But of course nothing can equal the joy that comes from being home with the folks on Christ-





All-state choices end Dallas Christian and center Arch Pardue head the big forward wall along with bruising Dale Robinson, a fine guard.



EDITORIAL COMMENTS

Christmas Is Complicated, Sure! And We Hope Our Children Make It More So

Christmas is becoming quite complicated for most families, according to a neighboring Panhandle exchange, which yearns for the simplicity of former Christmases with "a practical gift and a moderate priced toy," topped off with some candy and a few nuts.

The idea is right to a certain extent, of course. Back in those days, people had just as much fun, with simplicity, perhaps, but we doubt if the same would hold true today. Several factors have entered the picture, all of which might well be summed up in two words: "Changing Times!"

In the first place, modern day boys and girls have come to consider candy, nuts and soft drinks as a daily necessity, not a luxury! In the second place, hardly a week goes by that our small fry does not indulge himself in some moderate priced toy, comic book or other doo-dad of the type to which our contemporary editor refers. Consequently, an every day event simply cannot provide the "super-dooper" thrills created through our more lavish Christmas presents in 1955. Some people will say the children are spoiled but, to many, the situation will represent an improved standard of living which makes "Every Day . . . Christmas Day". And, we must admit, it is an achievement far beyond the dreams and ambitions of the parents of a half century ago.

To lament the condition is, in many ways, Kighly similar to lamenting the progress in all other lines. Certainly we would not discard our automobiles for horses and wagons. And, to turn our standard of living back fifty years would be an equally reckless gesture. When you come right down to ft, in fact, an improved standard of living is the greatest of all benefits to be derived from machines and from the machine age.

Certainly, there is the point that too many of us over-spend, tax our energies and resources to the breaking point and are often too fired to fully enjoy the occasion.

Foolish as the procedure may be, however, we must admit that it is based-upon a feeling of unselfishness and paternal fondness, both of which are upheld and deeply treasured in the tenets of our religions and our

In addition, let us point out that the most important characteristics of Christmas, "Brotherly Love" and "Goodwill Toward Men", are still paramount in our thinking as a nation. We have also managed to retain "Silent Night" and "Hark The Herald Angels Sing" as theme songs for the occasion and these songs are just as dear to the hearts of our children as they were to our forefathers, fifty years ago.

Yes. Christmas is more complicated; that no one can deny. But have we done so bad, after all? As a people we have managed to keep a grasp upon the deeper meaning of the occasion - and we have achieved this in the face of the most rapid and the most far-reaching changes in the history of civilization.

So long as we have these fundamentals, and practice them; so long as we continue to gather with our families on Christmas Day, and to offer "Thanks" to the Supreme Being for our blessings, it really makes very little difference that we give little Mary a doll that walks and talks, instead of the homemade rag variety which grandma loved and cherished; nor, we doubt, will Junior be any more thrilled with his genuine Robot Man than grandad was with a whistlthan grandad was with a whisting top, or ing top, or a jack knife.

The type of gifts, in our opinion, merely represent the current of living standard in our civilization, whereas Brotherly Love and the American spirit of Goodwill toward Men makes that standard of civilization



Vegetable Woes

We note with interest a plan outlined by a Lazbuddie farmer to establish a tremendous Plains-wide corporation which, he predicts, could easily transform the entire ter-

ritory and its economy. The man is Ronald Davis, 45-year-old farmer and former vocational Ag instructor. His plan, in brief, would seek to overcome some of the huge price fluctuations which have established vegetable production as possibly the most hazardous of all farm crops. He would accomplish this

through planned production to place vegetables on the market systematically, and by emphasizing "Quality" to create a nation-

wide demand.

Mr. Davis has apparently contacted scores of farmers and businessmen over the High Plains area, and has met with much encouragement, according to reports in the State Line Tribune (Farwell), which practically devoted its entire issue to the plan last week. Names were listed in many of the communities, although we saw none from Hereford, which has more or less led the vegetable production parade in the area

during the past decade. Unquestionably, Mr. Davis hits the nail on the head when he says that stabalized prices on produce would change the entire economy of the area. Records show conclusively that production and quality can be established and, with stabilized prices, the entire High Plains would certainly become a huge vegetable production center. With this, the experienced vegetable grower would be the first agree.

However, stabilizing vegetable prices is definitely one of those \$64,000 questions. It is possibel that Mr. Davis can do it. Certainly, we are familiar enough with his plan to say that he cannot. However, it has never been accomplished by the growers in the Imperial Valley in California; it was too much for the growers of the Rio Grande Valley; and, after a serious attempt, it was even abandoned as a lost cause by the United States Government, which bought U.S. No. 1 spuds at \$2.35 and resold them at 10 cents per sack.

On the other hand, there are several

points regarding the plan which definitely make sense. Farmers with small tracts would naturally be more inclined to "withhold for better prices" than those who had everything they owned in the crop; standardized quality and marketing methods would, of course, be tremendous advantag es, especially if followed up with effective advertising at the points of consumption. In addition his proposed large scale research program in connection with his corporation would be invaluable.

We also agree with Mr. Davis when he says that his task is a tremendous one. Furthermore, it should completely wipe the area out as a vegetable production center, or should establish it as the leading vegetable point of the nation, depending upon failure or success of the venture. All being contingent, of course, upon Mr. Davis, progress during the first two years.

To us, it looks like one of those things which one should watch with interest. Mr. Davis might just have something - and he might put it over. On the other hand, if he fails, a lot of people will have poured quite a few thousand dollars down the drain.
