse people. It's his way or the highway."

The debate over simulcasting - the practice of televising one track's live races to other tracks where bets also can be placed - is one of the hottest in racing today. Tracks on the decline have increased overall attendance and betting totals by piping in additional races via simulcast.

In other places, however, simulcasting has begun to replace live racing. Its attractions are low overhead and none of the hassles that come with handling horses, trainers and jockeys.

Hubbard supports simulcasting, contending that an overabundance of live racing has hurt the industry.

"Today, nationally, we probably have several thousand more race days than we had 10 years ago," he said. The pool of racing fans hasn't expanded to keep pace, though, partly because of competition from lotteries and other forms of gambling.

A partial solution, as he sees it, is to limit the amount of live racing offered at each track and to fill the breach with simulcasting. That way, hard-core bettors will still be able to wager and those interested in seeing horses run live will get a break in the season.

At Hollywood Park, however, Hubbard's plans to simulcast quarter horse and harness races during the live Thoroughbred racing led to a boycott by horse owners. The boycott was called off only after Hubbard agreed not to do simulcast on Friday nights.

"Simulcasting has proliferated at an uncontrolled rate, with little to no regulation," said Diane Simmons, editor of "Speedhorse: The Racing Report."

"It poses a very real danger of

reducing live racing. Mr. Hubbard has demonstrated in no uncertain terms ... that simulcasting is one of his main objectives."

And that, she said, makes her worry more about an industry monopoly.

"If you want to race your quarter horse, where do you go? To Ruidoso? It is owned by Hubbard and Dr. Allred. To The Woodlands? It is owned by Hubbard. Los Alamitos? Find it difficult to believe he has no influence there," she said.


Ms. Simmons said that what happens in Texas is critical because it is the last major pari-mutuel market left.

"There's no place left to go after Texas. This is it. If we mess it up here, we don't have another place to try."

Hubbard discounts the argument that more control for him means dwindling freedom of choice for horse owners.

"How is that different from the way it is now?" he asks.



Global warming, over-grazing endanger ranchland

LUBBOCK, Texas (AP) - The fabled short-grass ranchland of West Texas could be reduced to a desert of useless dirt if global warming forecasts are correct and extensive animal grazing persists, scientists say.

"You are not going to have the Sahara, but you are much more likely to see spaced out arid shrubland like you find in southeastern New Mexico," says William Schlesinger, an ecosystem scientist at Duke University.

Schlesinger, who has helped publish a study called "Biological Feedbacks in Global Desertification," says desert conditions could affect hundreds of thousands of acres used for ranching in West Texas within 100 years.

"If weather models calling for increased temperatures and drier conditions are correct, the rolling short-grass prairie ranches significant to West Texas could be in jeopardy," adds Schlesinger.

Patricia Fall of Arizona State

University and Bruce Hayden of the University of Virginia have also published data showing how grazing and its effects contribute to desert conditions.

Other scientists in the field of range and wildlife management and arid studies disagree with Schlesinger's findings, saying only under the most extreme conditions could the ranchland of West Texas evolve into a grass-less, mesquite-filled dust bowl.

"The threat about global warming in so far as it applies to our area is that it's going to get hotter and drier, but it's not going to turn West Texas into a desert," says Dr. Harold Dregne, a retired professor of Texas Tech's International Center for Arid and Semi-Arid Land Studies.

At the heart of Schlesinger's argument is the damage West Texas grasslands have incurred from animal grazing.

Schlesinger says cattle, sheep and goats have eaten much of the region's fertile foliage, making conditions prime for mesquite and creosote

bushes, which suck up valuable nutrients and thrive in desert conditions.

"Research shows areas scattered throughout the western third of Texas have lost grass due to grazing and shrubs have invaded," Schlesinger said.

"The spaces between the mesquite and creosote bushes are exposed to wind erosion and could bring about the possibility of the dust bowl" similar to those witnessed in Oklahoma and Kansas in the 1930s.

Schlesinger says the only way to preserve the grasslands of West Texas is to "reduce grazing intensity because there's nothing we can do about the weather."

Jerry Holecek, a professor of range animal ecology at New Mexico State University, agrees that "there are ranges in New Mexico and extreme West Texas that are deteriorating due to excessive numbers of livestock."

But Holecek, who has written a widely used textbook titled "Range Management Principles and

Practices," says most ranchers have become sensitive to overgrazing.

"I feel the cuts ranchers have made set the stage for quite a bit of the recovery we had in the later part of the 1980s," Holecek said. "I think if we had a couple dry years again, the ranchers would sell off animals and adjust."

Jim Barron III, general manager of the Tongue River and Spur Headquarters ranches in Spur, which grazes thousands of head of cattle a year, said ranching is not the problem.

"The majority of the ranchers in Texas have been in business a long, long time," Barron said. "My family has been in ranching for nearly 100 years."

"And what environmentalists don't understand and maybe don't want to understand is we are extremely sensitive to the ecosystem and trying to keep that renewable resource in the best shape possible. It's our lifeblood. We have to be aware."

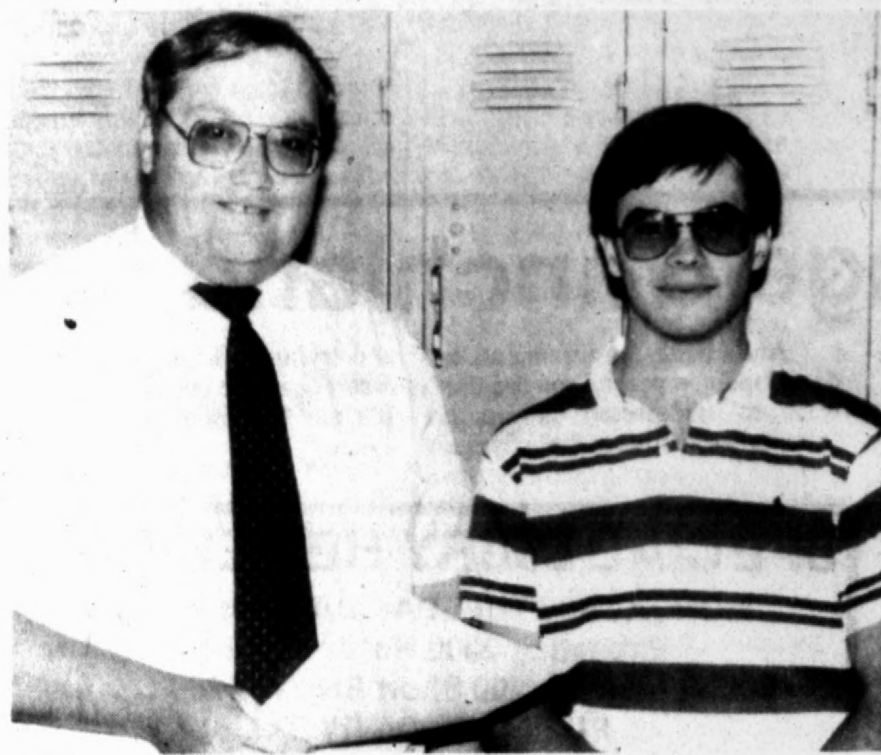

Perot tough, but generous, boss

DALLAS (AP) - Ross Perot was a tough boss at Electronic Data Systems Corp., instilling military-style order and dress codes. But he also inspired loyalty with extraordinary personal assistance and with benefits packages that made some rich.

