

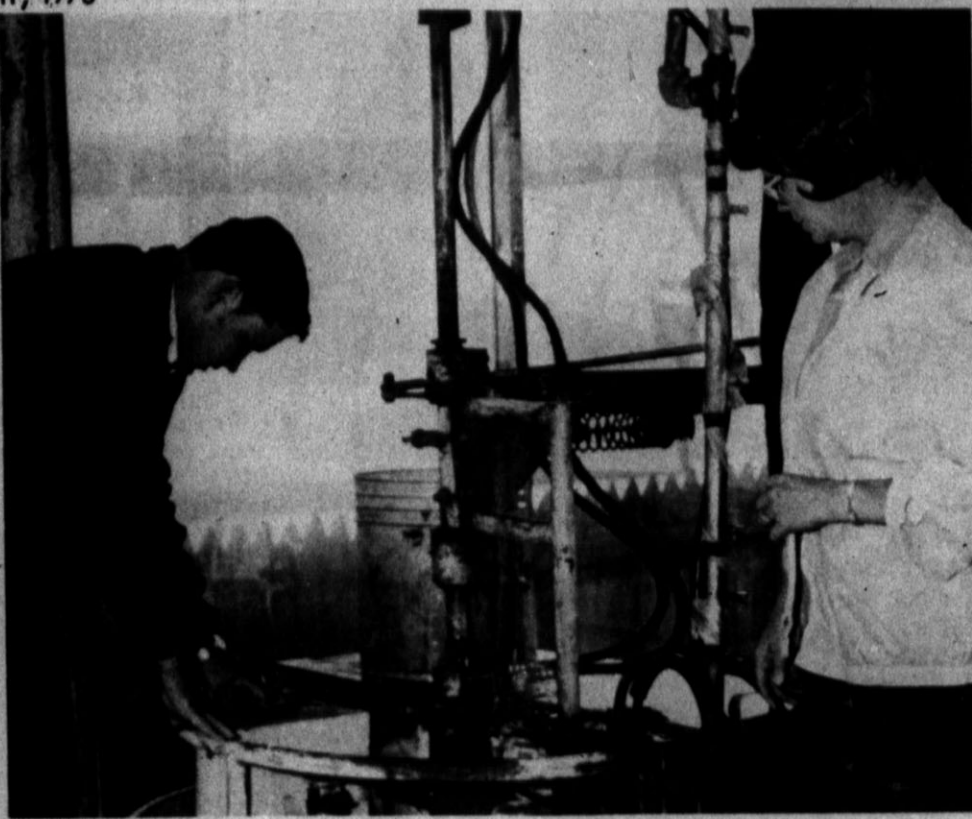

## Cindermen Compete In Possum Kingdom Meet

Hereford's Whiteface track team has already brought home two championship trophies in two meets, but the competition was expected to be much tougher Saturday at the big Possum Kingdom Relays in Graham.  
 Finals in the big meet were to be held Saturday night and were not available before press deadline. Preliminaries were run off Saturday afternoon.  
 Several Fort Worth and Dallas schools had been tabbed

as team favorites in the AAAA division of the meet. Hereford's mile relay team, unbeaten in two meets, faced a couple of teams with better times. The Whiteface relay team had posted the best time in this area with a 3:29.6 clocking.  
 In a listing of top individual performances in the area the past week, Hereford's Joe Coleman was the leader in the high jump with a mark of 6-3. Johnny Adams was tied for third in the 100-yard dash with a 10 flat time. James Harris and Charles High were tied for second in the 120-yard high hurdle times with a 14.9 mark. Luther Mays had the fourth best time in the 880 with a 2:03.5 clocking, and David Varner was fourth in the shot put with a 49-6 3/4 effort. In other events, Steve Nieman was sixth in the 440; Jim Henson was sixth in the mile run, and James Harris was sixth in the long jump.  
 The Whiteface track team will perform at home next Saturday when the annual Deaf Smith Chamber of Commerce Invitational is staged at Whiteface Stadium.

Of the more than 200 different commodities produced in Texas, only six are above effective parity, according to records of the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service. "This is something we need to keep in mind when we hear all those glowing stories about increasing farm prices," Texas Agriculture Commissioner John C. White notes. "It's good that farm prices are increasing, but let's keep them in their proper perspective. The fact remains that farm parity is still lagging about 20 per cent behind the rest of the economy," he said.

The six commodities above effective parity—or equality of income with the rest of the economy—are oats, hogs, beef cattle, calves, sheep and lambs. Hog prices at an average of 34.40 per 100 pounds in Texas are \$1 per 100 pounds above parity.

