U. S. Rep. George Bush, U. S. Rep. Bob Price and governor candidate Paul Eggers carried the Republican banner into Hereford Friday and told about 70 persons at a noon luncheon the best way they can reverse trends toward inflation and rising crime is to change leader-

They said the Democrats have controlled the Texas Legislature and Congress for too long

already. Price is hosting Bush on a tour throughout the Panhandle in behalf of the Houston Congressman's bid for the U.S. Senate against Democratic nominee Lloyd Bentsen. The win ner of the November Gener al Election will win Ralph Yarborough's seat, since Bents e n beat Yarborough in the Democratic primary.

Price, who is running without opposition for another term as representative for the Panhandle in the U. S. House, asked for financial support for both Eggers and Bush, as well as for other GOP nominees

"It's time for each of us to ask ourselves what we have done for our nation. We reap in direct proportion to the time we spend in being concerned about our government and our country," Price said. "We've got a long way to go in coming up with a representative government that really represents the people, and without your help, we're dead,' gressman added.

'We can't do it without your fives and your tens and your twenties. We're campaigning at a time when it costs \$300 for one minute on television. If you are not concerned about your business, the way to do it is to go home and forget about it. It's the same way with your coun-

try. We need your help.", Eggers has the toughest job, in his uphill fight to unseat Democratic incumbent Preston Smith as governor, His campaign tour was independent of Bush's but their paths cossed at Hereford. He arrived at 9:30 a. m. Friday and stayed in town for the \$2-a-plate luncheon in the Civic Club Center where Bush and Price were to be.

Flower arrangement is the art of organizing the elements used according to the principles of design, to attain beauty, simplicity, expression and harmony."

Before making an arrangewhere, when and how the arrangement is to be used. The placement sets the selection of the type to be used, the color, and effectiveness.

Another important phase is that of selection of materials. Cut the materials on a good long slant, with a sharp knife. Place in deep water. Groom, by removing unsightly blemishes, and harden by placing cut materials, in deep water.







Death Before The Crash

Recent research in California comes up with the finding that an unexpected number of drivers dying within 15 minutes of a single-vehicle accident were dying of natural causes which produced the accident. The researchers discovered that natural deaths at the wheel accounted for 15 per cent of the deaths in single-vehicle crashes.

This pinning down of why some road accidents happen illustrates the need for adequate postmortem examinations of drivers killed in accidents of all kinds. If the overall proportion of natural deaths is as substantial as these special findings suggest, the case is strengthened for much more stringent licensing regulations.

The California study shows that 96 per cent of the drivers dying of natural causes were men, in 94 per cent of cases the cause of death was a heart attack and, significantly two thirds of the victims were between 50 and 70 years

of age. Of the drivers who died of heart episodes at the wheel, 40 per cent had no previous knowledge of a heart con-

The California team of researchersa coroner, a highway patrol representative, a member of the state justice department and a public health official-urge that all physicians should advise patients with coronary heart disease about their fitness to drive. In the first five years after a coronary attack, other studies show, mortality is 20-40 per cent.

There is no doubt that drivers with heart conditions who insist on getting behind a wheel are a menace to others and are taking unecessary risks with their own health. The Journal of the American Medical Association states that the stress of driving has an adverse effect on cardiac function among drivers with coronary artery disease .-Financial Post.

While he was in the House, Dole was the proud possessor of a 100 per cent conservative voting record, as measured by Americans for Constitutional Action. He told an interviewer recently that he believes liberal Republicans should "swallow hard and stay loyal." He said: "There comes a time when you have to respond to the call of party responsibility." Such words are greeted with enthusiasm at the White House.

Dole's tactics on the floor are too rough for some Senátors. and he has made enemies as well as admirers. One colleague grumbled that Dole "approaches everyone the same way, with a sledge hammer." But there is no complaint from the White House, which badly needs fighting Republicans in Congress.

An unabashed admirer is Sen. Barry Goldwater (R., Ariz.). He backed another conservative, Sen. Howard Baker (R. Tenn.), for Minority Leader last year but says "Dole's my man now. He's the first man we've had around here in a long time who will grab the other side by the hair and drag them down the hill."

FOOTNOTE TO HISTORY-Like Texas, Vermont also was an independent republic before deciding to join the Union. When the original 13 colonies formed the new United States of America in 1776, Vermont wanted to be among them: New York opposed the idea, however, and New Hampshire hoped to take over a portion of Vermont's land for its own. George Washington and other leaders felt that Vermont was too close to the British to join the new nation as a

On March, 17, 1778, Vermont reacted by electing officers and declaring itself an independent republic. For the next 13 years, Vermont remained a republic, finally becoming the 14th state in 1791.

CONVIVALITY IN A CEMETERY-This summer, as they have for many years, people came from miles around to attend a two-day party staged in a Hill County Graveyard. Site of the unique get-together was the Peoria Cemetery, southwest of Hillsboro. For more years than most can remember, families with loved ones buried there have gathered for a couple of days in mid-summer to weed the burial plots and put flowers on the graves.

Known around Fort Worth, where he headquartered in the 1800s, as Captain Dick Bunch, he was one of the few of his kind who refused to work with a gang. Bunch needed no help to keep train crews and passengers covered because he concentrated only on the mail and express car.

Boarding a train late at night at some distant way station. Bunch would walk slowly forward to the express car and knock on the door. When the messenger inquired who was there, Bunch would identify himself as some well-known railroad official. When the messenger opened the door, he would find a gun in his belly.

After disarming the messenger and taking what he wanted from the safe, Bunch would pull the emergency cord near the next way station, stop the train and disappear into the darkness. By the time the lawmen could be alerted, he was well on his way back to Fort Worth.

HISTORY IN JEOPARDY-Texas' only quarantine station may soon be torn down to make room for a park unless interested citizens act to save it.

The old station, where incoming ship passengers at the port of Galveston once had to pass quarantine, has been leased to the city by the Federal government. Plans are to tear it down and use the area for recreation.