"He was very, very demanding," said Jerry Dalton, a retired Air Force general who led EDS' public relations department from 1980-84. "There are a lot of people who for one reason or another couldn't cut it in his organization. For those who did and produced, he took good care of them."

"We used to say the kind of guy we wouldn't want around EDS was a lazy genius," said Tom Marquez, Perot's first hire at EDS and later a vice president and director. "Ross is very, very interested in people living up to their potential."

Much of Perot's public persona is tied to EDS, the company he started and one that revolutionized the computer services industry. Some of his personality is still reflected in EDS' culture.

His more stringent requirements - he once only hired married men as EDS job recruiters because Perot feared a bachelor might not stay on long - gave way to more modern business practices.

But employees said they put up with his strict rules because of what they described as two-way loyalty - and benefit plans that included lucrative stock options.

"The guy cutting the grass at my house has the same health plan I have," Perot once said.

Perot recruited many employees from the military, believing they were more likely to accept his insistence on a dress code - white shirts for men, no pants for women - and 24-hour availability.

"One of the things we were always looking for is people who were self-motivated," said Marquez, who is now a private investor in Dallas.

He sold EDS to General Motors in 1984, a deal that made EDS a giant. The company bought him out in 1986 for more than \$700 million.

EDS had revenue in 1991 of \$7.1 billion.

Perot is trying to repeat his EDS success with Perot Systems Inc., launched in 1988. The company, based in Herndon, Va., had 1991 revenues of \$200 million from 35 clients.

But last week, Perot Systems announced its biggest deals yet, 10- and 12-year contracts worth a combined \$1 billion with East Midlands Electricity, a leading utility company in Britain, and Europcar, the largest vehicle rental firm in Europe.

He also intervened often on behalf of employees' families in times of crisis, the most familiar instance

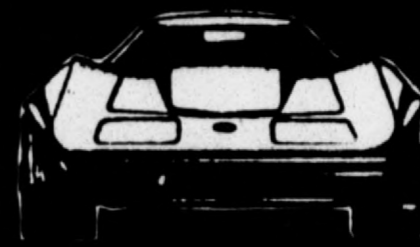
being his work to help two EDS employees escape from an Iranian jail in 1979.

Dalton said many EDS workers "would go through hell for him ... because Perot knew loyalty goes both ways."

With Perot now a potential independent candidate for president, EDS will no longer discuss him publicly. He's also a business competitor now and EDS has military and federal contracts that could be affected if Perot were elected.

Since leaving EDS, Perot's relationship with the company that made him a billionaire has been alternately cordial and litigious.

"I picked up half a brick and put it right in his face."

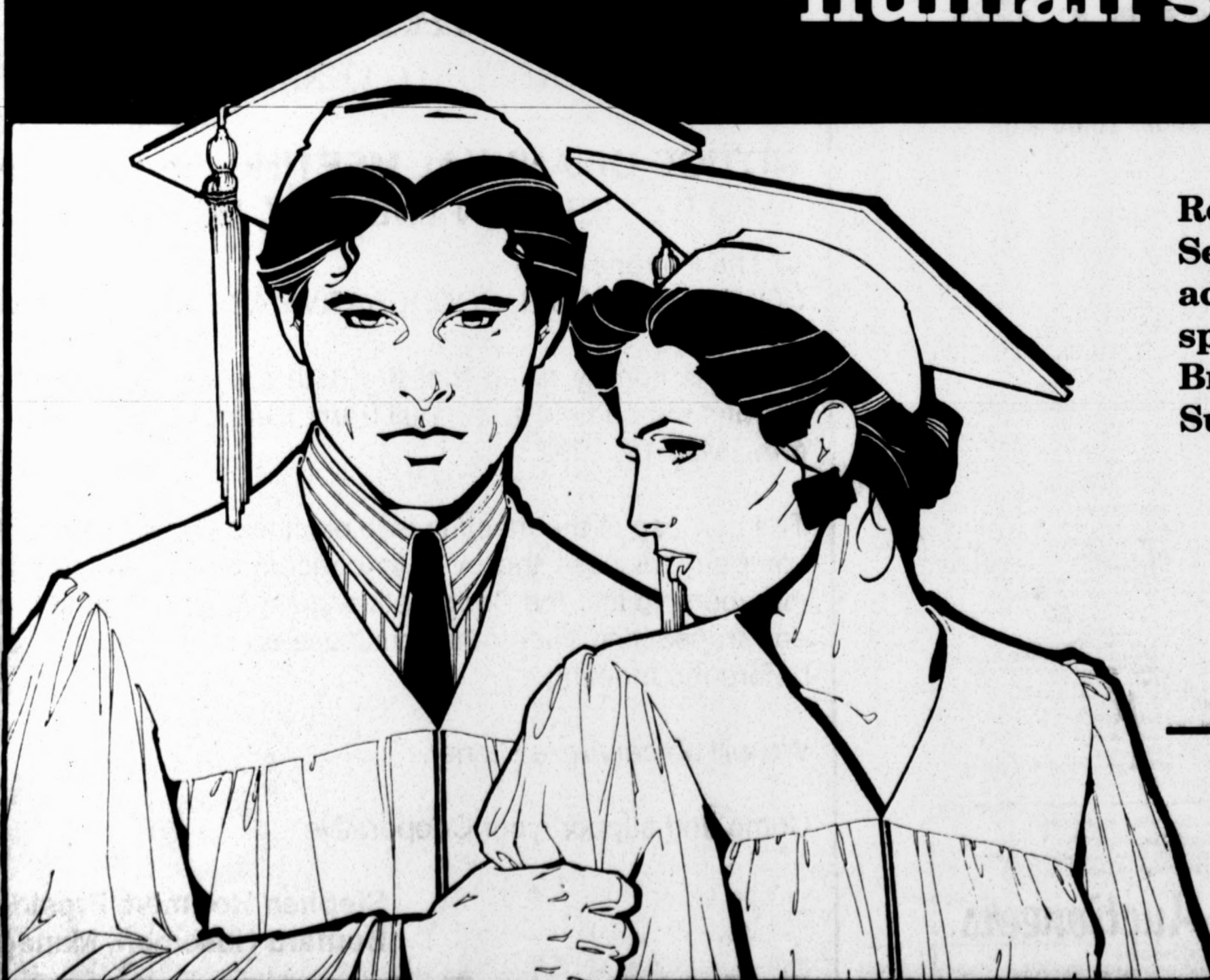

Genealogy workshop May 20

All members of the Deaf Smith County Genealogical Society and guests are invited to attend a spring workshop at 7:30 p.m. Wednesday, May 20, in the ballroom of the Hereford Community Center. Special guest speaker will be Dr. Duane Hale, a researcher of Indian histories and an author of Indian histories.

