The Brand joins other citizens of the community in welcoming Grain Handling Corp. and general manager Wister Clevenger to the city! The plant employs about 15 persons, and the work force could be doubled in a year or so.

The industrial development committee of Deaf Smith County Chamber of Commerce continues its work for the community, and another announcement may be ready in the near future!

SPEAKING of new businesses, The Caison House Restaurant is in the process of changing management. A grand opening will be announced soon for "The House of Wong". The new operator will be Peter Wong, who is moving here from Tulsa, Okla., and — naturally — Chinese food will be a specialty.

It had to happen — some wise guy has already come up with a pun. "I thought I was in the Caison House, but it was the Wong House," he quipped.

And, the above item also serves to remind us that Miss Hereford of 1973 — Sandy Caison — will be honored with a "sendoff party" today from 2:30 to 4 p.m. in the Community Center. The event is sponsored by the Women's Division of the Chamber of Commerce.

WITH OUR work on The Brand's special Diamond Jubilee edition, to be published Aug. 23, we have become interested in old papers. We ran across the following column in another old paper, and it shows how skeptical most people are of new inventions.

The story was originally published in a Boston newspaper in about 1865 and then was reprinted in the Wall Street Journal and other papers. It concerns the invention of the telephone, and it was not until 1876 that Alexander G. Bell first patented the invention for practical use.

The clipping follows:  
"A man about 46 years of age, giving the name of Joshua Coppersmith, has been arrested in New York for attempting to extort funds from ignorant and superstitious people by exhibiting a device which he says will convey the human voice any distance over metallic wires, so that it will be heard by the listener at the other end. He calls the instrument a 'telephone' which is obviously intended to imitate the word 'telegraph' and win the confidence of those who know the success of the instrument without understanding the principles on which it is based.

"Well-informed people know that it is impossible to transmit the human voice over the wires as may be done with dots and dashes and signals of the Morse code, and that, were it possible to do so, the thing would be of no practical value. The authorities who apprehended this criminal are to be congratulated, and it is to be hoped that his punishment will be prompt and fitting, that it may serve as an example to other conscienceless schemers who enrich themselves at expense of their fellow-creatures."

## DJ Reported 'On Schedule'

Dale Young, general chairman, of Hereford's 75th Diamond Jubilee reports everything is "on schedule in almost all phases of the Jubilee", and that only two days of the festivities are not filled with planned events. Young also said that the parade is shaping up better than expected.

Gov. Dolph Briscoe will be the Parade Marshal, along with a long list of officials and dignitaries who will attend the parade.

Other expected guests include 69th District Judge Archie S. McDonald, State Sen. Max Sherman, State Rep. Bill Clayton, and U.S. Congressman George Mahon.

INVITATIONS have been sent to all area mayors, city councilmen, county commissioners and leading businessmen.

Hereford's two oldest clubs, the Pioneer Study Club (formed in 1909, Federated in 1910), and the Music Study Club (organized in 1916, Federated in 1918 with Women's Clubs, Federated in 1920 with National Music Clubs) have entered floats for the parade.

Other float entries include St. Joseph's Mission, Avenue Baptist Church, Wesley Methodist Church, and the First United Methodist Church.

Many other Hereford clubs, both civic and study, have entered floats. Applications were mailed to 150 local clubs, and those who did not receive invitations are asked to call Parade Chairman Harold N. Wheeler, 301 Courthouse, 364-3891.

Invitations have been sent to at least 20 area bands, and several cycle clubs are expected, with at least one local club riding decorated bicycles.

TWO SPECIAL floats have been

prepared. One for Miss Hereford, Sandy Caison, and one for the Jubilee Queen and her attendants.

The local banks have entered floats, along with Pioneer Natural Gas.

The HHS High Steppers will add to the festivities, and at least one decorated boat is entered.

TWELVE trophies will be given, two in each division of the parade, and ribbons will be given to each of the other entries.

Any ideas for entries in the parade will be appreciated according to Wheeler. Those with suggestions may call Wheeler, Parade Chairman. There is no entry fee.

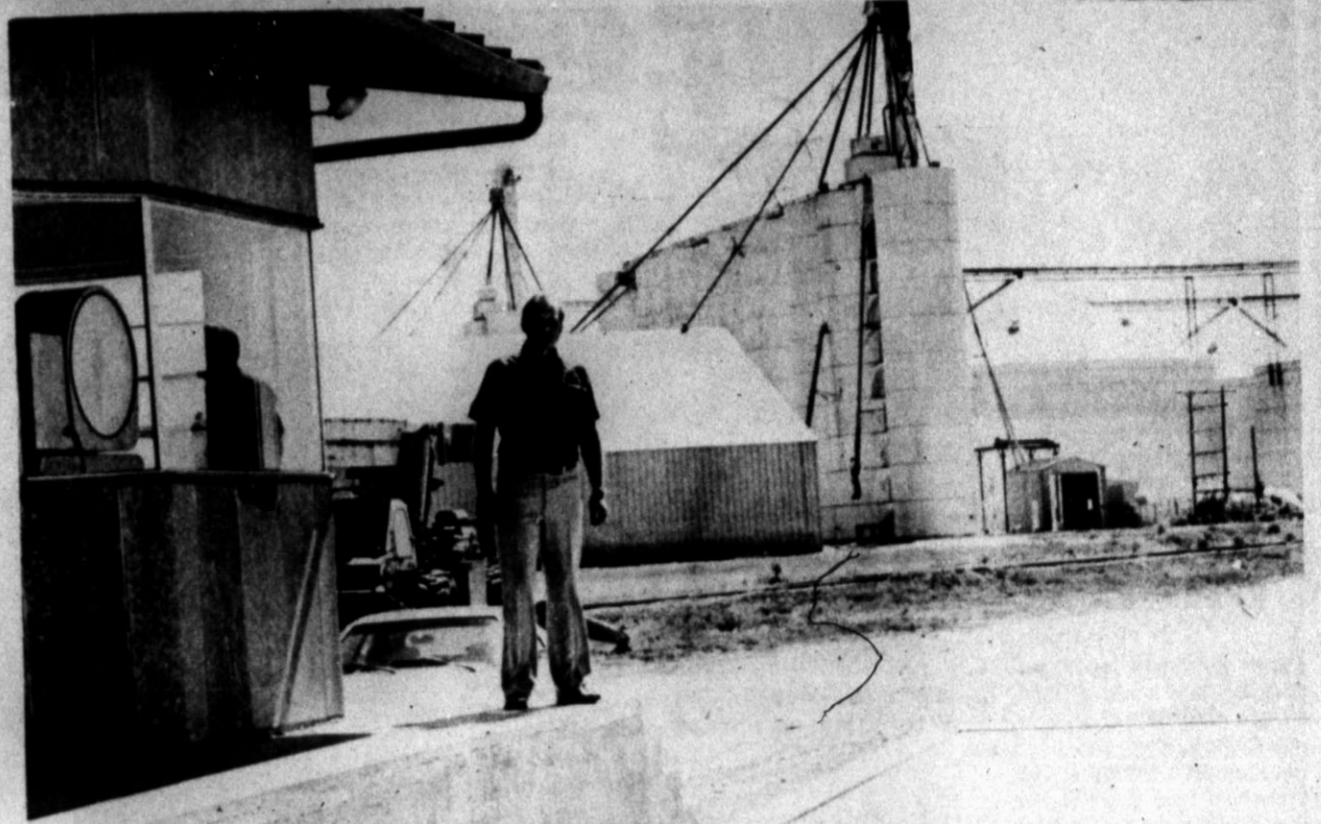
YOUNG ALSO reported that office hours have been set for the headquarters for the Diamond Jubilee. Located in the former Selective Service office across the street west of the courthouse, the headquarters will be open from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. through July 16.

"After that date we will see how we come along and then perhaps keep the office open longer," Young said.

IN OTHER action during the week concerning the Jubilee celebration, "Peddler's Permits" went on sale at many local merchants.

The permits cost \$2 each and are issued by local businessmen to their individual salesmen who call on them. The permit then entitles the salesman to "peddle" his goods to Hereford merchants.

STANLEY SIMMONS, of the Novelty committee of the Jubilee Celebration, said the idea was to get more persons from outside Hereford knowledgeable of the Jubilee and to also use the profits from the permits to help defray expenses of the celebration.

## New Industry Opens

# New Grain Industry Locates In Hereford

Hereford's newest industry, Grain Handling Corporation, was announced Friday in a joint statement of company officials and Deaf Smith County Chamber of Commerce.

The new industry, to initially employ about 15 persons, will handle mainly corn from area farmers but plans to also deal in hominy and various other grains raised in the area.

The announcement was made at a press conference by Rex Easterwood, chairman of the industry committee of the Chamber and Wister Clevenger, manager of Grain Handling.

The new company will be located in presently existing facilities near Progressive Road and U.S. 60 just south of the Santa Fe Railway.

Clevenger said the business is in operation now although cleanup of the facilities is still continuing. He said the storage barns and tanks have not been

used in several years and remodeling is just now being completed.

Grain Handling Corp., is jointly owned by Clevenger and Garland DePrang of Olton. The two men also own similar operations in Hart and Olton.

