# British Forces Attack Falklands

British forces attacked Argentine positions on the Falkland Islands from the land, sea and air today, and suffered their single biggest loss since the conflict broke out - 21 dead in a helicopter crash at sea, Britain said.

The Argentine Joint Chiefs of Staff said their troops were "repelling" British landing attempts on the Falklands. "It is still too early to say what has happened or what is happening," a spokesman in Buenos Aires added.

The Defense Ministry in London said ground forces attacked fuel and ammunition dumps and military depots, while warships bombarded

Stanley and other areas of East Falkland and Harrier jet-fighters attacked the main base on West Falkland.

It was Britain's single biggest loss since the conflict started April 2 with Argentine seizure of the South Atlantic islands.

British military sources have said there are between four and six Argentine battalions totalling around 4,500 men in and around Stanley, the Falklands capital-the biggest single concentration of the estimated 9,000 Argentine troops on the islands.

Between 1,000 and 1,500 Argentine troops are estimated to be at Fox Bay.

McDonald gave no estimate of the numbers of British troops landed.

## April Consumer Prices Increase

WASHINGTON (AP) -Consumer prices rose in April at a modest annual rate of 3.0 percent, rebounding from their sharpest drop in 29 years, the government said

Higher food and housing costs, which offset fresh record declines in gasoline prices, were largely responsi-

But even with the increase in the Labor Department's monthly Consumer Price Index inflation so far this year was still running at a low level of 1.5 percent, calculated annually.

The overall easing of the index, which averaged 8.9 percent last year and 12.4 percent in 1980, has been widely attributed to the stubborn recession and the lingering worldwide oil surplus.

Indeed, the plummeting

gasoline prices reflected the largest monthly drop in transportation costs overall since April 1954. And fuel oil prices, in another reflection of the worldwide petroleum surplus, also recorded their largest one-month drop on record.

April's figures bolstered many economists' predictions that, for all of 1982, inflation as measured by the CPI should be in the range of 5 percent to 6 percent.

In its new report, the Labor Department said the index rose a seasonally adjusted 0.2 percent in April, after falling 0.3 percent in March. It had advanced 0.2 percent in February and 0.3 percent in

## Texas Sheriffs Fear Increase in Crime Rate

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) - A judge labeled a meeting of state law enforcement officials an "ain't it awful" session as sheriffs voiced concerns that Texas' overcrowded prison system is backing up into packed county jails.

Harris County Sheriff Jack Heard told the Texas Commission on Jail Standards Thursday that paroling inmates early to ease overcrowding will result in more crime, and Tarrant County Judge Mike Moncrief was applauded when he recommended carrying out execu-

The Texas Department of Corrections closed prison doors to new inmates last week when the inmate population rose above a limit

set in a federal court order against overcrowding.

> Several officials called for putting prison construction on the agenda of the special session of the Legislature scheduled to begin Monday. But Gov. Bill Clements told a Capitol news conference Thursday he won't open up the session unless figures show added construction money will help the situation

and he's assured of its passage.

Clements said he would decide Monday whether to expand the session agenda now strictly limited to repeal of the state property tax.

TDC Director Jim Estelle said the prisons this week adopted a "limited reception" policy for admitting new inmates. The 16 counties responsible for 70

percent of the inmates sent to TDC will receive weekly "slots" based on the percentage of inmates they sent to.

prison last year, Estelle said. The other 238 counties can continue to send prisoners to TDC as usual, Estelle said.

Board of Pardons and Paroles Chairman Ruben Torres said his office has eased overcrowding by invoking a state law allowing paroles


# Dangling Keys Big Temptation

Since last October, juvenile officer Randy Williams said his office has been "run ragg-

ed" with stolen car cases, the latest being a spree of joyriding on Mother's Day weekend.

Of the 21 thefts handled in

the last seven months, all but one involved a vehicle with the keys left inside. That vehicle had faulty wiring and could be started without a

"The primary reason cars are being stolen by juveniles is that people are leaving the keys in the car," Williams said. "You take a kid that has been walking in the hot sun for a while or just wants to have some 'fun', its hard to pass up a car with the keys in it. It's not right, but it's still hard." "I don't know if kids are

more aware of cars, or poeple are less aware of thefts," Williams said of the recent surge of stealing.

