The fact has been determined by of Texas, and notice is hereby given beautiful high school building. scabies is not now known to exist, or cattle in the counties of Hanaford, Lipscomb, Hutchinson, Hemphill, Carson, Gray, Armstrong, Donley, Briscoe, Hall, Hale, Floyd, Lubbock, Lynn, Garza, Andrews, Nueces and Cameron, and all of Roberts county south of the Canadian River, quarantined by Rule 19 of the annual regulations proclaimed by the Governor, effective July 1, 1913.

The effect of this amendment releases from local quarantine the above named counties, except such premises that are now under special notice, cattle from such special quarantined premises shall be moved only in accordance with the rules and regulations of this Commission.

This amendment shall become and be effective on and after the 15th day of March, 1914.