Clevenger said about \$300,000 in equipment is being added to the existing facilities to help dry and store grains as they come in from farms.

"We will be interested in buying a lot of corn from farmers this fall," Clevenger said. "We hope to be making contracts with area farmers for their corn and other grain crops."

Clevenger said the company sells most of the corn as food to many larger food-making companies.

He said company sales go into much of the Corn Belt and into New England states and as far west as California.

Clevenger said the corn would initially be shipped by rail to the Hart

plant to be processed before it is sold to food companies.

"However, we intend to build onto this plant and within a few years make it a process plant," he said. "We will be heavy users of the railroad both to Hart and to food companies across the United States."

"We have present storage capacity for about 9.4 million bushels," Clevenger said. "We are not trying to compete with existing storage facilities, but we will have storage available."

"We are real happy to get this new industry in Hereford," said Easterwood. "The Chamber is certainly glad to welcome the Clevengers to town and I'm sure everyone in Hereford is glad to see growth in the town continue."

Clevenger and his wife, Leta, have moved to Hereford and are living at 301 Douglas. The couple has two sons, Mike 14, and Russell, 10.

## Jury To Convene

Deaf Smith County's 69th Judicial District Grand Jury is scheduled to meet at 10 a.m. Wednesday to consider eight felony cases against 10 persons.

In other action before grand jurors, past cases are expected to be cleared and several city officials are scheduled to appear in connection with other considerations.

The eight cases planned for study include two for theft, two for burglary, two for swindling with a worthless check (SWWC), one for forgery and passing and one for driving while intoxicated (DWI) — felony.

Jurors are expected to return true

bills (indictments) in the cases or to no bill (refusal to indict). Up for consideration include: Juan Carlos Mendez, charged with DWI; Raymon Hernandez Mireles, charged with theft; Randall Alan Arnold, David Neal Gass and Joe Don Daniels, all charged with theft; George Stringer, charged with SWWC; Danny Castillo, charged with burglary; and Jose Valdez, charged with burglary.

Two other persons have not been arrested for the other two cases to be considered. The jury will consider left-over cases beginning at 10 a.m. with city officials expected to report about 1 p.m. The other cases have been scheduled throughout the day.

## Driver Education Pays Off In Various Ways

More than 40 hours of classroom training and supervised driving and observation are required of driver education students before they are allowed to take their Texas driver's license test.

And in those hours the students are taught the very basics of adjusting mirrors, seats and fastening seat belts to actual driving situations of proper turning procedure, stopping and maneuvering in heavy traffic.

EVIDENTLY all those hours of training pay off in various ways.

The pass-fail ratio of persons who take their Texas driving test without driver education courses is one in five, while the ratio for students with the driver education course is one in 10.

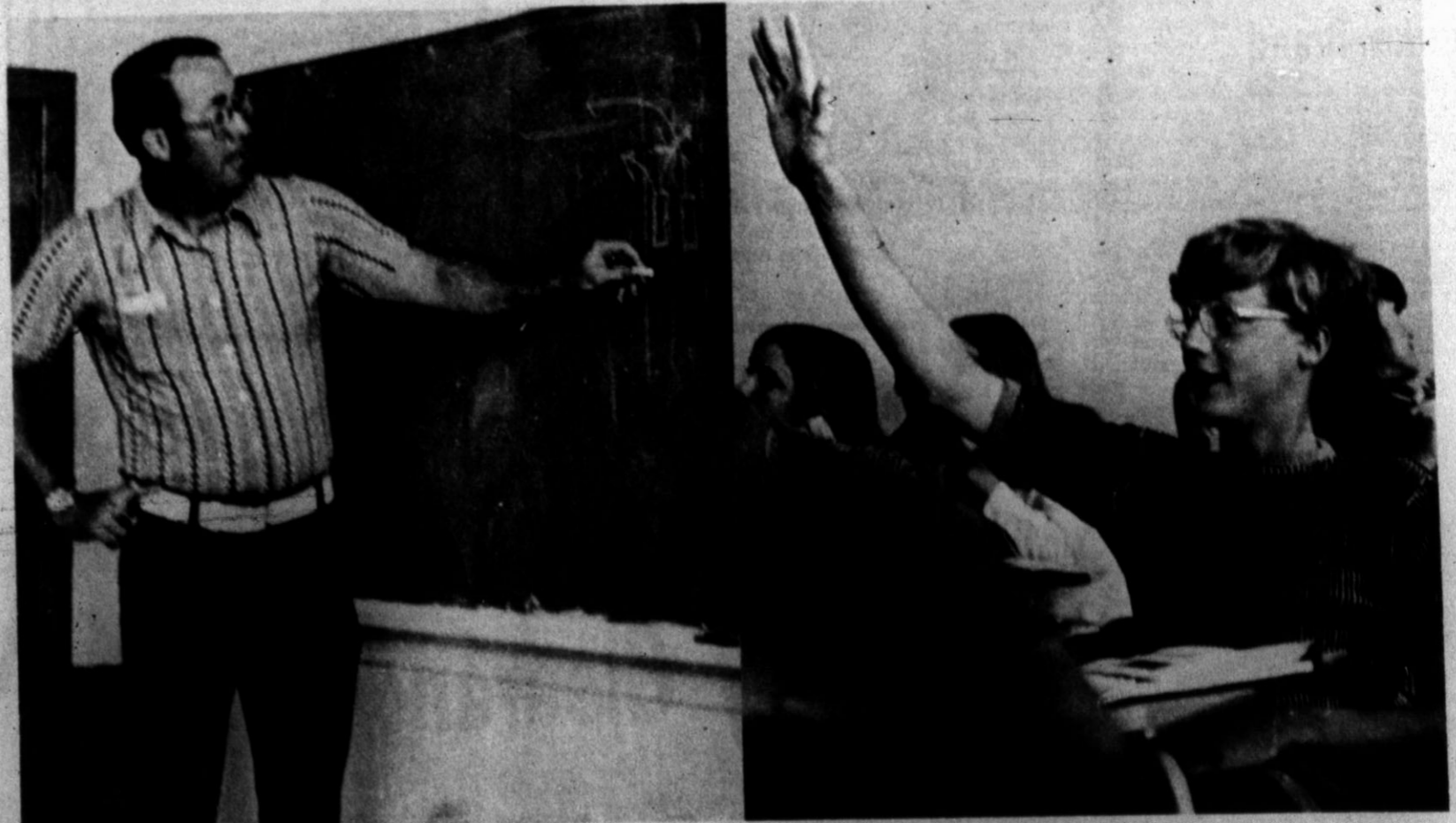
"The average grade of students who have driver's training is about 85 to 88, and that is an above average grade," said Jim Ward, Department of Public Safety officer.

"Students who have taken the driver's training course are easier to administer the test to. They know what to expect. The only problem they seem to have is assuming that everyone else knows as much about driving as they do."

IN THE STATE of Texas, most insurance companies will

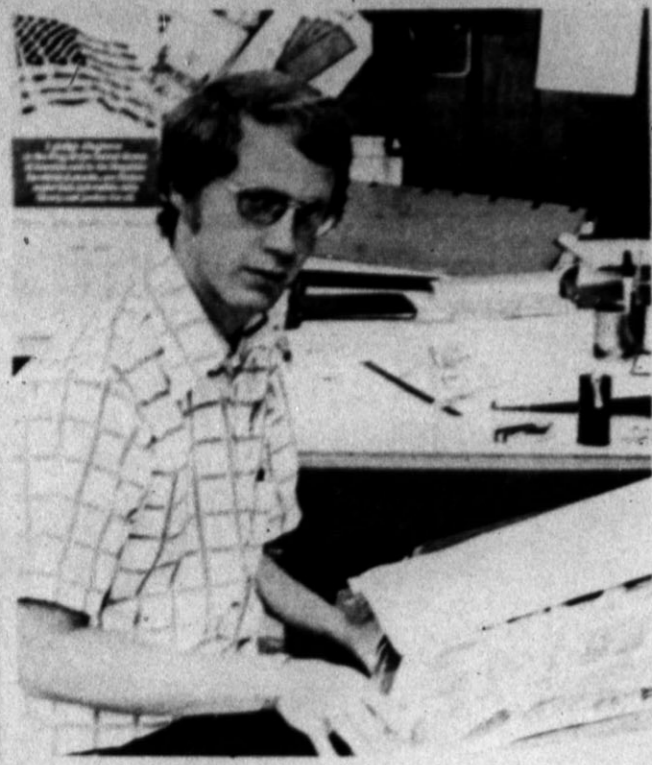
### Would You Go Over That Again?

