

Slow, drizzling rains and some ice drenched Deaf Smith County Thursday, Friday and Saturday with reports from various parts of the county placing rainfall within a range from one to two and one-half

Some 1.65 inches of moisture was reported in Hereford for the week, bringing total rainfall for the year to 17.02 inches. This included a trace of rain which fell Wednesday and 1.25 inches

is beneficial, especially to area wheat crops, according to county agricultural agent Juston McBride. He said the only detrimental aspect of the moisture would be its effect on the local beet harvest.

County Has One In Fifteen

One out of every 15 cases of tuberculosis found in the state of Texas was detected in Deaf Smith County, but local residents are not doing their share in helping wipe out TB and respiratory diseases, according to Top of Texas association officials.

In an effort to get more local support against TB and respiratory diseases, the local association is emphasizing memorial gifts to be made through Gililland Funeral Home or through one of the three county Top of Texas directors. The directors are Lorenzo Granado, June Rudd and Mrs. Smith.

Forms have been left at the funeral home and can also be obtained from one of the directors. The memorial gifts are made in memory of someone and a special memorial card is sent to a relative to let that person know a memorial gift has been made.

The donations from Deaf Smith County have lagged far behind those of the other 25 counties in the Top of Texas area, according to Jewel Smith. The situation now stands where the other counties are 'carrying' Deaf Smith County's share of funds needed in the research and treatment of TB and respiratory diseases.

The donations, derived from Christmas Seals, are used in this area, but for the past several years, Deaf Smith County has not contributed as much as a county of this size should, Mrs. Smith said.

Recent figures show that respiratory disease is the fastest-rising cause of death in the nation. It is the No. 2 cause of all social security disability benefit payments.

The Texas Panhandle's 26 counties, from June 1970 through June 1971 had 2,070 respiratory disease patient admissions, including 806 with emphysema, 687 with both emphysema and chronic bronchitis and 577 with chronic bronchitis.

That drive was the only time the Herd made it across the mid-field mark in the second half and only the second time in the entire game. They did make it to mid-field on one short drive, but the drive stalled and Hereford had to give up the ball.

Break up walls with light color

DECOR

Q. What colors could I use for sheer curtains and the wall to make my living room come alive a little more? I have beige carpeting, beige drapes and beige walls which is a little too much for me; I have one long wall on which I have installed two long panels of orange burlap framed in white wood. On these I have candelabras. This does add a little color to the room. These could be changed in color if necessary. My sofa is a white and brown figure print, one chair is dark green and the other chair is dark green and orange in a stripe. I am using orange, ashtrays and accessories. I must keep the carpet and drapes but would like to use sheer curtains if possible to change decorations a little. I would like to tie my drapes back. - J.P.A.

A. Instead of painting your walls a bright color to liven things up, I think an off-white for the walls and off-white sheers would be a good start.

Add tie backs and bind your beige drapes with strips of orange, green and white. Add an area rug with oranges, greens and browns. Add more accessories in oranges and lively shades of green and brown that blend well. This could give a considerable amount of color which can be repeated several times in the room.

Q. Is it possible to dye a white nylon high pile carpet on the floor as a do-it-yourself project? - T.W.

A. I have seen carpet dyes on the market but I have never had personal experience with them. I would shy away from trying to do a white high pile nylon because dyes are extremely tricky and different materials have different-ways of taking the dye. I think this is a place where a professional should be used.

Q. Is a bombe chest of





COINS Medal honors farmer

The 97th commemorative coin medal issued by the National Commemorative Society pays tribute to the American farmer. This issue marks the 47th commemorative issue in Series II of the so-

This medal was sculptured by Norman Nemeth. The face of the medal shows a pensive farmer with his horse and plow. The reverse depicts a farmer scything wheat along with the words of Daniel Webster - "when tillage begins, other arts follow. The farmers, therefore, are the founders of civilization.

+ + +

The West German govern-ment has released a fifth major coin issue - a 10-mark piece - to mark the 1972 Olympic Games held recently in Munich.

