

April 15 Last Day For State Vehicle Checks

Deaf Smith County residents this week were reminded by Highway Patrol Sgt. Dan Duggan to have their vehicles inspected before deadline, Friday,

Texas registered vehicles operated on public streets and highways after April 15 must display the 1960 Motor Vehicle Inspection sticker.

Duggan said operating a motor vehicle without obtaining an inspection sticker after deadline is a traffic violation, subject to fine as prescribed by law.

Inspectors at various stations in Hereford are checking braklighting equipment, horns and warning devices, mirror and windshield wipers of vehic-

By postponing having their vehicle inspected, drivers face the possibility of waiting in line at one of the state - approved inspection stations as the deadline approaches.

If bad weather develops, burden is added because inspection stations do not make inspection while streets are wet.