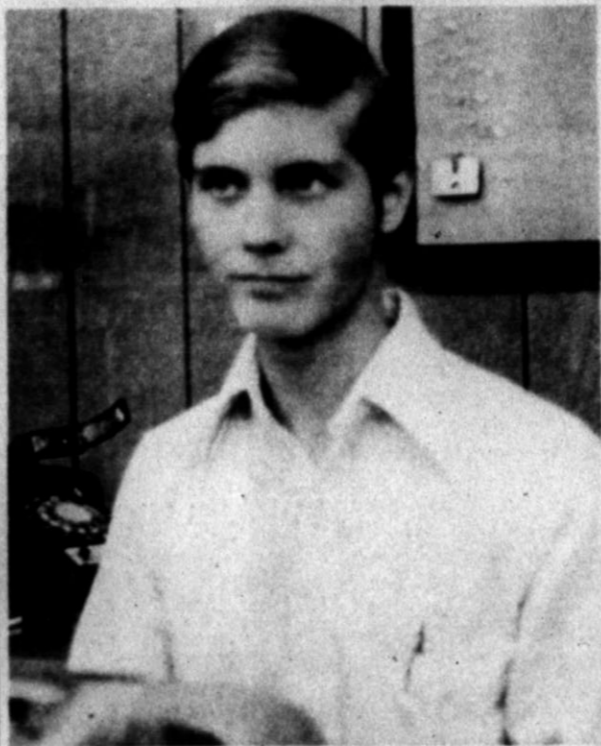
"I really have enjoyed Hereford so far. It impressed me by its friendly atmosphere — everyone has really tried to make me feel at home."

A grass fire near the intersection of 17th St. and Ave. F was put out by the firemen on the Fourth of July. Another call

the same day was answered to one mile west, one north, of Westway when a wheat field that was being burned got out of control, and burned several trees near a road.

A grass fire in the yard of a house three miles north of Dawn was quickly extinguished by the Hereford Fire Department last Thursday. The fire was believed to be started by trash that had been burning near the yard.

She was a native of Hereford, born Sept. 4, 1925, and was graduated from Hereford High School in 1942 as valedictorian of her class. She married Jimmie Hendrick here Dec. 12, 1949 and they resided here for a time.

She is survived by her husband; two sons, Justin of the home and Jamie, in U.S. Army service at Ft. Campbell, Ky.; her mother, Mrs. Stacy London of Hereford; two sisters, Ruth London of Hereford and Mrs. Ted Myers of Amarillo; three brothers, Walter and Baxter of Hereford and Ray of Amarillo, and one grandchild.

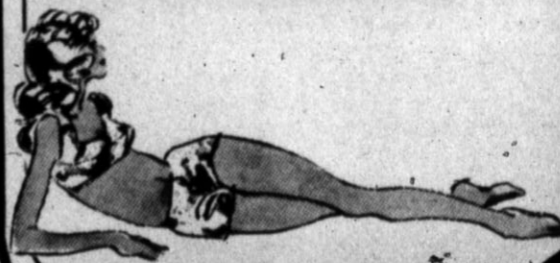

# ---Driver Education Pays Off---

offer a discount for boys who have completed a driver education course.

"Boys who have completed the course are qualified for a 10 per cent discount on their insurance premium," a local insurance spokesman said.

"The trend is that those with driver education have fewer accidents."

The trend also points out that persons who have completed the driver education course have fewer driving violations. "Students with driver's training are apt to run fewer stop signs and they don't speed quite as often as the person without driver's training," Municipal Judge J. D. Neill said.

"The kids with driver education pretty well know the law and try to abide by it. We have the driving instructors to thank for that."

JUDGE NEILL pointed out that the only problem he has with driver education students is their abuse of their driving permit.

"After the completion of the classroom instruction the students are issued a driving permit which allows them to drive with a 21-year-old licensed driver in the front seat. I don't know if these kids just over-look that provision but some have been caught driving alone."

Judge Neill said that there is a need for students to have experience in driving with their parents and that the main purpose of the driving permit is to gain that experience.

"I'm definitely all for the driver education program. Students need to get some experience by driving with their parents but I feel that the instructors are better qualified to teach the legal procedures of driving."

**THIS SUMMER**, approximately 385 students are enrolled in the driver education course at Hereford High with 11 instructors teaching the classroom, driving and observation sessions.

To become a certified driving instructor, persons must have nine college hours in driving courses.

In the state of Texas, students are required to be at least 15 years old before they are eligible to enroll for driver's training.

Before the students are eligible to take their driving test, they must satisfactorily complete 32 hours of classroom training, six hours of supervised driving and six hours of supervised driving observation.

The classroom instruction includes lectures on proper driving procedures, plus reading of the Texas Drivers Handbook and the text book, Sportmanlike Driving.

**IN THE CLASSROOM** sessions, the instructors use illustrations to create certain driving conditions and call upon individual students to relate the proper driving procedure for that particular situation.

Throughout the classroom sessions, courtesy is frequently stressed with the phrase "Remember the other driver," oft repeated.

When the classroom instruction is completed, the students are issued a driving permit which enables them to drive with a 21-year-old licensed driver, with at least one-year's driving experience, in the front seat.

**THE FIRST DAY** of actual driving instruction is begun with the instructor explaining the simple mechanics of the automobile and the student becoming accustomed to the car which he is to drive.

Five steps are normally carried out once the student gets behind the wheel — (1) adjusting the seat; (2) fastening the seat belt, which in the state of Texas is required of the driver as well as all passengers in the driver education car; (3) adjusting rear-view mirror; (4) adjusting side-view mirror and (5) locking all doors.

Before the student is allowed to drive on public streets, the instructor makes sure that he is capable of controlling the car. The student is required to drive around in the school parking lot familiarizing himself with the steering mechanism, brakes and foot-feed.

**ALL DRIVER** education cars are equipped with dual control — a brake on the passenger's side of the front seat.

"I have used my brake a few times," Jim Arthur, driver education instructor said.

"Sometimes the students are under pressure and they tend to panic, so I have to be the one to stop the car."

Throughout the driving sessions, the instructor encourages the students to ask questions if something is 'bothering' them.

"Any time you have a question, bring it up. I don't consider any question 'stupid'. I can't read your minds, and it helps me to help you."

After the students make a few circles in the school parking lot, they drive across town to another parking lot where rubber cones are arranged. The students are asked to drive between cones in a figure weave.

"This gives them assurance of steering properly," Arthur said. "Sometimes I let them pick up speed using the illustration of what speed in a tight situation can do."

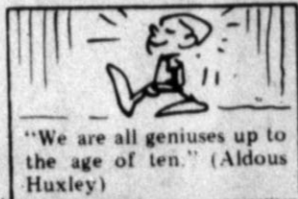
After the weaving between the cones is completed, the students are asked to back approximately 50 feet. The students are required to assume a proper position that enables them to see out the back windshield.

**ONCE THE** instructor is sure that the student is capable of handling the car, they head for public streets, mainly in the residential areas.

In actual driving situations, the instructor explains the correct procedure for right and left turns, changing lanes and the proper stopping position among other things.

After each student has had 30 minutes of driving time that day, the class returns to the high school parking lot where the student behind the wheel must park the car and apply the emergency brake.

Now who needs driver education? Maybe we all do.

She was a member of Pioneer Study Club more than 50 years and was honored by the club with life membership.

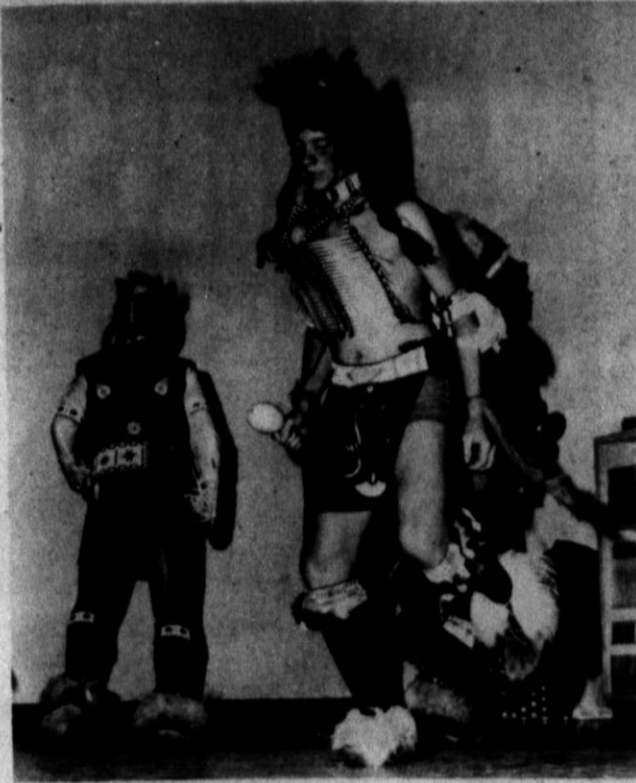

All qualified applicants will receive consideration for employment without regard to race, religion, color, national origin, sex, political affiliations, or any other non-merit factor.

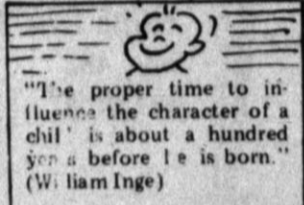

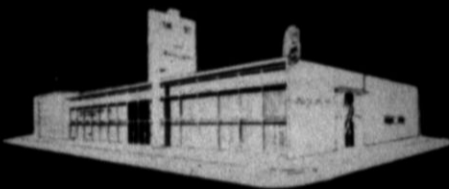

# Army Green

If anybody had told Abra Jones when he was growing up in southwest Louisiana that someday he would be working a 70-hour week in the U.S. Army - and loving every minute of it - he'd have told them they were crazy.