Donations will be accepted to help defray Dr. Hale's travel expenses. There will be no business meeting before the program.

Dr. Hale, of mixed white and Creek Indian ancestry, grew up near Cisco. He received two degrees from Abilene Christian University, completing his doctorate in history in 1977 at Oklahoma State University. While teaching at Navajo Community College and the University of Minnesota, Dr. Hale taught and developed seven college/university level Indian studies courses.

For five years, Dr. Hale worked directly with tribes in Oklahoma researching and writing their histories. During this time, he wrote three books on the Delaware of Western Oklahoma, one of which is entitled *Peacemakers on the Frontier: A History of the Western Oklahoma Delaware*. He later co-authored a secondary education level history of the Chickasaws, but also completed a Chickasaw tribal history

manuscript which has been published. Dr. Hale served for one year as the librarian for the Delaware tribe, a library he helped develop. Later he helped organize the Chickasaw Cultural Center and Library. In the meantime, Dr. Hale was working with several tribes on oral history projects.

More recently, Dr. Hale was the bibliographer along with the National Museum of Natural History, Smithsonian Institute of *The Indian Nations: The First Americans*, a high school level book piloted in the Chicago and San Diego schools in 1990-91.

Dr. Hale has developed a series of "Researching and Writing Tribal History" workshops to train Indian people to write their own histories. Twenty-three workshops have been held since 1983 in which over 300 tribes in the United States and Canada have received training which will enable them to write their own histories. The workshops have been sponsored by the American Indian Institute, the University of Oklahoma where Dr. Hale has been employed for four years as the director of the Native American Research Information Service.

There are about 300 species of toads.

Safe driving saves money

Graduation, prom dances and the start of summer vacation are all happy occasions. To keep them happy, it's important to remind young people to celebrate safely, so that no one is injured or killed in an auto accident.

The statistics on young people are very alarming. Auto accidents account for more than 40 percent of the deaths of 16-19 year-olds, according to the Insurance Institute for Highway Safety.

Compared to other age groups, teenagers are involved in more auto accidents as both drivers and passengers. Most accidents occur on weekends and late at night, according to the institute.

Not only is there physical danger in an auto accident, there also is financial burden. Because they are involved in more accidents, teenage drivers generally pay higher auto insurance rates than adults. For a teenage boy, the rates can be three-and-a-half times those paid by an adult male.

To help protect young drivers, remind them to:

- Always insist everyone in the car wear a safety belt. Safety experts say one of three people who die in car accidents could have been saved by strapping on a safety belt.

- Drive defensively and don't speed.

- Refuse to be a passenger in a car being driven by someone who has been drinking.

- Take enough cash for cab fare to get home rather than drive after drinking.

- Designate a non-drinker to drive others home from a party.

- There also are some ways to control auto insurance costs for teenage drivers. Encourage them to:

- Maintain a clean driving record.

- Drive the family car. Rates are usually higher for teenagers who own their own cars.

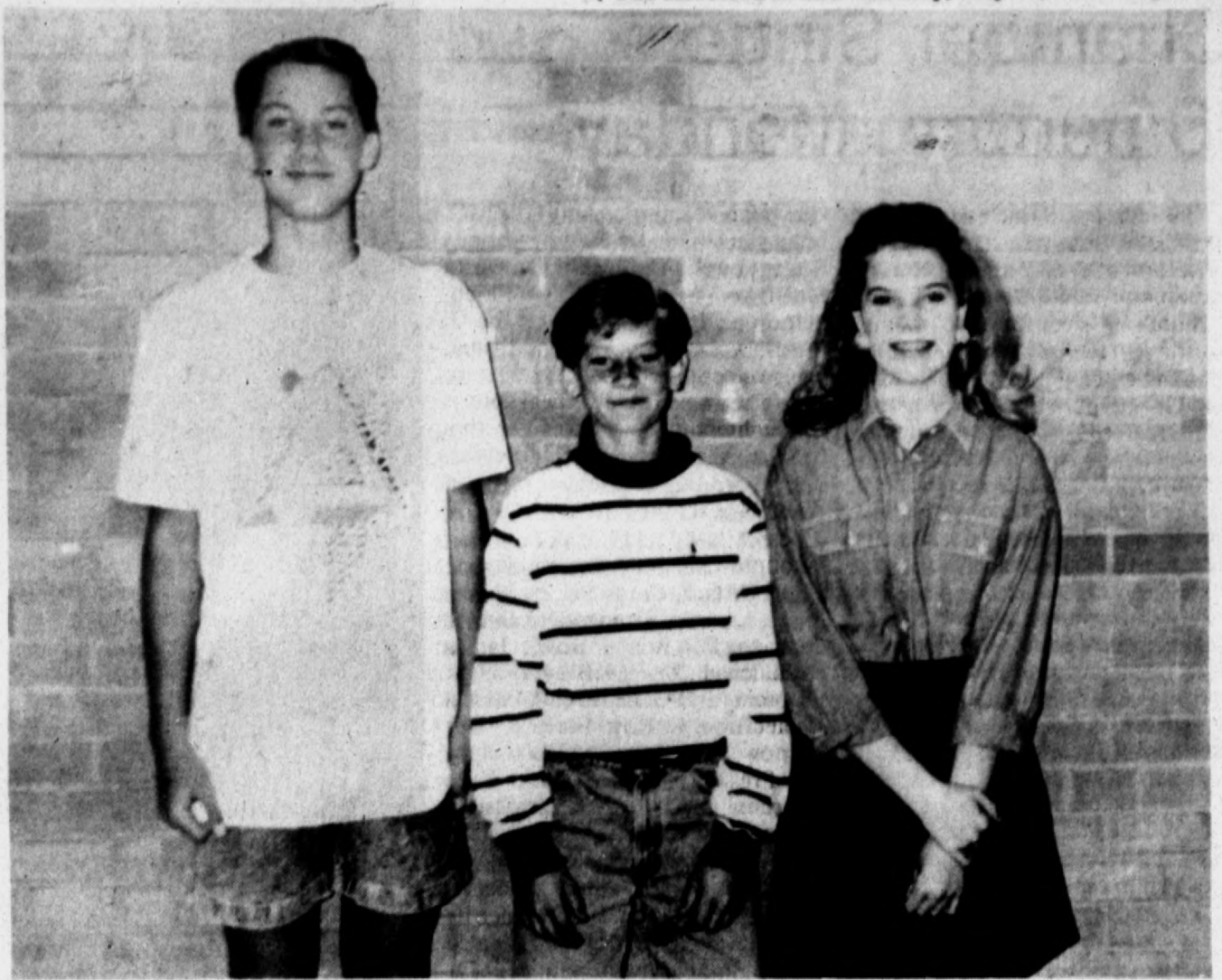
- At the same time, you should:

- Choose a higher deductible. Rates are lower if you choose a higher deductible for collision coverage.

