County Cotton Acreage Up Slightly; Mail Vote Notices

In preparation for the Dec. 15 Cotton Referendum, official notices of 1960 cotton farm allotments have been mailed from the county Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation office in Hereford to 607 farmers in Deaf Smith County.

All county farms will receive as much acreage as in 1959, and some farmers will realize a slight increase. The 1960 allotment is 10,331.1 acres, compared to 10,157 in 1959 according to ASC office manager Faust Collier.

Seven companies submitted bids for the laying of about 6,000 feet of pipe, but the Moore Company bid of \$10,319.14 was lowest. Second lowest bid was \$11,241.70. Moore will supply Belgium-made asbestos cement pipe and fittings.

The company bid \$1,500 for 2,000 feet of three-inch pipe, \$7,320 for 4,000 feet of eight-inch pipe and \$1,499.14 for fittings and valves.

The pipe, made in Tissett, Belgium, was approved by the American Waterworks Association last March, according to Frank Wright, sales manager of Moore Supply Company. Bill Moore, owner of the company, was also present at the meeting.

The water line will be installed

between the area around Deaf Smith County Electric Co-operative to Benefield's Corner along east Highway 60.

Grand Jury Makes Nine Indictments

Nine indictments and three no-bills were returned by the 69th District Grand Jury, which met in regular session in District Courtroom here Monday.

Indictments were returned against R. L. Sawyer, obtaining money by worthless check; Lloyd C. McWhirter, habitual user of narcotic drugs; Leonard Francis Garvey, embezzlement over \$51; Clovis Ray King, driving while intoxicated, second offense; and Caudill H. James, driving while intoxicated, second offense. All are in custody of county authorities or have been released on bonds.

Four were indicted but are not in custody at the present time. Cases included two charged with forgery and passing forged instruments, and for theft by bailee and statutory rape.

The Grand Jury session convened at 10 a. m. and ended at 5:45 p. m. District Judge Harry Schultz, dismissed the August term of jurors, subject to recall if needed.

The next Grand Jury term will open Feb. 1. The Jury Commission has already selected a tentative list for the February term. Judge Schultz announced that he would be in Hereford Jan. 7 to hear preliminary trials on civil cases.

ing and maintaining the program. Six other Hereford insurance agencies will share equally in the other 50 per cent of the total commission. All of these agencies were handling some of the school insurance. They include: Plains Insurance Agency, McLean Insurance Agency, E. E. Fridley Agency, Lone Star Insurance Agency and Hugh Bookout Insurance Agency.

Bill Decker, of the Robinson-Decker Agency, presented the board with a complete survey of its insurance coverage showing some overlap as well as some facilities which were not covered. He explained that the master plan he proposed would cover all of the school district's property, lower some insurance costs and consolidate all policies and records regarding insurance with one agent.

Only policies which will be cancelled immediately would be those where a saving could be effected for the district, Decker said. Other policies would be changed as they expired until all coverage is on five-year term plans, which would mean less expense.

A special meeting has been called for Friday, Dec. 11, to discuss plans for widening of U. S. Highway 60 through Hereford. The luncheon meeting is to start at noon in the Jim Hill Hotel ballroom.

Charles W. "Chili" Smith, district highway engineer from Amarillo, will be on hand to talk with local businessmen about the extensive project.

Guy Lawrence, chairman of the tourist and convention committee of the Deaf Smith County Chamber of Commerce, will have charge of the meeting.

In addition to businessmen located along Highway 60 in Hereford, managers and owners of businesses located south of the highway also have been invited to attend.

State estimates show a total cost of about \$398,000 to widen Highway 60 from the east city limits to U. S. Highway 385. This will make the road four lanes, with dividing islands and turn lanes.

Bids will be asked, Smith said earlier, as soon as negotiations with the Santa Fe Railroad are completed for drainage. It is hoped bids can be let and construction started in January or February, 1960.

One of the problems to be discussed by Smith is the plan for movement of grain trucks to city elevators, if the project is not completed before harvest starts. He also will explain how traffic will be routed during construction and how it will affect businesses located on U. S. 60.