Of course, Specialist 5 Jones never suspected he'd be stationed in Oahu, Hawaii and assigned duty as a lifeguard on private beach operated for military personnel. The 22-year old soldier is quick to point out, however, that assisting four others in manning a half-mile stretch of beach is quite a responsibility.

"It's fun, but you can never forget it's a job too," he said. "About 15 or 20 people drowned in other parts of Oahu last year but we didn't even have one serious accident. That's a record we intend to repeat this year."

EACH OF the five soldier-lifeguards is qualified under the Red Cross Water Safety Program. Additionally, they receive 12 hours of instructions each month that includes more than a dozen ways of assisting a drowning person. Their instruction is reinforced by a continuous physical training program. The men work a seven-day week from 8:00 a.m.

to 6:00 p.m. The military beach attracts an average of 200 visitors on weekdays and about 1,200 on weekends. "It's quite a job," Abra Jones says, "but I love it. We all do."

DURING THE week Andre LeBlanc is an Army man. On weekends he is an avowed "speed freak." LeBlanc is a Major and an executive officer at Fort Bragg, N.C. Each weekend he heads for the racing car circuits to drive against top flight national road racing competition.

One recent weekend, Andre drove his Matre Sports Coupe, which is powered by an 1108cc Renault Gordini engine, to Cleveland (home of the Sports Car Club of America) Friday, practiced Saturday, qualified, raced and won on Sunday and drove back in time to report for work Monday.

But the real fun is in competing. "The real awards are the challenges," he said, "the thrill of high speed racing with its timely gear shifting, passing, braking and cornering. There's nothing like it."

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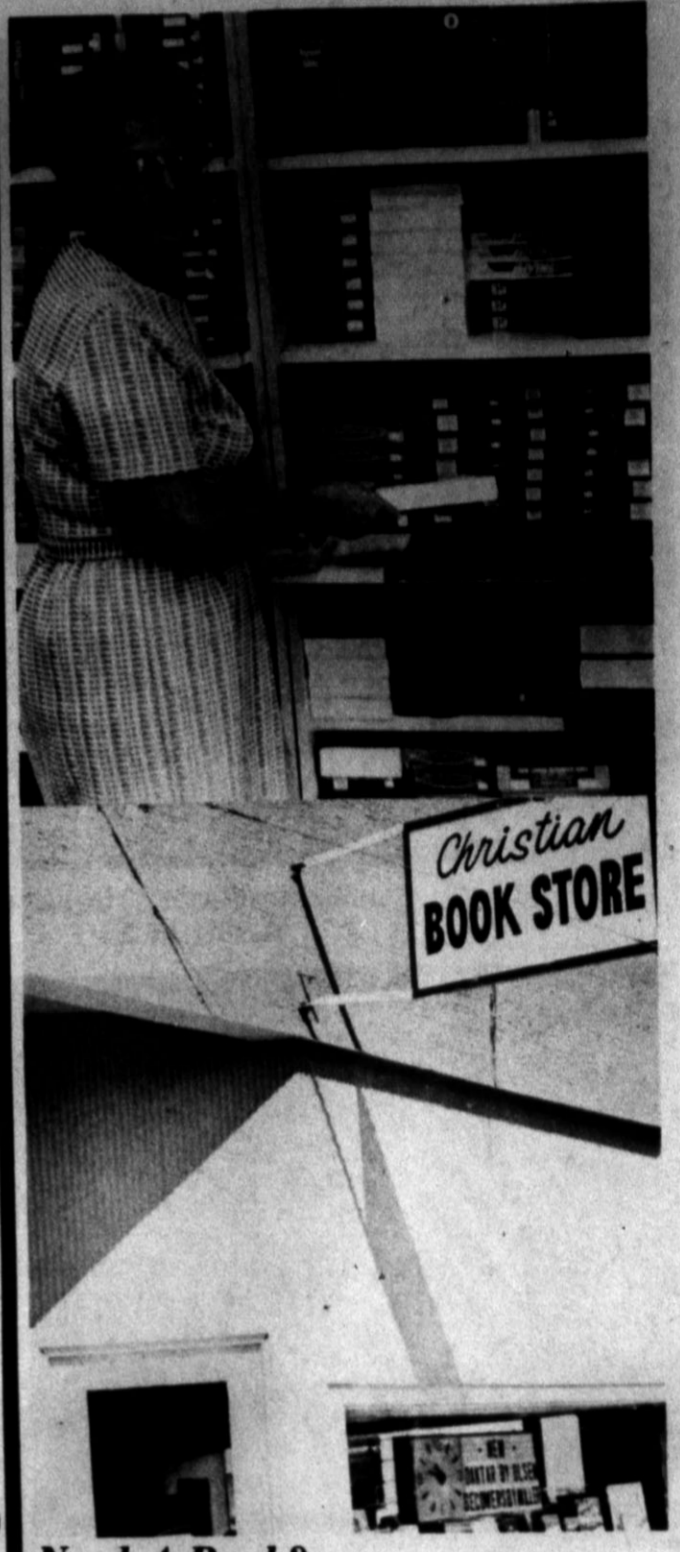

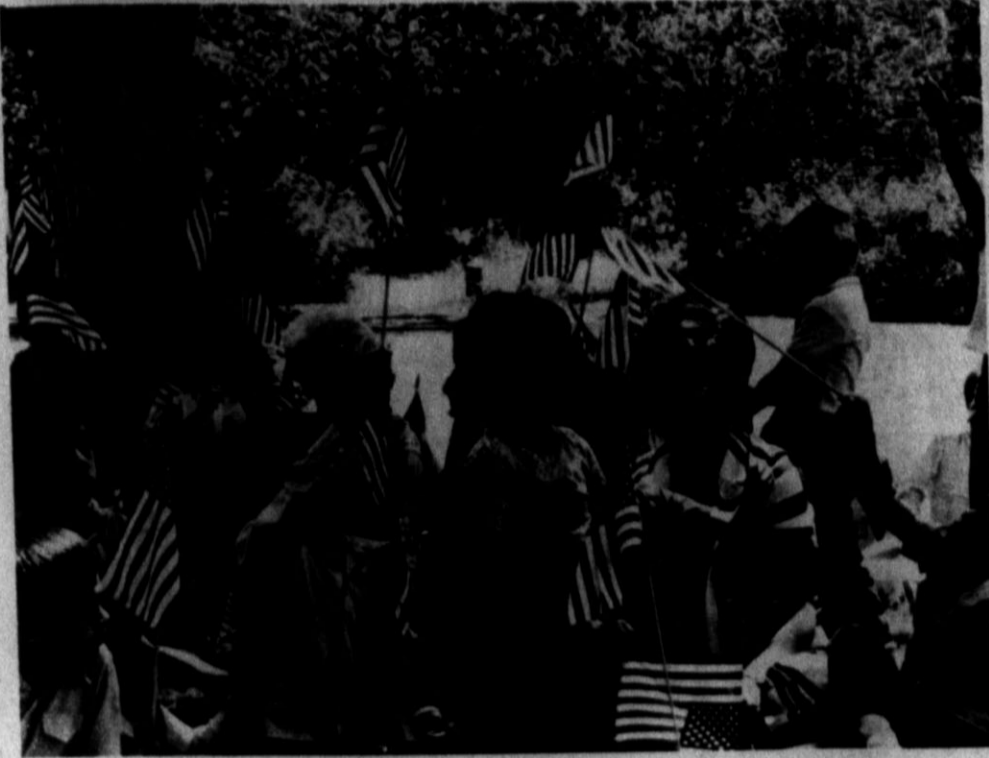

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# 'Americanism' Is What America Needs, Says Clayton

"America needs more of Americanism," State Rep. Bill Clayton told more than 1,000 local residents and students Wednesday assembled in Dameron Park for Hereford's July 4th Celebration.  
As main speaker at the event, the Springlake Democrat urged the crowd to become more patriotic and realize the freedoms they enjoy. Clayton said Americans enjoy freedoms that people of other nations don't have or ever will enjoy. "How do you pin down the American way — how do you explain it to people who don't have freedom," he said.

candidate for Speaker of the Texas House, kept his speech entirely in a patriotic theme and urged people to push for a "rebirth of Americanism in America."  
"WE ARE BLIND to what we take for granted," he said. He cited many individual freedoms in the United States which are not allowed in other countries and which he said Americans take for granted.  
"Look at the paper boy, or the milkman or the farmer applying for a loan with the banker," he said. "All these are things you won't see in many countries because they are individual freedoms."

CLAYTON WAS the highlight of the day's celebration sponsored by the Deaf Smith County Chamber of Commerce. Sandy Caison, Miss Hereford, and the Caison kids entertained with a variety of songs as the crowd sat on the grass at the park eating Rotary-prepared bar-becue sandwiches.

CLAYTON COMPARED the many differences of Communist countries with the United States and reminded the crowd of past July 4th celebrations when citizens went "out of their way" to honor the fighting man.

A group of school students from Shirley School also got in the spotlight with choral singing and Brothers of the Brush Chapter "Fred Fox and the Firehouse Fifteen" entertained with their musical combo.

