## SCHOOL AND CITY BOARDS ARE CHOSEN

Elections held last Saturday and Sunday, the first for the selection of four trustees for the Hereford Independent School District for another term, and the second for a Mayor and two City Commissioners. Both elections were quiet and both cast light votes, as there was no opposition on either ticket.

In the school election trustees J. O. Newell, E. B. Posey, J. W. Houston and C. O. Lee were re-elected. The hold over members of the board are Jeff Gilbrath, H. G. Conkright and C. S. Purcell.

In the City election Tuesday Mayor E. B. Ireland and Commissioners J. O. Newell and C. H. Dyer were all re-elected, almost unanimously.

Both of these bodies of public officials have worked hard for the interest of their constituents and have established enviable records for achievements won. Hereford is peculiarly fortunate in having such efficient and harmonious officials.

## Hereford Breeders to Stage Show in Fall

Plans are being discussed by the Hereford breeders of Deaf Smith county, for one of the largest Hereford shows that has ever been held in this section, to be staged in connection with the Deaf Smith county fair next September.

A superintendent for the Hereford department of the fair will be selected within the near future, and local breeders will be urged to start conditioning their animals for the show. "We must start early if we are to make a good showing next fall," was one breeder's comment.

Last year the breeders started out on short notice and put on a real Hereford show at the local fair, but this year more time will be spent in the conditioning of the cattle. Last fall the bull calf that was Grand Champion at the local Hereford show, was also Grand Champion at the Nolan County fair in October, and topped the Texas Hereford Breeders Consignment Sale in Fort Worth in March.

Deaf Smith county has long been recognized as the center for line bred Anxiety 4th Herefords. This county claims more Hereford breeders and more line bred Anxiety 4th Herefords than any county in Texas. With so many Herefords and with the quantity that is being produced here, all breeders should be able to put on a Hereford show that will equal anything that has ever been held in the Panhandle.

Right now local breeders are concerned with helping to put over the big Anxiety 4th Hereford sale that E. B. Black is staging here April 15. Just as soon as this sale is over, the organization will be perfected for the Deaf Smith county Hereford Show which will be held in connection with the Deaf Smith county fair, and a real show is being planned.

## Baptist Church Holds Inspiring Services

Throughout this week at the Baptist church the pastor, with the assistance of Evangelist Singer E. F. Woodruff, of New Mexico, and the membership, has been conducting the inspirational services here, together with the Simultaneous services of the several churches. It is expected that the Sunday evening service will close the meeting.

## Local Gun Club Elects Officers To Shoot Apl. 15

Dow Mercer has a double honor now. Recently he was elected President of the Panhandle League of Trapshooters. Monday he was also named President of the Hereford Gun Club. Other officers elected were: Johnathan Pitman, secretary-treasurer, and Dr. W. F. Gabbert, Field Marshal. The Club is a member of the Panhandle League, composed of Hereford, Amarillo, Panhandle, Shamrock and McLean. The first shoot for all of the clubs will be held on April 8, on their respective local grounds, and the results are wired in to headquarters and tabulated.

The Hereford Club will shoot for two handsome silver trophies, the winners to be based on high score at the end of the season. The Hereford Club is determined to annex the League championship in 1926.

(1) J. E. Keller, who resides near the Flagg Ranch, brought in a load of butter and eggs last Saturday to the Golden Rule Produce Co., and received a check for exactly \$51.81! And Mr. Hawkins says this is a regular weekly habit of Mr. Keller's.

(2) D. P. Vaughn Monday received a check reading \$65.95 for eggs alone that he had sold.

(3) J. W. Robinson Monday sold cream and eggs to the total amount of \$63.50.

The last two men are both approaching seventy years of age, but these figures tell the story louder than any language that could be used of how men can make money in the Panhandle country, at any old age, if they read the signs of the times aright and use ordinary intelligence and energy.

## E. B. Black's Big Sale of Registered Anxiety 4th Herefords Will Be Held In Sales Pavilion Thursday, April 15

Final preparations are being made for the big Anxiety 4th Hereford Sale which E. B. Black is to stage here next Thursday, April 15. The local hotels are planning to handle a big crowd at that time, several homes will be enlisted to aid in the accommodation of the breeders who are expected.