### Russians say soccer is not for women

The State Committee for Physical Culture and Sport, Moscow, warned recently that women who play football are displaying "harmful social tendencies" and that doctors consider soccer "harmful to the female organism, not to mention the fact that it causes unhealthy agitation." The committee also condemns games and exercises, including bridge, karate, judo, body building and certain types of yoga for having "nothing in common with the Soviet system of physical education."

Numbers of sheep and lambs on feed in Texas is 18 per cent below a month ago and three per cent below the number a year ago. Current intentions to market include: March 31,000; April 30,000 and May 13,000.

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## How to combat heartworms

Q. Recently I visited Grand Bahama Island and took my two toy poodles along. The island veterinarian recommended a medication to combat heartworms as preventive medicine. For how long a period of time should the medication be administered? — J.T., San Bernardino, Calif.

A. Heartworms, which are transmitted by the bite of a mosquito, are very dangerous parasites that live in an animal's circulatory system and accumulate within the heart and large pulmonary artery leading from the heart to the lungs. The presence of heartworms in large numbers can

cause a fatal blockage of the pulmonary artery.

To prevent the entrance of heartworms into the blood stream you can give your dogs a daily dose of heartworm preventive medication.

This will not prevent a mosquito from transmitting heartworms from an infected animal to your pet, but it will prevent the maturation of these immature heartworms, called microfilaria, into the dangerous adult heartworms that can cause blood vessel obstruction.

In tropical areas, or in areas where mosquitoes are a year-round problem, the oral medication should be given daily 12 months a year. In nontropical areas a more practical approach would be to begin the medication two months before the mosquito season and continue for two months after the mosquito season.