Most of the joyriding is done by kids 12 to 15 years old, Williams said, who do not have the technical knowledge to hotwire.

He said a lot of people who report stolen cars have not removed their keys because they 'never dreamed someone would take our car.' Some believe if they will be out of the car "just a minute" that it won't matter.

Removing the keys is a prime deterrent to juvenile theft, Williams said, adding that some kids have told him they just walked down the street until they found an "available" vehicle - doors unlocks and keys in sight.

"All locking the doors and taking the keys out will do is do away with the amateurs," Williams said. "But the least secure you leave your car, the more chances you have of it being stolen."

He said in the summertime keeping cars locked up may be hot, but the few minutes of heat is better than having no car at all.

Stashing a key under the seat or in a magnetic box on the car isn't always best either, Williams explained. Kids know the likely places to look. He suggests that men keep a spare key in a wallet and women keep the spare in their purse - which should also never be left in the car.

"When you're in the 70s models, your talking about a \$3,000 to \$4,000 investment,"

## Officials, Passengers Subdue Hijacker

CEBU, Philippines (AP) -Officials and passengers "ganged up" today to overcome a grenade-wielding hijacker who said he commandeered a Philippine domestic airliner carrying 114 people because he was frustrated by the loss of his small sugar plantation and his World War II pension.

Nobody was hurt in subduing the hijacker eight hours after he took over the plane, a spokesman for the National Defense Department said.

"They just ganged up on him," said Romeo Farol, spokesman for Philippine Airlines. The man, who identified himself as Juan Cleano after

defense officials called him by a different name, said he did not want to hurt anyone. He had allowed women and children, including two stewardesses, to leave the plane before he was over-

"I had no intention of pull-

ing the pin out of the grenade or of blowing up the women and children," he said, adding that he wanted a chance to air a long list of demands including removal of export controls on sugar and pay hikes for schoolteachers.

Cleano, who said his wife is a teacher, also demanded the equivalent of \$7,150 — a sum he said was owed him as back payment on his World War II veterans' benefits.

Cleano said he had lost a small sugar plantation because of government export policies. One passenger described him as a

'frustrated farmer.' Officials said Cleano took over the twin-jet BAC-111 Thursday night during a 30-minute flight from Bacolod to Cebu, the Philippines' second largest city.

When the plane landed at Cebu, it was parked at the end of a runway and surrounded by specially trained soldiers.

BAIRD, Texas (AP) -Wayne Limbaugh had to look over his shoulder for police when he courted his bride of one week. Now he'll have to look at her through bars at the Texas Department of Corrections.

State District Judge Billy John Edwards postponed the honeymoon Thursday, sentencing Limbaugh to eight years in prison for his Aug. 15 escape from the Callahan County jail.

It was in that jail where Lambaugh and Martha Jane Grimes exchanged their wedding vows May 13.

Mrs. Limbaugh said Thursday from

her Malakoff home that the newlyweds met last October at rescue mission in Nashville and have spent the last six months drifting through the Sun Belt hiding from police.

Spending time with a convicted felon "didn't bother me," she said. "I'm used to that kind of thing because I'm an ex-police officer" from Tupelo, Miss.

Limbaugh said they planned to wed May 2 while they stayed with his mother in Malakoff. He said he planned to drive to an adjacent county, get married, take a one-day honeymoon and then surrender to police.

"But I didn't even get a chance to get out of bed that day, said Limbaugh, who awoke to find the house surrounded by police, Henderson County deputies and Texas Rangers.

Edwards said the eight-year sentence would run concurrently with Limbaugh's previous four-year sentence for car theft.

#### Jury Investigating Cauble Trial Perjury

TYLER, Texas (AP) TA federal grand jury is investigating whether perjury was committed during the drug-smuggling trial of Denton millionaire Rex Cauble, a newspaper reported today.

The grand jury has summoned state

and federal narcotics agents to testify next Wednesday, the Tyler Morning Telegraph reported in today's editions, quoting unidentified sources.

The newspaper said the agents were involved in the investigation leading to Cauble's Jan. 28 conviction on embezzlement, conspiracy and racketeering charges. Prosecutors said Cauble financed and profited from the "Cowboy Mafia," which smuggled 106 tons of marijuana from South America in 1977 and 1978.

