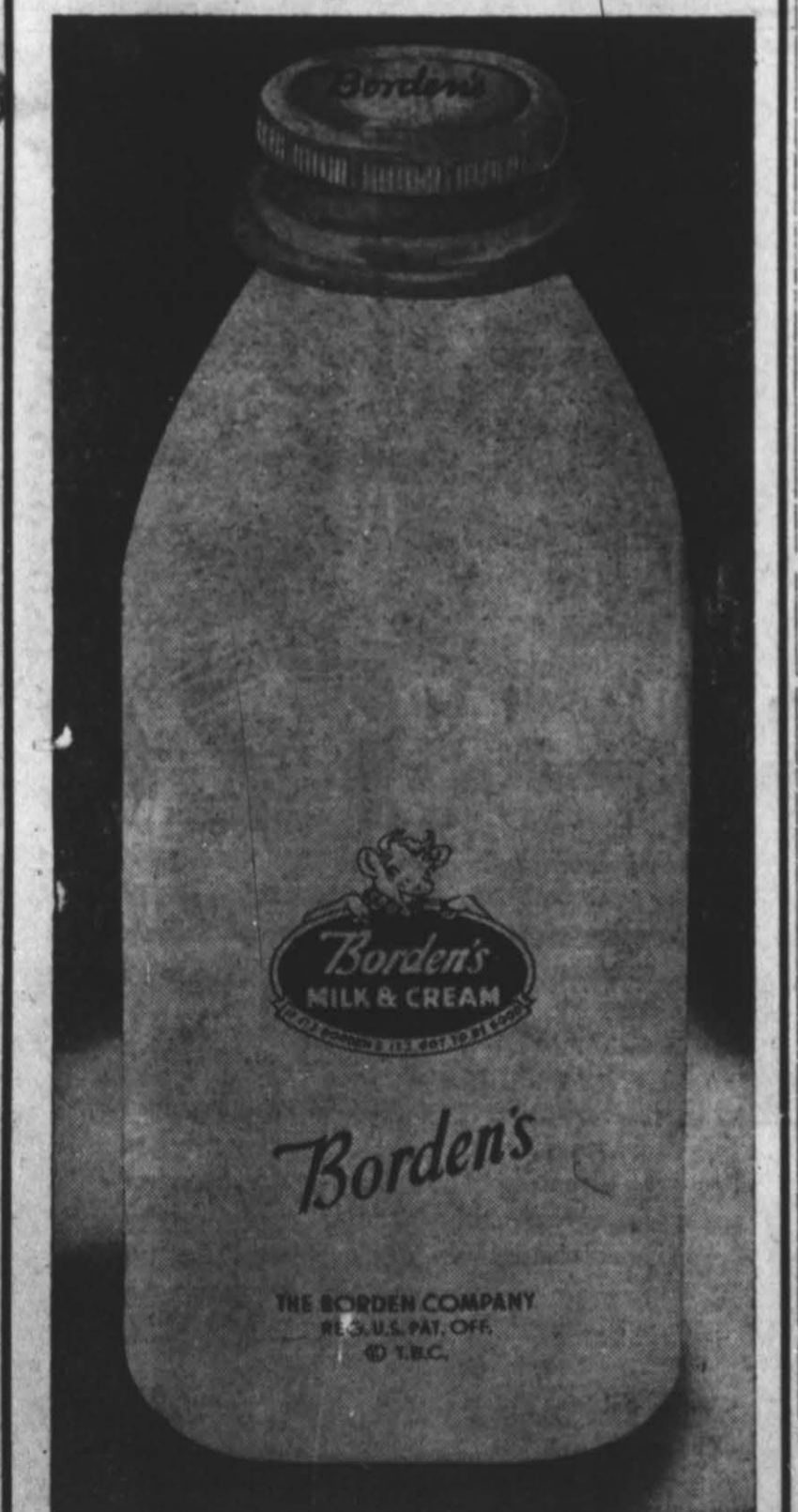

### Rev. and Mrs. Mark Beavers Recall Pioneer Days on 50th Anniversary

Rev. and Mrs. Mark M. Beavers who were married fifty years ago on Monday December 9, recall pioneer days in Texas in many different ways. Life has changed over and over again for the Beavers since that day half a century ago.

Mark Beavers moved with his parents from Arkansas to an Eastland County farm near Cisco, when a small boy. He became a farmer and married Miss Alma Munn of Cisco in 1896. Not for several years after his marriage did he become a "horse and buggy" preacher who rode the circuit regularly day after day. He had some studying to do before he could give his best to the ministry. He tried twice to leave the farm and enter the ministry but both times a throat ailment prohibited the constant use of his voice and he was forced to give it up. The second time, having sold his farm equipment, he had to borrow a mule from his father in order to start farming again. But the call would not be denied and Mrs. Beavers worried because he was far from happy, and steadfastly encouraged him to make a third attempt at entering the ministry. She knew there would be struggles ahead but she decided if he could give his all to the church she would be right with him all the way. And that's the way it has been for his third attempt, proved successful. They burned all their "farm-bridges" behind them this time, sold the farm for \$3,500 and moved with their five children to Haskell Mission. He didn't have time to go to college so he took a four year correspondence course in theology. From then on their lives were built around a succession of assignments from one charge to another, at the discretion of the Methodist Conference.

In 1939 he announced his retirement from active ministerial service and the couple now live quietly at their home on East Second Street. He is now 74, and she is 71. They still maintain their interest in the church affairs and rarely miss a service.
