




Feeding Scraps Hard on Chicks

ayed Matter Upsets Digestive

If scraps must be fed, they should be fed only while still fresh, and when the chickens can clean them up quickly. They should be fed to the mature hens not the growing chicks

many poultry raisers are accustomed to throw table scraps into the chicken yard in the evening. this is a dangerous practice. In this warm weather such waste matter decays very rapidly, and becomes injurious to the inmature digestive system of the chicks. Moreover, such scraps are hardly ever balanced so as to give the chicks the all round development the poultry wants. Even if fed as a supplement to a balanced ration, scraps have a tendancy to unbalance it.
