One Killed, Six Injured In Wrecks

Accidents Heavy On Christmas Day

Three separate Deaf Smith County accidents on Christmas Day, happening within a period of 30 minutes, resulted in the death of one man, hospitalized four persons and demolished three 1953 model vehicles. Two other persons received minor lacerations and only two persons escaped injury.

Funeral services for Jose Sandoval, 36, Hereford, were held at 2 p.m. Saturday at St. Joseph's Mission, with Father Raymond Gilles officiating. Burial was in St. Anthony's cemetery.

Christmas Day dawned, a beautiful day. But with it came trouble, and that means the Highway Patrol is needed. Maxwell and Skinner first went to work at 8 a.m. Various accidents, including two accidental deaths and three highway wrecks kept them busy for the rest of the day, and most of the night.

They finally ended their holiday at 4 a.m. Friday with a visit to the morgue. After 20 hours of holiday work, they are both looking for more "regular" hours after the first of the year.

Mrs. Burrus was born March 28, 1881, in Grayson County, Tex., and was married to Mr. Burrus at Henrietta on Dec. 24, 1903.

Bobcats Claw Whitefaces; Tulia Hornets Next Foe

Clawing and chewing from the opening whistle, the Dimmitt Bobcats took a mighty 68-57 victory from the Hereford Whitefaces Tuesday night in Dimmitt. It was sweet revenge for their earlier loss to the Herd, 59-52.

Dimmitt could do no wrong in their second match, as they hit 11 of 12 field goal attempts in the first period, jumping to an early 9-1 lead. They held a 24-12 advantage at the end of the period.

Both teams netted 14 in the second quarter, as Dimmitt led 38-26 at halftime. Hereford got behind even more in the third period, as Dimmitt hit for 17,

while the Herd got 13, trailing 55-39 at the start of the fourth quarter.

Without the services of big Steve Slagle, who fouled out in the third quarter, Hereford made a battle of it, swishing in 18, while Dimmitt coasted home with 13.


Each team had four men in double figures. Facing the sparkling Bobcats were Ratcliff and Smithson, with 20 each. They were ably assisted by Coffey, who had 10, and Gregory, who added 14.

Ken Clearman was tops for Hereford, with 14. Donnie Renfro bucketed 15, Steve Slagle 12 and Bobby Shelton 10 for

the losers. It was a heartbreaker for Hereford, which took its second loss of the season, against 11 wins. On Monday, the Whitefaces had to fight hard to down a vastly improved Tascosa quintet, 37-23.

Saturday night, Hereford was slated to visit Darger, for a game which filled an open date for the clubs. The Bulldogs went into Saturday's game with a respectable 7-3 slate, taking two successive losses from the top-ranked Norman, Okla., team.

Italian Sees Former PW Camp Here Christmas Day

A former Italian prisoner of war made a special trip to Hereford Christmas Day to visit the scene of his internment during World War II.

Tall barbed-wire fences and concrete barracks pillars are about all that remain. The pillars reminded him of gravemarkers, commented Mark Martini, of Mass-Carrara, Italy.

Martini now teaches in the equivalent of our high school. He and Miss Oretta Marchi, of Florence, Italy, have been in the United States for the past six months on an exchange program.

But in 1943 and 1944 Martini was just another soldier, captured and confined by his captors in a far-off place called Hereford, Texas. He was interned at the old Hereford prisoner of war camp from July, 1943, until March, 1944, when he was moved to another camp.

Martini recalls that he received excellent treatment during his stay, but nothing could make up for the loneliness that gripped all military prisoners. His first child was born shortly after (Continued on page 2)

Storage Hit By \$500 Fire

The Hereford Volunteer Fire Department extinguished a fire at the McGee Furniture Company warehouse, in the 300 block of Major St., Friday night.

About \$500 in damage to the building and contents was reported by Fire Marshal Clay Angelo. Origin of the fire is unknown, Angelo said.

The fire, which was reported at 6:30 p.m., damaged various pieces of used furniture and three new rolls of carpet padding, Angelo said. Investigation revealed that the fire might have started under a chair, he added, as the chair was destroyed.

Angelo said the building was locked when the firemen arrived at the scene. The contents of the warehouse were owned by Lloyd McGee.

Couple Die In Gas-Filled Room Christmas Day

A Latin American man and his wife, both 53, were found asphyxiated in their air-tight, combination bedroom and kitchen at the Labor Camp Christmas morning.

Mr. and Mrs. Faustino Torres, who have lived at the Labor Camp since August, were pronounced dead of asphyxiation by Justice of the Peace C. B. Miles after a relative of the couple, who was using the room to prepare a baby's formula, found them dead in bed about 9 a.m.

