- Discussed a follow-up report on the graduating class of 1971 in relation to college, Heard reports on enrollment, cafeteria, transportation and the tax office,

- Accepted a bid on a new car for the superintendent,

- Hired Rex Manley as the building trade instructor, and Officially installed Clark Andrews to the board of

trustees, replacing Raymond White who resigned

Richard Robons, Vocational Director for the school system, presented a film and discussion on the "Community Education" program and session he attended recently in Fling, Mich. Looking at possibily applying the same type of program in the local school system, officials sent Robinson to the session in late July and he returned with hopes of putting the program into operation here, although not on as large a scale as in Michigan.

What it amounted to was a first hand look at a new concept of an old idea," Robinson said. The Community Education Program, in the final analysis is the total use of schools and school facilities by all the people of a community.

"We are just in the exploratory stage at this pointjust feeling it out." The program, developed


of 200,000 population, is based on the idea that taxpayers furnish much of the money used in the construction of schools and facilities, and thus should have those buildings and facilities open to them as well as the children. The concept is to have the doors of school open 24hours a day, seven days a week, and not just for students, but for

adults as well.

"The big question we face here," Robinson said, "is that it worked in Flint, Michigan, but will it work in Hereford, Texas? We are looking at two entirely different set-ups - they have an industrial area there where we have an agricultural area

The board agreed the Community Education program is a good one, and went along with the idea of slowly developing the program and feeling out the pulse of the community on the

### 'The Last Stand'

The Republican National Convention may have been the last stand of the violent subgroup of the "war protesters." Some of their own leaders have been quoted admitting as much. If so, the movement died less with a bang than a whimper.

to assess its impact. And it is always difficult to avoid thinking about the paradox of the war-like peace-seekers, particularly if you have been assulted by them, as my wife and I were, along with many of the delegates to the convention.

So how shall we judge them, in retrospect? By the success of their actions? By the strength of their convictions?

- Obviously, their actions didn't accomplish much. On the surface, they seemed to have very strong convictions. But did they really?

In the name of freedom, they tried to half the democratic process in Chicago in 1968, and in Miami Beach in 1972. In the name of love, they hurled obscenities. In the name of peace, they slashed tires.

Their methods repelled and disgusted the other 99.9 per cent of America. More than any other single factor, the violence of various protest groups helped to elect Richard Nixon in 1968 - an outcome they could hardly have favored, considering his relatively conservative image.

At nearly every turning point in the war - at those time when many Americans from all walks of life were questioning the wisdom of U.S. policy

- the violent protesters, by their excesses, managed to rally the rest of the country in opposition to whatever they demanded.

This effect was readily apparent to the casual observer of the passing scene, to the student of political af-The end of anything is a good time fairs, to the peruser of editorial pages, and to the mature, responsible peace groups. Could the violent protesters have missed it?

My own theory is that they were well aware of the damage they were doing to their cause, and they didn't care.

Playing hide-and-seek with the police, breaking windows and throwing trash in the streets is "fun," especially if the "establishment" (Daddy) is picking up the bill for such mundane considerations as food and shelter, and you can rationalize your destructive behavior in the name of a "good"

Starting work in an entry-level job to support a family and become a useful, contributing member of society is pretty dull by comparison. That requires a maturity, a futureorientation, a genuine willingness to make sacrifices which the protesters lacked. They weren't even willing to do the tedious, plodding, behind-thescenes work of the true revolutionary.

"Intelligent"? The "cream" of their generation? Perhaps. But their apologists can't have it both ways: Either the violent protesters were too stupid to understand that their acts were counterproductive, or they were Sen. McGovern's charges of too immature to care. I'd call them scandal in grain exporters' spoiled children, too big to spank and alleged prior knowledge of too little to face life.

Thus, the government undertook not only the complex task of negotiating with the Russians but also tacitly assumed responsibility for adjusting equities among all the private firms and individuals in the U.S. who will have a role in supplying the grain. If such huge government-togovernment agreements are to be the means for much future Soviet-American trade, it can be expected that still further problems will arise. To cite but one example, take rules in Western trade that seek to prohibit producers from 'dumping' their goods in foreign markets at prices lower than at home. Since prices are set arbitrarily by state fiat in the Soviet Union, the home price, and thus the export price, could be set low by the Russians in an effort to get a market foothold abroad. negotiators who agreed to such arrangements might be popular with consumers buy they could expect to have plenty of complaints from U.S. manufacturers.

