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EGGNOG PIE

2 eggs, separated

1/2 cup sugar 1/2 teaspoon salt

1/4 teaspoon rum

Tablespoon vanilla

flavoring (can omit) 1/3 cup PET Evaporated

cracker crumbs 1/4 cup melted butter or

1/2 cup PET Evaporated 2/3 cup water

Press mixture of crumbs and butter on bottom and sides of 9-in. pie pan. Chill until needed. Chill 1/2 cup PET Milk in ice tray until almost frozen around edges. Meanwhile, soften gelatin in 1/3 cup cold water. Stir in 1/2 cup boiling water until gelatin disssolves. In 11/2-qt. bowl mix slightly beaten egg yolks, sugar, salt, vanilla, rum flavoring and 1/2 cup PET Milk. Stir in dissolved gelatin gradually. Chill until very thick, but not set, stirring now and then. Put egg whites and chilled PET Milk into cold 1-qt. bowl. Whip with cold rotary beater by hand, or with electric beater at high speed, until stiff. Beat in chilled gelatin mixture gradually, until smooth and creamy. Put into trumb crust. Chill until firm, about 2 hrs., and ready to serve.



Based on scientific research by the National Safety Council's Committee on Winter Driving Hazards, under actual driving conditions and during tests conducted by professional drivers and engineers, the cardinal rules for safe winter driving are listed as fol-

1. You are the key to your own safety. Driving conditions definitely are less favorable in winter. It's up to you to winterize your car, winter - wise your driving techniques, and determine to do your best to avoid accidents.

1. Rely on good tires and tire chains. Have good tires. You may prefer snow tires for winter, but you still should carry reinforced tire chains for the more severe conditions which can and will develop from time to time. 

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



About The Texas Safe Driving Insurance Plan

WHICH BECOMES EFFECTIVE JANUARY 1, 1960

TEXAS SAFE DRIVING INSURANCE PLAN Questions and Answers

A. PURPOSE

1. Q. What is the purpose of the plan? A. To encourage careful driving and to reward the group made up of safe drivers who operate their automobiles in a lawful manner.

2. Q. To what automobile insurance coverages is the Plan applicable?

A. The Plan is applicable to automobile bodily injury liability, property damage liability, medical payments and collision insurance.

3. Q. Is the Plan based on returning a portion of past premium to drivers who have had no accidents or convictions.

A. No, the Plan fixes a proper premium for the future period to be insured, based on the fact that drivers with safe driving records in the past are less likely to have accidents in the future.

B. MANDATORY

4. Q. Is the Plan mandatory?

A. Yes, for all risks eligible for Family Automobile coverage written as rates prescribed by the Texas State Board of Insurance.

C. ELGIBILITY

5. Q. To what automobiles does the Plan apply?

A. The Safe Driving Insurance Plan applies to all private passenger automobiles which are eligible for coverage under the Family Automobile Policy, except for liability coverage to private passenger automobiles which are part of a risk which is experience rated or which meets the conditions of elgibility as respects an amount of premium under the Automobile Liability Experience Rating Plan. For collision coverage, the Plan does not apply if such automobiles are part of a fleet which is fleet rated for collision coverage.

6. Q. Are jeeps or station wagons subject to the Plan? A. Yes, if individually owned.

7. Q. Since farmers' pickup trucks of a load capacity of 1,500 pounds or less are rated as private passenger automobiles, are they subject to the plan? A. Yes, if eligible for family coverage.

8. Q. Is previous insurance coverage a prerequisite to the application of the Plan? A. No.

9. Q. Does the Plan apply to a person who for the first time becomes the owner of a private passenger automobile?

A. Yes. The classification is to be determined on the basis of the driving record during the experience period in connection with the use of non-owned automobiles.

10. Q. Does the Plan apply to eligible automobiles insured under a "fleet" policy when the number of such automobiles is more than five?

A. Yes, unless the risk is experience rated or is eligible premium wise without regard to the experience period in the Automobile Liability Experience Rating Plan for liability experience rating. The plan does not apply to collision coverage, although otherwise elgible, if the automobile is a part of a risk that is fleet rated for

11. Q. When risks are written on a Comprehensive Automobile Liability basis, are the private passenger automobiles subject to the Plan?

A. Yes, if otherwise elgible.

12. Q. Does the Plan affect the rating of extended nonowned coverage?

13. Q. Does the Plan apply to risks written on a named non-owner basis? A. No.

D. EXPERIENCE PERIOD

14. Q. Is the experience period for new risks different from the period for renewals? A. No. The experience period is the 36 month period

ending 3 months prior to the effective date of the policy. 15. Q. If the accident or moving traffic violation occurs

less than 3 months before effective date of the policy, is the accident or conviction charged? A. Not on this policy. The accident or conviction must be within the "experience period."

16. Q. If the property damage to each participant in an accident is less than \$25.00 but the total damage to all is in excess of \$25.00, shall points be assigned to the records of the operators involved?

A. Yes, 2 points shall be assigned to the record of each operator unless one is excepted by the Plan.

17. Q. Are accidents and convictions that arise when an operator such as a next door neighbor is driving the car counted in rating the insured car?

A. No, the neighbor is not a "resident operator" as

18. Q. Is an accident which occurs when a car stopped for a red light, or stop sign, is struck in the rear end by another car approaching from the rear of the car that was stopped?

