## Federal Aid Cost Termed High For Area

(Special To The Brand)  
NEW YORK — Taxpayers in Deaf Smith County are paying a high price for the benefits their area receives under the various Federal aid programs.

Out of every dollar in aid received from Washington — for public housing, welfare, education, hospitals, roads, urban development and the like — the cost to them is \$1.04.

That is how much they have been contributing toward the aid programs through their income and excise taxes.

And this does not include the amount the community has had to put up in the form of matching funds for local projects.

The findings are based on a state-by-state examination of Federal grants-in-aid made during the past fiscal year. It was conducted by the Tax Foundation, a non-profit organization whose purpose is to serve as a watchdog on public spending and taxation.

During his over-a-cup-of-coffee mid-morning discussion the occasion presented itself and Price took advantage of it to take a poke at the "Great Society" perpetrators.

Price said he is conducting a series of "Crop and Cattle Clinics" throughout the 18th Congressional District to learn farmers' viewpoints.

He discussed the present subsidy program and discussed with the farmers present for the informal meeting what changes should be made regarding current farm legislation.

Price explained to the farmers his "Plan for Plenty," a plan whereby other free nations could be helped to help themselves while the United States reduces its surpluses and improves its farm income.

THE GOP hopeful said that he thought that doing away with farm subsidies "over-night" would not work, since many farmers have borrowed money and are counting on this guaranteed income.

He added, however, that he thought that the government should slowly decrease the subsidies until they are non-existent.

The "Crop and Cattle Clinics" were designed by Price to help him find out the thoughts of the farmers and ranchers of the area.

Balloting for the run-off primary will be conducted May 25-31 in the county clerk's office. Only two posts are to be decided in the run-off — C. B. Miles vs. Ernest Wade for justice of the peace and Crawford Martin vs. Franklin Spears for state attorney general.

Absentee voting periods for the \$450,000 county bond election which would provide for some 30 miles of new paving in the county is May 23 through June 7.

## Meat Plant Fire Loss At \$40,000

Flames raced through a Hereford meat packing plant Tuesday night, then settled into inaccessible portions of the building to deal firemen a five-hour battle and cause losses estimated at \$40,000.

The blaze, which sent smoke into downtown Hereford some three miles to the west, left only an empty shell of the concrete block structure which housed operations for Hacker & Jesko Meat Packing Plant.

Apparently triggered by refrigerator equipment, flames erupted and apparently went undetected before being first spotted at 7:15 p. m.

The five-alarm fire brought all units of the Hereford Fire Department into action, but was out of control as firefighters arrived.

WITHIN an hour, the building had been gutted, but it was not until midnight that firemen were able to leave the scene. Firemen's effectiveness was limited to containing the fire during most of the period, as flames smoldered and then erupted in spectacular gusts at first one, then another spot in the roof portion of the building.

LIMITED water supply curtailed firefighting as nearest source of water was through pumping from Tierra Blanca Creek, a quarter mile from the plant.

Morris Hacker, owner of the plant since 1964, said that no one was in the building when the fire erupted.

Employees of the plant working in an adjoining feed yard first spotted smoke shortly before 7:15 p. m.

"AT FIRST, they thought it was just coming from the smoker (used to process beef) but after they saw that smoke was coming from under all the seams, they called the fire department," Hacker said.

Hacker said that the building and all contents were considered destroyed, along with at least 35 butchered beefs.

THE PLANT had been operated under various names since 1941.

He said that the facility is insured and that he plans to rebuild the custom slaughtering business.

Unable to gain access to the burning portion of the structure, firemen utilized a boom basket truck owned by the Deaf Smith County Electric Cooperative as

## Woman Escapes Apartment Blaze, Damage Light

A Hereford woman asleep in her apartment was uninjured in a Monday night fire which was spotted by two boys who saw smoke pouring from the duplex in which she lives.

Firemen were called to the apartment at 11:46 p. m. in the first of five alarms in a 24-hour period climaxed by Tuesday night's blaze at a local meat packing plant.

THE APARTMENT was filled with smoke when firemen arrived at the scene Monday night. Miss Rose Blackwell, who had been asleep until the fire was

## School Transfer Deadline June 1 For Students

Parents of school students wishing to transfer from the school district in which they reside for the 1966-67 term should make application in the county judge's office prior to June 1, it was announced this week.

Transfer approval is required for all students who will attend school in a district other than the one in which they reside, it was pointed out.

This, includes, for instance, graduates of Walcott School who will be freshmen in Hereford schools next fall.

Students eligible for transfer include those in a grade not taught in their home district and those with whom it would be more convenient to attend a school other than one in the district in which they reside.

# Heat Arrives — Rain Doesn't

A cooler supply of air slipped into the Texas Panhandle Wednesday morning to dissolve a

three-day heat wave which had produced record-breaking temperatures for the area.

But the change to comparatively cool days brought with it no relief for the county's spring-time drought — which several weeks ago had claimed all but the heartiest stalks of area dryland wheat.

THERE'LL NOT be a dryland wheat harvest here again this year — keeping alive what has become a habit for the county's dryland wheat growers.

"Oh, well, I didn't expect a wheat harvest anyway," quipped one farmer from the western portion of the county, who avers that the area has experienced the driest five consecutive springs in history.

Monday saw the thermometer climb to 97 degrees, breaking a 39-year-old record for the date for the area. Sunday's high had been 96 and Tuesday the mercury reached 94.

THINGS WERE back to the May 20-year normal for the Panhandle on Tuesday, with a reading of 76 degrees. Little change was forecast for today with no precipitation predicted.

Moisture total this year is just 1.59 — only 25 of which has been recorded this month.

A year ago, on May 14, rains

arrived in Hereford with readings of up to four inches to break a previously dry year for the area.

THE WEATHER picture has at least one big bright spot, locally, however.

Irrigated cropland is ripe for planting and operations are expected to run full speed during the next few weeks, barring rain, which would be too late to aid the drylanders, anyway.

Watered wheat in the county has been described as "good" and "above average" by ob-

servers.

It was also pointed out, how-

## Firemen Gather Information For Emergency Action Plans

Hereford's second major fire in three months illustrates why the Hereford Volunteer Fire Department continues to seek information concerning area farms,

ranches, and business facilities. Fire Chief J. W. (Jap) Dickerson said following Tuesday night's \$40,000 blaze at Hacker and Jesko Meat Co. that he felt

renewed emphasis should be placed on completing a file for fire department use through a questionnaire appearing in today's edition of the Hereford Brand.

SOME 100 farmers, ranchers, and businessmen have returned forms published previously in the Brand, and Dickerson said Tuesday that the information provided by completed questionnaires will prove helpful in fighting fires such as the packing plant blaze.

Completed questionnaires should be mailed to the Hereford Fire Department, Box 512, or delivered to the city police station, Dickerson said.

From the returned forms, firemen compile information for a permanent file located at the fingertips of dispatchers.

