three year cotton history: Grower A had an allotment of 50 acres in 1953. In 1954 his allotment was 40 acres and in 1955 just 20 acres. That makes a three year total of 110 acres. Dividing that by three you will come up with an average of 36.6 acres. Then using the allotment factor of .5404, you find that the grower's allotment this year would be 19.7 acres. Since the farmer would share in the reserve acreage, his allotment would be put back up to 20 acres, the same that he had (Continued on Page 5)







Parents Confuse Children, Says Psychiatrist

people are not crazy mixed-up kids but the world they live in is. So says a University of Michigan

child psychiatrist.

Dr. Ralph D. Rabinovitch, chief of the children's service, Neuropsychiatric Institute at the university, explains:

"With all his problems, the adolescent has priceless assets which given proper nurture, far outweigh the negatives-but some things continually get in his way.

In an article in the English-Journal, printed by the University of Chicago Press, Dr. Rabinovitch takes aim at some current child psychology axioms which he thinks

have gone astray. In trying to give their child independence many parents, Dr. Rabinovitch believes, go too far, depriving them of needed family security and guidance.

As a result, he says, they are forced to stand on legs too wobbly to hold them.

"In some families," he writes, "it is thought parents no longer dare direct a child after he has reached the magic age of 16. . .It is certainly nice to grow up with one's children, but it is also wise to be more mature than one's children."

"Comic books are the evils of the times." But, he says, this theme, is overdone. Dr. Rabinovitch feels that the horrors of everyday life are more gruesome than most comic books. He believes that adolescents do

need more than a school course in the anatomy and physiology of sexual functions. He says: "The primary elements of sex education are found in family re-

lationships, in feeling tones between parents and in feeling tones between parent and child." There is too much of an effort now, Rabinovitch says, to keep sentiment out of young lives, to

Life In Russia Told By Farmer

One of America's touring farmers recently returned from a two-month trip gh Russia has brought back interesting information on conditions in that country.

He reports that Russians are in little or no danger of going hungry but at the same time states that their diet is a generally monotonous one which is about 70 per cent carbohydrate.

Bread and potatoes are currently the mainstay of the Russian people who seldom see any red meat. In fact, this lack of meat is the spark plug in the new Russian drive to increase the country's corn crop. Once they have succeeded in this they figure they will be in a position to increase their livestock herds and in turn improve the diet of the Russian masses.

However, as things stand now meat, milk and eggs are vitually unattainable for the Russian wage-carner who makes \$200 a month or thereabouts. Inasmuch as it can be assumed that most Russians make \$200 a nonth or less than that, rather than more, is obvious that Ivan and his family are eating none too high on the hog these

The touring American farmer also reorts a great scarcity of what we term in his country "consumer goods." And in ew of present policies there appears to little liklihood of any increase in the ear future in this regard.

This on-the-spot survey by American eyes ppears to point to one major conclusion hat can be made on the Russian way of ife as it is today. The Russian masses are etting by but that's about all. The family ar, the washing machine, the television and the single-family dwelling unit hich has become standard equipment for average American is still a long way for the average Russian.

The report supplies further evidence of y Russia is stalling for time by making ace overtures at the same time Communist satellites are committing acts of aggresion. Russia must have time to quell the restiveness at home, caused by a shortage f consumer goods, before she can continue her plan of world conquest.

lotments and government controls on marketing. Livestock production may possibly absorb some of the slack, since the area is generally considered to be naturally well adapted. The vegetable industry, despite its present woes, might also point the way for limited acreage and a few small tracts. Generally speaking, however, the situation presents a delimma to most producers. To us, it is the inevitable outgrowth of federal controls—and with it goes the answer as to why so many great Americans have held out so bitterly to preserve States Rights.

The Brand does not pretend to have the answer. However, it does appear that this irrigated area has something with which few other areas in the nation can compete. It is entirely possible that we may have been wasting our resources on small-moneyper-acre crops, when the same number of acres and the same amount of water might have paid much more in returns. They occurred because someone came up with a beffer crop for the area; a crop with more dependable yield, greater eage and more net profit to the grow-

To say the least, the irrigation belt does have a definite advantage over most other areas. Our per-acre yields have proven this time and time again. If we cannot take such an advantage, adapt it to our situation, and come out on top, then we are definitely of the same calibre as our forefathers. The Constitution of the United States offers us the right to PURSUE happiness and wealth. It definitely cannot guarantee them.