Q. Why doesn't my cat have a tail? — Covington, Ky.

A. Probably because he's a species of cat called a Manx, which does not have a tail.

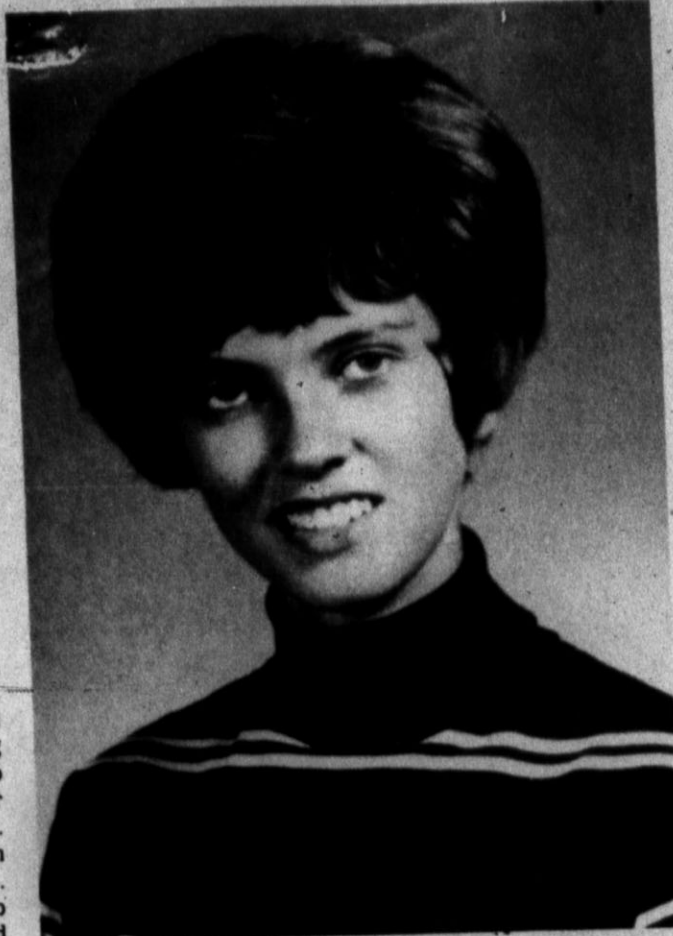
# Relief Society Has 131st Anniversary

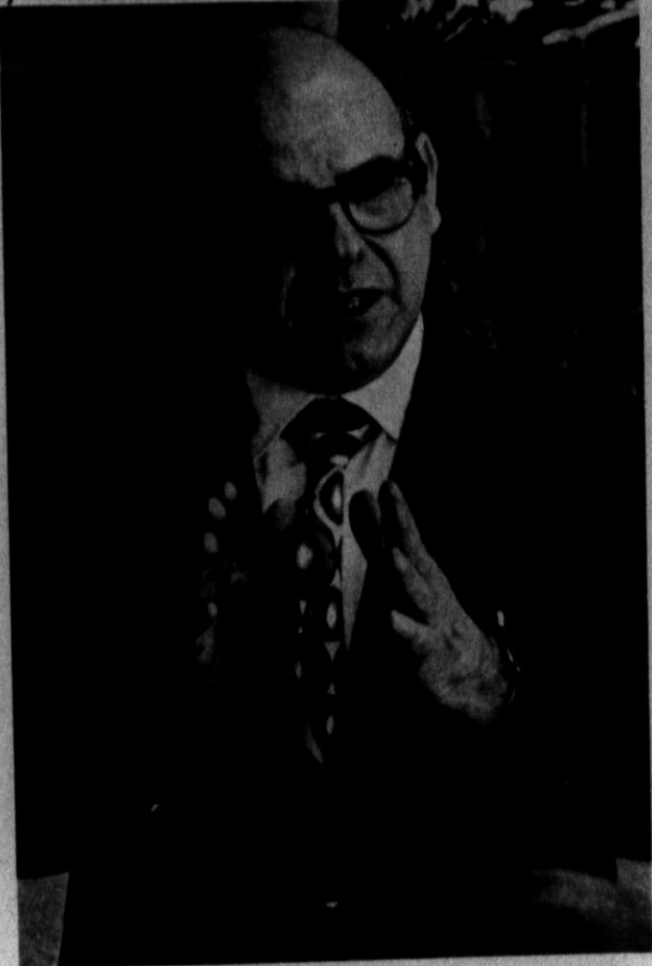

# By the Garden Gate

## With Glad

By Mrs. Art Manjeot



Gardeners should always be on the alert. There are garden enemies. Insects, diseases and a very common ailment which we are all familiar with, littering.

This disease or perhaps better known as a serious illness is spread by Litterbugs. These bugs are very destructive, and are quite numerous. If they are on your premises you can hear them buzzing their song, which goes something like this, (when interpreted).

"We are the Litterbugs, a family of renown. We uglify the landscape, in country and in town. We live on litter, or refuse we do thrive. Each hank of bag or paper helps keep us alive. We are the Litterbugs, and upon our family tree are all the little litterbugs to stock each hill and lea.

"We thrive in alleys, highways, vacant lots and uncovered trash cans. We travel extensively and favorite places to stay are trash piles or any kind of piled-up messy stuff. Our best friends are tin cans, junk and rags, old car parts and plastic bottles and old paper bags strewn here and there. Beware of us; we are happiest when left alone because then we can cause diseases and other kinds of trouble."

Remedy; The remedy for this insect and disease is cleanliness. Directions are, use often and thoroughly.

REMINDER: This is the very last month in which to plant sweet peas. They have to make strong blooming plants before hot weather begins. The trench should be dug deep (better in early fall).

On the bottom of the trench place a generous mixture of well matured barnyard manure or your favorite fertilizer, which should be 5-10-5 analysis, or very near that. Cover lightly with top soil, then hoe open a furrow and plant the pea seeds an inch apart.

Cover with two inches of soil

lightly tamped. If soil is not moist when planted, then it should be well watered.

Anyone who has grown sweet-peas and enjoyed the fragrance of the beautiful formed blossoms will continue growing them. They are great favorites for old fashioned flower arrangements.

The pretty pastel colors with accents of darker blossoms are very lovely. They are especially pretty when arranged as a nosegay or tussiemussie. The cut flowers are exceptionally nice to share with others.

MARCH LAWN WORK: If this chore is put aside the results will show in mid-summer. It is well to go over the lawn as early as possible (many of my good-garden neighbors have already performed this chore) to stir up the matted grass so sun and air can reach the crowns.

This is an aid in keeping down diseases such as fungus, aids in good health to the grass and green will be seen faster. To perform this chore use a metal lawn broom, sweep deeply to loosen the dead grass, remove this, and water lawn if moisture is needed.

Another evil of the lawn is crab-grass; soon it will be appearing. One horticulturist that I read after, stated that a good rule to remember was to treat for crabgrass when the forsythia is in bloom. To prevent the growth of crabgrass is very important.

PROPAGATION: Take dormant cuttings of deciduous woody ornamental plants this month. Crepe myrtle, althea, forsythia, wisteria, honeysuckle, pomegranate, flowering quince and crabapple are some of the plants that may be started readily by this method.

Cuttings should be taken from one-year-old shoots that are at least 1/4 inch in diameter. Make the basal cut just below a node

and treat the cuttings with root-promoting (Root-tone is recommended) hormone, available from nurseries or garden supply shops.

