





Persian Gulf politics

In backing the Indian invasion of East Pakistan, the Soviet Union bought itself and India a whole host of problems they will be incapable of

Certainly Soviet-Indian collaboration did not represent a threat to the vital interests of the United States, Vand, as we have said before, there was very little reason for the United States to consider direct intervention.

But that does not mean that Soviet adventurism has ceased to present a problem to the United States and to its allies. There is some danger that Russia's conception that it has won a victory on the Indian subcontinent will embolden its militarists to risk other

Unhappily, their next target might prove to be the Persian Gulf. And there the vital interests of the Western allies would be affected to a dangerous degree Russia's top political leaders would do well to try to restrain their military men from running such a

The Soviet awareness of the potential for fomenting trouble in the Persian Gulf is all too evident. Marshal Andrei A. Grechko, the Soviet defense minister, is just making an official visit to Iraq, no doubt to discuss that country's military needs and attitudes. While there, he is visiting the Iraq port of Basra, where Soviet warships cruising the Persian Gulf call to take on supplies and fuel.

While Marshal Grechko's visit has been interpreted in some quarters as another attempt to apply pressure to Israel, the stop at Basra is indicative of an interest in Iraq's eastern border, with Iran and the Persian Gulf,

What is tempting about the Persian Gulf is a political vacuum of sorts brought about by British withdrawal, due for completion at the end of this year, from its responsibilities over the small Arab "trucial states" at the southern end of the gulf. The six states have formed an independent federation, but are hardly a political entity capable of self-defense.

Iran has moved partly into the vacuum by seizing three small islands at the mouth of the gulf, off the coast of the newly formed federation. It thus incurred renewed enmity from its usually unfriendly neighbor, Iraq. Interestingly, oil-rich Kuwait also protested. Even more interestingly, Libya joined in, retaliating not against Iran, but Britian. It seized Libyan properties of British Petroleum Corp. and withdrew its money from London banks.

Naturally, this kind of unstable situation appeals to the Russians as it might seem to offer potential for exploitation. Yet further Soviet Wvolvement in the sensitive affairs of the Persian Gulf could set back the cause of improved East-West relations immeasurably. The Persian Gulf is simplytoo important to the major industrial

Western Europe draws nearly half of its oil from the nations that border the Persian Gulf. Japan gets nearly-80 per cent of its oil from the region. Neither the NATO countries nor Japan could look with equanimity upon any Soviet-Iraqi effort to apply political pressures to Iran and the other Persian Gulf countries.

However the equities of the Indian-Pakistan war are viewed-and there is plenty of blame to be bestowed on both sides-there can be little doubt that Soviet backing for India played a role in bringing it about, just as Soviet backing for Egypt played a role in the 1967 six-day war with Israel. As long as there is a Soviet presence lurking behind outbreaks of shooting wars it will be hard to believe Soviet claims that it wants improved relations with other nations of the world.

And if the next hot spot should prove to be the Persian Gulf, the consequence of Soviet adventurism could prove to be most serious. -Wall Street Journal

Government offers bonuses in program

tested by the U.S. Office of Ed- San Antonio, Texas, the cost of the experiment this year is budgeted at \$770,000. The school board in Cincinnati, Ohio, rejected payments to parents, and funds are not available to pay the parental bonus in the fourth test city, Jacksonville, Florida. A teacher could earn up to \$1,200 extra if her class improves, and parents up to \$100 per child. Since about half the families are on welfare, the bonus money will come in handy. Practically all of the children involved are black or Mexican-Americans, All are far below average in reading and arithmetic and are in grades 1 through 6. About 2,400 children are involved, and there is a con-

> trol group of similar size. Tests will be made before. during, and after the program. More than half the cost of the experiment will be spent on interviewing and analyzing results, aided by computers. Only \$319,000 is earmarked to go to teachers and parents. Most of the rest will go to two Washington research firms which will assess the results.

Paying Parents Is New Awarding bonuses to successful teachers in not new, although it is controversial and opposed by some teachers' unions which are against "merit pay." However, rewarding parents because their children amprove their grades appears to be a novel idea.

Actually bonuses will not be paid on an individual basis. The entire class average will have to climb before the cash register is rung. Full bonuses will be paid only for a 30 per cent improvement. Teachers might receive as little as \$150 per subject for a lower rate of improvement, and parents only \$12.50 per subject.

Payments will not be made until the school years ends next June. In fact, no contracts had been signed in early December because no funds had been appropriated. However, verbal agreements have been made with the selected school boards and with the research firms, pending formal action later.

For the same reason, the program has not been publicized yet. However, the hassel in Cincinnati over bonuses to parents led to one national newspaper story. Officials in Washington are reluctant to talk about the subject at this point and have no literature to make available to inquiring reporters.