Among those called to testify before the grand jury is Capt. Wesley Crites of the Texas Department of Public Safety, the newspaper quoted sources as saying. Crites, who did not testify at Cauble's trial; declined to comment on the investigation but said he would be in Tyler Wednesday "to conduct some business at the federal building."

### Oilman's Death Caused By Injection,

Nurse Resigns

SAN ANTONIO, Texas (AP) - A Fort Worth oilman was killed by an injection of air into his veins, not a heart attack as a hospital said, the Bexar County medical examiner has ruled.

Dr. Vincent DiMaio ruled Thursday that the death of Don Van Trease, 42, was accidental.

Hospital spokesman Jeff Duffield said Friday the hospital is investigating the death, and that a nurse resigned after the incident. She was not fired, he said.

Van Trease died Monday after he received a blood cleaning treatment on a kidney dialysis machine at Medical Center Hospital. DiMaio said Van Trease was admitted to the hospital May 1, after he suffered a heart attack while on a business trip here.

Van Trease had had a successful kidney transplant five years ago, but suffered acute kidney failure as a complication of the heart attack.

During the dialysis treatment, air was pumped into Van Trease's vein after a bottle of saline solution ran out and air was sucked in through the bottle's vent.

Although a hospital death certificate listed "cardiac pulmonary arrest" as the cause of Van Trease's death, DiMaio said his verdict is that Van Trease suffered kidney failure, with "death due to air embolus during tialysis by acccident."

### Minister Offers To Buy Indebted Dallas Baptist College

DALLAS (AP) - The pastor of the First Baptist Church here has offered to buy financially ailing Dallas Baptist College for \$6.5 million.

W.A. Criswell said he would like to convert the school to a nondenominational evangelical school and Bible study center.

The college trustees are to appear June 8 before the executive board of the Baptist General Convention to ask for a \$3 million loan. The school is \$6.5 million in debt. The appearance would be the third time the college has asked the board for help.

Criswell, who is chairman of the college's board of trustees, wrote last week to 70 Baptist leaders asking, "Would you let me have Dallas Baptist College if I assume its indebtedness?'

Criswell said he would like to make the school a "Wheaton College of the South."

Wheaton College, in Wheaton, Ill., is evangelist Billy Graham's alma mater and "one of the finest academic schools in the world," Criswell said.

He said his proposed school would be nondenominational so it would draw students and financial support from many conservative, evangelical

Criswell's First Baptist Church already operates an elementary school, high school and the Criswell Center for Biblical Studies.

Dallas Baptist has had money trouble since it came to its present site in 1965. The latest loan proposal would need approval from the convention's coordinating board, administrative committee and executive board.

## Methodists Deliberate Over Bishop Who Refuses to Condemn Gay Society

LOS ANGELES (AP) - A United Methodist investigating committee is debating whether a church trial is warranted for a Denver bishop who refuses to condemn homosexuality, terming it "a mysterious gift of God's grace."

Bishop Melvin Wheatley Jr., 67, defended himself Thursday before the seven ministers and lay people who will decide whether he undermined church doctrine.

Three churches in Georgia, one in Dallas and another in Boulder, Colo., charge that Wheatley disseminated doctrines contrary to the church and disobeyed the Order and Discipline of the church.

The Methodist Book of Discipline says, "We consider the practice of homosexuality is contrary to Christian teaching." Testimony concluded

Thursday night. The panel immediately began closed deliberations before recessing until this morning, said Martha Man, director of news services for the church.

Wheatley said he doesn't view homosexuality as an academic subject because three close friends and a family member are homosexuals.

He asked the committee to consider whether "God (supplies) sexuality of all kinds, and if not, from what source comes the other kind of sex-

uality?" Wheatley noted that United constitutes sin are constantly changing, referring to past prohibitions against ballroom dancing, sewing on Sunday

His grandparents would be shocked, he said, to learn that "abortion and divorce are no longer viewed as sins" by the United Methodist General Conference.

Wheatley also insisted he hadn't lost the right to express personal opinions when he was ordained bishop in 1972. One letter he wrote on the homosexual issue was to explain his actions to colleagues, he said.