- Check with your agent or company for any discounts given for completing driver training courses. Also, companies sometimes give discounts for students with good grades.

- If a student is away at school and drives only when home for the holidays, see if you can negotiate a lower premium.

- When shopping for auto insurance, be sure to compare—not just price but also for service and what is the best value for your needs.

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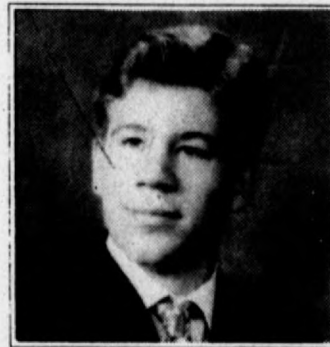
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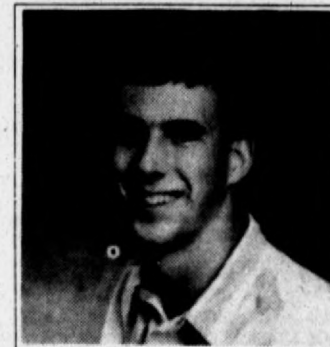
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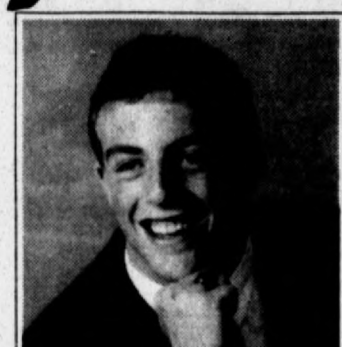

Betty Crocker's Cooking Tips

Q. What are the uses of a vanilla bean and how is it prepared? Mrs. S.M.G., Pasadena, CA

A. Whole vanilla beans can be used in several ways and several forms. Scrape out seeds and stir them into ice cream mixtures, beverages, pastry or sauces. Or cut a two-inch piece of vanilla bean and stir it into a pudding recipe for a different flavor. Remove the bean before serving pudding. You'll get homemade vanilla by placing a split vanilla bean in a jar of 3/4 cup vodka. Let jar stand for six months. Any vanilla bean used whole can be rinsed, dried and stored for reuse.

A Big Black Cloud

(Part Two of a Two Part Series)

Last week I described how government spending and regulation hangs over America like a threatening black cloud. Everyday the cloud grows thicker and more imposing.

The spiraling increases in the cost of our government are rapidly diminishing the quality of life for every productive man and woman in this nation. We are paying more in taxes every year, and we're working longer to get them paid.

According to Washington, D.C. based Tax Foundation, the average American taxpayer will work until the middle of May this year before earning enough to pay all the taxes they will owe for 1992. Today, as you read this column, you may still

be working on your 1992 tax obligations.

More critically, this burgeoning spending and ever increasing piles of regulations threaten to stifle the economic engine that pulls the whole train. Businesses, large and small, create all the profits that pay all the taxes that keep the river of government services flowing.

As the tax and paperwork burden increases, many businesses find profits impossible to maintain. They cut back on expenses to stay solvent. Often they let employees go as part of this cost trimming process. This leaves fewer workers to pay the taxes demanded by our gluttonous government.

The Answer Is...

The best long term solution is to cut government spending. Too simple you say? Nonsense. Businesses have been cutting back for years. One of the first lessons I learned as a Missouri farm boy was that you didn't spend money you didn't have. Maybe we need a few more farm boys in congress.

Later, as I entered the small business arena, I learned that the same lesson applies. If you want to succeed in business, you don't spend money you don't have. Maybe we need more small business folks in congress.

Nearly every year since the 1950's the amount of taxes collected by state and federal governments has increased. Yet today, most state governments wail over the lack of funds.

The United States Congress doesn't wail. In fact, they don't even whimper. They just go right on spending as if they had all the

money in the world.

This year the spending deficit will probably top \$1 billion per day. If this growth rate continues, this nation will accumulate a debt of more than \$12 trillion by the year 2000. Fathom the interest on that debt, if you can.

Send A Message

It is time we, the taxpayers, send a message to our big spenders in Washington. The message needs to point out how fed up we are with congressional spending and regulation. We need to let our representatives and senators know that if they don't balance the budget and stop frivolous legislation, we will hold them personally responsible. The message must be simple and clear, "We put you into office, we can take you out."

I urge you to contact your local newspaper and get the names and addresses of your state and federal elected officials. Tell the friendly folks at the paper you are going to follow my advice and send your employees at the capitol - that's right we pay them, they work for us - a message. Better yet, include a copy of this column.

We can regain control of spending without losing sight of those less fortunate than we are. Slashing pork barrel projects alone would balance our budget. Eliminating unnecessary perks for federal and state officials would free up billions.

We can do it, but we need to start now. Write your representatives today. Urge him or her to balance the budget by cutting spending. The black cloud will lift and the sun will shine again on this great land of ours.

Ask Dr. Lamb

DEAR DR. LAMB: Three years ago I was diagnosed as having thoracic outlet syndrome. I was told surgery would cure it, but I could try physical therapy. Well, I have for three years and I'm still in very bad pain with my hands swelling and going numb. I cannot sleep at night as the pain is worse. Will surgery relieve the pain and swelling and numbness? What are the side effects of surgery? Will I have less or more use of my arms?

DEAR READER: The nerves to the arm originate in the spinal cord and must pass from the spine under muscles and under the collar bone. Pressure on the nerves in the neck and shoulder area is called the thoracic outlet syndrome. Numbness, weakness, pain and even muscle wasting of the involved arm or hand is characteristic. Sometimes this is caused by an extra rib, or the way the nerves are trapped under muscles. Surgery to relieve the pressure will relieve the condition, but muscles that have atrophied may not improve. Often such symptoms are caused by carpal-tunnel syndrome, when nerves to the hand are entrapped in the wrist under pressure, or from compression of the roots of the nerves by a cervical disc in the neck. Although the surgery is different, again it is to relieve compression of the nerves involved.