School Dancing Poses Question

We never like to straddle the fence on a given subject, but there are times when such an attitude appears definitely feasible. In our opinion, the policy outlined by the Ministerial Alliance in a recent letter to the Hereford Rural High School Board of Trustees offers a solution - and we whole

heartedly agree with the ministers.

The Ministerial Alliance, while definitely pointing out that they could not approve of school sponsored dances, at the same time made it plain that they could see no place or time where the school district might be compelled to act against persons who wished to sponsor orderly private or group dances. This, in our opinion, is the practical answer to a strictly touchy question.

School sponsored dances, as many will quickly point out, do have some advantages through professional supervision, blanket invitations and a general attraction to which students will look forward throughout the year. On the other hand, there are many people who feel that dancing is an outrageous sin-and who class dancing in much the same light that many other people consider one's failure to pay debts, downright theft, adultry, or Communism. If you disregard the other angles of dancing, is it fair to assess taxes from these people to pay for school projects which they view with such opprobrium?

Because there are many people in this area with such sentiments, it hardly seems practical to split the community wide open with such a trivial matter as officially sponsored dancing.

Parents who, on the other hand, favor dancing can, with very small expense, group

together and sponsor such dances as they please. It might, in some cases, result in heart-breaking episodes for youngsters who might not be invited, and it could easily create friction within the homes of parents who frown upon such activities, Still, these are family questions which must, sooner or later, be settled—and the only place they can be settled is within the individual home. How they are settled always has been and, always will be, a matter of personal rights and personal convictions.

Certainly, it is not just for the man who condemns dancing to cram his opinion down the throats of parents who think it is all right. This is unquestionably true where the pro-dancing parent is willing to pay his own way. To us, it is a different thing, however, when we extract taxes by law to sponsor and pay for a program, which a possible majority of the people oppose and consider to be a form of sin and iniquity.

The answer to the problem appears to be a simple one. It has been reviewed and surveyed by the Ministerial Alliance, After much thought and consideration, they have merged with a sensible answer. It does not attempt to settle the question of dancing but, as concerns officially sponsored da--ing in our public schools, it is a thoroughly democratic solution.

BOOTLEG -Philosopher

(Editor's note: The Bootleg Philosopher on his Johnson grass farm has been thinking about the farm problem again, but the problem is still here.)

Secretary of Agriculture Benson has called on "everybody" to send him some answers to the farm price problem, so I brought the matter up at the meeting around a stove during the cold snap last week and here are some of the ideas I picked up, and Sec. Benson is welcome to them:

(1) "The whole trouble comes from ever letting farmers get prosperous in the first place. That's where the country made its big mistake. It's just hard to go back to the days of one-gallus farming when you've gotten used to living like other people."

(2) "The way to reduce the farm surplus is to cut out all the nonsense about reducing. Let the Department of Agriculture offer a prize for the woman in every town in the nation who gains the most in the next six months. You take right here in Deaf Smith County, if every woman really let go, the farm surplus would meet its match."

(3) "That won't do it. The way to reduce the surplus is to stop producing so much, and the way to do that is to abolish the tractor. The tractor is what enabled a farmer to produce four times as much as he used to. Get Congress to outlaw the use of the tractor, and in two years we won't have a surplus. Turn the farmer loose, let him produce all he can, provided he does it with horses and mules."

(4) "Won't work. All it'd do is bring on a depression for the tractor manufacturers. The thing to do is put all the whitecollar farm experts and professional agriculturists at work farming. Nothing will produce a scarcity faster than that."


(5) "What about this soil bank idea? Take a tenth of the land out of cultivation, build up the soil's fertility and hold it in readiness until the country's population doubles."

(6) "Won't work, It'd work all right maybe if you could get Mexico, South America, Brazil, etc. to join up, but you cut down on production in the U.S. and production on every scrap of land elsewhere on earth will be doubled. Every time the U.S. cuts production by 1 acre, Brazil steps hers up

As you can see, this area is pretty well divided on the solution to the farm problem, and if the rest of the country is in the same shape, you can understand how it's hard for me to understand how anybody would want the job of finding an answer. Secretary Benson is welcome to his job, I don't think anybody out here wants it.