The state representative urged the people to keep faith in the government even though trouble sometimes bogs down the system.  
"The government, though slow and cumbersome has survived... and has preserved the dignity of man. We are a country that believes in God and that God created man in His own image."

Jim Conkright, CC president, was master of ceremonies at the event in which the Veterans of Foreign Wars, American Legion and local Scout troops presented the colors and led the pledge of allegiance to the U.S. flag.

"I'M NOT TRYING to minimize the social and economic problems we have," he added. "These have been brought about by change. But we can conquer them — we can take care of them in time."  
Clayton ended his 20-minute address urging people to become "patriotic again."  
"We need to get rid of the notion that being patriotic is corny and old-fashioned."

Hale, introduced by program chairman Earl Warrick, said cable television would provide local residents with the same thing they are now getting, "just more of it."

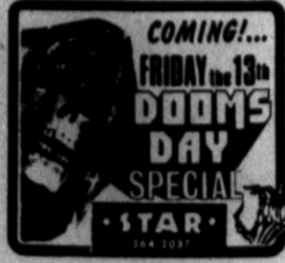
Hale said the reception tower of the cable company is of the best quality and is designed to bring the finest reception.

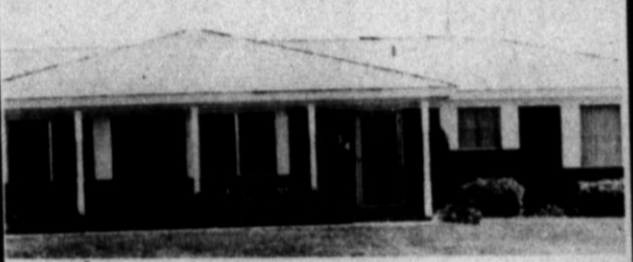

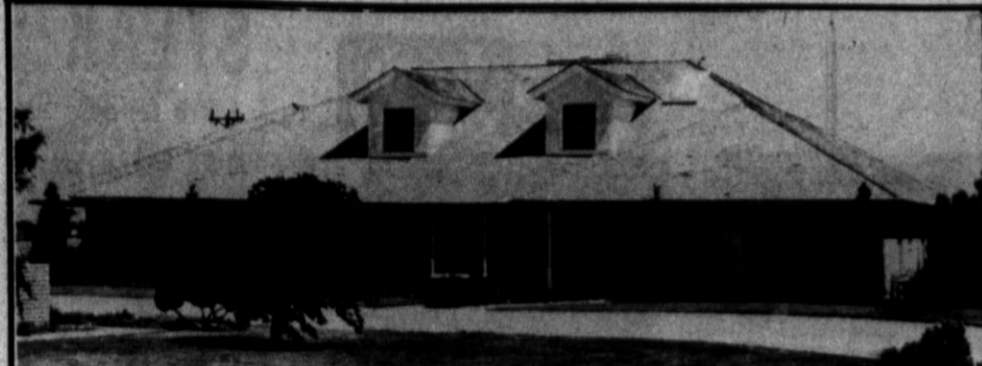

## Wards Helping Customers Learn To Save

Energy Saving Action brochures are helping customers of the Hereford Catalog Wards Store learn how to save energy and money. As part of a nationwide energy program initiated by Wards, red, white and blue brochures with 65 energy-saving tips are being distributed by all Ward locations. In addition, catalogs produced by the company later this year will have identifying symbols to emphasize such energy saving products as microwave ovens, insulation, ventilating equipment, insulated draperies and automotive products.

As an example, Wm. Broxson, manager, points out that according to the Electric Energy Association in New York, for a family of four a microwave oven uses only 300 kilowatts annually compared to 1,175 for a conventional electric oven. Operating costs are \$9.00 compared with \$35.35 (based on 3 cents per kilowatt).

"Large capacity washers and dryers can handle in one load cycle what small washers must do in two loads. This means real savings in the gas or electricity required for power and hot water," Broxson said.

He also stated that American housewives can "save billions of kilowatts daily, by using appliances prudently and by shopping with more discrimination."

Included in the free brochure are tips covering laundry, kitchen and miscellaneous appliances as well as household heating and cooling.

For example, air conditioners need not operate at the maximum setting to achieve efficient cooling. If all air conditioners were set at 75 degrees, instead of the popular 72 degree setting, they would provide adequate cooling while conserving 15 per cent in electric consumption. "For each degree we cool below 75 degrees we expend about five per cent more energy," Broxson said.

Drapes and shades have a major effect on energy conservation. If left open during sunlight hours, 19 per cent more energy is required to cool a home.

In homes and apartments, Broxson recommends unplugging coffee pots when not in use, instead of letting them bubble away. He advises housewives to turn off the iron or the hair dryer when the phone or door bell rings. Don't let the television, stereo or radio play to an empty room.

Proper maintenance increases the serviceable life of products as well as their efficiency. The Energy Saving Action booklet recommends keeping the filter clean in a dryer, the furnace or an air conditioner to improve performance, reduce energy requirements and eliminate the need for many service calls.

Ignoring maintenance can be expensive as well as wasteful. According to Broxson, one drop of hot water per second from a leaky faucet can waste 650 gallons of hot water annually. "And the problem can usually be eliminated with an inexpensive washer you can install yourself."

He emphasized that clean air filters, fuel pumps and spark plugs, properly adjusted carburetors and distributors will substantially increase gas mileage for cars, reduce costs and air pollution.

The company itself is trying to cut down on its own use of energy. In a letter going to all locations, Ward President, Edward S. Donnell, has urged action by every location.

"Inspection of our furnaces, air conditioning units and water heaters should be increased to insure that they are operating efficiently," Donnell stated among eight suggestions listed in the letter.

"In all of our locations we should maintain a temperature of 75 degrees in summer instead of 72 and we should maintain a 72 degree level in winter as well," Donnell explained.

Wards is the first major retailer to take action on the energy crisis and the company hopes others will join in the fight to conserve energy. "We may not have the whole answer," Broxson stated, "but if each of us — consumers, retailers and manufacturers — pitch in, the job will get done."

# Farmcast

Compiled From Sources Of The Texas Department of Agriculture  
 John C. White, Commissioner

Texas Hog Producers Join In . . . Cattle and Calves Marketed Show Increase . . . Above Normal Grazing.

Texas, which is currently 14th in the nation in hog production, is showing a 19 per cent decline in numbers of hogs on farms as of June 1. Nationwide, the number is also down, but by only one per cent.

Hogs kept for breeding purposes on Texas farms totaled 150,000 head, down 18 per cent from a year ago. Market hogs and pigs totaled 810,000 head, down 19 per cent from last year.

Hog farmers in Texas intend to farrow 102,000 sows from now through November; this will be 11 per cent less than farrowings for this period last year. Reasons for the decline include the increased costs of feed and the fact that retail prices are frozen.

The December-May pig crop totaled 729,000 in Texas. This is 18 per cent below the 1972 December-May pig crop. Pigs per litter averaged 7.29 compared to 7.50 last year.

Nationwide, hogs and pigs on farms as of June 1 is down one per cent from a year ago. The December-May 1973 pig crop is estimated at two per cent less than the same period in 1972. Pigs per litter averaged 7.16 compared with 7.32 last year.

Hogs producers intend to farrow 6,000,000 sows now through November, which is virtually unchanged. If intentions are realized and projected pigs per litter are reached, the pig crop will be 43,600,000 head, up one per cent from 1972.

SALES of cattle and calves as well as sheep and goats at auction markets in Texas show an increase compared to a year ago. Hog sales are down from year ago levels, the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service notes.

Cattle and calves marketed through auctions during May numbered 731,000 head, 26 per cent above a year ago, and 70 per cent above a month ago.

Sheep sales at livestock auctions during May at 230,000 head were 37 per cent above a year ago and 191 per cent above a month ago. Goats sold during May at 36,000 head were 24 per cent above last year and 20 per cent above last month.

Hogs sold during May at 41,000 head were 25 per cent below a year ago, but 21 per cent above a month ago.

EXCELLENT moisture conditions over most of Texas are maintaining ranges and pastures in above normal grazing conditions. Livestock condition is good to excellent. Horn flies and ticks have been bothering livestock but weight losses have not been severe. Rains have ruined some curing hay in East Texas but prospects for third and fourth cuttings are outstanding.

Screwworm outbreaks over the state are minimal compared to a year ago when the screwworm situation was completely out of control. Livestock producers are reminded to continue to submit suspected screwworm samples to the fly laboratory at Mission.

VEGETABLE crops are making good progress in the Hereford-High Plains-Panhandle areas. Moderate shipments of potatoes and onions are now underway with heavier supplies expected during the latter half of July.

A market news office has been opened in Hereford.

MANUFACTURED dairy products utilized 23 per cent of the 1972 Texas milk production; nationwide, manufacturer dairy products utilization 52 per cent of the 1972 milk production.

Frozen dessert production in Texas totaled 62,656,000 gallons in 1972. This is one per cent below the 1971 production. Ice cream production was three per cent above the 1971 production in Texas.