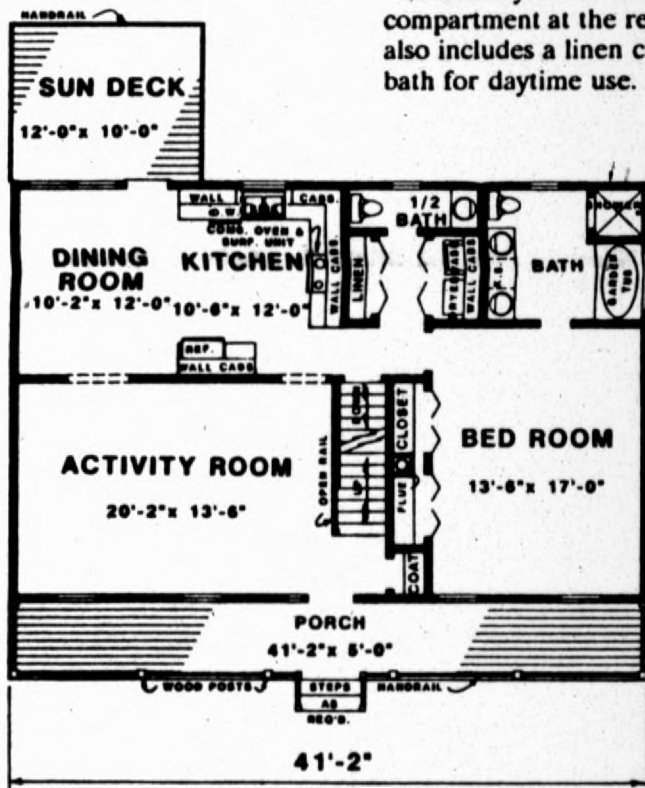

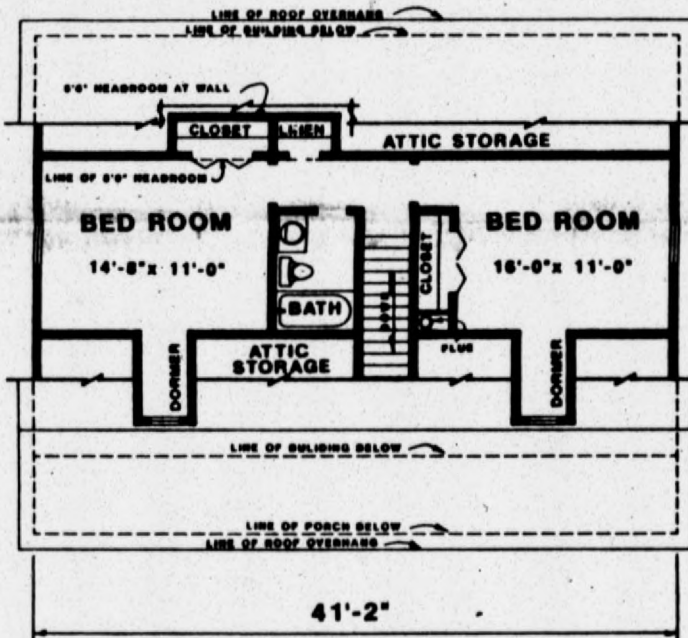

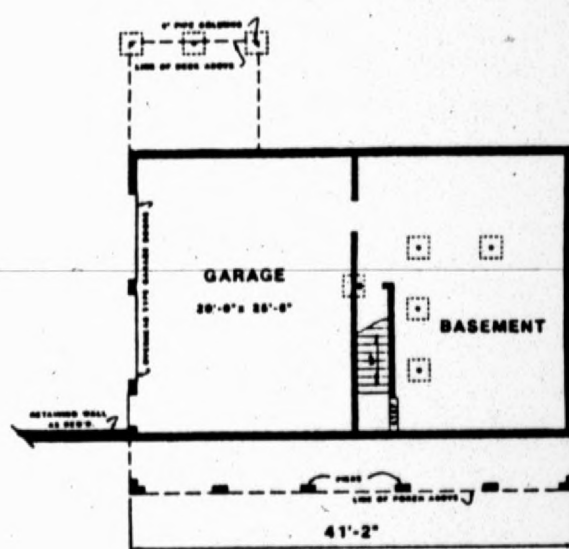

Question & Answer

Q. - Three years ago, I acquired an English-style, 1 1/2-story all-brick, all-plaster house, 50 years old and in excellent condition. There is a full attic with a catwalk in the center.

I would like to finish the attic, but it only has 2-by-6-inch ceiling joists, 16 inches on center. I am told the joists have to be at least 2 by 8 inches, 16 inches on center, before rooms can be added.

First, why were houses like this built, and what's the remedy? Can I do most of the work myself?

A. - In house design, the size of the floor joists depends on the distance between the joist supports (span), the on-center distance between the joists (usually 16 inches on center), the species of wood the joists are made of, and the loading applied to the floor. In residential structures, the floor loading is usually designed for

a live load of 40 pounds per square foot, with attic floors designed for loading of 20 pounds per square foot. A live load is the load that is imposed solely by occupancy (persons, furnishings and appliances).

The attic's design load is less than the load for habitable rooms because the attic is normally not used for storing heavy appliances or furniture. Hence, ceiling joists are often smaller than the floor joists below.

In determining joist size for a given span, architects use tables that consider bending stress, deflection and stiffness (in order to minimize the springiness in the floor). Your floor joists are sufficient for a 40-pound-per-square-foot floor, providing their unsupported span does not exceed 9 feet, 6 inches (approximately).

To finish the attic properly, you would first need a building permit.

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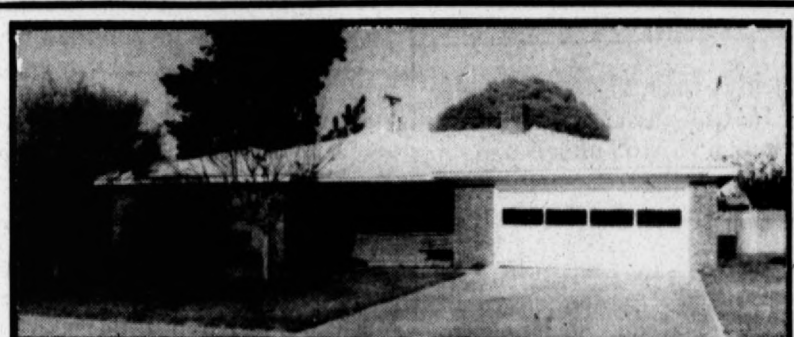

