

# **City Fathers** Ask \$50,000 **Bond Issue**

A special city election to vote on the issuance of \$50,000 in bonds for construction of proposed improvements to the city parks in Hereford has been ordered by Mayor E. S. Ireland for Tuesday, April 30.

The specific purpose for which the bonds would be issued is the construction of a municipal swimming pool and bath houses at Lake Park.

A petition signed by more than 150 citizens asking that the election be called was presented to the City Commission on March 4.

Action on the petition has been delayed while the commission secured a ruling from the Attorney General of Texas regarding the legality of issuing bonds for the purpose of con-structing a swimming pool.

The Attorney General's Office has advised City Attorney James W. Witherspoon that: "We know of no statute authorizing the issuance of tax bonds by a city for the purpose of con-structing or building a swimming pool. However, we call to your attention the fact that a city may issue bonds for the purpose of erecting and constructing improvements to the parks of said city, and use the proceeds of said bonds for the

local police department.


Street lights are being broken at a great rate, according to City Officer Bruce Wooddell, despite the fact that several boys have been brought before Juve-nile court for that offense re-

Any citizens observing such acts are requested to identify the persons responsible, or to get a description of the car and, if possible, the license number, and report at once to the City