Inquiries have come from a dozen different states concerning the offering, and practically all these states are expected to have representatives here. This will be one of the largest individual draft sales, that has been staged in Texas for a number of years, according to predictions.

The sale will be held in the spacious Hereford sales pavilion which was erected here six years ago by the Hereford breeders of this section, as a monument to the famous Herefords that are raised in this country. The pavilion is located across the street from the Santa Fe depot, at a cost of \$18,000. It is one of the best of its kind in the southwest.

Mr. Black has drafted sixty head of Hereford cattle for his sale. Over half of them are better than three fourths in-Anxiety 4th breeding. Col. Fred Reppert, famous auctioneer of Decatur, Illinois, will conduct the sale. Competition is expected to be keen among the Hereford breeders of the

country, for a number of the females that have young calves. Some thirty calves will go free with their mothers, and many of them are straight line bred Anxiety 4th youngsters. There are around ten real herd bull prospects among the calves, and many of these young aristocrats would bring as much as their mothers if sold as separate lots. Hazel Caldo and Donna Mischief, two of the outstanding cows of the sale, have young bull calves by their side.

Breeders of the southwest will watch with interest the outcome of this Hereford sale. There are probably as many line bred Herefords in this sale, as have gone through any sale in Texas since the drop came in cattle prices. Breeders have been slow to draft many of their best bred cattle for the various Hereford sales. A good sale, or a bad one will affect the Hereford cattle industry, in comparison, it is believed. Mr. Black is leaving nothing undone to make his sale a success.

The suggestion has been heard that this sale offers an unusual opportunity for local cattlemen to enter the registered business. A small start with this kind of blood now may develop into a real herd of real cattle quite soon, if the business is handled with care and industry.

## Ton Litter Contests Provisions Interest Farmers

A few farmers in Deaf Smith county are interested in the Ton Litter Contest. This contest pertains to hog breeders who are interested in producing the maximum amount of pork in the time limit set by the State Swine Breeders Association. The time ranges from 150 to 180 days. The amount of pork produced must be from the pigs of one litter. The pigs are fed and managed according to improved methods in feeding. The point is to try to produce more pork from one litter than other farmers who have undertaken this same project.

The experience of the best farmers show that good feed put into the sow during the suckling period is worth much to the future life of the pig. The sow must be fed a balanced ration that will keep the sow in good milk which, of course, is essential to the development of the pig. The following ration was fed to the sow and litter that won first place in the Ton Litter Contest last year; six pounds of milled corn, four pounds of wheat shorts, and one and one-half pounds of cotton seed meal. In addition to this the sow should run in a good pasture after the pigs are two weeks old. Let the sow have all of this feed she will eat. Feed lightly on the start and gradually increase. After the first two weeks the pigs should have free access to a self-feeder containing milled corn, wheat shorts and cotton seed meal. A separate compartment for each of these feeds should be used or a self-feeder containing the same ration which is fed the sow. In addition to this a mineral mixture should be used for both sow and pigs consisting of two parts of wood ashes, one part salt and two parts bone meal.

Farmers interested in the Ton Litter Contest must see the County Agent and nominate the litter before the pigs are two weeks old.

## Hereford Scouts Are Working Hard Daily

Much interest is being shown in scouting in Hereford at this time, and the boys are working early and late, on the various tests which will entitle them to promotion.

At the last meeting of the local Court of Honor, Boy Scouts of America, Monday evening, April 5th, the following awards were made: Tenderfoot, nine; Second Class, six; First Class, two; Merit Badges, forty eight; Star Scouts, two; and Life Scouts, two.

Five local Scouts will receive their Eagle badges at the Chamber of Commerce luncheon next Monday. They are: Keith Guthrie, Paul Wright Barnett, Bill Parker, Oliver Ray, and Marland Gilliland.