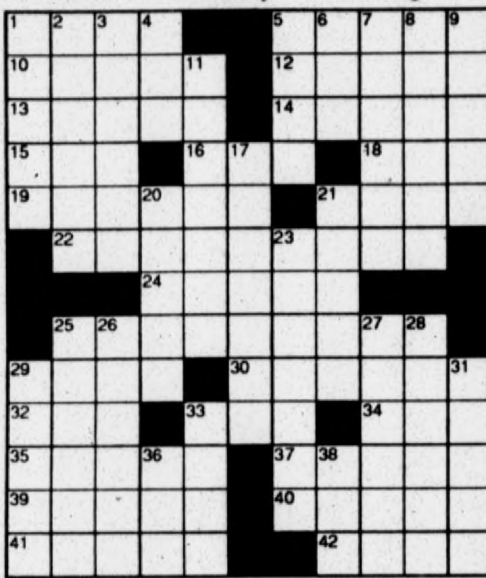

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An era ends for NBC's 'Tonight Show'



Carson casts long shadow

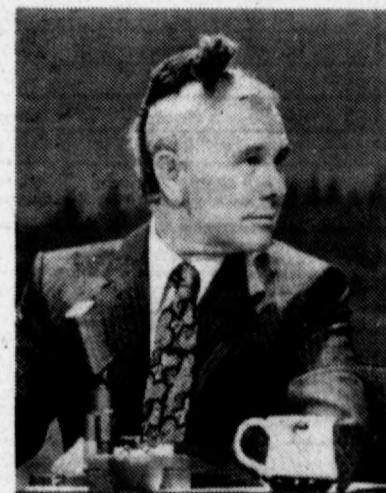
It was inevitable and we knew it. Someday, Johnny Carson, like Jack Parr, Steve Allen and others less memorable before him, would retire as host of *The Tonight Show*. In May 1991, Carson caught the network by surprise when he announced that he considered this his final season. On Friday, May 22, he will sit behind the desk as host for the last time.

Carson's retirement isn't as serious an event as many he has helped us mark: the first moon landing, the painful late '60s, the fall of communism and seven-and-a-half presidential campaign seasons. It's a milestone nonetheless, and his three decades' tenure is an achievement not likely to be matched in television. The jester who first sat on the throne on Oct. 2, 1962 (he was introduced by Groucho Marx), can truly claim the crown.

For years, this retirement business seemed like a game. Each autumn, there has been an anniversary show: 23 years, 27 years; who could take it seriously? There were guest hosts, then permanent guest hosts, then experimental guest hosts. Johnny was off on Mondays, he was off on Tuesdays, and about half the time he was off on vacation. Then there were his wives, who were known to divorce him. Surely he would have to keep working just to meet his alimony payments.

The show business equivalent of panic set in shortly after the beginning of the new year. That's when the phone started ringing with requests from the famous and the wannabes to make a date to visit Johnny, whether for the first time or the last. But seating on the Carson couch is limited; bookings were complete more than a month ago.

It isn't just Johnny Carson who leaves *The Tonight Show* on Friday. Sidekick Ed McMahon, who has been laughing at Johnny's jokes since the

beginning; and bandleader and sartorial scapegoat Doc Severinsen (along with the band) will disappear as well. Behind the scenes, a score of Carson staffers, who have produced the show for over a decade, also find themselves at a turning point.

Among them is co-producer Jim McCawley, who has booked comedians and others on the show for 15 years. For a comedian, a six-minute shot on *The Tonight Show* is both a rite of passage and a launching pad to fame. McCawley has arranged first *Tonight Show* bookings for Eddie Murphy, Garry Shandling, Roseanne Barr, Sam Kinison and Keenen Ivory Wayans.

"The very first call I made was to David Letterman," McCawley remembers. Letterman, who had his pride even then, had already auditioned six times and wouldn't submit again. McCawley wisely said okay.

McCawley does much of his work

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SITAR NOTES

Country gentleman still picking

Ask people to name the world's most influential guitar players, and chances are Chet Atkins will make most lists. Although he is best known for his country music, Atkins also plays with pops orchestras and has collaborated with Paul McCartney, George Benson and Dire Straits' Mark Knopfler. Atkins will perform this Wednesday, May 20, for the *Country Music Hall of Fame* special on CBS.

Atkins' first instrument was a broken ukulele which, at age five, he restrung with wires pulled from a screen door. He went on to become one of the most demanded session men in Nashville. His credits for backup work include sessions with Hank Williams Sr., The Everly Brothers and Elvis Presley. But Atkins' relationship with the guitar is much more than that of a picker.

"Back in the '50s, Gretsch Guitars wanted me to play one of their guitars, but I didn't care for the ones they had for sale. So they finally said, 'Well, let's design a guitar that you want to play.' We did that. And it was very successful."

So successful that the Chet Atkins Country Gentleman became a favorite of musicians including George Harrison, and the early sound of the Beatles owes much to Atkins' design.

The 68-year-old 10-time Grammy winner has no plans to retire. "As long as I feel good and as long as I can hear some applause, he says, "I'll continue to do it."

"I think each thing you do pushes you a little further," she says. "I have wonderful memories of exciting moments in life. A lot of things happened to me when I was younger that don't always happen that way when you are older. Those things let me know that I would be okay in my profession," says Sorel.

Days is not Sorel's first foray into the daytime arena. She played manipulative Augusta Lockridge on *Santa Barbara* for several years and Judith on *One Life to Live*. It looks like Sorel should do just fine as Salem's all-knowing wicked one, Vivian. Who knows what secrets she holds in her past?

On becoming 'The Environmental Tourist'

Important special needs to lighten up

For many, the vacation of a lifetime means an expedition into one of the world's rapidly diminishing wilderness areas, particularly one with an abundance of native wildlife. The central conceit of such travel is that the animals are in "their" environment. Even well-intentioned visitors often have little appreciation for the way their presence dramatically alters and diminishes the quality of life for the very animals they have come to see.

One answer is ecotourism, an new travel ethic emphasizing the relationship between the traveler and his environment. The idea and its importance are examined in the latest *World of Audubon Special*, titled *The Environmental Tourist*, which premieres Sunday, May 17, on TBS. Other airdates include May 18, 23 and 25.

"Can wilderness areas around the world accommodate more and more tourists and still remain wild?" asks host Sam Waterston.

Many larger countries would do well

to follow the example set by the tiny Central American nation of Belize. To protect the country's vast barrier reef and lush rain forest, the Belizian government has enacted a policy of ecotourism. Growth is strictly regulated and local farmers and landholders, who know the land best, are encouraged to open and operate their own small resorts, adapting to, instead of radically changing, the environment. Everyone seems to benefit, including the interior villages now reaping an income they'd never dreamed possible.

The special also travels to Glacier National Park in the U.S. and Kenya's Amboseli National Park, a facility suffering from nearly three decades of overuse and mismanagement.

The Environmental Tourist is a fine effort, bringing home a point all of us would do well to consider. One wishes, however, the show emphasized the solution, rather than making ever darker predictions for the future. It is enough to say that we are not merely inhabitants of Earth but also its curators, charged with attending to the most amazing museum imaginable.