The obverse of the coin features the five Olympic rings and flame, along with the offi-cial emblem of the games. The reverse portrays a stylized eagle of the state. The edge of the .625 fine silver coin bears the inscription "Citius Altius Fortius" - Latin for "faster, higher, stronger."

Like the four previous issues in the series, including the recently released second variety of the first issue, this coin has been produced at each of the four West German mints: mint mark "D" for Munich; mint mark "F" for Stuttgart; mint mark "G" for Karlsruhe, and mint mark "J" for the Hamburg mint. The appropriate mint mark is just above the right talon of the eagle on the reverse.

The Eisenhower dollar will be added to the U.S. proof sets next year, it was announced by Mrs. Mary T. Brooks, director of the U.S. Mint. The announcement was made by Mrs. Brooks during a luncheon address before the Young Numismatists.

+ + +

The dollar to be included in the 1973 sets will be the cupronickel specimen and not those struck in 40 per cent silver which are offered for sale singly as proof and uncirculated coins. The decision to add the clad dollar to the proof sets was made in response to a suggestion that all six of our circulating coins be in the sets.

Other coins in the 1973 sets will be the customary cent, nickel, dime, quarter and half dollar. The dollar piece, because of its face value, larger size and hand work required for a proof specimen, will necessitate an increase from \$5 to \$7 for each of the sets.

Mrs. Brooks expressed hope that coins made in both the Philadelphia and Denver mints, including the dollar, and the cent produced at the San Francisco assay office, can be included in the 1973 uncirculated sets. A number of details must be worked out before a firm commitment can be made.

The mint also contemplates changing the packaging of the 40 per cent silver Eisenhower proof dollars - which are sold individually - in 1973. It is likely that a smaller, airtight container for the commemorate Ike dollar will make its appearance.

Scuba divers probing the wreckage of the sunken sidewheeler, Winfield Scott, sunk near Anacapa Island off Ventura, Calif. on Dec. 3, 1853, have been turning up small quantities of privately minted gold coins.

An article in the September issue of Argosy magazine re-ports that the gold coin search has been under way since 1965. Though an \$800,000 gold shipment was recovered from the ship before she went down, divers have been finding occasional gold coins and other items in the wreckage of the ship, the article reports.

Wife in Name Only

During their courtship, Hannah spoke soulfully to Jim about the joys of raising a family. But right after the marriage, she changed her tune. In fact, she refused to have sexual relations with him. Finally Jim sued for an annul-

"She is a wife in name only," he complained in court. "She deliberately misled me with all that talk about raising a family. The marriage was based on fraud.

"Maybe I was less than honest," Hannah conceded. "But if people had to tell the truth, the whole truth, and nothing but the truth before the wedding, there would be mighty few marriages.



Nevertheless, the court granted Jim an annulment. The judge said Hannah's deception involved no minor matter but an essential element of matrimony itself.

It is true that the law will overlook a certain amount of what it calls "the deceptive arts" in courting. But deception about the intent to have sexual relations is usually considered too vital to be condoned.

This is so even if the subject of sex is never mentioned before the wedding. Courts say that the sexual relationship, even if not discussed, is nonetheless considered, by common consentto be implied in the contract of

On the other hand, lying about something less important will not ordinarily justify an annulment. For example

A disgruntled wife sought a decree on the ground that her spouse had lied about having a college education. But the judge decided this was not adequate grounds to annul the marriage.

"Surely every representation leading, up to a marriage cannot be material," said the judge. "The fact that a brunette turned to a blonde overnight, or that the beautiful teeth were discovered to be false, or that the ruddy pink complexion gave way suddenly to pallor, or that a woman misstated her age, would lead no court to annul the marriage for fraud. The fraud must relate to something vital."

Africa. The oldest SPCA in southern Africa, known as the Cape of Good Hope SPCA, was founded in 1872 and still serves the Cape peninsula.