TRADITIONS THAT LIVE-This year, as they have since 1885, ranch hands from a large area of West Texas will gather in Anson, Jones County, for their famous "Cowboys" Christmas Ball."

It was started 86 years ago purely as a business venture An Anson innkeeper, M. H. Rhodes, needed to increase patronage at his Morning Star Hotel and hit on the dance as a way of getting it. He invited lonely cowhands from miles around to come into the hotel for a holiday dance. The ball was so successful that Rhodes decided to make it an annual event.

In 1893, William Lawrence Chittenden, who ranched near Anson, wrote his famous poem, "The Cowboy's Christmas Ball," to include in his book, "Ranch Verses." The book went into 16 editions, and the dance at Anson became a part of the nation's folklore.

SANTA'S HELPERS-Texas has one of four plants in the United States that manufacture those giant decorations used by cities and business firms to brighten streets and buildings during the holiday season.

Though Greeks have been master mariners since the dawn of history, and Greek-owned ships ply the world's trades routes, Greece only recently acquired a modern shipbuilding industry Today, however, the Hellenic Shipyards Co., owned by shipping magnate Stavros Niarchos, provide Greece with one of the finest ship construction facilities in the world, capable of making Greece one of the principal shipbuilding nations,

Since Skaramanga commenced operations in 1968, it has been turning out new vessels at a rapid rate. The initial construction effort was aimed at building 15,000-ton SD-14 freighters, simple, modern replacements for the aging World War II Liberty ships which earned fortunes for Greek ships owners. Twenty-seven of this type were ordered and twentytwo have been delivered. One of these trim merchantmen is being outfitted as I tour the shipyard and another is in a final construction stage. Skaramanga also has specialized in building 35,000-ton bulk carriers for service in areas inaccessible to the giant bulkers.

But Hellenic Shipyards is aiming at construction of the largest ships. It has received orders for six 300,000-ton supertankers. And its giant graving dock can accommodate vessels up to 250,000 tons. In addition, Skaramanga, shortly will commence building marine diesel engines under license from

Like other major shipyards around the world, Skaramanga depends heavily on repair work. This new shipyard has plenty of work. Its floating docks and outfitting piers are jammed with tankers being grit-blasted, painted and overhauled. This is the largest shipyard in the Mediterranean. Its major competition comes from a big shipyard at Lisbon, Portugal, Even the Bulgarians, traditional foes of Greece, send ships here for repair and Skaramanga recently repaired several warships in the U.S. Sixth Fleet.

The Hellenic Shipyard's huge investment in docks, plate shops and other facilities is based on the conviction that the demand for ocean-going vessels, especially the giants, will continue throughout the 1970's and 1980's. This is a reasonable belief, for the industrialized nations of the world have rapidly increasing energy and raw material needs. At the moment, Skaramanga lacks the know-how to build giant carriers for liquified gas, but they intend to develop the skill, for that type of vessel will be in great demand in the future.

In order to operate this shipyard, the owners had to train their work force almost from scratch. The Greek' shipyards in existence prior to 1968 had few employes. Skaramanga takes men out of rural villages and trains them in welding and other marine construction specialties. They have trained them so well that Skaramanga is competitive with Japanese shipyards that have long experience in mass, low-cost con-

The key ingredients in Skaramanga's success are modern shipyard layout, the best European machine tools and facilities, and low-cost labor, plus an absence of labor strife.

Labor costs for a skilled workman at Skaramanga average a little over \$7 a day, in startling contrast to the United States where a unionized workman may earn much more than that in one hour. Clearly, the wage gap places the U.S. at an impossible competitive disadvantage. It is hard to see how the U.S. can retain a shipbuilding capacity in future except on a subsidized basis or as an adjunct of naval programs. Moreover, this Greek shipyard, like other shipyards in Japan, Portugal, Scandinavia and elsewhere, isn't faced with expensive disruptions by strikes. Greek shipyards workers also give a full day's work for a day's pay, which can't be said of many U.S. workers. In addition, U.S. shipyards are slowed down by rigid job classifications. A member of one union can't be switched to a job outside his classification. At Skaramanga, workers can be assigned to jobs as they are needed,

Very dim future

las of the would-be new state to exact galis for their collaboration with the Pakistan authorities before the Indian invasion. The hatreds must be intense, considering the fact that the Pakistani army slaughtered thousands of Bengalis and uprooted several million more. It should be remembered that the army was itself exacting retribution after Bengali guerrilla attacks on army units, but few sane persons would argue that it was justified in the way it dealt with the Bengalis.