WHEN FIRE breaks out at a location where such information has been provided in advance, firemen are in a better position to minimize losses, the fire chief said.

Farmers and ranchers are asked to complete the information sought under "For Farmers," in order that firemen may know the quickest route to reach the particular location, as well as what firefighting resources are available.

BUSINESSMEN provide similar information.

**PRICE SAID** that when he is elected to the congressional seat he will continue to meet with the farmers in his district "regularly" to keep abreast of their views.  
 He said that he does not feel that "the representative who lives out of the district and makes only a few trips back to the district for short periods of time could possibly be a true

representative of the people."  
 Price is a farmer and rancher from Pampa and is opposing Walter Rogers for the seat in Congress for the 18th District.  
 The Congressional candidate said that the farmers of today are facing a financial problem. He said that there has been a \$14.8 billion dollar increase in farm debt over the past five years — from \$26.2 billion to \$41 billion.

HE CONTINUED by saying

that one of the major threats which the current administration is posing to farmers is the expansion of unemployment compensation and unrealistic minimum wage laws into rural areas where costs of living are much less than in the cities.  
 Price spoke out against the nearing danger of the destruction of the two-party system and the possibility of a monopoly control when he said:  
 "GENERALLY, the success or failure of the massive effort by the Democrat power structure to completely destroy the two-party system and establish monopoly control will depend on the popularity of the 'Great Society' in November," he commented.

"I charge that our relations with out Allies have never been so low, and that the LBJ administration is playing politics with tax-payer's money in its 'War on Poverty.' The most notable beneficiaries of this program have been relatives of Democrat office holders who have been placed in high-paying jobs which were supposedly created to help the poor," he added.

Price continued, saying, "Regarding the need for a two-party system, it is notable that Lyndon Johnson closed his 1964 campaign in the small state of Delaware, pleading for the defeat of the Republican Senator who played a key role in bringing the Billie Sol Estes and Bobby Baker scandals before the public."

Price said that Senator John Tower is the only voice that Texans have in the United States Senate. He said that many people are asking what they should do about their private health insurance plans.

"I submit that the rapidly multiplying problems we have in this country and around the world," the candidate said, "are due in large part to the uninspired, uninspiring leadership of a man whose talents lie largely in his ability to force bad legislation through a 'yes-man Congress.'"

 ever, that the half-inch rain received in the county on April 24 was the first general moisture for the county since October.

AND THAT missed the heart of the area's dryland crop and range area, in the western half of the county, where rainfall total for the year remains less than an inch.  
 Land conditions there are not good, by any means, but observers point out that blowing has been at a minimum compared to the lack of moisture.

"We actually had more rainfall in the dust bowl days in some areas of the county, but farmers are taking proper care of the land and you hardly notice it now, except for the lack of crop yields," said a Boottleg community farmer.

## Medicare Brings New Questions To Elderly

With the beginning of Medicare coverage for all people 65 or over who have signed up for it July 1, 1966, many people are asking what they should do about their private health insurance plans.

WHILE THIS decision is a

private one, Travis Briggs, social security district manager in Amarillo cautions, "do not cancel any other health insurance you have until your medicare coverage actually begins."

This warning also holds true for people who become 65 in the future. If they apply for medicare in the three-month period before their 65th birthday, their coverage will not begin until the month they are 65.

Briggs said that it is important that people approaching 65 do three things: obtain good evi-

**ITS STUDY** shows that residents of 18 states paid more in Federal taxes toward the aid programs than they received in aid. Those in the other 32 states got back more than they put in.

In the State of Texas as a whole, approximately \$569,000, 000 of the Federal taxes collected went into the aid programs and \$540,200,000 came back in grants.

A breakdown indicates that Deaf Smith County residents contributed \$788,000 of this total and that its share of grants was approximately \$757,000.

There is no attempt on the part of the government to provide Federal aid on a dollar-for-dollar basis. The money is allocated according to need and to desirability from an overall standpoint, it is explained.

**THE SCOPE** of the aid programs has expanded rapidly in recent years. There are now several hundred separate programs in operation, with a budget of \$14.6 billion for fiscal 1967.

Senator Robert F. Kennedy, in a speech last month, urged communities to become more familiar with the benefits available under these programs.

He pointed out that many localities were passing up chances to tap these Federal funds because they were unaware of what was being offered and, in some instances, because they didn't bring enough "initiative and ingenuity" to bear.

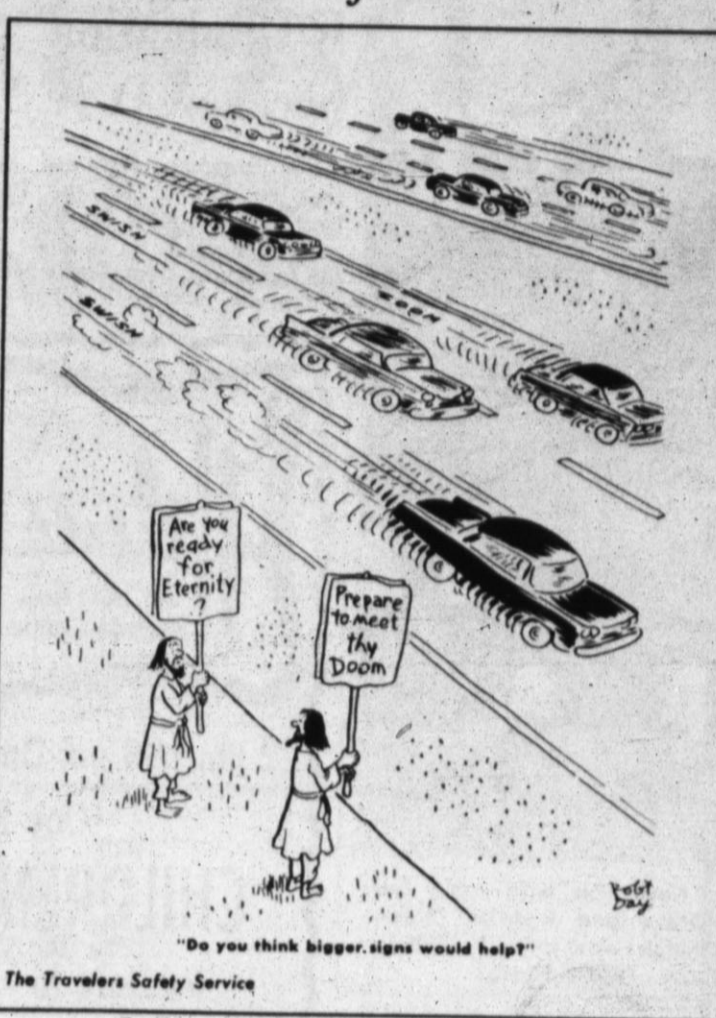

THE CHURCH I LOVE IS SUSTAINED BY PRAYER. (33rd. in a series)

Paul wrote, "We do not know how to pray as we ought, but the Spirit himself intercedes for us with sighs too deep for words." (Romans 8:26). But it was midnight before the final flames were extinguished after the building had been reduced to an empty shell. See story on page one. (Staff Photos).