## Hill & Ricketts Sell 12 Sections of Land

Indications are that a great deal of activity will be experienced in Deaf Smith county during the next few months in the way of development. Hill & Ricketts, local real estate dealers, have closed a deal on twelve sections of land northwest of Hereford. This body of land goes to several different parties and a large part of it will be put under cultivation. ## EAGLE COURT OF HONOR ON NEXT MONDAY

A capacity crowd at the Stockman's Cafe Monday participated in the weekly luncheon of the Chamber of Commerce. A Mr. Lyons of the Santa Fe railroad discussed the road's problems at Panhandle by request, and told of the extraordinary calls made upon the railroad at that point for spur tracks and extra facilities caused by the oil boom. He said he understood that a small parking plan for Hereford was on the calendar, but that no appropriation for same had been made this year, and suggested that the organization write the superintendent and make formal request for this improvement. President Black was asked to do this.

Mayor Ireland was called upon to tell what he knew about paving and clean-up week. He said that the paving deal was all in The Brand, and that the city would haul off all cans and non-combustible trash if the citizens would clean-up the premises.

President Black announced that the annual "Home Beautiful" campaign was close at hand. A change in judging, he said, had been made so that three inspections instead of one would be made this year, one on May 15, one on July 15, and the last on September 15, and the average taken instead of on just one inspection.

Rev. Ross announced that on next Monday the Boy Scouts will hold a special "Eagle Court of Honor" at the luncheon hour, at which time the five Eagle Scouts who hold their memberships here will be presented with their badges. This is a very special Scout occasion and a big attendance is anticipated. This meeting will be held at the City Cafe.

Scout Executive Nelson made a few supporting remarks and said that on April 15th President G. A. F. Parker and other Panhandle Scout officials recently elected will be installed at a formal meeting in Hereford.

The meeting closed with remarks from A. E. Channace on the need for highway signs in this territory and on the possibility of oil in this region.

## Selected Burnett Cotton Seed May Be Secured Here

There seems to be some doubt in the minds of many farmers as to whether cotton can be planted safely in this section after the almost complete failure last year. In November of last year a general survey was made throughout the county in regard to the cotton situation. Several fields were visited and inquiries were made as to the varieties planted. It was found that those who planted early maturing varieties were having very satisfactory results, while those who had planted cotton of unknown variety had made almost a complete failure.

Most every farmer will agree that cotton is certainly worthy of a place in a crop rotation plan. Many of the mistakes that have been made were due to too large acreage which resulted in insufficient cultivation. Because of our short growing season it is necessary that an early maturing variety be planted and the earliest maturing variety that we have on record by experimental stations is that of Burnett Cotton. It has a shorter stalk, small burr and thin burr and because of these characteristics is early maturing. Seed variety tests in Deaf Smith County last year and in adjoining counties give Burnett Cotton first place in lint production per acre.

The Chamber of Commerce of Hereford has purchased Burnett Cotton Seed from Lubbuck, Moore and Hall counties and this seed is available for farmers who wish to plant a small acreage in cotton.

Those wishing some of this seed should get in touch with E. B. Black or the county agent.

## Cleanup Week is Extended Week to Make a Good Job

### The Sunday School Lesson



(By Jaa. T. Ross, Pastor of First Presbyterian Church)

Sunday, April 11.

Subject: "The Story of Creation."

Scripture Reading: Genesis 1:1-3

26-31.

Golden Text: "In the beginning God created the heavens and the earth."

There was a time when this material universe did not exist. There is no violation either of common sense, or science, or of history when we make this assertion. All things save one have their beginnings. This is a world of beginnings and becomings. By the very nature of things

a changing world requires a beginning and a becoming. Common sense says so. In the very rocks which comprise the successive layers of our earth's interior are written the mute but powerful chapters of the material history of a world, and the history of man and nature since men have chronicled the happenings, the goings-on, tells the story of ten thousands beginnings and multiplied thousands of changes.