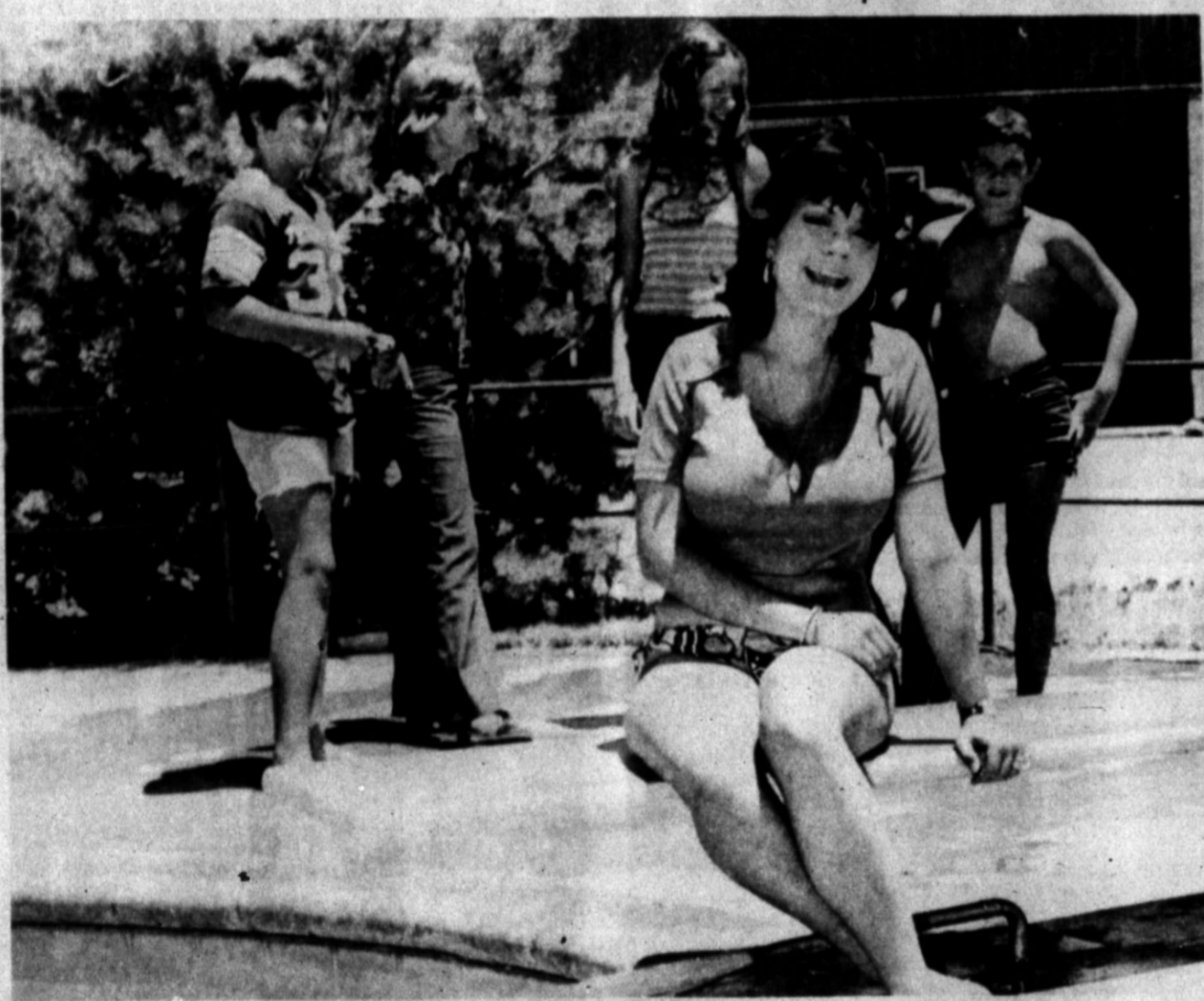
# Miss Hereford Gets Ready For State Pageant

The Rev. Jack Crippen of Texhoma, Okla., will speak of his unusual hotline for troubled youth.

His talk here will concern that work. Slides on the Christian drug treatment house called His Place, which he was instrumental in establishing in Wichita, Kan., will be shown.

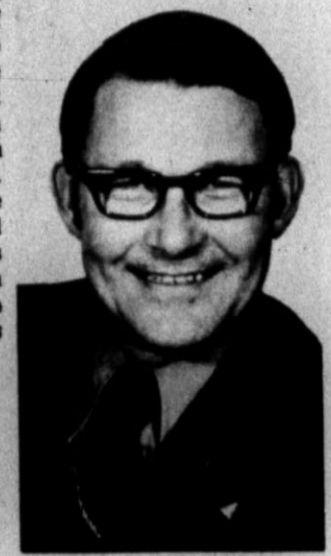
A youth group from various Christian denominations, the Contact Singers, will accompany the speaker to Hereford and assist on the program. They and other young

Called as pastor to Christ the King Lutheran Church in Salina, Kan., two years later, he organized The Concerned Christian group which carried on a house ministry in the black community. In 1970 he was asked by all the Lutheran Churches to begin a new ministry in the slums of Wichita.

There he began the hotline called Someone Who Cares in the basement of his home, and was a leader in starting a faith mission which established His Place.

# By the Garden Gate

With Glad

"Wherever flowers cannot be reared, there man cannot live". Napoleon Bonaparte.

While in France, it was my pleasure to visit the gardens of Napoleon Bonaparte. He and his wife were gardeners. He liked to have many trees and near them long paths where he could walk, with his hands behind his back and think! and think! and plan some of the strategy of coming battles.

His wife's favorite flower was the rose, and she grew many varieties. She planned and had the gardeners make trellis for the running roses and some of these had been preserved throughout the years and were still in use. The paths were bordered with violas in rich, warm colors.

The guides told us many interesting and fascinating incidents, also problems the Bonapartes had in keeping their gardens. Tradition is that she caught her death of a cold while working in the garden in the early spring months, developed pneumonia and soon died.

We all have our share of garden problems. This has been a most unusual year. Have had many calls and questions relative to diseases, insects and fungi.

Seems there is an enunymous scale which is causing much anxiety and extra garden chores. This can be controlled but it will take perseverance and systematic treatments to control it.

The following suggestion is one that we all should write in our garden calendar, as it is a preventative measure and if used will aid greatly. It is: do dormant spraying.

Time to do this is just before the plants wake up from their winter sleep (the dormant period) and start the new spring growth. Plants can stand a stronger spray than during the growing season, and such a spray is useful to get hard-shell insects like scales and to kill eggs that have been laid during the growing season.

Others have asked about ridding lawns of dandelions without damage to the lawn or nearby shrubs. This may be done by attacking the plants individually. Mix a solution according to label directions of Weed-No-More or Weed-Be-Gone, in a gallon glass jug. Purchase an applicator that will fit the jug. Early morning is a good time to apply the mixture, as the blossoms are easily seen. When discovered give each dandelion a charge of the mixture in the center of the plant.

I have learned by experience that if the heart of the dandelion is bruised a bit, that the mixture will take effect quicker. Caution: Be patient, because this method requires from a few days to two weeks, depends on the weather.

Store remaining mixture and use daily. As long as seeds are blowing around and new plants are showing up, it will be necessary to continue treatment. If this is done, one can have a dandelion-free lawn. Yes, it takes persistence but it pays off.

**CAUTION:** Extra care should be exercised when using fertilizer containing herbicides (weedkillers) or other sprays or treatments near trees and shrubs. And do not make it too strong, follow directions carefully.

The difficulty arises in defining what is meant by "near". Roots of many trees and shrubs extend well beyond their "drip-line." Consequently, any heavy rain or watering can wash these chemicals into the roots of trees, shrubs and sometimes vegetables. Results are extremely damaging.

Several years ago one of my garden friends called me and said she had a tree that looked like it was sick. . . she had watered, sprayed carefully, and it was growing in an area where rocks or gravel had been placed.

I inquired whether she had treated any of the nearby shrubs or trees and if the drain from them would tend to go towards the tree which appeared to be sick. She said she didn't think so, but later she called back and said that she had treated a nearby tree and that the rain had reached the tree which had been damaged.

Advice was to prune off the damaged area lightly, add new soil around the roots of the tree and spray with solution with traces of iron, and water well. To continue treatment if needed. This helped to save the tree but development was not as good because of the damage. So use care with sprays, fertilizers etc.

**TO RESTRAIN GRASS:** Most of us have areas where it is very difficult to edge grass. Around foundations, under chain link fence or at the base of trellises the grass is hard to control.

Vera Deason suggests that if naptha is used in a tank type sprayer, using low to moderate pressure, that grass can be controlled. It will be necessary to be consistent with this, perhaps 4 to 6 weeks between spraying.

Also use care to keep from getting the naptha on tender bark or leaf surfaces of nearby plants. Use just enough to wet the grass and undesirable weeds and plants.

**SUGGESTIONS:** Keep a watchful eye on the chrysanthemums. If growth is stunted they will have hard woody stems and flowering will be stunted. If the tops haven't been

clipped on large mums, this should be done so the plant will not become top heavy, and will give more strength to the proper development of foliage and blossoms.

Do not allow coleus or caladiums to suffer from lack of moisture. If caladiums are allowed to become extremely dry they will go dormant and the foliage will die.