The room had been shut off from the rest of the house, and a fire was still burning in the gas heater when Mr. and Mrs. Torres were found, Sheriff Charles Skelton said.

Skelton said the couple apparently died shortly before the relative's discovery. The couple reportedly returned to their small home from a neighbor's house at about 3 a.m. Officers investigated the deaths at 9 a.m. (Continued on page 2)

Mr. Sandoval died in the emergency room of Deaf Smith County Hospital at 11:15 p.m. Thursday, more than three hours after a heavy 1953 sedan which he was driving skidded off the road and overturned on the Harrison Highway, 16 miles west of Hereford.

Hospitalized early Friday morning after lying at the scene of a one-car accident which happened at 7 p.m. Thursday, northwest of Hereford, were Lewis Lauverne Newcomb, 40, Hobbs, N. M., his wife, Lorraine, 36, and two sons, Fred, 9, and Ted, 10.

Mrs. Newcomb Saturday was listed in "fair" condition at the hospital. She sustained a large laceration of her scalp, multiple fracture of ribs and possible internal injuries, attending physicians said.

Newcomb, the driver, was listed in "good" condition. He suffered a fracture of the left ankle, scratches and bruises.

The two young boys also were reported in good condition. One received lacerations of the face and bruises, and the other suffered a fractured left arm and fractured left leg.

Highway patrolmen Kenneth Maxwell and Charles Skinner said the Newcomb car, traveling north on a farm-to-market road 13 miles north of Bootleg, left the road on a curve and uprooted a state guard post and seven fence posts. Wreckage from the heavy 1953 sedan was scattered over a large area.

The accident, which happened at about 7 p.m., was discovered about 11:45 p.m. by a young boy, who reported the accident to his father. The father, in turn, called officers to the scene. The road carried relatively little traffic and a fence obstructed view of the wrecked car from the road, officers said.

At the hospital, Newcomb told officers he and his family were returning to Hobbs from Hammonds, Okla., where they had visited relatives during the holidays. The family was taken to the hospital by Kreig-Marcum ambulance.

Sandoval was driving the car at the time of the fatal accident. A passenger, Margarito (Continued on page 2)

"We had comfortable facilities and enough food," Martini remembered, "but the worst time was during Christmas. We didn't know how long we would be prisoners or when we would ever see our families again."

Word preceded Martini's arrival in Amarillo Tuesday that he wanted to visit his place of confinement in Hereford during a brief stay in West Texas. Mr. and Mrs. Elmer Patterson, 610 East 5th, heard of Martini's wish and invited him and Miss Marchi to join them for Christmas Day. The two Italians were brought to Hereford Thursday morning by Pat O'Keefe, a member of the Amarillo Chamber of Commerce.

Joining in the Christmas celebration were Joelle Tillier-Laroche, an exchange student who is living with the Pattersons, and her mother, Mme. Danielle Tillier-Laroche, of Royan, France, who has been spending the holidays with her daughter. Martini and Miss Marchi left Thursday afternoon, after he has realized a long-standing ambition to view again the camp where he had been confined.

Two families lived in the two-room house. The couple's 17-year-old godson found the couple, who were lying on a makeshift bed on the floor.

A small puncture wound on Mrs. Torres' right cheekbone was attributed to a broken glass. Skelton said Mrs. Torres apparently had knocked the glass off the table and either fell or dropped her head on the broken edge while nauseated by the carbon monoxide fumes.

No evidence of violence was indicated, and no autopsy was ordered. Skelton said investigation indicated the deaths were accidental.



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

They established their first home at Lefors and later moved to Happy and Wichita Falls. In 1925 they moved on a farm about 10 miles southeast of Hereford and it was while living there that they received word that oil had been struck on their land in Gray County.

Mrs. Jackson said that 1925 was one of the hardest years she could remember. "When the word came about striking oil on our property, we didn't have enough money to go see about it. Then we thought of the turkeys we had been fattening to sell for the holidays, and sold them all in a bunch. They turned out to be the most profitable bunch of turkeys I ever sold," she said.

Soon there were gushers on their property and now, after many years, they still have a comfortable living from those oil wells.

They moved to Hereford in

1928 and improved a place at the edge of the city. In 1944 they purchased their present home at 441 N. Miles Ave. "I would rather live in Hereford than any place in the world," Jackson said last week.

In looking back over the years, they consider their children their greatest blessing, and among their prized possessions are 19 grandchildren and four great-grandchildren. They count as their greatest wealth the love and esteem of friends and neighbors, and their faith in and devotion to their religion.

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
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
