WOOD CHOPPERS CLEAR NEW GROUND

Local Camp With Many Visitors Put on Entertainment and Enjoy Feast of Fun and Feed.

Last Saturday night, the Wood Choppers, one hundred and fifty strong, from Amarillo, Canyon, Dimmitt Farwell, armed with their axes, invaded the Hereford Camp and before the night was half gone had cut down nearly all of the saplings and had switched some thirty two candidates with an unmerciful ordeal while they attempted to "run the gauntlet" and thus become full-fledged members of Woodcraft.

The Alamosa Camp of Amarillo was headed by District Manager T. W. Barnes and a big, live billy goat, wearing a Woodman button in violation of the Texas law. As lieutenants in the Amarillo Camp there were T. W. McBride, C. C., and his assistants, and Editor Greer of the Daily News and a bunch of other five wires, including an uniformed team of some thirty well trained axmen. The special Santa Fe that brought the biggest end of the crowd into Hereford made the run from Amarillo in fast time, coming from Canyon, a distance of 31 miles, in 29 minutes. Upon their arrival, the visitors were met at the train by the entire Hereford Camp and the other visitors. Forming a line, lead by the uniformed degree team, the delegations marched up Main street, following the bleat and smell of the billy goat, which was in charge of Troy Womble and Mark Agee of Amarillo.

The local hall being too small, the celebration was held in the old opera house. Some 450 Woodmen were present. Council Commander C. L. Sullivan rapped for order and introduced the Hon. Bill Ray, who delivered the welcome address. This was responded to by Hons. A. F. Works and Walker Hall, both of Amarillo. After the usual opening preliminaries, the candidates were excused and the lodge went into session, the local lodge resigning their posts in honor of the Amarillo officers.

In a short time the fun began. With a real, live, butting billy and a hobby donkey with floppy ears and an uncertain wink in his left eye, and a dozen sentinels on guard, the candidates were made to chop their way thru the thicket into the Camp. "Riding the goat" made a lot of fun for the boys and many surprises were in store for the uninitiated. After these overtures were completed and all of the new candidates properly introduced, the regular work was taken up. Under the direction of most competent officers with the assistance of the degree team of young men in uniform, the lesson of Woodcraft was deeply impressed upon the old as well as the new members. The Amarillo Woodmen won the praise of every other visitor in the lodge room.

At the close of the work and during the necessary interim, while the local committees were opening the "barrel," a number of short speeches were made. Among the number to respond to impromptu calls were City Atty. Miller of Amarillo, Jack Walker of Hereford. When the re-

past was ready, the choppers waited for only one invitation to "fall to." The long line of cakes, the plates of sandwiches, the steaming black coffee, hot from the camp fires, made a more urgent invitation than speeches of solicitation. The midnight hour was nearing and the bountiful spread furnished by the Hereford Camp was a fitting close to the night's work of making a new "clearing" for the additional members.

The affair was a success in every detail and the success of the event will always be remembered by every one present.

Will Have Double Primary.

At a meeting of the Deaf Smith County Democratic Executive Committee and the local candidates, Tuesday afternoon at the court house, it was decided by unanimous vote that a double or second primary be held in this county. This means that the two candidates receiving the highest number of votes in the first primary will "run" again in the second primary and the one then receiving the largest number of votes will be declared the nominee. The members of the committee present were: J. M. Boone, chairman, E. B. Black, W. B. Phillips, J. K. Gray, J. A. McIntosh and A. C. Elliott. Most of the candidates were present and participated in the business. There was but little discussion as to the merits of the "majority" primary. As provided by law, each candidate will be expected to bear his proportionate part of holding the elections and as soon as the total expense can be determined he will make the assessment.

News In General.

The bill for the repeal of the Canal Tolls was passed by the National House of Representatives by 247 to 162 votes, many Republicans voting with the Democrats. Champ Clark, who made an impassioned speech against the bill and which is said to have been the effort of his life, felt the hand of the school teacher from New Jersey in a way that boys sometimes gets it at school.

The Canal Bill is in the Senate and is likely to be passed with little opposition.

The Isthmian Canal Commission has been dissolved and a semi-military and civil administration inaugurated with Col. Goethals as the first governor.

Lieut. Gov. Mayes has resigned his position to accept the deanship of the department of journalism in the Texas State University. Thus his ambition to be governor has been sidestepped for a more lucrative and influential position.

Spring has come. Texas onions are being shipped to the eastern markets by the train loads, presumably to assist the lacrimal machinery of the East.

Terreen has "fallen" several times during the week, but it is still holding out against Gen. Villa and his men.

Small Amount of Rain Comes.

Beginning with threatening clouds Wednesday and Thursday, a small shower or sprinkle fell Thursday afternoon which was followed by intermittent showers during the night amounting to about one half inch precipitation. This rain is in exact accord with local prophets for yesterday morning, even while the sky was almost clear. Backup Waddle Miller set down a prophecy that it would rain before night. His reputation came near of being ruined for the sprinkle scarcely settled the dust; but it was saved and he is no new-comer either.