In discussing the project with the City Commission recently, Smith estimated it would take as much as 180 to 200 days to complete the widening and other necessary work, including curb and gutter and drainage.

City's cost of the program will be \$60,000. The City Commission has \$50,000 of this from a \$100,000 bond issue for street improvements passed in 1958. The remaining \$100,000 will be made up from the city's con-

five-year history basis, Collier said.

Allotment history acreage includes: 13,937 acres in 1954; 10,027 in 1955; 9,606 in 1956; 11,424 in 1957; and 11,532.9 in 1958.
The five-year average sets the 1960 county base acreage at 11,309 acres. The state factor applied to the average base acreage is 1.029, and added to that computed county allotment is 216.1 acres from the national reserve, making the 1960 allotment 10,331.1 acres. No state reserve was retained, Collier said.

If marketing quotas are not in effect for the 1960 crop of upland cotton, only the regular allotments will be available and price support to co-operators will be available at 50 per cent of parity, as directed by law, Collier explained.

Collier pointed out that farmers electing to take Plan B must register their choice at the ASC office. If the referendum on Dec. 15 favors marketing quotas for the 1960 crop, farmers will have until March 16 to register for Choice B at the ASC office in Hereford. If the referendum passes, registration will be open immediately afterward.

If the operator intends to grow his cotton under Choice A, no action will be taken. But failure to elect Choice B will automatically make Choice A effective on the farm for 1960.
"The general rule is that anyone who engaged in the production of upland cotton in 1959 is eligible to vote in the referendum," Collier explained. This includes owners, operators, tenants or sharecroppers, and their wives.

widening of the highway begins. Bayne said facilities of water and sewer lines will be needed in the immediate future and that installation would begin as soon as possible. Installation will be by Hereford city employees.

Sewer pipe bids will be called for at a future date. The sewer line and water line will be put in at the same time.

In other business at the meeting, the commissioners approved annexing the John Pitman Municipal Golf Course south of Tierra Blanca Creek. Formerly, the north side of the golf course along the length of the creek was within the city limits. The annexation added the remainder of the golf course to the city limits.

In connection with proposed widening of Highway 60, the commissioners passed a motion that when construction is finished, parking will not be permitted on the highway from Lawton St. to U. S. 385. Parallel parking will, however, be permitted from Lawton to Benefield's Corner (east city limits) when paving is completed.

From U. S. 385 to Lawton, the highway will be widened to 62 feet, and from Lawton to the east city limits, 85 feet.

Also in connection with the widening project, the commissioners passed a notice of intent to pave along Highway 60 and on S. Main St., from Highway 60 to the Texas Electric and Light Co. bridge, Assessment proceedings for curb and gutter along the sites will begin about 15 days after the notice is published.

About \$23,000 will be assessed against property owners along the proposed sites for curb and gutter costs. Curb and gutter along Highway 60 amounts to \$18,000, and property owners along S. Main will be assessed about \$5,000. The property owners will not, however, be assessed for paving.

Christmas is a time of good cheer; Peace in the World and Goodwill toward Men. Christmas lights and decorations contribute much to this feeling, but sadly enough, even Christmas lights are sometimes dimmed.

This is what happened along Park Avenue during the past week. Lights and decorations were purchased with donations by Hereford merchants, then sweat and elbow grease donated by members of the Hereford JayCee organization. Many people remarked how nice the new trappings looked and thousands of people have enjoyed them as they drove around at night. Vandals moved in this week, however, and several hundred dollars worth of lights and plastic decorations have been mutilated along the street. Consequently, a great portion of these lights no longer shine out their message of cheer and goodwill.

I guess there isn't much much difference between damaging public property than in damaging the property of an individual. However, it seems worse when youngsters vent their wrath against Christmas, and against the symbols which represent our Savior.

