## Low Caries, T. B. Rates Found To Come Together

A new angle on the mystery of Deaf Smith County's low tooth decay rate is provided in "The Chaser," official publication of the Texas Tuberculosis Sanatorium, in the December issue of which is a story pointing out that Deaf Smith County also has a low Bell County Registrants tuberculosis rate—and that there To Fill Out New Records

tooth decay, the article points out, adding that 11 patients from his county have been admitted to the sanatorium within the past five years; but in 1938 there were just two deaths from tuberculosis in Deaf Smith County-or a rate of 35 deaths per 100,000 population. This is almost twice as low as the rate of the state as a whole, which showed 66.3 deaths per 100,000 persons in 1938.

## Trucks, Trailers To Be Registered With The War Department

All owners of trucks and trailers must register their vehicles with the war department for use in any possible war-time emergency, Gov. Coke R. Stevenson for \$775. announced this week in a letter to civilian defense workers 11-year-old McDonald Herd Sire throughout the state.

"Registration of the vehicles

(minimum capacity 3,000 pounds) was called for several weeks ago, Okla, for \$1,200. but it is probable that some owners have not received the registration forms," says A. J. 





### U. S. Flag 3rd Oldest Of National Standards

The Flag of the United States of America is the third oldest of ne national standards of the world; older than the Union Jack of Great Britian or the Tricolor of France.

During the early days of the Revolutionary War a variety of flags were used by the different colonies and military commands. Prominent among these were the Pine Tree' and "Rattlesnake" flags with various arrangements of mottos.

Late in 1775 a committee of Congress with Benjamin Franklin at the head, after consulting with Washington in command of the army at Cambridge, decided upon the form for a new flag. This flag consisted of thirteen stripes, red and white, with the crosses of St. George and St. Andrew in a blue field in the canton or union. This preceded the Declaration of Independence and indicated that the colonies had not wholly broken from the mother country. This flag was first unfurled by Washington. January 2, 1776. It was probably this flag which was raised by Paul Jones on his vessel and carried by the American fleet which sailed out of Philedelphia in February, 1776.

During 1776 and 1777 a number of flags with thirteen stripes came into use and the need of a definite national emblem was realized. On June 14, 1777, Congress passed an act stating "That the Flag of the thirteen States be thirteen stripes, alternate read and white, that the union be thirteen stars, white in a blue field, representing a new constellation." This was the birthday of the Flag as we now know it, and June 14 is now celebrated as "Flag Day." It has been claimed that this new flag was first displayed on land during the Battle at Fort Stanwix, New York. ## Protein Vital In U.S. Health Defense Effort

An army of nutrition workers, scien tists, physicians and others in the public health field are engaged in an all-out health defense effort to conquer malnutrition, now recognized as America's No. 1 health problem.

In this program to make America strong by making Americans stronger, feeding the family is the homemaker's most important task. It is a task made easier by a knowledge of good nutrition and of the factors necessary in an ade-

### Value of Protein

Among the diet factors, protein ranks first as a body-builder. About 18 per cent of the human body consists of protein. No life exists without it. Protein is necessary for building and repairing body tissues. It furnishes energy and it also enters into the structure of certain hormones which have a specific action on vigor and general efficiency.

The word, "protein" was coined in 1838 by Mulder, a Dutch chemist, from the Greek word. "proteois," meaning "in first place." Proteins differ greatly because they are made up of various emino acids known as "building stones." When protein is digested these amino acids are set free and are reconstructed to fit the needs of each body cell.

A plentiful protein supply is imperative for good health. Persons subsisting on low-protein diets show slowness in mental reaction, lowered resistance to disease and other ill effects. Authorities recommend about 1/2 gram or preferably 2/3 gram per pound of body weight as the daily protein requirement. Thus a man weighing 155 pounds requires about 100 grams of protein daily about 3.5 ounces. Children require two to three times as much protein per unit of body weight as adults.

### Protein in Reducing Diet

Contrary to former beliefs that high protein diets cause kidney disease, physicians now use such diets in treating origin. Glandular meats, such as liver kidney ailments, Dr. Leo K. Campbell, Rush Medical College, Chicago, has shown that on diets high in protein, over-weight persons lost 8 to 12 pounds monthly. He also proved the value of a high-protein diet for weight gaining.



In all cases, waters stocked were examined by fish biologists to determine if the waters contained enough food and cover to warrant the planting of fish.

Checking of waters to determine their suitability for fish, something new in Texas, has been going on only two years, since the legislative action of 1939, but already anglers are reporting much better fishing in streams and lakes as a result of wise stocking and general scientific approach to the problems faced by every individual body of water that someone wants to see produce more fish, or even some fish.

Unwise stocking of waters, the fisheries chief said, results in a pure waste of fish. "The problem is exactly like that of the rancher," he explained "A ranchman wouldn't dare put too many cattle in a pasture, for the pasture wouldn't yield enough food to benefit his herd. In our case, we think of the lake as a pasture for fish. The pasture will yield just so much food and cover. If we do not put too many fish there, the fish will thrive, there will be little waste through cannibalism among the fishes, and the fisherman will have a good time-if he can catch 'em."

## **Farmers Enthusiastic** About Hybird Corn

Hybrid corn is on the march in Texas, according to information received this week by county extension agriculture workers. A number of farmers in Deaf Smith County have already tried the hybrid corn, and with demands for increased corn and hog production likely, it is probable that many more farmers will raise hybrid corn within the next few years. According to E, A. Miller of the A & M Extension Service, this new type of corn is one of those magic developments by plant breeders which will mean millions of extra dollars for farmers of this country.

The northern corn belt got the jump in growing hybrid corn because suitable strains became available for Texas only in 1940. Among the leading corn states, which have been raising hybrid for a number of years, almost 78 per cent of total corn acreage was planted to hybrid this year.

Unfortunately, the amount of Texas hybrid corn seed is still limited, only about 8,000 bushels being available for 1942 planting from certified seed growers and from the A & M experiment station. Hybrids developed for northern states have not been as satisfactory here as the strains developed in Texas.


From this year's results, Texas Hybrids No. 12, No. 8 and No. 6 are recommended for general planting over the state. By the use of these best Texas hybrids, farmers may expect to increase their corn yields by approximately 20 per cent. Remove from fire and before the peel is entirely cold roll in granulated sugar. Red and green cake coloring may be added while simmering for a variety of