Brando older, richer but still cares

Q: In 1972, Marlon Brando spurned his Academy Award (for *The Godfather*) in favor of having a young Indian maiden represent him in an effort to draw attention to the plight of the American Indian. Has he done anything to further his point of view? — Winifred Golden Neveu, Chesire, Mass.

A: Since his refusal of the Oscar by proxy 20 years ago, Brando has continued to be sympathetic to causes relating to American Indians. It has been reported that Brando surreptitiously supported the American Indian Movement up until 1975. That year, when fugitive AIM leaders Leonard Peltier and Dennis Banks escaped a police roadblock, they left behind Brando's motor home, which, police reports say, contained weapons, dynamite and airplane tickets that were charged to Brando's credit card. Later in 1975, the actor's relationship with AIM soured during his attendance of a Menominee Indian standoff in Wisconsin. (Brando's prima-donna attitude got him booted from their camp.) At one time, Brando was developing a motion picture about the American Indians, but the project never got off the ground.

Recently, Brando, who plays the sadistic Spanish Inquisitor Torquemada in Ilya and Alexander Salkind's upcoming production of *Christopher Columbus: The Discovery*, announced that he would take steps to have his name removed from the film's credits because Columbus was not portrayed as a villain, which Brando says Ilya

Salkind agreed to do.

"Christopher Columbus was directly responsible for the first wave of genocidal obliteration of the native peoples of North America," the actor says, responding to questions posed by *Daily Variety*.

Brando, who has not seen the film, made the statement after he was paid (and kept) an estimated \$5 million for about 10 days work.

Q: I would like to know where *Northern Exposure* is filmed. I have heard that part of it is filmed in Washington and part of it in Alaska. If so, where?

Has Janine Turner (who plays Maggie) appeared in any other TV series or movies? — C.L. Leach, Eldon, Mo.

A: Most of the series is filmed in Roslyn, Wash., with additional locations in Redmond, Wash.

Turner, who began performing as an apprentice with the Fort Worth Ballet, got her first television break with a recurring role in *Dallas*. This led to parts on the late-night soap *Behind the Screen* and the daytime drama *General Hospital*. She has also appeared on the TV series *Family Ties*, *The Love Boat*, *The A-Team* and *Mike Hammer*. Turner's feature-film credits include *Young Doctors in Love*, *Tai-Pan*, *Monkey Shines* and *Steel Magnolias*.

Q: I hope that you will help me by getting the name/spelling/address of a young director who was one of the presenters at this year's Oscar presentation. The name of this man sounds like "Almoos." Our family has been searching in vain for an ancestor who we think was named Almoos. — Ada Haines, Sturgis, S.D.

A: You must be referring to Edward James Olmos, whose surname is almost Almoos. Olmos played Lt. Castillo on *Miami Vice* and has starred in the feature films *Zoot Suit*, *Stand and Deliver* and the recent *American Me*, which he also directed. Nielsen families prefer hoops to homers

Baseball's all-American image has taken a beating this season as CBS' Major League telecasts have gone into a ratings slump. Meanwhile, they're doing high-fives at NBC, where ratings for the National Basketball Association playoffs have been impressive.

One charitable view is that baseball has been outdrawn by basketball because its season is just getting into full swing, while the NBA season is nearing its climax. Even so, ratings for CBS's coverage of the recent American Kennel Club championships were just slightly below those for a game between the world champion Minnesota Twins and the Oakland Athletics the same weekend.

At NBC, where sports announcer of the year Bob Costas is a slam-dunk favorite, the celebrating is accompanied by a big sigh of relief. With the last two NBA finals having ended in routes, there was concern that apathetic fans might tune out in anticipation of the Chicago Bulls repeating their walk through the playoffs. However, with teams like the Portland Trail Blazers, Boston Celtics and the rejuvenated New York Knicks in the equation, the ratings outlook for the finals has risen dramatically.

The NBA playoffs are part of NBC's countdown to the Summer Olympics in Barcelona, Spain, which also includes LPGA Golf, French Open tennis and the U.S. Olympic trials.

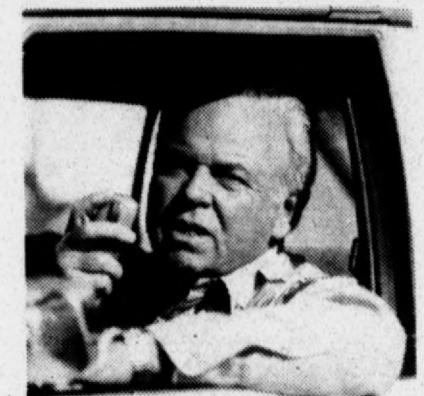

These public service announcements come in two types: Vignettes on topics such as "Self-Image" and "Excellence" provide counterweight to the evils of peer pressure, while "The Totally for Kids Detective Agency" helps put a lid on potentially dangerous situations kids may encounter.

The features pertaining to the awkward, maddening relationships kids develop among themselves offer refreshingly original perspectives. The once soothing notion that "They're not laughing at you, they're laughing with you," here becomes something more like "Let 'em laugh. What do they know?"

Meanwhile, John Walsh, the steely host of *America's Most Wanted*, lends stern authority to the "Totally for Kids Detective Agency," helping to mold model citizenry of a smaller stature. Young toughs considering changing their plans without phoning home or picking up a handgun are chastised in the same voice that strikes fear in the fleeing felons of prime time.

Hereford EMS has three full-time employees and seven part-time employees. The ranks include six paramedics, two intermediate EMTs and two EMT basics.

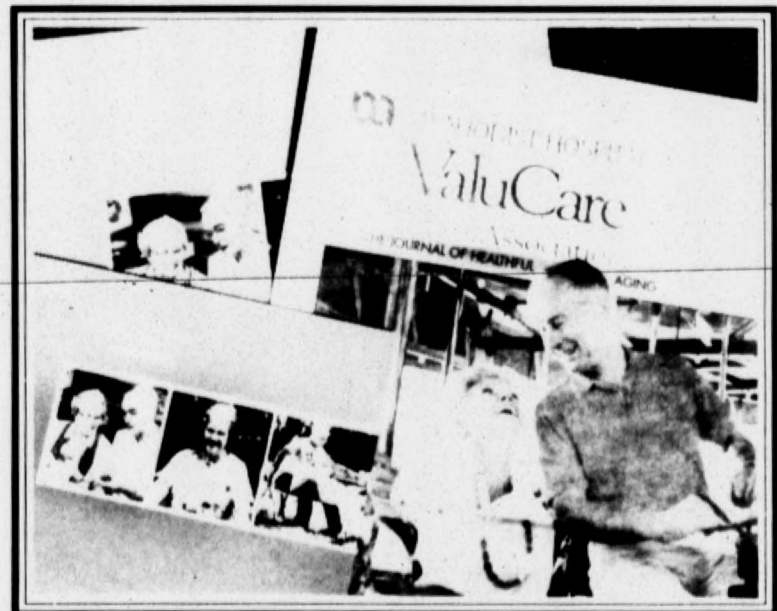

Children's Hospital Opens In June

Methodist Hospital in Lubbock in June will open the first free-standing hospital in West Texas and Eastern New Mexico dedicated exclusively to the medical needs of children. The three-level, 50-bed facility will feature the region's only Children's Emergency Center. It also will house a pediatric intensive care unit, two floors of patient rooms and ancillary services.