Personally, I doubt if they even thought of this particular phase, but it really is a poor gesture; it is also one which the Russians dearly appreciate. Frequently, vandalism is aimed at some object which has been created for the benefit of the very persons who seek to destroy. I remember when a group once did extensive damage to the swimming pool, for instance - and park equipment is often the No. 1 target. This happens in other places, too. 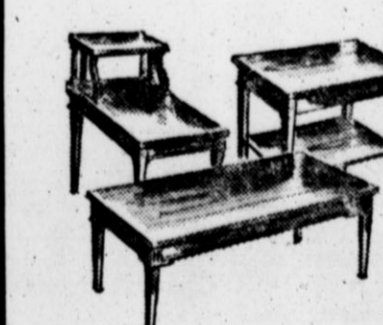

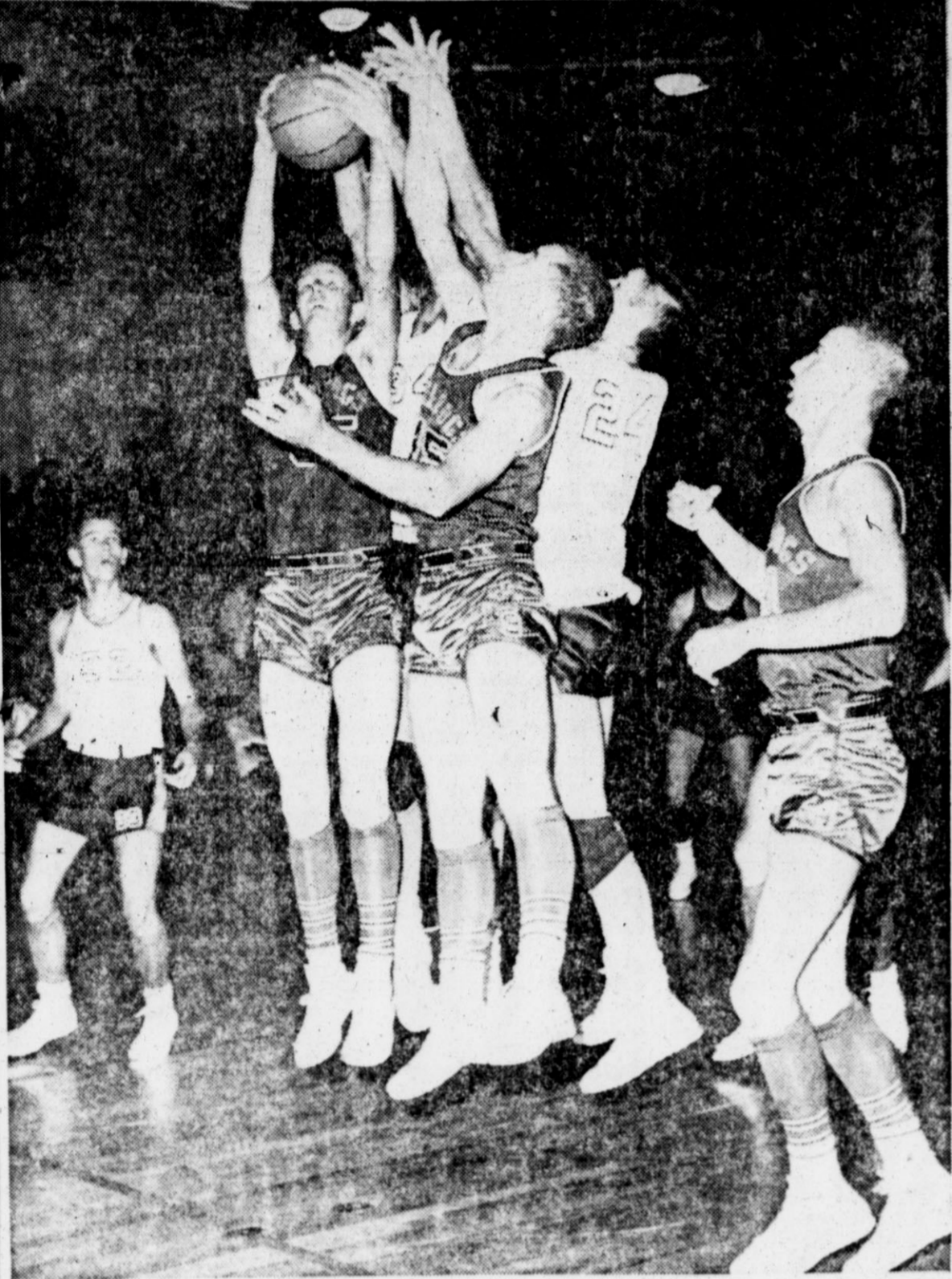

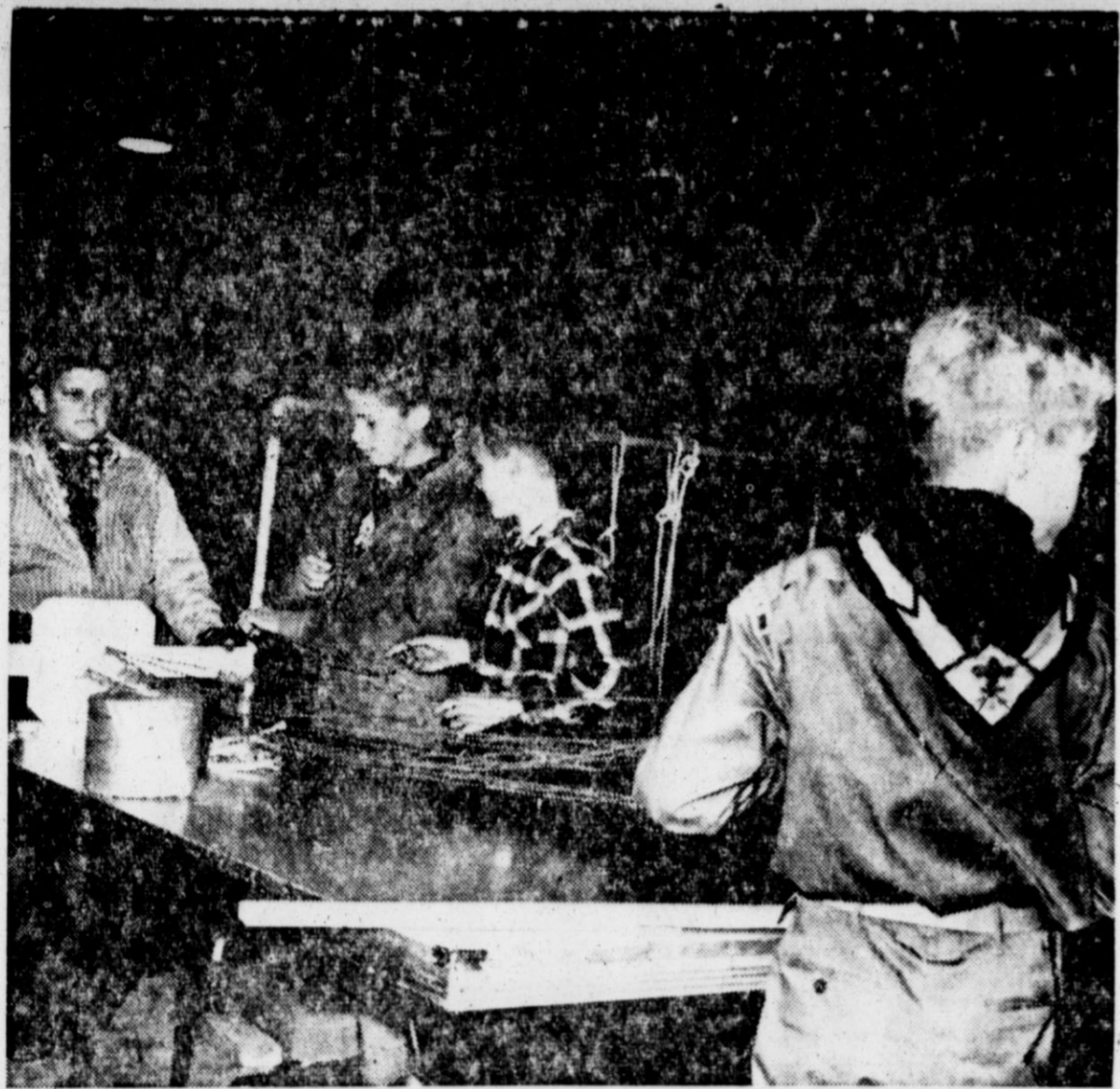

AUSTIN HIGHLIGHTS

Old Dream Comes True With Building Dedication

By VERN SANFORD

AUSTIN. - Texas high courts began a new era of stately splendor with a double-bared dedication of the massive granite Courts Building.