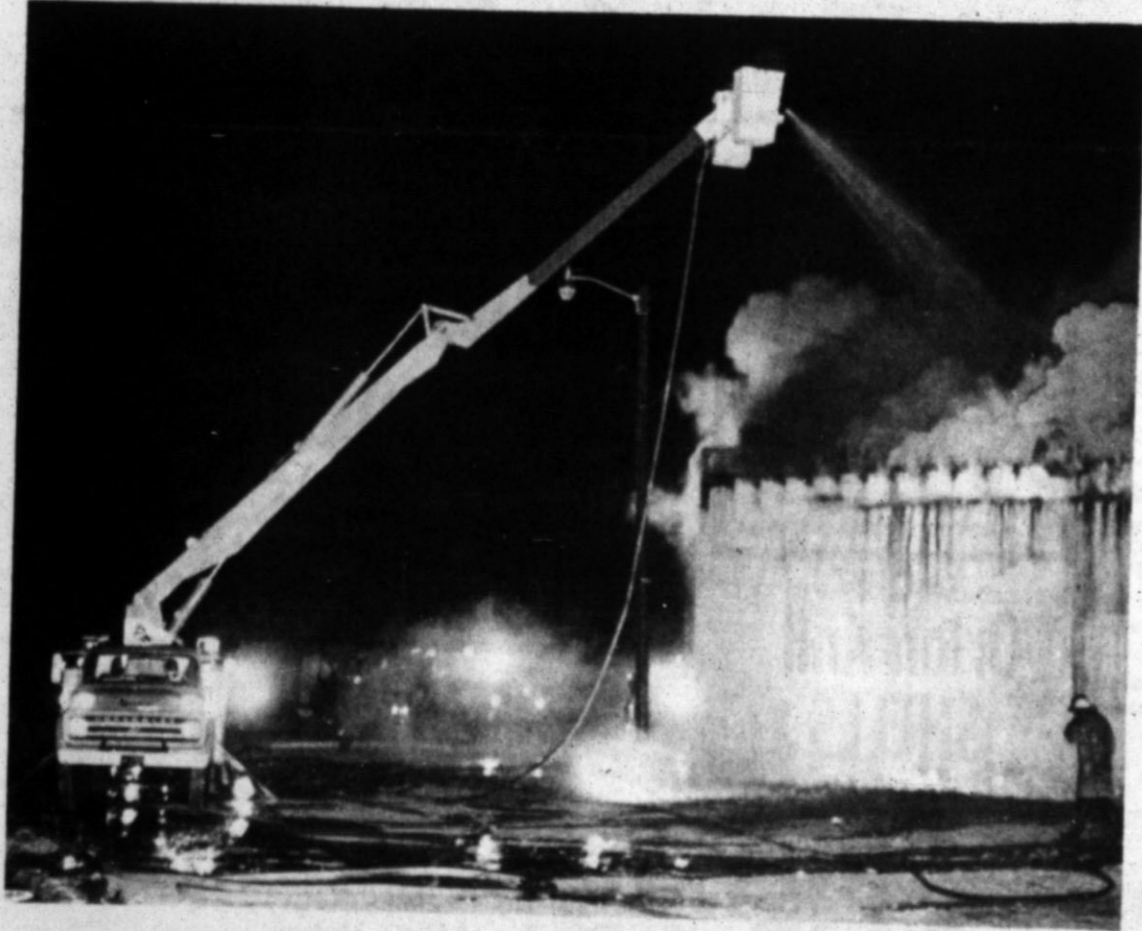

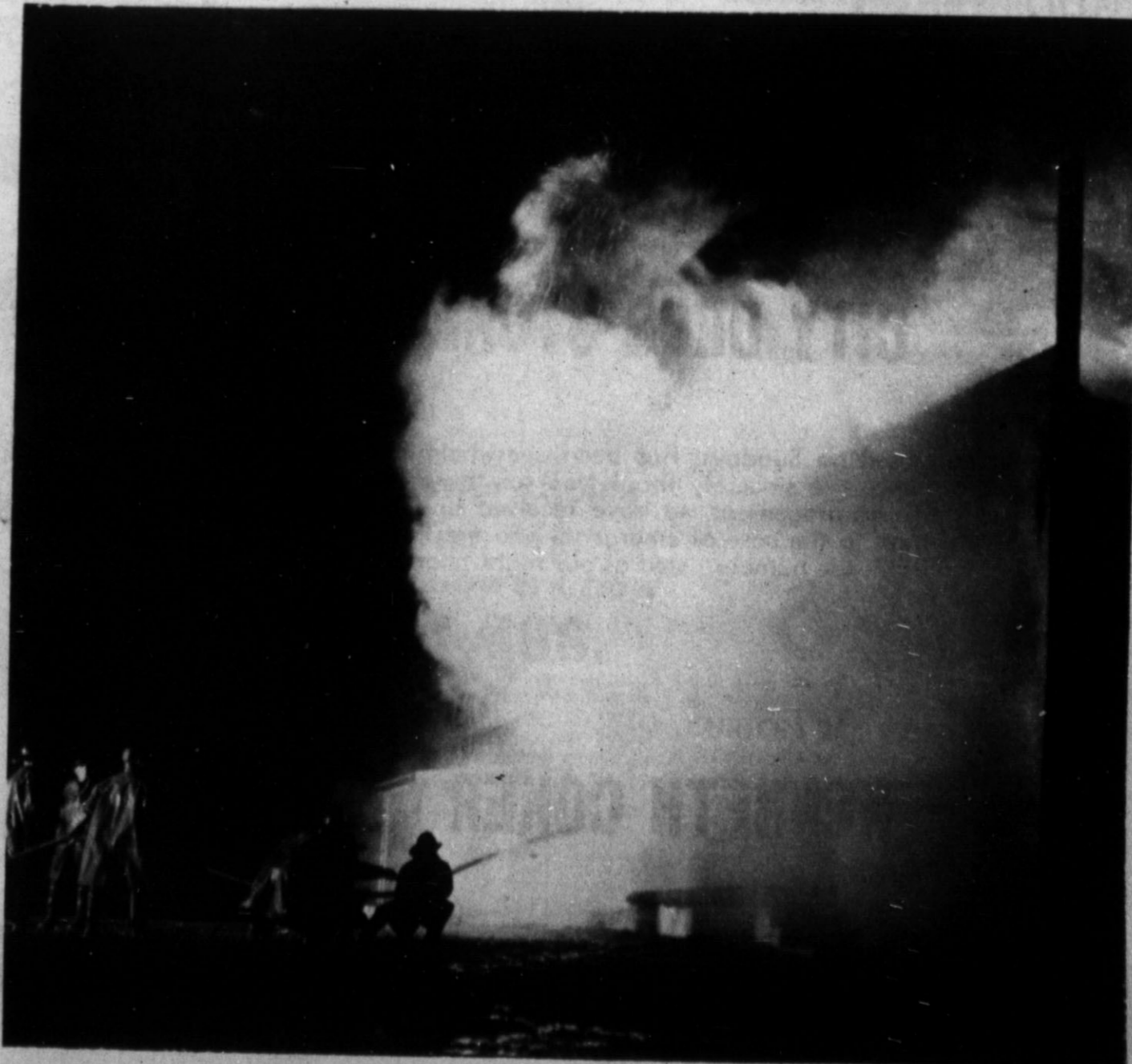

# Busy Cook Has System

A teaching career combines very well with the duties of a minister's wife and a homemaker, but it does keep one busy and make kitchen short-cuts desirable, avers Mrs. James Arnold, whose husband is pastor of Summerfield Baptist Church.