Water thoroughly but not excessively. Allow soil to become dry before watering again. This encourages deeper root penetration and aids in plant growth and proper development.

**LOOK ABOUT YOU . . .** There are many beautiful spots in Hereford. The mimosa trees are very pretty. They add that certain something to a landscape design.

Yesterday afternoon while driving around I noted the very attractive tree at Sissons', 114 Liveoak, also the mimosa is lovely at the Coup home, 300 West Haven Drive, and don't fail to go by and see the largest one in town, at the Viegel home.

On east Third Street, there is a wheelbarrow filled with beautiful flowering petunias. A nice thing about this is that it can be moved to different locations in the yard. Would make a lovely attraction for a party on the patio.

The vegetable garden at 428 Schley is a very refreshing sight. The gardener has done a wonderful job. Plants have good color, show excellent growth patterns and color.

And of course the promise of delicious fresh vegetables, makes one's mouth water. What is better than green beans, with small fresh potatoes, sliced tomatoes, cornbread and buttermilk?

The hemerocallis (daylilies) are beautiful. There are many very effective plantings throughout town. The colors are so planted that there is a very pretty blend in color harmony. The hemerocallis is easy to grow, and is adaptable to many landscape designs. Foliage is attractive, when plants are not in flower.

Congratulations to those who won the Beauty Spot of the Month. It is always interesting and challenging to see these lovely places. Color harmony at the Sigle Home, 135 Star, is very lovely, as is the attractiveness added by landscaping around the office building of the Swayzes.

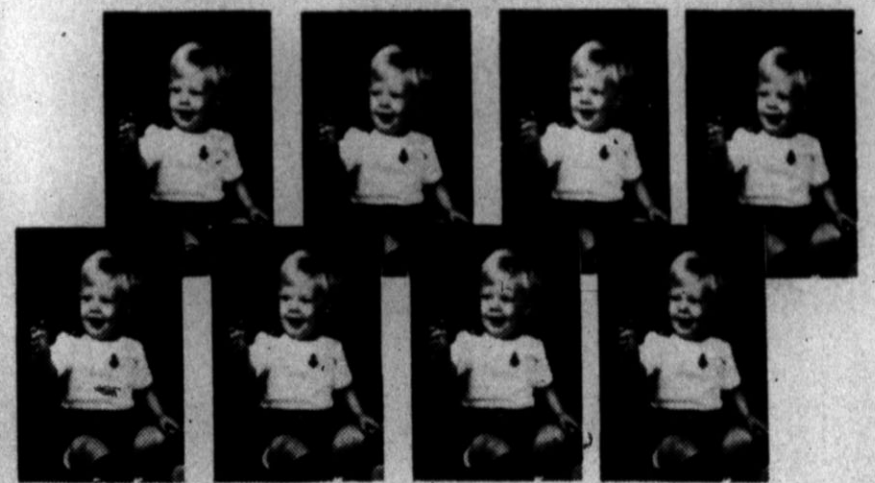

## Time For All Interests Is Retirement Reward

AFTER TEACHING 23 years, Mrs. J. D. Neill states she is looking forward with enthusiasm to retirement.

"I'll have the opportunity to do many of the things that I've never really had the time to do before," says the Hereford woman who was one of the local school system's retiring faculty members this spring.

Receiving her first teaching assignment at Van Horn, she later taught at Higgins for four years and in the Hereford school system for 18 years.

DON'T EVER TELL a woman it is impossible to identify an antique. Especially if the woman is of the strong and determined nature as June Dearing.

She'll get the identity, if it takes six years, six months and five days. This is exactly the time it has taken to learn the name and use of The Thing.

In a load of metal the Dearing bought in 1967 for their iron and metal business, there was an apparatus that stumped the pros as to what was it.

Tom Draper asked the help of Sloan Osborn, Edwin "Goose" Ramey, Bess Werner and not telling how many more for identification. Here's what these folks decided it was not: it was not a bottle capper, nor a punch, nor a leather brad, nor a harness clamp nor a part of a loom.

EVERY DAY, MRS. Dearing would look at this unidentified object and wonder. One day she was heard to mutter: "I'll find out what it is or else—" She copied ITSG-2T6-EUREKA-6TSE and to strengthen the case sent pictures to the Chamber of Commerce, Ashland, Ohio, a name barely visible.

In no time at all, here came the reply, "The Ashland Manufacturing Company went out of business during the late 1930's or early 40's."

"The item you have was used back when people stored their automobiles during the winter months and did not attempt to drive during freezing weather.

"A jack (Folks, there it is!) such as you have was placed under each wheel to take the weight off the tires. Also, the radiator was drained, oil was added to the upper engine block,

etc., in order to protect the automobile while it was in storage."

After six years, six months and five days, wagers, disagreements, arguments and much idle chatter, it now sounds so simple. We wish we had guessed what it was, so we could feel superior.

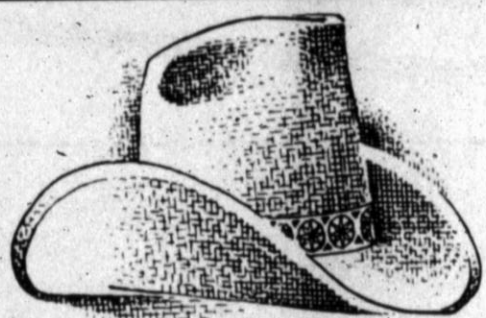
**Girlstown Sets

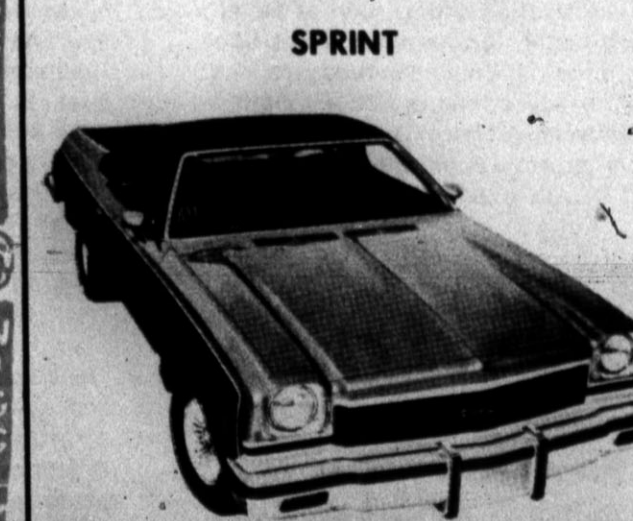

**Crime Stalks Business**

Occasionally we see news references to the "infiltration" of some business or other by organized crime. Have you ever wondered exactly what that means? How it's done?

These things are important for the businessman to know, so he can be on guard. They are important, too, for all citizens to know, because employees often become unfortunate pawns in an underworld take-over attempt.

The simplest and most obvious kind of take-over is the legitimate purchase of a business, using the proceeds of crime to pay. The business can then be used as a front through which ill-gotten funds are channeled to "launder" them. Businesses that deal mostly in cash are favored for this purpose, since cash transactions are more difficult for authorities to audit.

But suppose the owner doesn't want to sell? Or the price is too high? Well, as the saying goes, there are ways.

**THE MAFIA** uses gambling and loan sharks to hook its fish. Ideally, the victim is the owner or an employee with access to company inventory, or company funds, or both.

It's an old story. The victim makes a few small bets. Maybe just playing the numbers. Nothing big. But he gets "lucky." Gradually the bets increase. Then the luck changes. He tries to recover the lost money with bigger bets.

Soon, he's hopelessly in debt and being pressed for payment. Since no responsible lending institution would make a loan under these circumstances, the loan shark is the only place to turn.

**THE LOAN SHARK** is part of the trap. His loans carry rates of interest that are impossible to meet.

The victim may think of theft or embezzlement on his own. If not, his creditors will spell it out for him.

They'll also provide the market for stolen goods.

Now the victim's employer begins to feel the loss. Profits fall off. Money seems to be leaking away. And it is.

**IF THE** company takes too much of a loss before finding the cause, it will eventually be in the same position as the hapless employee: When everything else fails, there's always the loan shark.