Court of Criminal Appeals dedicated its chambers in the north wing, and the Supreme Court had another ceremony for its new home in the south wing.

Opening of the \$3,000,000 building represented a dream come true for the jurists and State Bar leaders who began talking of a courts building back in 1940 the year of the Supreme Court's 100th anniversary.

Supreme Court dates its origin to the days when Texas was still a republic and the first session was held Jan. 13, 1840, in a private home in Austin, Court of Criminal Appeals was established in 1891 and is the oldest of the only three courts in the world of its type. It has final, exclusive jurisdiction in criminal matters.

In opening day addresses Bar leaders paid tribute to the courts and jurists through the years as guardians of the concept of government by law rather than by men.

Justices of both courts wore for the first time the black robes that will be their court attire from now on. Robes, said Supreme Court Chief Justice J. E. Hickman, are "not to satisfy our own vanity, but in recognition of the fact that we are beginning a new era in the court's history. . . . These elegant surroundings call for it."

Judge Hickman, who is planning to retire next year, had said some years ago when the

building was still in the planning stage, that to preside in the new courts building was one of his most cherished hopes. When the day came, the elderly, revered jurist, admitted to having, among other emotions, a "nostalgic feeling" for the old courtroom where "the great jurists of the past had sat."

A majority of legislators, according to reports, have told Gov. Price Daniel they favor a pay raise for school teachers.

In the precarious life of a free lance writer with three daughters and a wife, every day is Father's Day for Ben Archer. Such is the amusing book, Yes, My Darling Daughters, by David Duncan.

Ben Archer lives in Hollywood, where he writes low-budget science-fiction thrillers for the movies. Working at home, he is the brooding, baffled father of two teenage girls and one sub-teen daughter. Somehow he manages, in spite of this handicap, to be a hero as he struggles to remain master of his own house.

With the painful process of making a living, Ben Archer keeps getting farther and farther away from his life's ambition: to write the definitive story of the founder of an obscure 19th Century free-love colony.

Archer is never free of his daughters. They lose teeth at the breakfast table, bring home insoluble mathmatic problems for him to solve. And they entertain a continuing round of boys who insult him, beat him at ping-pong and drive him out of his mind with worry.

One of the funniest sequences comes as Archer and one of the high-school boys fill the study with clouds of smoke in an attempt to outline a scientific problem for one of the daughters; namely, why do smoke rings curl from inside to outside and why do they form tiny smoke rings in the lower corner when they dissolve.

Trapped into an acceptance, Archer almost gets himself lynched by other parents after making a talk on writing to a high school honor group. Having fortified himself rather stiffly, he ends up talking about his serious project: the free-love colony.

An outspoken, completely modern book, it should provide solace for any father who is outnumbered by females. We heartily recommend Yes, My Darling Daughters by David Duncan, for an evening or two of chuckles. You'll find it in the Deaf Smith County Library.

resigned and will be replaced in special elections Jan. 9, nearly a dozen representatives have said they will not ask re-election to the House.

In this group are Reps. Joe Ed Winfree, Houston; W. N. Woolsey, Corpus Christi; James S. Bates, Edinburg; Carl Conley, Raymondville; Ben D. Suderth, Comanche; Oscar M. Laurel, Laredo; Zeke Zbrank, Daisetta; V. L. Ramsey, Beckville; Jerry Sadler, Palestine.

Some of these will be running for other offices or are hoping to. Others are retiring to private life, at least for the time being.

Those whose places are to be filled in the special elections in January are Sen. Jimmy Phillips of Angleton; Reps. Ted McAtt, Burleson; Bobby Barr, Millsboro; and Sam Bliss, Freeport.

Only about one out of every thousand Texas boat owners has thus far registered his craft under the new Water Safety Act.

State Highway Department reports that only 1,747 Certificates of Number have been issued for an estimated 212,000 Texas motorboats.

Deadline for registration is March 1, 1960. After April 1, 1960, the boat cannot be operated unless the Certificate of Number has been placed on each side of the bow.