**IN ADDITION** to keeping house for him and their son, nine-year-old Jimmy, and assisting with work of the church, she teaches in Stanton Junior High School.

But the Arnold family has worked out a system of living which enables all members to fill a busy schedule. The men of the family assist with home duties by helping keep the house neat and sharing in daily chores.

Mrs. Arnold has learned to prepare meals quickly and more easily, often cooking such foods as casseroles and desserts ahead of time and storing them in the parsonage freezer to use when needed in a hurry. She finds the freezer her main helper in cooking, she says.

**EXPERIENCE** in combining a career with housework was gained by Mrs. Arnold before the family moved to Summerfield two and a half years ago from Fort Worth, where the Rev. Arnold had completed study in Southwestern Baptist Seminary while he served a small church near Gainesville as pastor.

He earned a college degree and two seminary degrees in seven years after he completed military service attending Texas Tech, Hardin-Simmons University and then the seminary. Mrs. Arnold had just received her degree from H-SU when they married, and she worked as a librarian at Austin while he served his final year in the Air Force.

Since then she has taught most of the time and was employed in the Fort Worth school system before they moved to Summerfield. She grew up and was graduated from high school in Sudan.

**SINCE SUMMERFIELD** Baptist Church is an active community organization with a full program of church work and also something of a social center for its part of the county, the pastor's wife has found a demand for her services as Sunday School leader, youth worker, WMU member, assistant with music and as librarian. She also accompanies her husband on visits when possible.

For relaxation she likes to read, play the piano — and cook. She prepares many dishes for the freezer at times which she classes as leisure when she goes to the kitchen and "cooks up a storm" turning out food in quantity to make family meals in the days ahead.

One of her specialties which has a company flavor but is simple to prepare, is chicken with an unusual sauce from a recipe which her husband's mother gave her:

Line shallow pan with foil. Sprinkle chicken with salt. Melt butter in pan. Remove pan

from heat and arrange chicken skin side down. Combine honey, mustard, lemon juice, and 1 tsp. salt to make sauce. Brush some of mixture on chicken. Bake 30 minutes, brushing chicken with honey mixture occasionally. Turn chicken; bake about 30 minutes longer or until tender and golden brown.

## A&M Branch Opens At Waco

The James Connally Technical Institute, a part of the Texas A&M University System, will offer courses in 15 areas of study when its doors open for the first time in September.

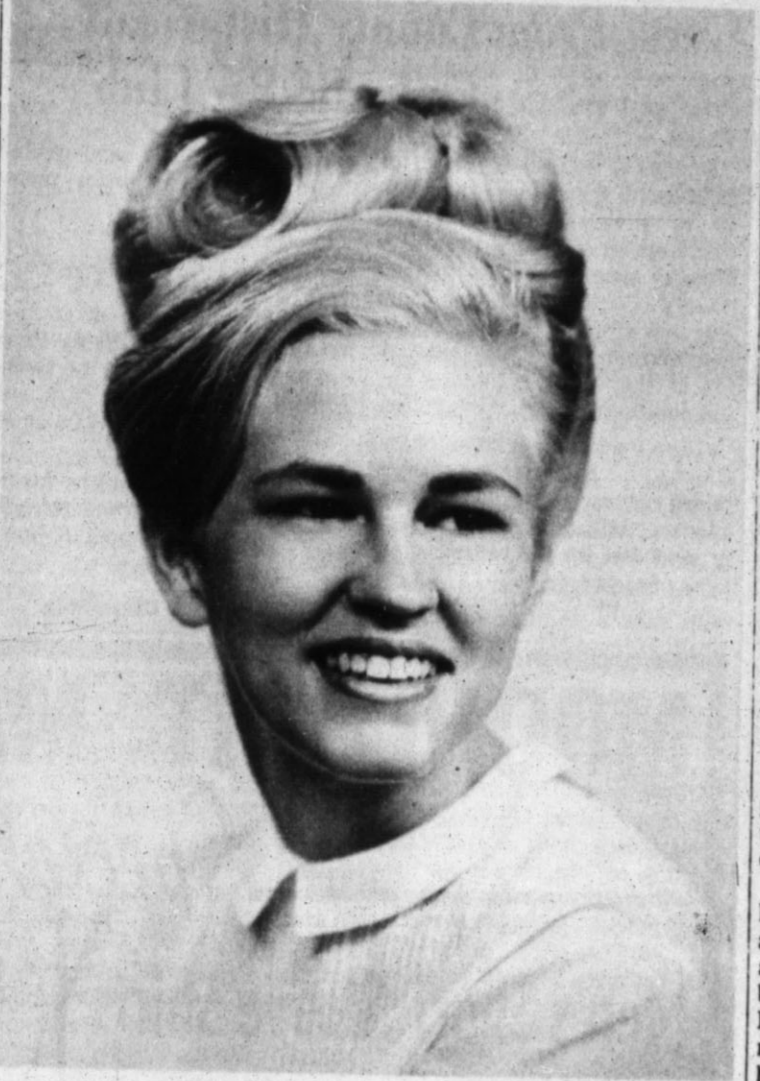
The Institute was created by an act of the Texas Legislature in April 1965. The legislation authorized the Board of Directors of Texas A&M University to establish "a coeducational institution, which may offer courses of study in vocational and vocational-technical education for which there is a demand within the State of Texas."

Information on the new educational facility, located near Waco, is now available at the offices of all county agents. According to County Agent Juston McBride, agents have been supplied with a copy of the Institute's general catalog for the 1966-67 session.

McBride said the instructional programs of the Institute are designed for training and retraining youth and adults so they may join the state and nation's work force as skilled workmen or technicians. A major objective of the Institute, he added, is to provide occupational training needed by Texas business and industry and for which there is sufficient demand by students.

The county agent said that persons desiring to enroll must submit applications for admission. High school graduates can be admitted as regular full time students. Mature individuals who have not graduated from high school will be permitted to register if they furnish evidence that their preparation is substantially the same as required of other applicants and have the ability and desire to profitably pursue their desired course of study.