The First United Methodist Church in Boulder brought charges against Wheatley for his appointment of Julian Rush, an admittted homosexual, as an associate pastor at St. Paul's United Methodist Church in Denver. Rush had been an associate

pastor at the Boulder church until he divulged his sexual

The Rev. David Hendrix of the 89-member Waverly Hall Methodist Church in Georgia charged that Wheatley's statements embarrassed the entire 10 million-member church. Hendrix gave the commmittee newspaper clippings and letters Wheatley had sent explaining his views.

Hendrix also spoke for churches in Ellerslie and Shiloh, Ga. The committee said it is considering identical objections from the Tyler Street United Methodist Church in Dallas.

"The general church's welfare is dependent on the support of the local church," said Hendrix, 29. "In order for our connection to be continued, the kind of statements and action Bishop Wheatley has made need to be called into accountability."

He insisted Scripture is clear in condemning homosexuality as a sin, citing the Genesis account of the ciof Sodom, prohibitions in Mosaic law and New Testament references. He disagreed with Wheatley's contention that homosexuality is an "orientation" a person can't change.

Big jumps were recorded in prices for beef and pork while poultry prices rose moderately. For the second straight month, egg prices were off sharply. Fresh fruit and vegetagle costs also declined.

Restaurant and alcoholic beverage prices were up, however.

—Housing costs jumped 0.8 percent, boosted by a 1.2 percent gain in home prices themselves and a 0.6 percent gain in mortgage interest rates. Rents rose a slight 0.2 percent, the smallest gain in two years.

-Gasoline prices plumneted 6.7 percent, the largest irop since these costs were first recorded monthly in 1967. Over the last 12 months, gasoline prices have plunged 12.5 percent.

Prices for both fuel oil and gasoline had set records in March.

Overall transportation costs, which include gasoline prices, fell 1.6 percent. Partially offsetting the drop in gasoline prices were higher costs for both new and used cars.

In other areas, the new report said:

-Medical care costs, up more than any other segment of the CPI, rose 1 percent, matching the March rise. Prices for hospital rooms jumped 1.2 percent and doctors' fees were up 0.6 percent.

-Apparel costs edged up 0.1 percent, less than the 0.4 percent gain posted in each of the two previous months.

-Entertainment prices were up 0.3 percent, less than the 0.5 percent of March and the 0.7 of February.

In all, the unadjusted Consumer Price Index stood at 284.3 in April, meaning that a hypothetical list of goods and services costing \$10 in 1967 would have cost \$28.43 last

In advance of today's report, Edward Yardeni, chief economist for the brokerage firm of E.F. Hutton & Co. in New York, said he suspects "the best of the inflation numbers are behind us for the year. ...

"There was a whiff of deflation for a little while but it's not going to persist for the next couple of months," he said.

Lacy Hunt, chief economist for Fidelity Bank of Philadelphia, predicted inflation would remain moderate.

"It's not going to return to double-digits, or even close to it," he said.

Wholesale prices, as measured by the Labor Department's Producer Price Index for finished goods, rose at an annual rate of 0.9 percent in April, after falling for two months running. Those prices often point to what will happen to retail price changes as measured by the Consumer Price Index. The CPI, though, checks for a broader range of consumer







GUILT In her Encyclopedia from A to Z, Ann Landers writes about two kinds of guiltearned and unearned. "Earned guilt," she says, "comes when you do something dishonest, hurtful, tacky, selfish or rotten. Spend two hours agonizing over it, then tell yourself, 'Enough of this hair-shirt'...and don't think about it ever again.

"There's another kind of guilt-the kind we lay on ourselves. Parents are especially susceptible to this variety. Judith Viorst gives a fine example: 'It's all right to leave your sick child with a sitter to go to a PTA meeting or to a Save-the-Whales meeting, or to a drugstore to buy a heating pad. 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



# Lakers Win NBA Draft Toss

NEW YORK (AP) - It's been a dream year for the Los Angeles Lakers - almost.

With the Western Conference championship and the first pick in the National Basketball Association college draft wrapped up, only one hurdle remains: the NBA championship finals, where the Lakers will meet either the Boston Celtics or the Philadelphia 76ers.

"It's been Laker year so far," club executive Jerry West said Thursday after Los Angeles won the coin toss from the San Diego Clippers for the first selection in the June 29 draft.

"I told (Coach) Pat Riley if we could win four more games, it would be perfect." West said, referring to the upcoming best-of-seven series.