Highway Department is not authorized to grant an extension in time, and has urged boat owners to register now to avoid a pile-up in March.

Law applies to all boats with more than 10 horsepower operating in public waters. Applications can be made with any boat dealer or county tax collectors.

Certificates issued now will be good until March 31, 1963.

A "juke box" is not a phonograph inssofar as the new state sales tax on phonographs is concerned.

Atty. Gen. Will Wilson ruled that the 30 per cent sales tax on phonographs, record players and hi-fi equipment does not apply to the coin-operated machines.

Coin-operated players are, however, subject to an occupation tax that goes in effect before the new tax bill was passed.

State Highway Department has authorized the spending of \$50,000,000 on farm-to-market roads in Texas.

Work is divided into three programs. First is designating county roads to become a part of the state F-M road system and providing funds for construction of these new roads.

Second project is the improvement of F-M roads built early in the farm road building program begun in 1949. Many of these, Commission Chairman Herbert C. Petry Jr. pointed out, were built narrow and light in order to get as many miles of new roads as possible built quickly. These roads are showing wear and tear and need re-working to protect the investment.

Third phase of the operation is the day-to-day maintenance in a system now totaling 33,143 miles.

To finance the program the Department will use the \$30,000,000 appropriated every two years by the Colson-Briscoe Farm-to-Market Road Act and \$20,000,000 from gasoline tax revenues available for the betterment of the state road system.

tion in government. This has been achieved by the granting of statehood, territorial status, or outright independence as was the case of the Philippine Islands.

The Jones Act of 1917 granted collective citizenship to the people of Puerto Rico as well as the right to elect certain of their own governing officials, but retained strong veto power with the President and the Congress. Many benefits were extended to the people of Puerto Rico during the next 30 years including those of the Smith-Hughes Act, the creation of the

Puerto Rican Reconstruction Administration and the right to elect their own governor.

In 1950, Congress passed legislation which would allow the people of Puerto Rico to draw up their own constitution, but did not abdicate Congressional responsibility for the island. Under the terms of Public Law 600 "in the nature of a compact so that the people of Puerto Rico may organize a government pursuant to a constitution of their own adoption", only 2 stipulations were included with respect to the content of that constitution. The bill required "that the constitution shall provide a republican form of government and shall include a bill of rights."

can referendum on the acceptance or rejection of Public Law 600, which referendum supported it overwhelmingly. The constitution was subsequently adopted by the people of Puerto Rico and ratified by the Congress and the new government thus constituted was referred to as a Commonwealth in English while in Spanish it became Estado Libre Asociado, of Free Associated State.

Thus, a political subdivision of the U. S. exists which is unlike any other part of America. This booming, burgeoning Caribbean island enjoys a great degree of self government, although it bears the title Commonwealth rather than state or territory. Many questions have been raised as to the position of the island as regards the authority

of Congress. Several factions in Puerto Rico seek a change in status, and bills have been introduced in the 86th Congress which would (1) provide for extensive amendments to the "compact" between the people of Puerto Rico and the U. S., (2) grant outright independence to Puerto Rico or (3) grant statehood to the island. I have heard many of these proposals discussed. From the expressions of the Puerto Rican people which have come to me, it would appear the majority of them are conscious of their democratic growth and development in their present status, and I foresee no immediate change.