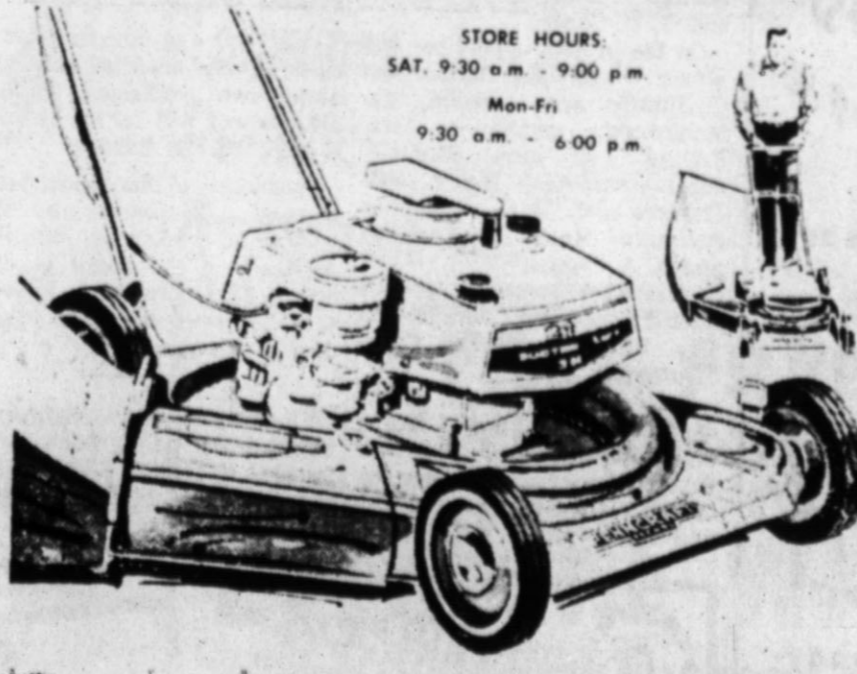

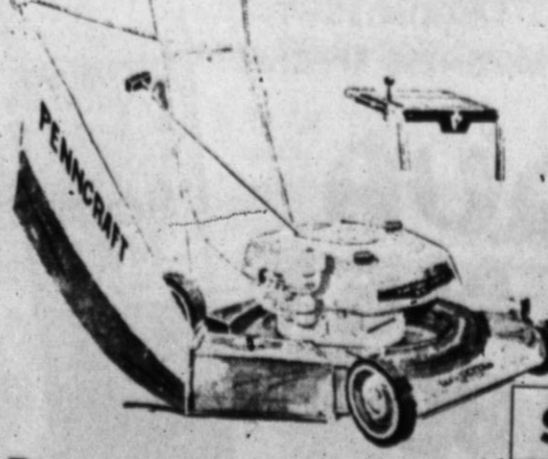

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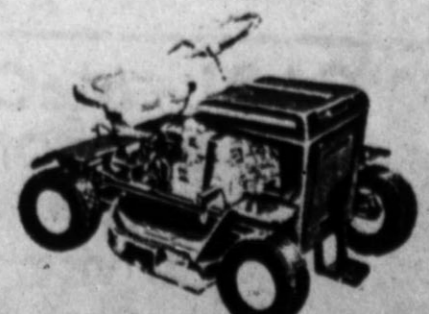

**LISBON** — Intrigued lodgers of a Lisbon apartment building now have the answer to their questions about that scraping noise on the second floor.

For two years, according to a recently published communique, DIALAP (Portuguese company for diamond cutting) had employed Portuguese apprentices and foreign workers, cutting the gems from Angola in a fashionable building of Avenida dos Estados Unidos.

## DPS Report Shows Twelve Rural Mishaps

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated 12 accidents on rural highways in Deaf Smith County during the month of April according to Sergeant W. E. Wells Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in six persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$8,690.00. THE RURAL traffic accident summary for this county during the first four months of 1966 shows a total of 33 accidents resulting in one person killed, 16 persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$34,040.00.

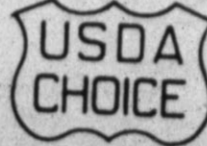

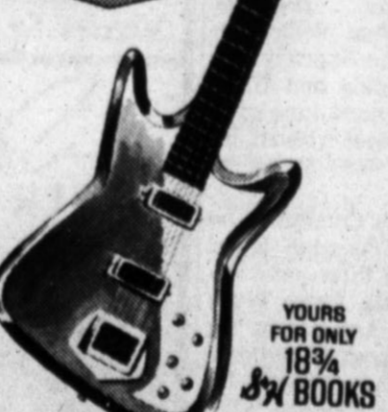

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AUSTIN HIGHLIGHTS

General Election Races Get Off To Statewide Start

AUSTIN — With a lackluster first Democratic primary behind state political insiders are looking toward the big general election contest for the U. S. Senate — and even to a potentially exciting 1968.

Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr, the Democratic Senate nominee, and Republican Sen. John G. Tower have their campaign machinery in gear. Both are ranging widely over the state.

Carr boasts of drawing nearly 80 per cent of the May 7 vote in his race against John R. Willoughby, carrying both liberal and conservative areas and rural and metropolitan counties by lopsided margins.

HE CITES this as evidence the Democratic party will close ranks behind him in the rough race against Tower next November.

Speculation already has started on potential candidates for governor in 1968 if Gov. John Connally steps aside. Lt. Gov. Preston Smith admitted plans to run for the top job when it opens up. House Speaker Ben Barnes is giving it some thought.

Among liberal prospects are U. S. Sen. Ralph Yarborough and State Sen. Franklin Spears who made the attorney general's run-off against Crawford Martin.

Present Martin — Spears race is the only statewide contest on

the June 4 run-off ballot. Martin received about 47 per cent of the first primary vote to 37 per cent for Spears and 16 per cent for Galloway Calhoun. Calhoun has endorsed Martin. Both candidates are beefing up their organizations and replenishing financial resources before their final stump tours and appeals. Getting out the vote again is expected to be a real problem, with so few local run-offs.

Governor Connally scored a clean-sweep victory in the May 7 primary and conventions. Not only was he nominated to a third term with 75 per cent of the total vote cast in his race, but his supporters apparently scored overwhelming victory over liberal forces in party conventions.

Only one incumbent was up-set. Court of Criminal Appeals Judge W. T. McDonald lost to John F. Onion, San Antonio district judge.

Lieutenant Governor Smith, Railroad Commissioner Byron Tunnell and Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler won hands-down.

Texas Senate, with no fewer than 10 new faces, will be a more-liberal body than it has been in the past. Lieutenant Governor Smith says it offers the greatest challenge in history to the presiding officer. One third of the upper house membership now is from metropo-

litan counties. House of Representatives, with a minimum of 54 newcomers, will remain moderate or conservative in tone, with Speaker Barnes retaining firm control of the gavel.