The mind boggles at the tragedies that have beset the hapless Bengalis, but the tragedies are partly of their own making. Even before the unwise decisions in 1947 that awarded part of Bengal to a distant capital in West Pakistan, the area was beset with strife and human suffering. Calcutta, a part of India but the cultural capital of the Bengalis, perhaps contains more misery than any other city in the world.

Thus, Bangla Desh, with little indigenous leadership, hordes of displaced people and few economic prospects. can hardly look forward to the dawning of a bright new ear. Even if the raging animosities between Bengalis and non-Bengalis can-somehow be submerged, possibly by the occupying troops of India, there still will be the enormous economic and social probof refugees who fled the Pakistani army's repression.

The new Bangla Desh almost certainly will be very heavily dependent upon India, with a sort of protectorate status, for some time to come. Given the racial and cultural differences that exist between the Bengalis and the Indians, this relationship could wear. thin, too, after a period of time.







Wrap the styrofoam base with these days, an inexpensive satin ribbon about two inches wide, and in the color of your-choice. This finishes off the back of the wreath, in an attractive manner, and to further secure the materials, when they are pushed through the ribbon into the base. Secure the ribbon with long pins.

Then the next thing to do is to prepare by grooming the evergreens selected.

This is a good way to prune the evergreens both the needled and the broadleat, and it will not harm the trees or shrubs at all. Cut the lower branches first, then trim for tips and other greens as needed. If you do not have trees old enough to cut, then borrow or get some from the neighbors who have older

To condition the greens they should be previously cut, cleaned of residue, and cut with a long slanted cut, and submerge this cut into the treated water for-several hours.


Snip greens into small bunches and wire each bunch to a small florist's pick or one made yourself. Move in a clockwise direction, cover base by inserting the picks through the ribbon into the base. Use care in covering well, and give added attention to the sides so the wreath will look well formed and complete.

Other than evergreens dried or treated materials can be used, such as seed pods, cones, nuts, fruit, dried flower heads, acorns, pine cones (these can be cut in cross section which adds attraction to wreath). Be creative and make your design attractive and original.

When completed spray with clear plastic for added sheen, Bows of waterproof or outdoor ribbon should be used or a large grouping of cones, flower heads, or other interesting bits of materials can be used as center of interest on the wreath.

Therefore, it is my responsibility, not only to myself, but to the rest of the people of the world, to continue in this fight in any way that I am able.

I cannot expect others to fight for my freedom, nor can others expect me to fight for theirs, even though I am willing to do so if nessary Freedom is everyohe's responsibility and patriotic duty.

True, we must fight in order to retain freedom, but it is not so that the only way is the taking up of arms. The very idea of freedom is that each man, woman and child has the right to choose their own way of life for themselves and not to have it dictated to them.

Taking up of arms to defend anyone's freedom is often necessary, but to do so with the intent of forcing a way of life onto a people against their will accomplishes little but to take away their freedom.

One way in which I can help now is to encourage and practice the acts of giving and loving to my fellowmen, whoever he is. and whereveer he may be found.

My country as well as others is beset not only by eternal war but internal strife as well. In the United States there are groups at work that would destroy our free government and set another in its place.

These same groups are also at work outside the United States and they would destroy all types of free government, everywhere it is found.

It is my responsibility, therefore, if at all possible to combat these groups, by fighting them not only with guns but also with the help of organizations that were formed for a different task than the one of destruction of freedom, the task of preservation of freedom.

These organizations can be found in every country in the world, striving to either lead a country to freedom or helping to keep it on the road of freedom. In any way they are able, these organizations put into practice loving and giving to the people of various countries.

When there is hope to avoid war these groups teach people about love, respect, dignity and trust. But the most important lesson they attempt to teach is the one of freedom.

When a country declares its independence, they are there to love and instruct, and in being there they bring the joy and responsibility that only freedom can give to these people. I am proud that it is within my power to help support these groups, that in doing so I preserve my own freedom and that of the rest of the world.

Many people doubt that there is any reason to worry about the. protection of freedom so they donate to these organizations only for income tax loopholes. I often wonder if these people ever stop to think about the privilege to getting to pay income tax.

While it is true that the people in Russia do not pay income tax, do they really have anything to tax? Think about it. How many of the people who complain about income taxes would be willing to give up all their personal property and guaranteed rights. just to get out of income tax?

Freedom may mean such inpleasant things as paying taxes and being subject to the draft, but it also means that I have the freedom of speech with the right to express my convictions, freedom of the press, freedom to worship God as I plaese, the right to a fair trial by an unbiased jury and even the freedom to give this speech.

Yes, freedom is a responsbility, but it is one that I would not like to do without,




