Credits McDonald With De-Wilkinson Tells of Success With Wells

William Dee Little, field representalive of Farm & Ranch, spent several days in this community a few weeks ago. One result of his trip was an illustrated writeup of the irrigation de-velopment in this section, published in Farm & Ranch October 30, as follows:

Irrigation in Deaf Smith county, Texas, is receiving more and more attention, more particularly around the town of Hereford The water is obtained from wells around 120 feet deep. Water is found, however, at an average depth of fifty-five feet, and the pumps are set at ninety feet, with the suction pipe twenty feet below that. It is never necessary to prime a

Irrigation was started just ten years ago. D. L. McDonald started the movement, and his first plans have been followed by the others. With only one exception, so far as the and machinery were all alike.

Standard pumps are driven by oil power. A house encloses all the machinery, and the engines cannot be used for any other purpose than pumpused successfully for any other purpose. One man operates the engine and distributes the water. No enthe Hereford district, as each farmer operates his own plant.

Has Irrigated Many Years Mr. McDonald has a half section under irrigation from two wells. One of the plants has been running nine. years, and he says the upkeep has not been more than \$400. It is still running seemingly as well as it did at

It costs from \$850 to \$1200 to install a system, including the well, and the life ought to be not less than twenty years. The flow of water has never shown any weakness, according to the Hereford people, and it is thought there is sufficient supply for irrigating the entire country. The capacity of the wells is from 1000 to 1500 gallons a minute. It is claimed that an trrigation can be applied for \$1.50 an (Continued on Page 9.)

acre, including fuel, labor, wear and tear on the machinery and everything involved. About four inches of water is used for one irrigation. Much Kafir Grown

On the McDonald farm 165 acres were in Kafir this season, ninety acres of which had been planted with handselected seed. In the entire ninety acres there were only about a dozen heads of mixed grain. The rest was pure Kafir, and the heads were as even and uniform as a field of wheat. This field averaged eighty bushels to the acre last year and is said to be better this season.

This crop followed alfalfa in 1919, the sod being broken six inches deep early in the season. This year it was listed and planted thick. One irrigation was given the middle of June and another the middle of July. A rain in August made another unnecessary. In a dry year the crop



would have needed a third application



WORK STARTED ON HIGHWAY PROJECT

N. W. McCluskey, state supervisor of federal aid projects, with headquarters in Santa Fe, was in Clovis Monday to start surveying on federal aid projects Nos. 24 and 25. These projects include work on the highways between Clovis and Texico and Clovis and Portales which will amount to nearly \$200,000.

The contract for work on these projects was let some time ago to the Atlas Construction Co. of La Veta, Colo., and the improvements are to be completed by June 1, 1921.

The work in Curry County includes 81,342 yards of earth work, 350 yds. of concrete construction, 100 lineal feet of corrugated iron culverts and 20,323 square yards of calechie surfacing. The work in Roosevelt County will include 36,825 yards of earth work and 40,004 square yards of calechie surfacing.

These improvements will be a great asset to the Ozark Trails, Bankhead National Highway, Abo Pass Route, and the Great North and South Cross-Connecting Highway, all of which pass through Clovis.-Clovis News.