West said the Lakers will choose either James Worthy of North Carolina, Dominique Wilkins of Georgia or Terry Cummings of DePaul. All three forwards left college before their senior years to turn pro.

"We won't trade our pick," West said. "All three are outstanding kids. We have pretty much determined who we'll take. We have them ranked, but we have to visit the coaches and really zero in

Clippers rejected the offer.

The coin toss is designed to benefit the teams with the poorest records in the Eastern and Western divisions. The Lakers landed the Eastern Conference's No. 1 pick from the Cleveland Cavaliers, the team with the worst record in the East, in a 1980 trade that sent Don Ford and the Lakers' 1980 No. 1 pick to Cleveland for Butch Lee and the Cavs' top selection in 1982.

Clippers' General Manager Ted Podleski said San Diego also is ready to select Cummings, Worthy and Wilkins, even though the team badly

"There was no way we could lose," Podleski said. "As far as I'm concerned, any of the three players are. satisfactory...Our greatest need is in the backcourt, but

The player most coveted by draft to fill the need. We are thankful and feel blessed we can get any of those (forwards).".

Worthy, a 6-foot-9 second team All-American, scored a career-high 28 points when North Carolina beat Georgetown for the NCAA title. Worthy, likely to be the Lakers' choice, waited until tentions before deciding to turn pro.

Cummings, 6-foot-10, averaged 12 rebounds and more than 20 points per game for DePaul. Wilkins, 6-foot-7, led the Bulldogs to a 19-12 record and their second straight appearance in the National Invitational Tourna-

## SPORTS TALK: **Rick Mears**

Rick Mears, 30, driver of the Gould Charge/Penske-Cosworth PC-10, was the 1981 PPG Indy Car World Series Champion despite burns suffered last year in a pit fire at the Indianapolis 500. He won the 1979 Indy 500.

Do you think sports fans really understand auto racing?

It depends on the person. Some people are very close to it and know all the details of what's going on. Others just show up for the race. They don't have the slightest clue of what's going on. But they enjoy a good show watching the faces and the drivers competing for position. They're out there mainly to root for their favorites.

Is the Indianapolis 500 the most exciting race you drive in? It's still the biggest one of the year, and the one we all are always shooting for. It's more or less a tradition.

At the Indy 500, what's the most important factor to you in driving to win?

Mainly, running smoothly and consistently. If you run smooth, you can run fast without getting into trouble. If you stay running consistently fast, then you're usually up front. Five hundred miles is a long race. You have to learn to pace both the equipment and yourself for the distance

Is it true that in the past Indy cars were faster?

The cars were faster, but only in terms of engine power. They ran a lot more horsepower, and they ran a lot faster down the straightaways than we do now. But they never went through the corners as fast as we can now.

The cars today are designed for ground-effects, and we have gained so much in technology, car geometrics and aero-dynamics that we're getting through the corners faster to make up for the time we've lost on the straightaway. So the cars are actually now faster overall than any cars ever have

What advice would you give to young auto racers?

I feel it's a matter of luck, being in the right place at the right time. Keep plugging away, be consistent and most importantly, stay out of trouble. If you stay out of trouble, you will get to the end of the race.

By doing that, you get more experience because you get Finish all the races you can, and run in as many different areas and types of cars as you can. That all gives you more

How did you happen to join Roger Penske on his racing

As I said, sometimes it's a matter of luck. I met Roger when we were both riding motorbikes in Wally Dallenbach's do 500. That led to our association in racing and ultimately to my additional responsibilities as director of development for Penske.

Does being director of development for Penske gives you more opportunities to improve:

Yes. It gets me more miles in the car, more development time. I get to learn more with new areas, trying things on the cars and just getting more experience on tracks and more track time. It will help my learning curve by quite a bit.

What changes do you see coming in auto racing? I think we are going to see more "street races" such as those at Long Beach and Detroit. The Ontario, Calif., Motor Speedway - where we did a lot of our training as well as racing - has been closed down because the owners found a more profitable use for the property. But with "street races" the track is already in place.

Can you describe the "feel" of driving a race car at high

It's all relative. Before you can go that fast, the car must feel right to you. When it does feel right, you push the car a bit faster. But if it doesn't feel right, you take it easy.

