The U.S. Department of Agriculture has a little pamphlet which tells how to fireproof a Christmas tree, and its as simple as ABC. "The tree can be made fire proof by replacing its natural moisture with a fire resistant substance," Martin Leatherman, author of the bultin, advises. Eithen of two inexpensive chemicals can be used: calcium chloride or ammonium sulphate. Local drug stores should be able to supply one or

Weigh your tree, then buy ammonium sulphate (or calcium chloride) equal to one-fourth of the weight. Dissolve the salt in water, a pint and a half for each Saw off the tree trunk in a cool place for a few days. The mether the tree, the more liquid it will absorb. Flame-proof decorations are available, and many stores carry flame-proofing mixtures which can be sprayed on.