Plant immediately in loose sandy loam, setting cuttings 3 to 4 inches apart and deep enough so that only one bud shows above ground.

In applying the rooting hormone, have a small container of water near, dip the cut end of cutting into the water then into the root hormone. If too much has adhered to the cutting shake gently, then plant. Keep rooting bed moist, not wet. Cuttings should begin to root after several weeks, depending on weather.

EARLY SPRING BLOSSOMS FOR ARRANGING: When cutting the shrubs for the cuttings, select some of the best formed, with interesting curves and lines, and force these. To force: Groom the cuttings by cleaning and removing damaged areas.

Select a deep container, fill with water. If possible it would be good to have fresh well water, or water which was saved during the melting snow time.

Re-cut the cutting, place the cut end on a rock or heavy material and pound gently with

a hammer or other tool. Place in water container covering completely. I often use the bath-tub to place my cuttings in instead of the deep container.

Leave for several days, then lift out of the water bath and place in water deep enough to cover the end of cutting to a depth of several inches, 4 to 5 inches is suggested. Place in a dark room with warm temperature.

Buds and blossoms will appear in a few days, then these can be arranged in your favorite container. This kind of material is especially nice for line arrangements. If you wish to be a bit festive purchase iris or daffodils at the florist and make a pretty mass line arrangement.

This type material is very good to use in instructing children or practicing on arranging for one's own pleasure. Some of my cherished moments are those spent making arrangements or assisting Beverly, my granddaughter, in making arrangements.

We have worked with practically all types of floral materials, spring, summer, fall and winter. On my recent visit it was fun to make for her a nosegay styled arrangement of treated materials.

Since the colors in her room are carnation pink and apple green we used sweetheart roses, white spray material, and luxurious green foliage. This arrangement was placed on her dressing table and the reflection of it with the face of the granddaughter is a cherished memory.

from one of my horticulture magazines: Soon after swallowing what he thought was an aspirin tablet, a husband learned to his panicky dismay that the pellet was of the type his wife "fed" her flowering annuals, which needed nitrogen.

Seeking immediate aid and advice, the man who really had a headache by then, was calmed by an agricultural expert who explained that he had merely taken the equivalent of 18 bushels of horse manure and had absolutely nothing to worry about.

Caution...label everything carefully, and store after use.

# Deemphasize college football?

You can put college basketball on the air and the program will bomb, even though the teams involved are prestigious.

It isn't a dud show, of course, and it beats Saturday afternoon movies, but it won't have the ratings that a similar football matchup would entice.

And that's why everybody, most particularly the networks, want football.

Ah, the game has taken a grip. It is not only everybody's conversation piece during the fall and early winter, but it is increasingly the networks' meat and potatoes. Curiously, as pro football advances in interest, the college brand declines.

There was a downturn in collegiate TV audience again in 1972. It was not much, but significant.

And, resultingly, there is a fear and a specter among the National Collegiate Athletic Association people that they won't be able to sell their product competitively against National Football League, which made great viewing gains.

What the NCAA is talking about, if you can believe this vast TV involvement in a game that a decade ago was eligible for "deemphasis," is a further extension of the college season that now runs from July to January.

The NCAA is talking about a playoff that would incorporate the four New Years bowls — the Rose, Orange, Cotton and Sugar.

It has been suggested that

the four winners play the following Saturday, and the two surviving finalists meet seven days later on Super Bowl Eve, in a national title match.

The proponents of such an extended college season, which mainly are the TV people, insist that the nation suffers from the absence of a pyramid plan for choosing the nation's top team.

Have you been suffering? Perhaps, your January malaise was falsely blamed on the London flu!

In any event, a title event extending into January would assure a huge collegiate TV audience that would, according to TV people, encourage advertising sponsors to participate in regular season telecasts. They would be building to an end!

Boston's TV critic, Jack Craig, thinks the NCAA feels uneasy about its contract renewal with ABC because it competes with the NFL's TV package that also expires for all three networks after next year.

An attraction to rival the Super Bowl, thinks Craig, would prompt a fresh respect for the college game by ABC and the other two networks, which are CBS and NBC.

But then Craig climaxes his own thinking with an extremely logical question:

"The NFL is admittedly a profit-making business and its success is measured in money. But why should the NCAA follow the same road?"

Why, indeed?

As we basically understood it, the original purpose of collegiate education was to sponsor collegiate education. This is a redundant observation, but still it makes more sense than sponsoring collegiate prospects for the profit of the pros.

Maybe this is the time for deemphasis. And it should start with TV contracts!