COURTS SPEAK Striking down a 1965 Texas law, a three-judge federal court held a Vernon farm couple cannot be stopped by the state from selling water under their land to Altus, Oklahoma.

Supreme Court heard lengthy arguments in sulphur company suits to force Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler to file their claims in Pecos County. State attorneys called companies "trespassers." Firms charged Sadler reversed the land office policy in refusing their applications.

Jack Ruby's lawyers, seeking to disqualify trial Judge Joe B. Brown, told the Court of Criminal Appeals that Brown performed four judicial acts concerning the convicted slayer of Lee Harvey Oswald after contracting to write a book about the case. If the court disqualifies Brown, Ruby will get a new trial for murder of the presidential assassin. If Brown is found qualified, Ruby will get a sanity hearing in Dallas.

Third Court of Civil Appeals, reversing the lower courts, held that State Comptroller Robert S. Calvert has authority to collect franchise taxes on dividends and interest paid to Texas corporations from out-of-state sources.

AG RULES Former aliens naturalized as U. S. citizens since the March free voter sign-up may vote this year without registration. Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr has held. However, election judges were advised to inquire into other qualifications, including age and length of residence.

In other recent opinions, Carr ruled that: PUBLIC employees are entitled to 15 working days leave for military training, regardless of whether duty is on consecutive days.

A defendant is not entitled to calendar time served on a subsequent conviction when the original conviction for the same offense has been set aside and declared void by a federal court.

Atascosa County commissioners can't lease a county-owned building to a furniture manufacturing firm, since public buildings must be devoted to public use.

Special information can be submitted by firms bidding on the sale of cars to the state, showing their car's adaptability to the uses of different agencies.

CATTLE DIPPING COMPLETED Dippings of scabies-infected cattle in the Texas Panhandle was completed on April 27, according to Dr. S. B. Walker, executive director of Texas Animal Health Commission.

A total of 15,452 head were dipped twice 10 to 14 days apart in an approved manner and solution, while 257 head were dipped once.

Federal quarantine for Castro, Swisher, Briscoe, Lamb, Hale, Floyd, Motley and Randall Counties still is in effect, though cattle from these counties have undergone state and federal inspection.

A request for release of the federal quarantine is being prepared, Dr. Walker said. Requirements for shipments to other states remain the same.

Dr. Walker praised cooperation which prevented the six Texas outbreaks from spreading.

AUTO INSURANCE UP FOR REVIEW On June 15 the State Board of Insurance will hold a public hearing on automobile insurance rates.

Based on evidence presented to the board at its 1965 hearing rates were upped an average 13.4 per cent. But a relatively minor change in motor vehicle traffic accident rates for 1965, compared to a dramatic increase in 1964 may mean good news for car owners.

PLANTING EXTENSION GRANTED Agriculture Commissioner John C. White extended the cotton planting deadline from May 10 to midnight, May 25, for farmers in 22 counties whose plantings have been washed out or delayed by heavy rains.

These counties include Atascosa, Bee, Bexar, Calhoun, De Witt, Dimmitt, Frio, Goliad, Jackson, Karnes, Kinney, LaSalle, Live Oak, Maverick, McMullen, Medina, Refugio, Uvalde, Val Verde, Victoria, Wilson and Zavala.

MEDICARE SET UP APPROVED New procedures for medicare aid to the aged have been approved by the State Board of Public Welfare.

All old age assistance grants will automatically be increased \$3 a month beginning in June. This will enable those 65 and older to pay supplementary medical insurance benefits. Old age assistance grants will thus be raised to \$100 maximum, with aid to blind increased to \$95 top.

A contract will be signed with Blue Cross-Blue Shield to handle payment of medicare deductibles. Separate contract will be signed for dependent children and for the disabled.

Beginning date on contracts is July 1.

SHORT SNORTS Texas Highway Commission approved 1966 Farm-to-Market Road construction projects which involve improvements on 904 miles of FM roads — including 75 per cent school bus routes — at a cost of about \$23,000,000.

Texas' General Revenue Fund was in the black — more than \$23,900,000 — at the end of May. R. Henderson Shuffler, who supervises the Texana Collection at the University of Texas, is on leave to help the Texas Tourist Development Agency plan themes for the Texas pavilion at the HemisFair. Highway officials report that dedication of link of Interstate Highway 35E between Waxahachie and Hillsboro opened the multi-lane divided highway almost without interruption from Red River to San Antonio.

New Governor's Committee on Public School Education heard guidelines for its three-year study and proposals from Texas State Teachers Association for a pay scale geared to national average at Monday (May 16) meeting here. Parks and Wildlife Department will accept applications for game warden training until June 8. Democratic and Republican state executive committees met in Austin and Dallas respectively this week to canvass primary election results.

LOOSE GOOSE ARTESIA, N. M. — Mrs. Virgil Sneed says traffic is getting mighty interesting downtown.

She stopped her automobile for a traffic light at the intersection of Roselawn and Main Streets and saw a big goose come waddling around the corner.

The goose turned the corner onto Main, honking to clear the traffic and was last seen by Mrs. Sneed walking down the middle of the street.

## Postmen Aid In National Stock Survey

Postmaster Nolan Grady reminds rural patrons of the Hereford Post-Office to be on the lookout for June Livestock Survey cards. Next week, mail carriers will leave survey cards in a sample of boxes along their routes.

"USDA bases livestock and poultry estimates on replies to this survey," Grady explains.

They reside in 20 nations. Since its founding in 1927 by 32 life insurance men, the organization has grown steadily each year despite some 200 changes in the rules which make it tougher than ever to qualify for membership.

"It is important for everyone who gets a card to fill it out and return it to the carrier. This way, USDA gets a representative sample of the area's livestock and poultry holdings." Carriers assisting with the survey are: Coleman Wright Route 1; LeRoy Price Route 2; Howard Armstrong Route 3; Owen Stagner Route 4; Eursel Young Route 5; and Max Goforth, Star Rt.

Survey cards will be forwarded to Cary D. Palmer, State Agricultural Statistician, in Austin. After adding and analyzing these cards, USDA statisticians are able to estimate the State's milk production, calf and pig crops, lamb and wool crops, and the number of hens and pullets. Information from this survey will guide livestock and poultry producers in making important business decisions.

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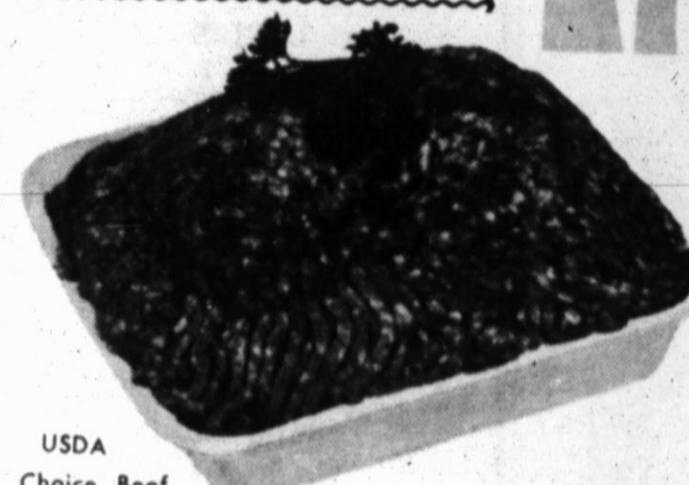

for business, including a reminder that all members are invited to a salad luncheon at the County Bull Barn Monday when reports from the recent District THDA convention will be made and the May Council session held.