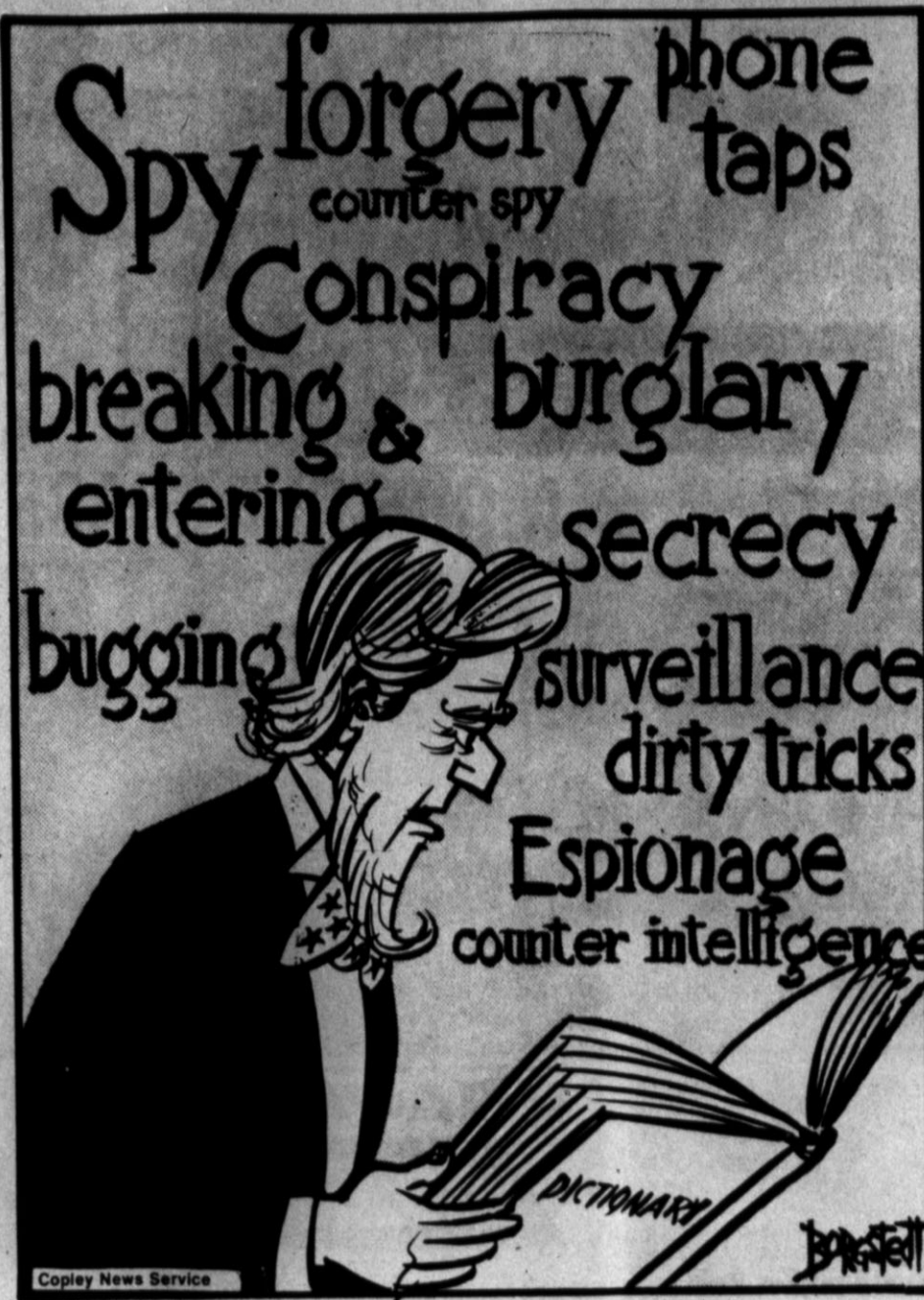
Thus, the once-prosperous company, brought to the verge of bankruptcy, is forced to sell out at a bargain price, or simply required to accept a "silent partner" who will thereafter run the business. Either way, it will cease to be a legitimate business. Worse still, it will henceforth be competing with other legitimate businesses, using for its capital untaxed funds readily available from its underworld connections.

This process is one of the subtlest and most insidious forms of take-over. Pressure is still applied in cruder forms, such as direct threats to life and property, although that style is falling from favor because it tends to give crime a bad name.

**EITHER WAY**, the object is always to get the camel's nose under the tent first. Just one little bet. Just one little favor. What's the harm?

Most victims are little guys. But none is too big. A few years ago, the giant A&P corporation was asked to carry an inferior detergent in its stores. To its everlasting credit, it refused. Several A&P stores were burned. But the company stood firm, the Justice Department put its famous "strike forces" on the case, and the heat became too much for the local Mafia family.

Saying "no" the first time takes wisdom and even courage. But it's a lot easier than trying to say "no" after the trap has closed.

My ability to convey intelligent comment concerning the Watergate Case is greatly hindered by the confusion of my mind concerning the entire issue.

However, I've seen many other people speak out on Watergate without letting their ignorance bother them so why should I?

**ALMOST EVERYONE** is complaining about the tremendous amount of coverage given to the Watergate issue and the Senate hearings. However, I personally wish I had time to watch the proceedings because it interests me very much.

I enjoy hearing the gossip — and much of it is just that — surrounding the case and coming from the Senate hearing. However, I think it is unfortunate for the many good politicians who have been — and will be in the future — tainted with the hearsay of the case.

**IF THE** Senate hearings are to continue I think it would be in the best interests of justice to see Chairman Sam Ervin tighten the rules some — much like in a courtroom — and put a stop to the gossip, argument among lawyers, and hearsay evidence that comes out.

Getting your name mentioned in the same breath as Watergate could mean the end of your political career. The effect at the polls could be the same as it was in Texas when so many names were linked to Sharpstown.

**WHAT REALLY** surprises me about the developments in the case is the involvement of so many attorneys. It seems very unusual to me that so many law-minded men could have left themselves open to so much wrongdoing.

I have always had the highest respect for the court system in the United States, the judges and



the lawyers for both sides — state and defense. Attorneys across the nation, as those in Hereford, have always impressed me with their thorough knowledge of law and of the true workings of our entire governmental system. That's why I can't imagine the lawyers involved in the Watergate issue letting things go so far.

**ALMOST** everyone has heard of Watergate by now and realizes that it may involve scandal at the national level. However, a lot of people failed to get in on the first of the news and really don't know where the word "Watergate" originated or exactly how the mess got started.

In the beginning there was a man named Frank Wills — a man whom most people never heard of or have forgotten about. He is the man that really started Watergate.

**WILLS** was a security guard in the plush Watergate Building complex in Washington, D.C.

On the night of June 17, 1972, Wills was making his rounds and noticed a basement door with tape over the latch. Assuming workmen had done it, he removed the tape and continued his patrols.

On his second round Wills found the tape had been replaced and this time called police. Officers searched the building and arrested five men inside Democratic headquarters in an office of the building. The rest is news media history. Wills, 25, received a \$5-a-week raise after the arrests. However, it unnerved him enough that he quit his job for another security job where he makes \$85 a week.

**WILLS MADE** a statement recently that I feel is one of the best I've heard in connection with the issue:

"There is a breakdown in the political system. The American people are not aware of what is really happening. I've seen it firsthand, and it's opened my eyes real wide. I feel sorry for the people who look at Watergate and say it's just politics."

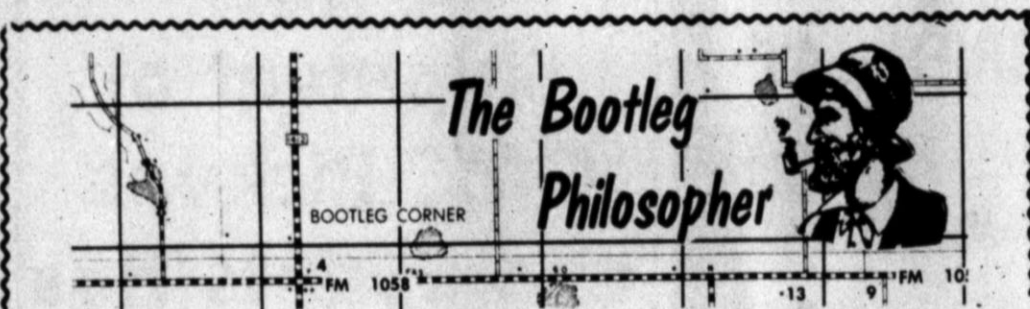

I guess at the top of a long list of things I don't understand and never expect to is international relations, especially summit meetings.

As I recall the events of the past few years, President Nixon first went to Red China. Then, to keep things in balance, he went to Communist Russia. Russia and China are nervous about each other and you can't visit one without visiting the other.

**LAST WEEK** Chairman Brezhnev visited the U.S., and as soon as he left, Washington announced Kissinger would go to China to reassure that country everything is still all right.

When he left here, Brezhnev went to Paris to assure President Pompidou that Russia wasn't making any deals

with the U.S. at France's expense. Now won't he have to come back over here to assure us he didn't make any deals with France?

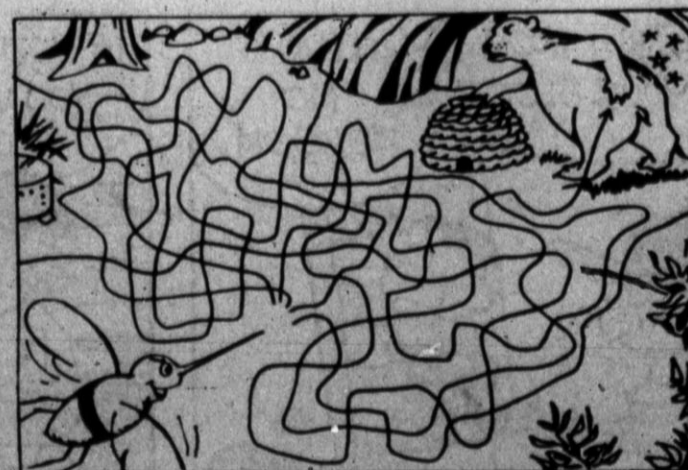