Talk Of Texas

BY JACK MAGUIRE

Footnote to History—Texas have all but forgotten the slim, quiet man who for seven years probably wielded more power and influence on world affairs than any other human being.

His name was Edward Mandell House, and most encyclopedias give him as much space as Sam Houston and Stephen F. Austin combined. Yet most Texas history texts fail to do him justice and some barely mention his name.

Col. House (the "colonel" was an honorary command in the Texas Militia given to him by Gov. James Stephen Hogg) was the "Kingmaker" of his time. He elected and managed the political fortunes of four Texas governors, founded the modern Democratic Party in this state and is credited with electing Woodrow Wilson president of the United States.

Born in Houston to wealthy parents and educated at Ivy League schools, House got his first taste of politics when he rescued James Stephen Hogg's campaign for governor from almost certain defeat and won the office for him. He continued to dominate state politics for some years, then moved onto the national scene. He succeded in getting vilson the Democratic nomination for president, directed his sucessful campaign and became his closest advisor.

House was Wilson's secret envoy to Europe who attempted to avert World War I. When war came anyway, it was House who represented the U.S. at the armistice talks at Versailles. Wilson, in fact, would make no decision without first consulting the mild-mannered Texan.

After Wilson's death, House retired to Austin. He uied March 28, 1938.

SWEET FALL - It's that time of the year again, and soon the little mule-powered mills in East lexas will gegin turning out their annual quota of ibbon cane syrup.

There aren't many farmers left who make the golden liquid that is so tasty with hot biscuits, pancakes and butter. By late this month, however, a couple of dozen mills should be at work.

Ribbon cane, or sorghum, syrup is a delicacy that the big food companies have never been able to mass produce. It is made by squeezing the stalks through a press and then evaporating the juice the same day by cooking it. It requires about six and a half gallons of sorghum cane juice to produce one gallon of the tangy brown syrup.

Most of the presses that retrieve the juice from the cane still are powered by mules. And connoisseurs swear that unless the juice is evaporated over a wood fire, the syrup isn't the best. Butane gas, howeven, has replaced wood at many of the

yrup mills today.

Now with cities, I don't know, If they're taking in more money than ever before and still not making ends meet and still not meeting the needs of their citizens, the supposition might be, let nature take its course, what worked with the farm problem ought to work with the city problem, but there are some perplexing questions going unan-

For example, what do you do with a city that gives up? Tell its citizens to move to town and get a job? With an abandoned farm, you can always put it in grass and run cattle on it, but with a city, there's so much pavement and cement I'd feel sorry for the man who tried to graze it. Oh, there're some lawns you might run goats on, and backyard swimming pools would make fairly good stock tanks, but on the whole I'd say the range conditions in Amarillo or Lubbock would be of a very poor quality and hardly worth fencing.

I'm sorry, I just don't have the answer to this problem. I will try to work on it some more later. Yours faithfully,

Serving on the banquet committee were Mary Thomas, Ray Seale, Charles Watson, Anna Jo Wilson, and Steve Graham.



QUICKEST YET CANDY Large Marshmallows Hot cream or evaporated

Vanilla

Dip marshmallows in hot cream, flavored with vanilla, until outsides of marshmallows are soft. Roll in finely ground pecans or other nuts, moist shredded coconut, or chocolate decorettes; flatten slightly.

CHOCOLATE PEANUT BUTTER PUFFS

2 C. miniature marshmallows 1 - 6 oz. pkg. (1 cup) semisweet chocolate pieces 112 c. chunk-style peanut butter

2 (b. butter or margarine Arrange marshmallows in a square cake pan (8x9x2"). Melt chocolate pieces, peanut butter

and butter over low heat in a sucepan, stirring constantly. Pour chocolate mixture over marshmallows and smooth into

the crevices.

Refrigerate and cut into pieces. Remove candy to room temperature about 30 minutes before serving. Yields: 3 dozen pieces. You could use large marshmallows, if you prefer.