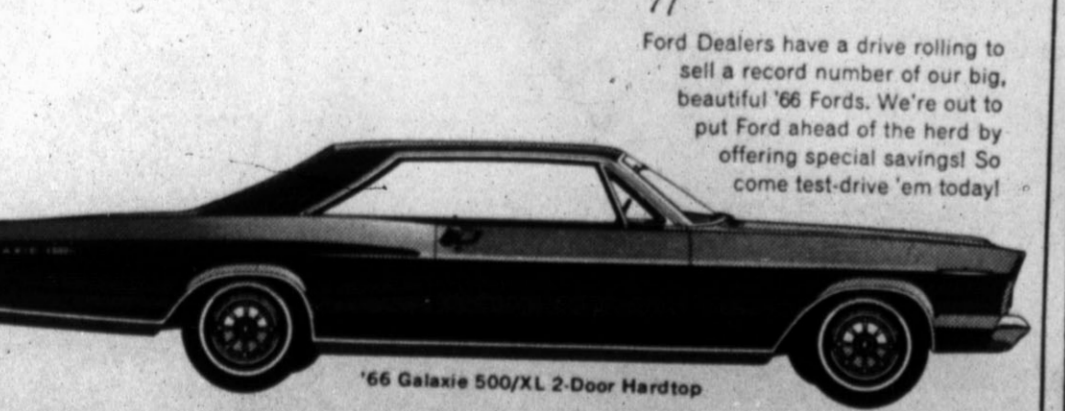

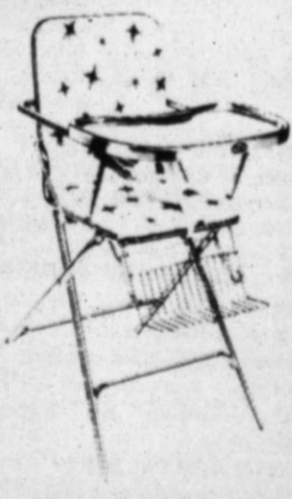

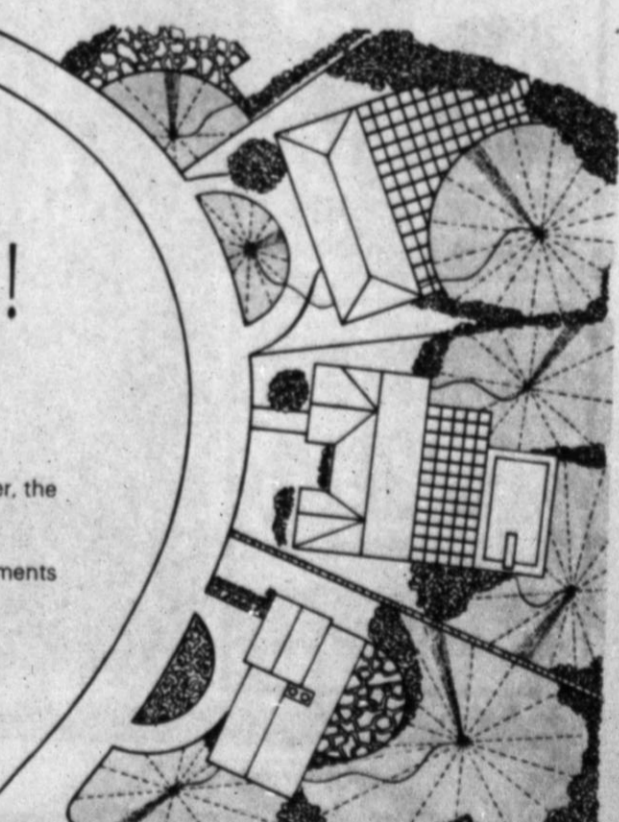

**REP. ROGERS REPORTS**

**Measure Would Relieve Freight Car Shortage, Grain Problem**

Year after year we on the Plains have witnessed the problem caused by a totally inadequate supply of railroad boxcars to meet demands at wheat and grain sorghum harvest time. We have seen grain piled on the ground next to elevators because it was not possible to obtain cars to move it.

This year we know of cases in which elevators have been unable to meet shipping orders be-

cause cars could not be obtained — with the result that some elevators have been unfairly penalized by the Commodity Credit Corporation for failing to meet CCC shipping deadlines.

**BECAUSE** of problems like these I had through successive Sessions of Congress proposed legislation to encourage railroad companies to develop a more adequate supply of rail cars, to step up their purchase of cars and to make better use of the cars available.

In Session after Session the legislation was effectively blocked by interests with no understanding or appreciation of a problem that was primarily one of Western areas.

In the past few months, however, the problem has become national in scope. The economic boom now in its sixth year has pushed the pace of business activity in every corner of the United States to such heights that there is a constant, recurring, daily shortage of boxcars. The impact is no longer seasonal or sectional or limited to a particular industry. The nation's entire economic activity is affected because of the dependence of agriculture and manufacturing on rail shipping.

The Interstate Commerce Commission advises that on not one day in 1966 have the railroads been able to meet the orders of all shippers seeking cars. The shortage of boxcars has exceeded 13,000 each day. There are shortages in other categories of cars. Covered hopper cars are, for example, estimated to be in short supply by approximately

1,000 cars per day. On the other hand, the ICC reports that no shortage has developed of flat cars, gondola cars, and auto cars. The shortage centers on the boxcar, that all-purpose workhorse of our railroads.

**WESTERN** railroads generally have built and maintained sufficient fleets of boxcars at a time when the national car supply has been declining. But in the course of delivering goods to eastern markets and ports, cars from western roads have become tied up in the service of eastern railroads which have lacked sufficient numbers of cars of their own.

It was less costly to rent cars than to buy them, and for railroads in deep financial trouble it was the alternative to making substantial investments in new equipment.

The bill passed by the House of Representatives and the Se-

nate authorizes the Interstate Commerce Commission in its setting of the rates of compensation to be paid for the use of any type of freight car to include such elements as in the Commission's judgment will provide just and reasonable compensation to freight car owners, contribute to sound car service practices (including efficient utilization and distribution of cars), and encourage the acquisition and maintenance of a car supply adequate to meet the needs of commerce and the national defense.