All equipment at Methodist Children's Hospital will be designed specifically for the diagnosis, treatment and care of young patients. The emergency center will be staffed 24 hours a day by emergency physicians and other professionals trained in pediatric care.

Emergency transport of children from virtually any location in West Texas and Eastern New Mexico to the Methodist Children's Hospital will be possible through AeroCare, a fixed wing and helicopter air ambulance service.

Methodist Children's Hospital won't let its focus on children overlook the needs of concerned parents. Each patient room will be equipped with a built-in bed for parents and a comfortable rocker-recliner.

This new facility is a welcome addition to the health care network in this region. DSGH is proud to be affiliated with Methodist Hospital and this fine new facility.

Health Education: Important Service

Deaf Smith General Hospital is committed to safeguarding the community's health. That dedication goes beyond just caring for patients when they become ill, it involves providing them with information to keep them healthy and to improve their quality of life.

Education is an important aspect of DSGH's commitment to good health. The hospital has been actively involved in presenting several seminars designed to improve not only individuals' knowledge of health related issues, but also to provide them with information that will enable them to more easily access services that are available.

As a partner in the community's good health, DSGH recently embarked on a series of educational programs, The Women's Issues Forum. The program, prepared with assistance from the Hereford State Bank and the First National Bank of Hereford, covered a variety of topics, ranging from finding a balance between work and home,

to finding financial security after the loss of a spouse and building a positive lifestyle through diet and exercise.

Rita Chamberlain, R.Ph., Director of Pharmacy at DSGH was the featured speaker at an arthritis seminar on "Medications Management" presented at the Hereford Senior Center. She was joined on the program by Bonnie Smith, a health care consultant from Lubbock, who is a leader of Arthritis Support Groups in that area.

The Patient Self-Determination Act has far reaching implications for all recipients of health care. Alan Rhodes, an attorney with a specialization in health care, joined Lisa Formby, Quality Assurance Coordinator, in presenting a seminar to explain the Act and to advise the community about the benefits of Living Wills and other legal documents that are pertinent to health care today.

Laparoscopic Equipment Speeds Recovery

The acquisition of new equipment allowing doctors to use a new surgical procedure is putting gall bladder patients at Deaf Smith General Hospital on the road to recovery in record time.

The new procedure, called a laparoscopic cholecystectomy, uses high-tech fiber optic technology. Instead of a six to eight inch incision that is necessary in conventional gall bladder surgery, the laparoscopic procedure requires four incisions that usually are only about 1/2 inch long. The area is inflated with CO₂ to minimize contact with other areas of the abdomen. Then a laparoscope, a slender tube-like instrument that contains a tiny camera with its own light source, is inserted. The surgeon guides the instrument used to cut the gall bladder away from the abdomen by

watching a monitor. The gall bladder is removed through one of the small incisions. The patient usually stays in the hospital overnight and may go back to work within a week.

Nadir Khuri, M.D., and Robert Clark, M.D., both General Surgeons, perform this procedure at Deaf Smith General Hospital. They are assisted by the trained nurses and technicians in the operating room.

Laparoscopic procedures are the new trend in the operating room. In the future, the equipment may be used for other procedures such as hernia repair, appendectomies and urology cases.

"This procedure is not necessarily for every patient, but it is an excellent technique and we're glad to be able to offer it to our patients here," Dr. Khuri said.

New Physicians Added To Staff

Dr. Palani Subra Mani, who recently joined the staff of Deaf Smith General Hospital, brings a unique situation to Hereford: his wife will be practicing alongside him at the South Plains Health Providers Clinic here

in Hereford.

Dr. Mani completed his residency in general surgery at Flushing Hospital in New York City. He is certified by the American Board of General Surgery.

Here in Hereford, though, Dr. Mani will be concentrating on family practice medicine. He will be able to provide primary physician attention for a wide range of illnesses and he will be able to treat all family members.

The doctor is very pleased with the clinic, the hospital and the community. "We chose Hereford," he said, "because there was a need for two physicians with our special skills. We also were impressed with the school system."

Local health care facilities also played an important role in the doctor's decision to move his family to Hereford.

"The availability of the hospital, the quality of care it provides and the professional level of the staff were very impressive. The staff at the hospital - and at the clinic - are so good to work with because they are highly skilled professionals. That makes it a real joy to work with them."

DSGH is proud to welcome Dr. Ranga Subra Mani to Hereford and to the hospital staff.

Dr. Mani is a board eligible pediatrician. She completed a neonatal fellowship at Texas Children's Hospital in Houston. Her skills as a pediatrician are especially welcome here, since Hereford has not previously had the benefit of a "hometown" pediatrician.

Dr. Mani will be associated with the South Plains Health Providers, and her office will be located at the Clinic here in Hereford. The clinic is a very important part of the local health care delivery system. About 1,000 patients come to the clinic each month. Payments for services are based on a sliding scale according to income.

Occasionally it may be a little confusing, since Dr. Mani's husband, Dr. Palani Subra Mani, also will be working at the clinic. But both physicians are excited about the arrangement.

"Here at the South Plains Health Clinic we can concentrate on what we do best - practice medicine. The clinic can take care of the business side of the practice, filing insurance claims and the other paperwork. It is a good arrangement for everyone," Dr. Mani said.

Dr. Mani said she and her husband chose Hereford because it has the environment they were looking for.

Building For The Future

The heart of a community's health care system is the local hospital. But Deaf Smith General knows that the body of routine care lies in the hands of a community's physicians. That's why the hospital is actively engaged in recruiting new physicians who can build a future for themselves and the residents of Hereford.

The simple fact is that there is a shortage of physicians available to serve this community. That problem was recognized some time ago and efforts began last year to bring new doctors on board. The effort was successful in influencing Dr. Palani Subra Mani and Dr. Ranga Subra Mani to come to Hereford to practice.

The Physician Recruitment and Retention Task Force, recently appointed by the Deaf Smith County Hospital District board is continuing to work toward the goal of attracting more physicians to meet the diverse health care needs of this community. The goal of the task force is to bring at least three new physicians to Hereford. Board members are concentrating especially on family practitioners.

The good health of the community is important not only today, but it also is important to its future growth and prosperity. DSGH is working today to provide for tomorrow's needs.



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
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