How do you like driving in normal traffic? What do you think of the drivers you encounter on the street?

I get upset. I hate traffic. The main reason is that people do not drive defensively. As far as they're concerned, they are the only ones on the road. That's the worst think you can

You've got to drive defensively and be aware of what's going on around you with others on the road. Failure to think this way is the biggest cause of accidents.

The June 11 championship battle in Las Vegas, Nev., between WBC titleholder Larry Holmes and Gerry Cooney does the trick.

"It's the 'Magic Fight," says the former New York newsman who touched shoulders with the Runyans and Winchells, gangsters and Broadway dolls in the mad period that stemmed from prohibition. "For every heavywight champion, there has been one magic moment that overshadowed all the others.

"In the 1920s, it was Dempsey-Tunney. Then came Joe Louis and his highly charged battles with Germany's Max Schmeling. With Muhammad Ali, it was the great series with Joe Frazier.

"This one may generate more world emotion and tension than any of these - the unbeaten champion, always overshadowed by Ali, and the big, pleasant fighter of Irish descent from Long Island with fists of iron.

"It will be a \$50 million fight. You can bet the whole world will be watching. You won't need any hype for this one. It sells itself."

That hasn't always been the case, says Conrad, a consultant to the promoters who is out with a new book, "Dear Muffo," detailing his associations with the bizarre fight mob, journalistic legends, movie stars and, quite innocently, the underworld.

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## **Monday Dodges Time**

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LOS ANGELES (NEA) -It was Game Five of the championship series for the National League title, the pathway to the World Series, and the Los Angeles Dodgers were locked with the Montreal Expos in a 1-1 duel as the teams, playing in the Canadian city, went into

the ninth inning. Fernando Valenzuela, the rookie sensation of the Dodgers, and Ray Burris of the Expos were pitching magnificently. But in the top of the ninth inning, in one of those managerial moves that are open to argument, skipper Jim Fanning of Montreal replaced Burris with Steve Rogers, the staff ace and a victor over Los Angeles in the third game of the league title series

With one swipe of the bat, Rick Monday negated the strategy and undoubtedly prolonged a career that was the yerge of extinction. The veteran Los Angeles outfielder, completing his 15th year in the major leagues, pounded a 3-and-1 fastball over the right-center field wall to win the pennant for the Dodgers and send them on to even higher achievement against the Yankees in the World Series.

Until that hit, Monday had pretty well decided that all the travel and travail of being a major leaguer were ended, that he would spend the summers getting better acquainted with his children and that he would concentrate on a new career as a sports broadcaster.

The 1982 season finds Monday still in the royal blue of the Dodgers and still providing pinch hits and an occasional sparkling full game in the outfield, appearances that have to be measured carefully because at 36 years of age he is no longer a full-time player.

That home run was the cause for continuation because it took him from a salary of \$175,000 annually to one in the \$250,000 range, which is ample reason to play another year. It firmed up his reputation as a clutch

player.
"He's a tremendous guy on the ball club," says Tommy Lasorda, the effusive manager of the Dodgers. "He's a real pro, a manager's delight. We've pinch hitter and a fill-in outfielder since age prevents him from playing every day. But in the six years I've managed him, I've never

seen the guy fail to hustle."

Lasorda first became aware of Monday's hustle

one night in Dodger Stadium in 1976. At the time — the exact date was April 25 -Rick was in the livery of the Chicago Cubs, playing the outfield, and Lasorda was coaching in the third-base box since Walter Alston was

still managing the Dodgers.

A couple of guys clambered out of the stands and raced into the left field area with an American flag. They were about to set fire to the flag, as a gesture of protest, when Monday ran over, prevented the blaze and retrieved the banner. The incident gained national acclaim for the left fielder, and a temporary title of "Mr. Red, White and Blue."

"If I'd have been faster," recalls Lasorda, "I'd have gotten there myself."

The next year, Lasorda was elevated to manager and Monday was traded to the Dodgers. They've been together through three pennant-winning seasons and three World Series, though Rick's career almost ended abruptly early in

Playing against Houston in mid-April, Monday hus-tled into foul territory to catch a fly ball, pulled up short to avoid crashing into the fence and tore his left Achilles' tendon. Surgery put him out for the year after 12 games.