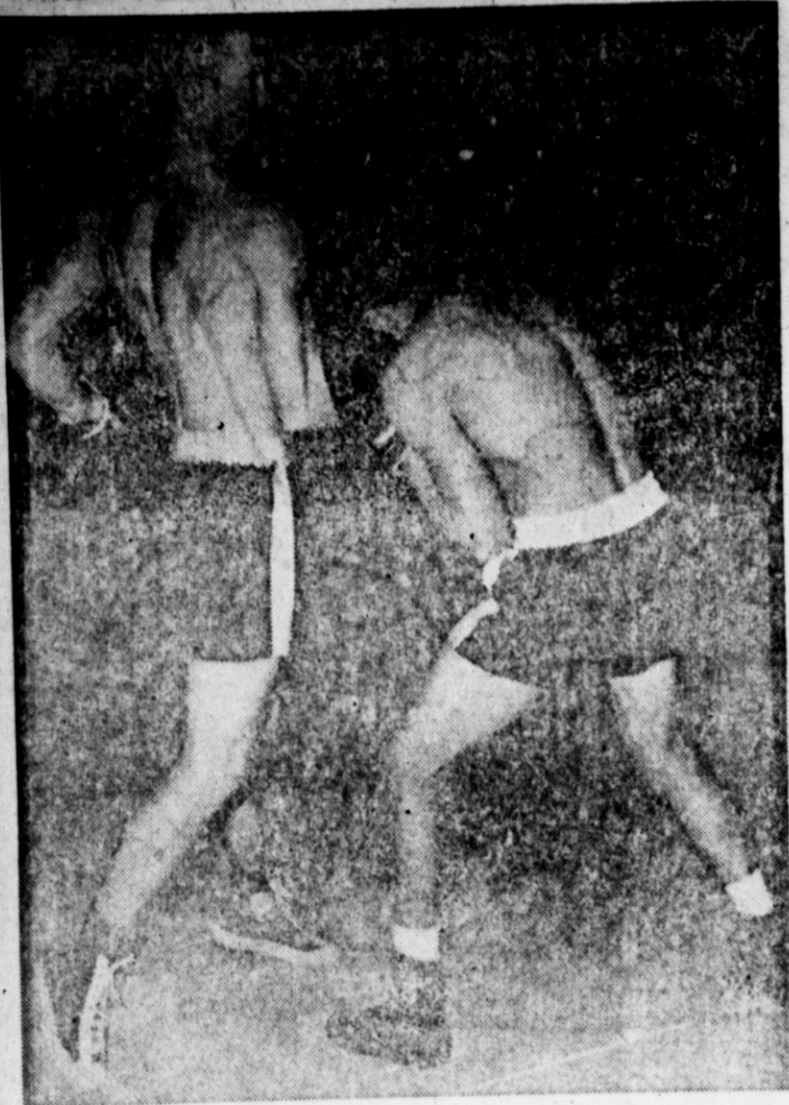

First Christmas Card Reminder Of Holidays

By ARGEN DRAPER

The first Christmas card reminds me that it is time to get ready for Christmas.

Abie Crume gave me this spice tea recipe. It is one that her mother used and Abie says it is quite a favorite with her family and with everyone who drinks it. You know that good spice recipes are hard to find.

SPICED TEA

Boil together 10 minutes:
4 cups cold water
2 cups sugar
Spice bag: 1 tsp. each allspice, cloves, cinnamon.
Remove spice bag; add 1/3 cup tea in bag.
Steep.
Remove tea bag when tea has desired strength.

Add:
1 can frozen orange juice, undiluted.
2/3 cup lemon juice
2 quarts boiling water.

This is an old-fashioned Plum Pudding recipe that will go well with spice tea or coffee.

OLD ENGLISH PLUM PUDDING

3/4 cup sifted flour
1 1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
1/2 nutmeg, grated
1/3 teaspoon mace
1/3 teaspoon cloves
1/2 pound seeded raisins
1/2 pound dried currants
1/2 pound figs, chopped
2 ounces citron, chopped
2 ounces candied orange peel, chopped
1/2 cup fine bread crumbs
1 cup hot milk
1/4 cup sugar
4 eggs, separated
1/2 pound fresh beef suet, ground
1/2 cup boiled cider

Mix and sift flour, salt and spices; stir in fruit, soak crumbs in milk 10 minutes. Beat sugar into well-beaten egg yolks; and add suet and soaked crumbs; stir into flour-fruit mixture. Add cider and mix well; fold in stiffly beaten egg whites. Turn into greased 1 1/2 quart mold, cover and steam 3 1/2 hours.

Here are the prize-winning beef recipes that go along with Mrs. Lee Cochran's Ham Burger Ring Barbecue.