**BY SETTING** rental charges at higher rates, if such action is called for, the Commission could thus encourage return to home roads of boxcars that the owning railroad might require to meet sectional demands. This is one of the types of incentives covered in the legislation. This action will not solve all

the problems by any means. Boxcars are going to continue to be in short supply, but the legislation is going to help. I am very much in hopes that additional steps can be taken to encourage railroads to be able to meet the every-increasing requirements of U. S. business and especially the seasonal problems with which agriculture is confronted.

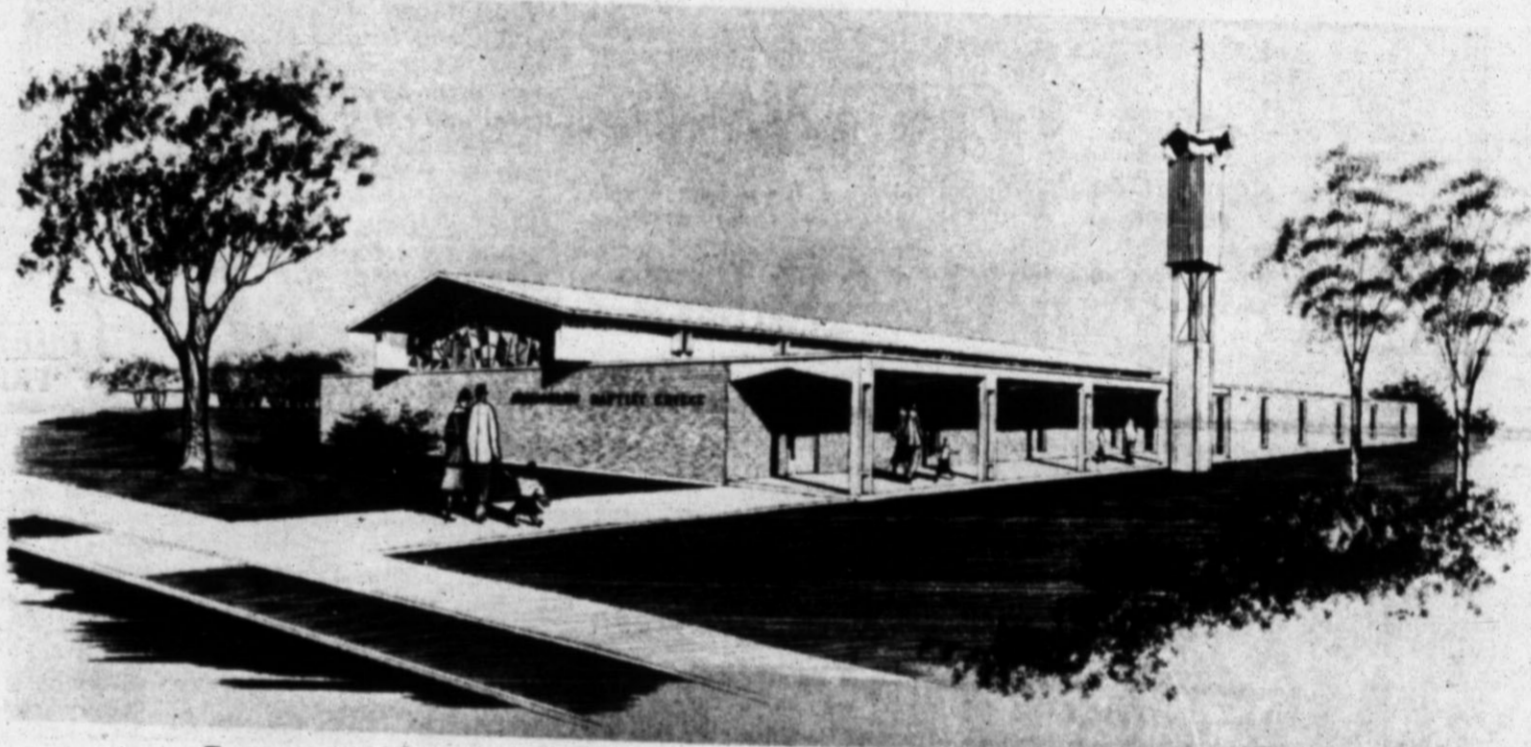

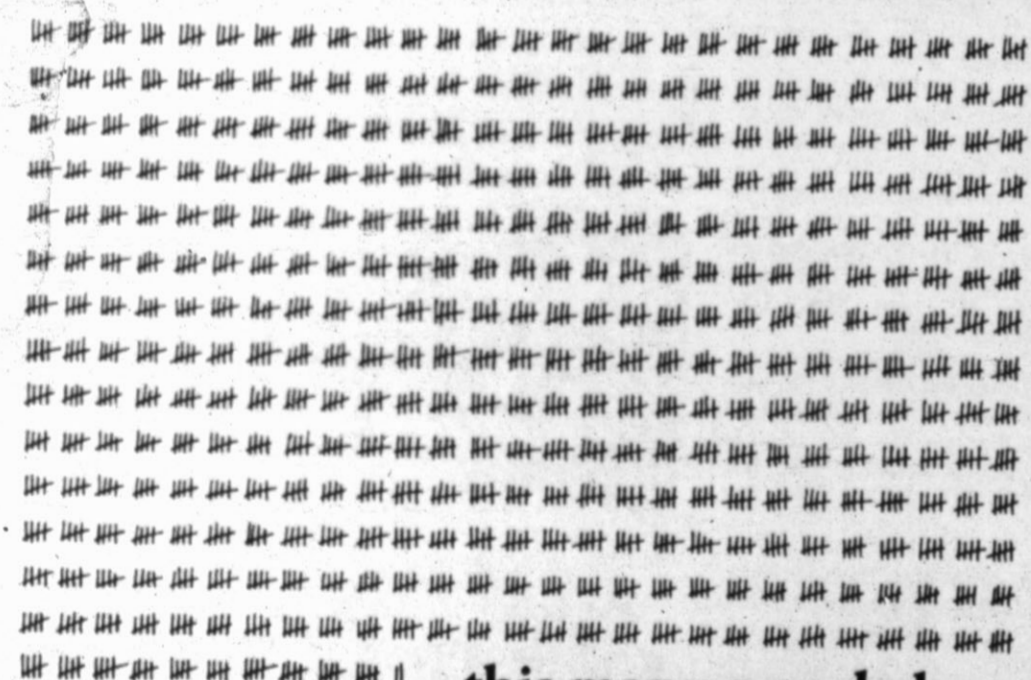

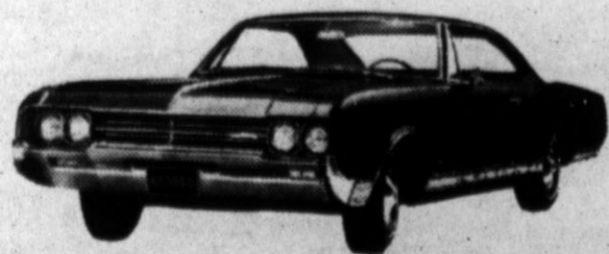