# City's Financial Situation Good

According to the 1972 financial statement for the municipality of Hereford, the assessed valuation of taxable property in Hereford has increased from \$29,428,634 in 1967 to \$39,501,620 in 1972, indicating a good, steady growth for Hereford.

The assessed valuation of taxable property in Hereford is 45 per cent of its actual worth, according to Dudley Bayne, Hereford city manager.

Hereford's net debt is 1.06 per cent of the assessed valuation of taxable property, or \$417,936. This represents \$31.16 per capita.

"The average net debt, or average debt, is usually three to five per cent of the assessed valuation in most cities," Bayne said.

Borger shares the 1.06 per cent net debt figure with Hereford, however most towns

in the Texas Panhandle are over that low percentage.

Plainview has a net debt of 2.1 per cent of its assessed valuation with Friona's net debt standing at 2.45 per cent; Littlefield at 4.3 per cent; Amarillo at 4.4 per cent and Pampa at 9.2 per cent.

### Triticale Is New For Bread

MY CURRENT VOTE ON homemade bread goes to Mrs. Andrew Kershen. She served delicious hot buttered bread at a luncheon Thursday. The bread is made from triticale and whole wheat flours.

Bake, uncovered, in a 350 degree oven 30 to 35 minutes or until chicken is tender. While chicken is baking, stir butter into pan drippings with mashed bouillon cube and 3 tablespoons of the seasoned flour mixture.

Here is the recipe for the very flavorful bread:

**TRITICALE BREAD**  
Dissolve 2 yeast cakes in 1/4 c. warm water. Melt 4 T. fat, 1/4 c. honey, 1 T. salt in 1 1/4 c. milk. Mix the above.  
Add 3 c. triticale and 3 c. whole wheat flour and knead until dough does not stick to hands.  
Let rise twice, punch down. Let rise third time, make into loaves. Let rise and bake at 350 degrees for 50 to 60 minutes.  
This will make six small loaves.

Some good chicken recipes have come to us.  
**GINGER CHICKEN BOMBAY**  
1/2 cup flour  
1 teaspoon salt  
1/4 teaspoon pepper  
1 teaspoon ginger  
2 1/2 pound frying chickens, cut up  
Oil  
3 tablespoons butter  
1 chicken bouillon cube  
1 1/2 cups milk  
1 cup sour cream  
Ginger, salt, pepper  
Combine measured flour, salt, pepper, and ginger in paper bag; shake well. Drop in chicken pieces a few at a time; shake until chicken is well coated.  
Heat oil in skillet. Add chicken and brown slowly on all sides, adding more oil as necessary. Place browned chicken pieces in a shallow casserole.

**CHINESE CHICKEN AND WALNUTS**  
1 medium sliced onion  
1 green pepper cut in strips  
3 tablespoons butter, melted  
2 or 3 cups coarsely cut cooked chicken  
1 3-oz can mushrooms  
1 cup sliced celery  
2 tablespoons cornstarch  
2 1/2 cups cold chicken broth  
Dash pepper  
3 tablespoons soy sauce  
1 cup sliced walnut halves  
Cook onion and green pepper in butter two or three minutes. Add chicken and drained mushrooms, reserving liquid. Cook 10 minutes. Add celery. Mix cornstarch with 1/4 cup of the broth. Add rest of broth and mushroom liquid to chicken mixture. When this is hot, stir in cornstarch mixture; cook, stirring gently, until sauce is bubbling hot and clear.  
Add pepper and soy sauce. Cook slowly about 5 minutes, until slightly thickened. Stir in walnuts. Serve with hot, steamed rice. Makes 6 servings.

**LEMON BROILED CHICKEN**  
This is a refreshing chicken dish that's easy to prepare, and great for dieters:  
1 3-pound broiler-fryer, cut in serving pieces  
Salt, pepper and paprika  
Juice of 1/2 lemon  
2 teaspoons salad oil  
1 teaspoon tarragon  
Sprinkle chicken with salt, pepper, and paprika. Line broiler pan with aluminum foil. Turn temperature control to

moderate (350 degrees) and broil 3 to 4 inches from heat, or set control for "broil" and place broiler pan 7 to 8 inches from heat.  
Place chicken, skin side down, on pan. Combine lemon juice, salad oil and tarragon; brush 1/2 mixture over chicken. Broil 30 minutes, brushing occasionally with pan drippings.  
Turn chicken and brush with remaining lemon-herb mixture. Broil 15 to 30 minutes longer, brushing occasionally. To test for doneness, pieces should be fork tender. YIELD: 6 servings, 215 calories per serving.