When I first came up 16 years ago," he muses, "if you had Achilles' surgery, it was the end of your career. But the doctors today are doing a lot of things for players. Pitchers get their whole arms re-done.

It was the end of Monday as an every-day performer, but he slid gracefully into a part-time role. Last season. for instance, he hit .315 while appearing in 66 games during the strike-shortened campaign, and 11 of his 41 hits were homers, indicating there was still plenty of muscle in the old bones.

A schoolmate of Reggie Jackson at Arizona State, rangy at 6-foot-3 and swift and able to hit with power,

Monday was the first player selected by the Kansas City Athletics in baseball's first free-agent draft in 1965. He arrived in the big leagues the next year and moved with the A's to Oakland in

He spent six productive years with the A's but was Charlie Finley after a disagreement over deferred bonus money. It was just before Oakland burst into dominance of baseball with three straight world championships. That left some bitterness in Monday.



She tees off today in the \$125,000 Chrysler-Plymouth Classic at the Wykagyo Country Club.

Looking trimmer than ever since turning pro in August, 1977, the 25-year-old Lopez joined a field of 82 for the 54-hole event on the par-72, 6,084-yard course.

Hall of Famer Kathy Whitworth, who established an LPGA record with her 83rd career victory last Sunday in Atlanta, is the defending champion. She is second in money winnings this year, with \$95,872.

Sally Little, the leader with \$125,084, Amy Alcott, JoAnne Carner, Hollis Stacy, Pat Bradley and Donna Caponi, all in the top 15, also are entered.

Lopez, who turned pro at 20 after finishing second in the U.S. Open as an amateur, married Melton, a sportscaster, on her 22nd birthday

"I just wasn't ready," she explained Thursday after a practice round. "I wanted it to work so much that I stopped being Nancy Lopez. I struggled a great deal trying to find out just what I wanted to be, who I wanted to be and what I wanted to do.

"There were times when I was home that I wanted to be on a golf course. There were many occasions when I became quite nervous. There was a limit on my golf and I didn't enjoy that. Out here is where I feel I need to be."

Lopez, who started playing at the age of eight under the tutelage of her father, Domingo, has lost none of her characterstic long-distance hitting as a result of the drop in weight.



### **POLLY'S POINTERS Polly Fisher**

Table finish marred

By Polly Fisher

DEAR POLLY - I have a dining room table on which I have kept a flannel-lined tablecloth for some time. When I recently removed the cloth, I found that the fibers from the flannel had stuck onto the wood finish and marred the table top. What can I do to remove this? - ROSE

DEAR ROSE - To remove the fibers with the least amount of damage to the wood's finish, soak all the affected spots with vegetable oil. This may take some time, but it is frequently very effective if you have the patience. You can do this by just pouring on a coating of oil (probably the fastest way) or covering the spots with thoroughly oil-soaked rags. Check periodically to see if the fibers have loosened. If you don't mind refinishing the table top, gentle, even sanding will remove the fibers. Or you could use a solvent-type stripper to simultaneously remove both the shellag or

type stripper to simultaneously remove both the shellac or varnish and the flannel fibers. Your local hardware store should be able to recommend a suitable product. Then refinish as desired. — POLLY DEAR POLLY - I borrowed a velvet dress from a friend and was dismayed to find it collected lint when I wore it. When I hung it outside to brush it, I forgot about the dress

and left it out all night. The next morning, all the lint was gone; it looked like a new dress! The morning dew had refreshed it. I've found you can do the same thing by hanging the garment in a shower stall. Turn on the hot water and fill the booth with steam. Hang the dress in the stall. Turn the water off close the shower surtainers does and let the article. water off, close the shower curtain or door and let the article hang for several hours. It will look like new. — MRS. H.A.S. DEAR POLLY — I've found the perfect way to remove lint from velvet or velour. Put the garment into the dryer on low all by itself. When it comes out, the lint will be in the

dryer's lint filter. — CARRIE
DEAR POLLY — I've found that duct tape (used to wrap around pipes) is the best tape for removing lint. It's sufficiently sticky and wide enough to cover a large area at one time. — MRS. M.P.

DEAR POLLY — To remove lint, one might try rubbing the fabric with a piece of fine sandpaper. This has worked

for me in removing fuzz balls from knit garments. — PAT
