The House Committee on Interior and Insular Affairs, which has legislative jurisdiction in matters concerning American Indians and of which I am a member, has undertaken a study recently to determnie information not currently tabulated and which is necessary to legislate intelligently and with understanding.

The completed study is much too lengthy to cover in this news-letter, but some facts were brought out which are most interesting. They were assembled from many sources including all the Federal Governmet Agencies having any jurisdiction in Indian affairs, State and Local Governments and from private organizations devoted to Indian welfare.



How Can I?

Q. How can I give cement

A. Use one pint of water glass (available at your hardware store) to four pints of water. Apply this to the clean, dry cement with a brush or mop, and floors a hard, waterproof fin-ish and prevent dust from being with clear water, allow to dry, tracked into other parts of the and then recoat. Three or four coatings are best for a good,

hard surface, Q. How can I provide a good 'substitute' waxing for my linoleum floor?

A. Try adding a handful of starch to your wash water, and when your floor has dried, it will have a gloss almost as high as if it had been polished.

Q. How can I repair a snap fastener on a dress which refuses to stay fastened?

A. A light tapping with a hammer on the tip of the snap fastener will usually restore its

snug fit. Q. What can I do about the wooden steps on my porch whe rain water is constantly collect-

A. Why not insure this draining off by boring a number of small holes in the steps? You can then sandpaper the whole surface smooth, and paint to preserve the wood -- including, of course, the insides of the hol-

Q. How can I repair holes that have been worn into linoleum? A. Fill the holes with a paste made of shellac and finely ground cork. When the mixture has dried, sand it smooth, and paint to match the color of your linoleum pattern.