Mrs. Laughery of Canyon was a pleasant visitor in the home of Mrs. W. B. Robinson Friday and Saturday of last week.

E. T. Barnett of Illinois, brother of our fellow townsman, J. W. Barnett, was here last week looking over the country and he may become a permanent citizen of the county.

Help Wanted at the Brand Office.

This office is in need of competent assistance in the editorial and reportorial department and a liberal salary will be paid for the man or woman who can fill the place acceptably. The job will pay something like 30 cents a week, the pay check being an order on some grocery store. The specifications for the job will not be difficult to follow.

The editorial worker for the Brand will be barred from writing on the prohibition questions, for the regular editor has been told not to discuss that question; he will not have to "jump" on the anti's in their position as this would make them mad and the Brand would likely lose a subscriber; he must not under any circumstances write anything about church policies or economics, especially about the co-operation of the different denominations, as this will not meet with the approval of some of the best customers of the paper, and it stirs up denominational prejudice to "beat the tan bark;" he must not in any way criticize the county or city officials as they, like the king, "can do no wrong" and if they did it is nobody's business—they are running the affairs and the people might get a bad opinion of some of their official acts; he must not discuss the latest styles in slit skirts and tangloons or betray his ignorance about millinery; he must not tell what the school patrons are saying about the school board or the methods of discipline; he must not report that little private dance or card party because the preachers will "lambast" the members from the pulpit and thus put them "in bad" with the Sunday school; he must not criticize the telephone company, even if it takes 45 seconds to get a call answered or whether you can ever get disconnected or not; he must go slow on the mail order question as most of his subscribers patronize the mail order houses and even some of his merchant advertisers send off to mail order houses for their counter tickets and stationery. These are some of the things the Brand's assistant editor must NOT do. Of course, there is little left of the job, but here is the list of things he must exercise the latest gymnastic stunts. In reporting a wedding, the bride must always be beautiful and the most accomplished girl in the county; she must be dressed on some sort of "machine made cloth," and the bridegroom must always have on a suit of conventional black, even if it is not paid for. Notice of Release From Quarantine of Counties in the Scab Quarantined Area.

The fact has been determined by the Live Stock Sanitary Commission of Texas, and notice is hereby given that the contagious disease known as scabies is not now known to exist, or exists to a slight extent only, among cattle in the counties of Hereford, Lipscomb, Hutchinson, Hemphill, Carson, Gray, Armstrong, Donley, Briscoe, Hall, Hale, Floyd, Lubbock, Lynn, Garza, Andrews, Nueces and Cameron, and all of Roberts county south of the Canadian River, quarantined by Rule 19 of the annual regulations proclaimed by the Governor, effective July 1, 1913.

The effect of this amendment releases from local quarantine the above named counties, except such premises that are now under special quarantine, or may hereafter be placed under quarantine; and during the continuance of this quarantine notice, cattle from such special quarantined premises shall be moved only in accordance with the rules and regulations of this Commission.

This amendment shall become and be effective on and after the 15th day of March, 1914.

Beautify the School Grounds.

As a contributor to the school fund I feel privileged in calling attention to the delapidated condition of the grounds surrounding our beautiful high school building. At least two big wagon loads of broken brick, rocks, cans, sticks, discarded iron seat racks, etc., could be gathered from this block of ground. I suggest that the 114 trees should be trimmed and watered and the whole south half of the block filled in with soil and planted to grass as was done with the court house grounds. This would leave the north half, which, with the street lying between the school block and annex, would give sufficient play grounds. This street is little used and should be vacated for play grounds. I trust the citizens will pay an early visit to the school grounds and see with their own eyes the miserable condition they are in and then let us all bring pressure to bear on the board and see if this can't be changed at once.

Letter From Missouri
Nevada, Mo., Mar. 15, 1914.
Gentlemen of the Hereford Brand:

Dear Sirs:

I feel like writing you a small letter for the next week's Brand if you think it worth publishing. I wish to say on the start that I think there is a great future for the Panhandle. Talk about drought county; there are quite a number of them almost as bad as the Panhandle. I have seen some of the last year drought at one time the country would all burnt over from the Panhandle to the Potomac River if some one had dropped a match. I wish to say right here that I believe with the same energy and right kind of farming in the Panhandle there can be as much raised as most any other state without irrigation. And why don't you say so. Everybody 4 or 5 years ago talked that way, but since you have found out that you have water to irrigate with, irrigation is all we hear. I will admit that plenty of water is a grand thing. We have needed it in several different states for 3 years, but didn't have the water to turn on. Irrigation is a grand thing in time of drought to those that like it, but I find there are men that have a perfect horror to think of having to irrigate to raise anything. I tell those fellows they can raise stock and plenty of feed without irrigation, but if they want to raise a bumper crop, if they are prepared to turn on the water in time of need they can raise a bumper. We have needed it in grand old Missouri and several other states for about 3 years, but we haven't got the water. I wish you all best of luck with your oceans of water, but don't fail to tell us how those stock fellows are getting along with the water that falls from above. Please correct all mistakes. 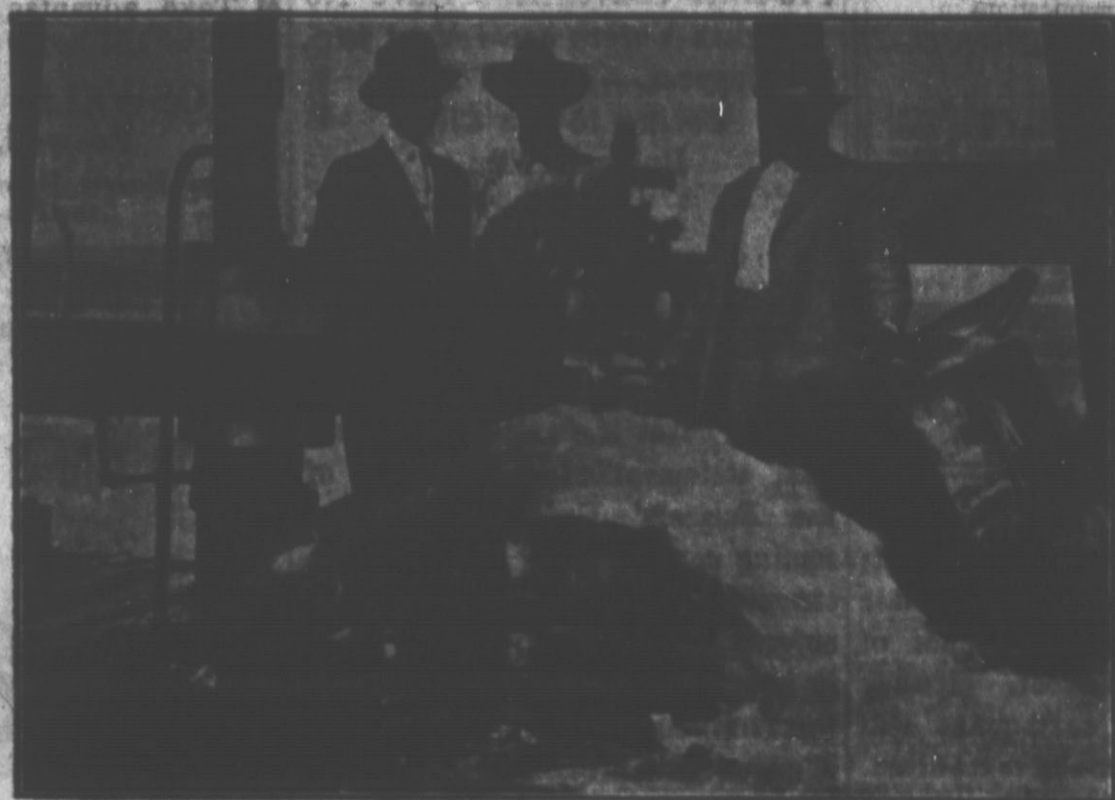
Daughters Meet.

**PEACE, THE PLOW
MAN'S HOPE**

Pre-Anti Conventions Have No Rights Voters are Bound to Respect.—Dove of Peace Cooling to the City Business Man.

Fort Worth, Texas.—We would not feel that we had fully performed our duty to the citizenship of Texas if we did not make a final statement of the attitude of the Farmers' Union toward the coming convention of so-called constructionists. We have two serious objections to that convention. First, it is undemocratic; second, it is a factional convention. The Terrell Election Law prescribes the manner in which nominees for the Democratic party, as well as all other parties, shall be chosen and the methods pursued by the prohibitionists and that adopted by the opposition is outlawry and a crime against good government.

We do not see how a convention called for the purpose of defeating prohibition can be anything but an anti-prohibition movement, for an anti convention by any other name is an anti just the same. Factional issues madden men and those who contribute toward making factional strife paramount in this campaign deserve to be crushed at the polls. We believe it would be as impossible to keep liquor representatives out of that convention as it would be to keep a duck out of water, and the farmers will have nothing to do with any convention whose leaders represent or have represented special interests, liquor or otherwise.

Like the prohibition convention, it has no rights that voters are bound to respect. We are as much opposed to an anti-prohibition faction in this campaign as we are to a prohibition faction. In our opinion no man, as a candidate of any faction, can be elected Governor of Texas, and none should be. The people of Texas are tired of factional strife and peace is the plowman's hope.

Discretion the Better Part of Valor.

We realize how trying it must be upon anti leaders to engage in peaceful pursuits while the air is thrilled with the bay of the greyhounds of prohibition as they strike the trail and set politics to the music of the chase and we know full well the power of the bugle call of mighty hunters as they make the welkins ring, marshalling their forces for the contest and challenging the brava to the battle; but discretion is the better part of valor and there are things far more important in our public affairs today than scrambling over a bottle of booze.

Be Not Deceived.

Let the farmers of Texas be not deceived by promises of either pro or anti for agricultural legislation "after the scrap is over." No party organized for the chase ever did anything more than pursue the object of their wrath or pleasure, and then divide the spoils and none ever will. No party or faction thereof organized to fight for or against prohibition ever plowed the fields, built factories or opened mines and none ever will. The prohibition question was here before we came and it will