APPLE MEAT BALLS

1 1/2 pounds ground beef
1 apple
1 small onion, chopped
2 pieces celery, chopped
5 soda crackers
1 egg
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 tablespoon brown sugar
4 tablespoons cooking oil
1 tablespoons flour
1 cups cooked rice

Core and chop unpeeled apple, onion, and celery and crush soda crackers. Add to beef. Add beaten egg; salt and sugar; and mix well. Form into small balls. Dredge with flour and brown in hot vegetable oil or drippings. Remove beef from skillet. Blend flour into fat to make smooth paste and slowly add hot water to make medium thin gravy. Spread the hot cooked rice in a large serving tray. Pour gravy over rice and arrange meat balls on top. Makes 8 servings.

HAMBURGER RING BARBECUE

2 pounds ground beef
2 1/2 cups coarsely grated sharp American cheese
1 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon pepper
1 teaspoon dry mustard
3 tablespoons chili sauce
1 tablespoon Worcestershire Sauce
2 cups corn flakes
1 cup milk
One 7-3/4 ounce bottle barbecue sauce.

Blend all ingredients except barbecue sauce. Press into 9-inch ring mold (1 1/2 quart) Bake in moderate oven (425 degrees) for 10 minutes to glaze. Serves 6 to 8.

TEXAS TAMALE PIE

1 1/2 pound ground round
1/2 cup shortening
1 chopped onion
1 clove garlic
1 chopped sweet green pepper
1 1/2 cups chopped fresh tomatoes
1/2 cup ripe olives (pitted)
2 chili peppers cut fine salt and pepper
1/2 cup grated American cheese
2 tablespoons corn meal
1 tablespoon chili powder
1 cup corn meal
3 cups boiling water
1 teaspoon salt

Cook onion, garlic and green pepper in hot fat until tender; add ground round and brown. Add tomatoes, ripe olives, chili peppers, salt and pepper and

simmer 1 hour. Stir in grated cheese, 2 tablespoons corn meal, chili powder and cook five minutes. Gradually add 1 cup corn meal to 3 cups boiling salted water, stirring constantly until mixture thickens. Pour corn meal mush over beef mixture. Bake at 400 degrees for 30 minutes and garnish with more ripe olives. Makes 4 servings.

BEEF IN CASSEROLE

1 pound ground beef
2 teaspoons salt
2 teaspoons sugar
1 1/2 - ounce can tomatoes
1 8 ounce can tomato sauce
2 cloves garlic, crushed
Pepper to taste
1 8 ounce package thin egg noodles
1 cup sour cream
1 3 ounce package cream cheese
6 green onions chopped with some of tops
1 cup cheddar cheese, grated

Combine and simmer 5 to 10 minutes; beef, salt, sugar, tomatoes, tomato sauce, garlic and pepper. Cook noodles, drain, and add to mixture of sour cream, cream cheese, and chopped onions. Arrange in layers, in greased casserole, meat mixture and grated cheese. Heat until bubbling, about 35 minutes at 350 degrees. Makes 8 servings. May be prepared, refrigerated and reheated just before serving.

CHUCKAROO

2 pounds beef chuck, cut in 1-inch cubes
1 1/2 tablespoons flour
2 teaspoons salt
1/2 teaspoon pepper
7 tablespoons butter
1 small can tomato sauce
3 cups beef bouillon
1/4 teaspoon thyme
1/2 inch oregano
2 medium onions, chopped
2 cups carrots, sliced
1 to 2 cups english peas

Shake beef cubes in bag with flour, salt and pepper. Brown beef slightly in hot butter in heavy skillet. Add tomato sauce, 1 cup beef bouillon, thyme and oregano. Cover and simmer (without boiling) until meat is tender. Cook onions, carrots and peas in remaining 2 cups of beef bouillon until barely tender. Remove beef and thicken gravy with a roux made of 1 tablespoon melted butter and 1 tablespoon flour. Return beef to gravy, add cooked vegetables and liquid and mix well. Put in casserole and cook for about 1 hour at 350 degrees. Makes 8 servings.

Have you got that spirit? Do you feel that pep rallies are rit and tem support your worth your while? Is school spili-ability or had you just as soon let someone else carry your load?

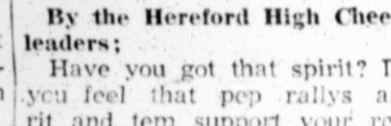