A. No, unless the operator of the stopped vehicle is convicted of a moving traffic violation.

19. Q. Are points to be assigned for bodily injury when an automobile door is slammed on an occupant's fin-

A. No.

20. Q. If a new owner is the sole operator of an automobile, did not drive during the experience period, does the Plan apply to the applicant? A. Yes, Assign Sub-Classification O.

21. Q. If an automobile newly owned by a person with no driving experience is to be driven by others who have had driving experience in the experience period, does their experience apply to the automobile? A. Yes, if they are "resident operators."

22. Q. Are accidents and convictions on the record of a resident of the household who is away in military service to be counted in rating an automobile owned by another member of the household?

A. Yes, if he will still operate the automobile during the policy period.

23. Q. Are accidents and convictions on the record of a resident of the household who is away attending school to be counted in rating an automobile owned by another member of the household? A. Yes, if he will still operate the automobile during

the policy period.

24. Q. Do accidents and convictions incurred while operating public automobiles apply in the determination of classification rates under the Plan?

A. No. Public automobiles are not private passenger automobiles as defined in the Plan.

25. Q. Does the record of the insured and any resident operator with respect to the use of all types of nonowned automobiles apply in the determination of classifications rates under the Plan?

A. No. Only private passenger automobiles as defined.

26. Q. The applicant's car was legally parked. Another party ran into it. Is this a chargeable accident? A. No.

27. Q. Are points to be assigned for a conviction for overtime parking?

A. No.

28. Q. If the applicant owned a private passenger automobile during only part of the experience period, on what basis is the classification determined under the

A. The classification is to be determined from (1) the accident and conviction record resulting from the use of the owned private passenger automobile and (2) the accident and conviction record with respect to the use of non-owned private passenger automobiles during the experience period.

29. Q. If the applicant is struck by a hit-and-run driver, is the accident chargeable?

A. Not if the applicant reported the accident to proper authority within 24 hours.

30. Q. Does the term "conviction" as used in the Plan include forfeiture of bail or payment of fine? A. Yes.

F. TWO OR MORE AUTOMOBILES

31. Q. When two or more automobiles are insured in the same company, does the Plan follow the experience of the driver or the automobile?

A. Driver. Points are assigned to the rate of the car usually driven by the operator who incurred the points.

33. Q. When two automobiles are insured one at Subclassification O and the other at a surcharged rate, what is the procedure when cancelation is requested on the surcharged automobile?

A. Points will be assigned to remaining automobile. 34. If an automobile or form of coverage is added to a policy effective prior to January 1, 1960, are the driving record points applicable to the additional automobile or coverage?

A.No. Automobiles or coverages added to a policy effective prior to January 1, 1960, are not subject to the provisions in the plan.

35. Q. When an additional private automobile is endorsed on the policy mid-term, is a rating information statement necessary? What class applies?

A. Yes, a statement is necessary if the policy became effective on or after January 1, 1960. The rating class will be determined on the basis of the driving records applicable using the experience period ending 3 months prior to the effective date of the policy.

H. Texas Automobile Insurance Rating Application 37. Q. Is the Plan applicable to automobiles written under the Assigned Risk Plan?

A. Yes.

38. O. When a policy is effective prior to January 1, 1960, may it be canceled and rewrittend to tage advantage of the Plan? If so, is cancellation short rate or pro rata? Is an inssurance rating application re-

A. The policy may be canceled. Cancelation is short rate. An application is required.

39. Q. How are physical damage policies, written for more than 12 months, rated?

A. The class application at inception applies to full

40. Q. Since the manual bases the medical payments premium on the bodily injured premiums, should the medical payments premiums be calculated before or after the Plan has been applied to the bodily injury premiums?

A. Before. Each coverage subject to the Plan is first calculated at the classification rate applicable without regard to the Plan, and theseafter the sub-classification differentials of the Plan are applied to determine the final rate for each such coverage.

41. Q. What are the rating differentials in the Texas Safe Driving Insurance Plan?

A. Sub-Classification 0 is 80% of the manual rate otherwise applicable; Sub-classification 1, 100%; Subclassification 2, 120%; Sub-classification 3, 140%; Subclassification 4, 160%; Sub-classification 5, 180% and Sub-Classification 6, 200%.

Most popular theory now among historians is that Coronado left his Army in Palo Duro Canyon. According to Williams Corona lo never saw the canyon. Yet, guides in Palo Duro point out where Coronado entered the canyon, as well as other

Coronado sites. Williams discovery should alsome come as a surprise to residents along the Concho . . they never knew they ever had such a famous visitor.

Williams says he used simple evidence to pinpoint the end of Coronado's travels in Texas - pecan trees, grapes and mulberry trees, something he believes other his torians may have overlooked.

Using the notes made by a Spaniard who was with Coronado, Williams had these facts to work with: Coronado stopped 444 miles deep in Texas from his starting point near Albuquerque, N. M., he camped at place where he found both green and ripe grapes, pecan rees and nearby groves of mulberry trees, he camped at a ravine one league wide, and he stayed two weeks -- from June 17 to July 1.

Williams traveled over West Texas, interviewed oldtimers. wrote letters and made phone calls until he found the spot