Samuel Pisar, an international lawyer and East-West trade expert, told the American Bar Association convention in San Francisco last month that the task of devising adequate techniques for commerce between free enterprise societies and state enterprise societies will be a complex one. "Even if Communist and capitalist business organizations religiosly ob served all the established customs and laws of the international marketplace and political tensions disappeared with the wave of the magic wand, the institutional and technical problems would remain," he said.

He noted that it has been seriously suggested that non-Communist countries should set up their own state corporations to deal with the East, That, however, would be tantamount to emulating totalitarian trading methods and "inviting probably serious and irreversible inroads into a domian which economies prefer to leave in

private hands," he said A just-released study by the Committee of Economic Development suggests that it is indeed desirable for the United States to promote East-West

### Talk Of Texas

FOOTBALL IT WAS—The Southwest Conference is 58 years old.

It was organized by L: Theo Bellmont, who had been named athletic director of the University of Texas in 1913. On May 6, 1914, he called representatives of the University of Arkansas, Baylor, Oklahoma, Southwestern, Texas A & M, Oklahoma A & M and Louisiana State together at the old Oriental Hotel in Dallas and tentatively organized the Southwest Intercollegiate Conference to promote athletic competition between the members.

The league became a permanent organization the following December at a meeting in Houston. Texas, Texas A&M, Oklahoma A&M, Oklahoma, Baylor, Southwestern and Arkansas. became members. Louisana State wasn't interested, but Rice was brought in as a conditional member.

After two years, Southwestern dropped out and was replaced by Southern Methodist. For the privilege of membership and to pay Conference expenses, each team had to ante up \$7.50 each

PREGNANCY BY DEEP FREEZE ... Dallas now has a depository for frozen semen, the fluid which carries the seeds of fatherhood.

For a fee, a woman desiring motherhood can have the thawed sperm injected directly into the cervical opening by a gynecologist. Usually the procedure is repeated twice a month until pregnancy occurs.

Donors of semen are carefully selected as to body type, eyes and hair color, race and even religion. Thus it is possible for a woman to select a father for her child who closely matches her husband's physical characteristics.

The Dallas sperm bank was established because the supply of adoptive children has been declining for the last decade. Also many couples prefer this method to adoption because it permits the mother actually to bear the child.

TRAVELING TEXAS... The Little Chapel-in-the-Woods on the campus of Texas Woman's University in Denton is the first true stone masonry building to be constructed in the state since 1870.

While designed primarily to speed up the identification of criminal suspects, it is producing new statistical evidence on the extent to which "repeaters" are responsible for the crime problem in the United States of America.

Publication of the FBI's Uniform Crime Reports for 1971 shows that the role of the repeater is considerable indeed. Fully 68 per cent of the 68,914 offenders whose 1971 arrests were entered in the computer file turned out to have been arrested before, on the average of four times.

Seventy-seven per cent of the persons arrested for murder had a previous criminal record. About 75 per cent of the arrests for robbery, burglary, forgery and auto theft involved repeaters.

without concluding that our criminal justice system has a long way to go in fulfilling one of its primary goals - to rehabilitate the first-time offender or otherwise deter him from a criminal.

There is visible tension between police organizations and the courts over the contrast between the hard work and risk that go into finding and arresting a suspect, and the manner in which the judicial system often disposes of a case with plea bargaining, suspended sentences or liberal parole policies that quickly put an offender back on the street.

This bitterness among police officers will certainly not be ameliorated by another section of the FBI crime reports. The number of law enforcement officers slain on duty in the United States has been rising steadily - from 64 in 1968, to 86 in 1969, to 100 in 1970 and to 126 in 1971. Of the 875 offenders known to have been involved in the killing of police officers in the last decade, 77 per cent had been arrested previously on criminal charges.

While the dollars involved here are larger than mast, the percentages are not unusual. We have received information where only 25 percent of funds raised go to the charity and the other 75 per cent goes to the fund raiser.