With these delvings of the rational man into the boundless past have gone the delvings of the man of faith, and when we make the distinction between the rational man and the man of faith we do not wish to be misunderstood as having drawn a contrast. Such is not the case. Faith and reason are not foes; they are complementary, each to the other. But faith spans the farther distance of the two; it deals with first causes. This is beyond the province of science, for science deals merely with phenomena and subsidiary causes and not with the original causes of such phenomena. It is the province of philosophy to explain the ultimate beginnings of things, and that divinest philosophy in which faith predominates is the surest and best explanation. So the writer of Hebrews states that, "Through faith we understand that the worlds were framed by the word of God, so that things which are seen were not made of things which do appear."

It takes a farther reach than mere human reason to find an adequate cause for our universe. What infinite mind devised it, what powerful hand laid its foundations? Mere human reason staggers up to the dark brink, to the outside boundaries of human experience and despairs of the quest. It soon finds that, "The truth is greater than definitions of truth; that life is larger than any interpretations of life." Beyond the boundaries of measureless space, beyond the grey-old centuries, was the adequate cause of this world—God. So it is the divinest of wisdom that states, "In the beginning God created the heavens and the earth."

The universe at that far away day was formless and plant and God can in marvelous glory reveal himself through a plastic medium. This is the first great lesson of creation after the fact of God. Amidst heavens that declare his glory, the majestic thunder peals of the sky, and rolling oceans, God speaks to the human heart, his message of power over a plastic world. And in the lives of Pauls, Luthers, and Moodys, and

others less celebrated, who have known so will—but the divine will he speaks a message of power in human life.

But, my friends, power is not the only message of this sublime story of creation; nor is it even the greatest. Greater than the manifestation of divine power is the manifestation of divine intelligence. Order is a message of intelligence, and perfect order is the message of unlimited intelligence. It was an intelligent spirit that moved upon the face of the waters and brought forth harmony from darkness and incomprehensible confusion. Light dawned and ushered in this world's first day; light both natural and supernatural, and natural because of the supernatural. Land and sea appeared and prepared the stage for organic life in sea and on land. Organic life moved on by the power of the creative spirit to animate life, to sensuous beings. Then came the climatic stage of creation. "And God, said, Let us make man in our image, after our likeness; and let them have dominion over the fish of the sea, and over every creeping thing that creepeth upon the earth. So God created man in his own image, in the image of God created he him; male and female created he them."

Nor are power and intelligence the only message of this story. Deeper, far deeper, than these is the message of love. Love breathes in every act of power and intelligence traced through this story. Love gave us this beautiful world, just as love only can give the beautiful, and love gave to conscious beings the power for enjoyment of the beautiful. What kind of being gives to us the rose, the sunset, the spicy food, the silver cloud, and the capacities for their enjoyment? Who planted that divinest order in

the human soul, the harmony of music? It is as utterly impossible as that darkness should beget the light, that any other than a God of love could have given earth these things. Love in excellent mercy might be nourished; love brought forth no animate life until there was food to sustain it and place for its habitation; love brought forth, no human being without the Godlike implanted in its nature, love planted no heart yearning in man without a response in the heart of God, love did not beget its child and leave him an orphan in a world without a Father. Creation tells a story of love.

But how can we express the inexpressible? As Story well says:—"Strive not to say the whole! the poet in his art.

Must intimate the whole, and say the smallest part.

The young moon's silver arc, her perfect circle tells.

The limitless, within Art's bounded outline dwells.

Of every noble work, the silent part is best; Of all expression, that which cannot be expressed.

Each act contains the life, each work of art, the world, And all the planet laws are in each dew-drop peered."

That the plaintiff and those under whom they claim acquired their title to said lands through and by virtue of a decree rendered by the District Court of Castro County, Texas in Cause No. 75, Mary Erskine Tainter et al versus Clyde Erskine et al as well as by regular chain of title from the State of Texas and by the ten year statute of limitation in that they and those under whom they claim, had prior to the filing of this suit, had and held adverse, peaceable possession of said land and paying taxes thereon and claiming to be the owners thereof under deeds duly registered, and that said possession was actual and visible continuous and not interrupted.

That the defendants are asserting and claiming some rights, titles, interest and estate to said lands that plaintiffs do not know just what rights, titles, interest or estate the defendants are asserting or making but that plaintiffs title is superior to any rights, titles, interest or estates the defendants' or either of them have in or to said lands.

