Chief of Police for the Hereford Police Department is Marshall Padgett. Padgett came to Hereford in April of 1961, after serving on the Amarillo Police Department for 13 years.

He was a detective at Amarillo for several years and came to the Hereford Police Department as a patrolman,

Padgett was soon promoted to a sergeant on the local force and was named chief by the city commission in July of 1962, after the resignation of the chief

One Of State's Finest Padgett has transformed the local department into one of the finest in the state of Texas. The offices in the local department are ones that can be point-

ed to with pride. Equipment is the finest, But still, the most important factor of all is the caliber of man that operates the equipment.

They are experienced in law enforcement. The 10 men on the force, including Padgett, have a total of 75 years service, an indication of many years of training and experience

The department has a secretary, who serves as a dispatcher during the day; a meter maid, capable of doubling as a dispatcher, and two other dispatchers who work the evening shifts and weekends. Modern Filing System

The department maintains one of the most up-to-date filing systems to be found in any police department in the state. A cross file system is found on every person who has any dealings with the Hereford Police Department.

Accurate records are kept, concerning the type of violation and if the offense is serious enough, mug shots and fingerprint cards are kept.

This is very necessary in maintaining an efficient department," Padgett said, "You-need to have your results where anyone can look at them at anytime and know exactly what you

Padgett is a firm believer in keeping records. A complete descriptive record is kept on every offense reported to the department and is kept in a file

for later reference. A monthly report is submitted to the city manager and at the end of the year, an annual report is compiled by Pudgett, including all phases of the department's business for the past year and a comparison with the past several years' record, showing the progress or decline of the immediate year.

More Cases Solved Even though the rate of varcity each year has risen, there has been a steady rise in the rate of those cases solved.

Another factor which evidences the progress of the department is that the rise in the crime rate has not gained as sharply as the rise in the poulation rate.

Every patrolman on the force must be capable of performing every job required of a police-

"In a small force of this size," Padgett said, "we do not have enough men to specialize someone for every job. We must have every man where he will capacity.

However, the department does have one patrolman who specializes in traffic control.

Ray Morgan, a newer member of the force, came to Hereford from Slaton and has been working traffic during the day shift. He has proved effective In this position and thus spends a large portion of his working hours on this assignment.

## Our National Budget

After a long struggle and much juggling of figures, the President has been able to hold his budget estimate for federal spending next year below the 100-billiondollar mark — a sort of fiscal Maginat Line of point of no return, the crossing of which - which spending will exceed income next could have unpleasant political, as well as

economic, repercussions.

Mr. Johnson has asked Congress to appropriate a total of 99.7 billion dollars for fiscal 1966 to finance the first stages of the journey to the "Great Society." This exceeds last year's budget request by 1.8 billions, a modest enough increase, perhaps, when one reflects on the ever-expanding role of government. Ten years ago, the federal budgt was 64.5 billions. In the past decade, then, federal spending will have increased by 35.2 billion dollars - a boost of some 55 per cent.

Critics of the new budget have already made known their doubts that actual spending next year will be held below the 100billion-dollar level. Calling the 99.7-billiondollar estimate a trick or a myth, they suggest that the President has intentionally overestimated federal income and underestimated federal spending.

We're willing to give Mr. Johnson the benefit of the doubt and await the final returns. Presidents have a habit of viewing budgets optimistically, and seldom come close to the mark with their predictions. But the level of spending is higher than it ought to be, and the major point to be made is

## Negro Problem Grows Larger

With some 1,800 arrests reported last week in Selma, Alabama, there seems little doubt that America's problem of racial strife is current, and probably destined to grow much larger before it is settled.

In this part of the nation we are fortunate in that we have practically no Froblem, especially when compared with the "deep" South, where numerous communities include 50 percent or more Negro population. Consequently, we cannot judge the actions of either side by the yardsticks

Part of the difficulty is spurred on by communist agitators who, at the same time take every advantage to publicize the strife in this nation. Mostly, though, it is a recurrance of an old problem out of which grew the Civil War - and it is definitely not limited to the United States.

Everyone in this land, including folks in West Texas, has altered his thinking on the race question during the past two years. The Democratic Party, long a Southern flag bearer, has probably done the greatest "about face" of any known group, Meanwhile, there seems little question but that the condition would have arisen regardless of which party happened to be in power.

We doubt, too, if there will be any solution in the near future. The colored people must, above all else, learn that there are definite responsibilities which go along with equality and rights. The whites at the same time, must become a bit more tolerant and make sincere effort to see both sides of the question. When these things are achieved, it will be possible for us to live together in peace and harmony.


As for complete integration, including full social acceptance, we doubt if this stage will be reached during the days of our lives. This is a point which the Negro must sooner or later face. Like the white man, he must earn and achieve his own individual level in society. Some Negroes have achieved acceptance on their own and we doubt if this particular phase can be realized in any other manner. Certainly, it can never be legislated.
