

EXPRESS RATES

To enable it to continue in busine at a time of unusual trasportation difficulties, the American Railway Express Company recently filed a petition PANHANDLE STORE with the Interstate Commerce Commis sion, asking permission to put into effect a new and higher scale of express rates. The proposal is now being considered and studied by the Commission

Under the Transportation Act, the Government guarantees the express carrier against an operating deficit nutil August 37, of this year, and after that date this company must trust to its own recurees to finance its opera-

It will be recalled that in the Calengent for the Director of Railronos, 105,945.68, whch was met by the Government, under the original contract between the express carrier and the Administration. The operating deficit for the remander of the period of guaranty will, according to present indications, exceed \$18,000,000.

MONEY RATES

The rate on prime commercial paper is always issued by firms of the very highest credit-standing the interest rate which they are compelled to pay can be taken as a measure of the scarcity of business capital and bank credit.

The market rate for prime names has risen until during the month of July it has stood almost uniformly at 8 per cent Occasional flurries of the money market have brought it even higher than that for a few days but it has settled back at this prevailing rate. This is coincident with the action of the New York branch of the Federal Reserve Bank in marketing its rediscount rate up to 7 per cent, and this rate is now maintained in four of the eastern districts. This state of the money market and the fact that one year Treasury Cerificates of Indebtedness have been issued at 6 per cent, the highest rate ever paid by the government for money, are taken to indicate that the probability of in the near future is slight.—Seattle Current Commerce.