That said claims of title, interest, and estate to said lands casts and creates a cloud on plaintiffs title thereto.

Plaintiffs pray for the recovery of the title to said lands of defendants, that they be quieted in their title thereto, and that defendants' rights, titles, interests, estates and claims in and to said lands be cancelled, annulled and removed as clouds on plaintiffs' title.

Herein fall not but have before said Court, as its aforesaid regular term, this writ with your return thereon, showing how you have executed the same.

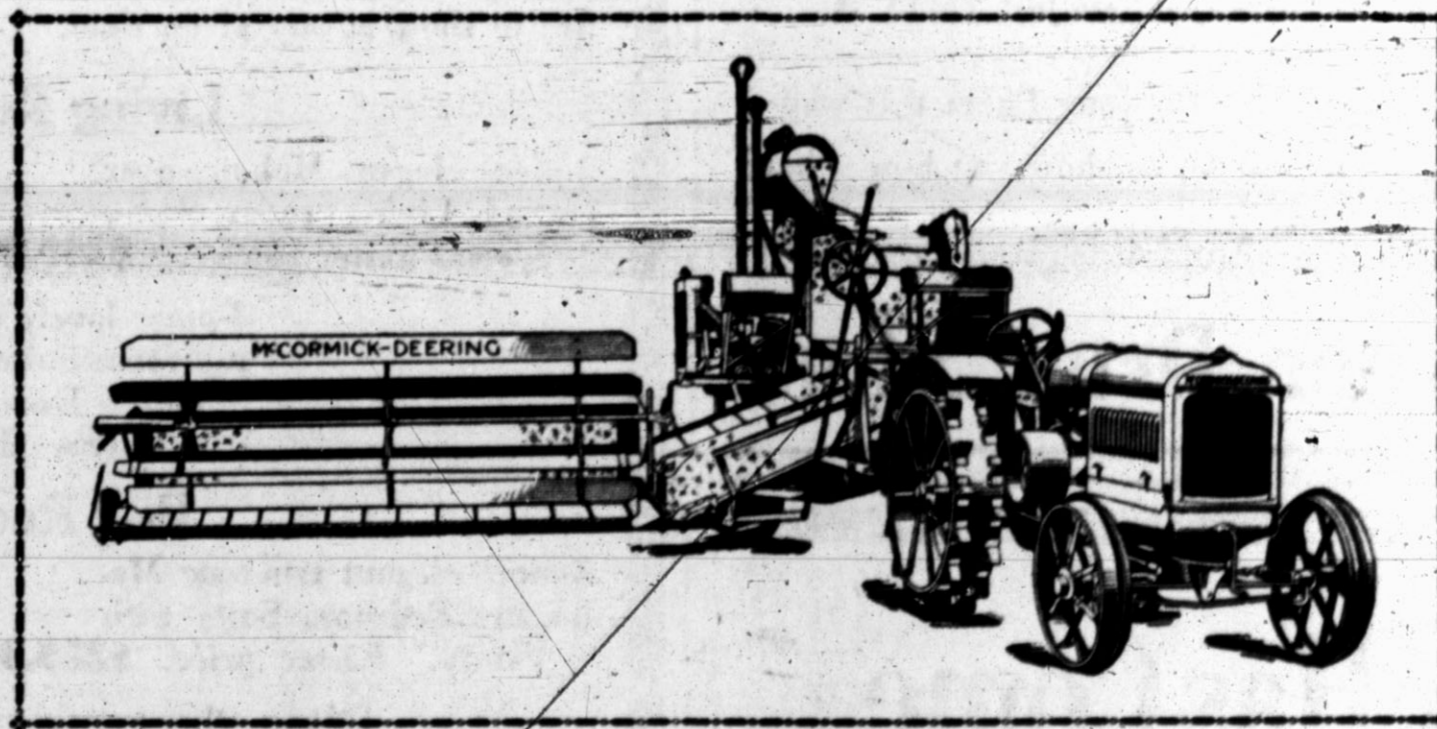
