Those were the words of D. C. Martin, principal of Aikman Elementary School, who will be honored Dec. 13 as the local system's "Outstanding Administrator of the Year."

Martin's father, who passed away just last week, was a teacher for 50 years and Martin's mother also was a teacher. These things, he said, played a major role in his choosing the teaching profession — a profession he has been in for 43 years.

In the 43 years he has been associated with the Hereford system for 24 years. He has been with only one other system and that was in Oklahoma.

He came to Hereford in 1947 as a history teacher at the high school level. Before coming to Hereford he was superintendent of an Oklahoma school but wanted to get away from the administrator's position back into the teaching profession.

"It didn't work out that way, though," he recalled. "The principal at Central school moved to Lubbock and they asked me to take over that position until they could find someone else. Well, they never did find anyone else, I guess, because

Building permits falter; drop seen in yearly total

Hereford's 1971 build in g surge, which was keeping pace with last year's near-record ending, fell off during the month of November.

Construction in the city totaled only \$209,300 for November of this year as compared to the November, 1970 total of \$327,000.

The decline over the same period last year dropped the yearly total to \$3,211,550. This is well below the November total of last year of \$3,615,500.

Some 24 permits were issued during November for consturction purposes and nine of those were for the building of homes in the \$15,000 to \$25,000 range. The permit for the \$25,000 home was the largest single permit issued during the month.

The 24 permits of November compare with the 30 issued a year ago which included 17 for construction of new homes.

Over the past several years a nome-start surge has continued in Hereford and last year 169 permits for the construction of new homes were issued through the latter part of November, At that time Hereford was one of the top home-building cities in West Texas, easily surpassing some of the larger cities in the

The only city last year to begin construction of more new homes than Hereford was Ama-

This surge in new homes seems to have slacked off considerably over the past 11 months and this is reflected in the total in building permits for

the year. Last year the city had its second largest year in construction with \$5,137,800 in permits issued. That year was topped only by the 1965 total which zoomed

to \$5,313,100. However, last year was helped considerably by a \$1.3 million permit issued for the construction of a housing complex in northeast Hereford.

THE BRASS RING By Bill Mauldin

Bill Mauldin, America's most widely read editorial cartoonist, shelves of Deaf Smith County has written an autobiographical account of 10 years in the life of a cheerful delinquent whose character was formed in such places as a Mexican mining town, an Arizona desert homein the vivid word pictures of his stead, and a New Mexico mountain apple farm.

He survived a broken home cept Sunday on the first floor of full of loving but combative relatives and came down out of the hills at the age of 13 in the fourth year of the Great Depression, bearing a drawing tablet which bore but one commandment: "Thou shalt win."

In the course of his next wild decade he became a free-lance sign-painter and was thrown into jail at 15 while riding a the Sun-Times. freight train to an assignment as a sports artist for a highschool paper. At 17, he made his way to Chicago to study art, drawing magazine gags and washing dishes for meals.

As a building political cartoonist at 18, he worked both sides of an Arizona gubernatorial contest, which led logically to a rea year and a half before Pearl

Driven by an amibtion to a chieve recognition as a warc artoonist he succeeded so spectacularly that General George Patton, infuriated by Mauldin's satire, wanted to court-martial him while other eminent generals in the field applauded him as a morale-builder and gave him his own jeep for traveling a. very real and frightening ways. bout the front

got married, and helped put out an incredible weekly called the 45th Division News, which flouted policy, never printed officer's pictures, and supported itself in Sicily through such devices as stealing zinc coffin linings for engravings.

Eventually assigned to Stars and Stripes, the huge overseas army daily, and reprinted regularly in hundreds of U.S. papers, Mauldin, still a sergeant in uniform, won his first Pulitzer Prize before he was 23, became the youngest biographee in Who's Who, and realized the success he had sought, even as

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the war and the men who had fought it got under his skin.

Wounded once and scared often, he prowled the foxholes with his pencil, learning new values and maturing from a gag cartoonist to a satirist of such depth and stature that he is still considered the best of all war car-

His career was summed up by an army historian who recently remarked: "There will never be another Mauldin. The Pentagon will never let him happen again."

In the quarter century since this chronicle's end. Mauldin, still irreverent in attitude and fresh in outlook, has won another Pulitzer Prize and a closetful of other professional awards. He has covered two more

wars-Korea and Vietnam-as a correspondent: appears daily in almost 300 newspapers around the world; has fathered six sons; authored 10 previous volumes, two of which were Book-of-the-Month Club selections; and has become a skilled airplane pilot and photographer.

A high-school-non-graduate, he has two honorary doctorates and is an honorary master of arts. He lives with his second wife, Natalie, in Santa Fe, and in Chicago, where his base paper is

No Ouestions Asked

Many a conscientious husband seeks peace of mind by buying life insurance to protect his family in case he dies.

But he may also have a nagging worry: will the insurance company really pay off when the time comes, or will it find some flaw making the policy null and

To cut this worry to a minimum, most policies now contain what is known as an "incontestable clause." Under this clause, after a stated period (usually two years), the insurance company can no longer raise technical ob-



jections about the validity of the policy. It must generally pay off

with no questions asked." Suppose, for example, that a man applying for insurance fails to mention the fact that he has a drinking problem. And suppose, after his death, the insurance company finds out about it. Under the incontestable clause, the company could not raise this point to escape paying the insurance to the widow.

In fact, the incontestable clause applies in most states even if the applicant told a deliberate lie. Take this case:

A man filling out an insurance application was asked if he was in good health. He said he waseven though he knew he had serious heart trouble.

After his death, the insurance company tried to cancel the policy on grounds of fraud. But a court ruled that, despite the fraud, the company would still have to pay off-because more than two years had gone by. As one judge explained:

"Even though dishonest people are given advantages under incontestable clauses, still the sense of security given to the great majority of honest policyholders makes it worth the cost."

But not even an incontestable clause will help if the fraud involves the very existence of the policy. Thus:

A man suffering from tuberculosis managed to get life insurance by sending a healthy friend to take the medical examination for him. After the man died, the insurance company found out about the trick and denied liability.

The widow tried to rely on the incontestable clause, but a court ruled that there had never been an insurance contract in the first place. The court said that on one basic fact, the identity of the insured person, there was never a "meeting of the minds."

Shopping Cart Casualties

Myrtle picked out a shopping cart at the market, placed her baby son in the front seat, buckled the strap and made her way to the vegetable section. But as she was examing the lettuce, the child burst through the strap and fell to the floor.

In short order, Myrtle sued the store for damages. She said the strap was so badly worn that it should have been replaced.

"That is possible," countered the company, "but it is also possible that the child put excessive strain on the strap. She admits she was not looking at him at



the moment he fell, so she just does not know how hard he was

Nevertheless, the court held the store liable. The judge said the strap should have been sturdy enough to withstand all the pres-

sure a baby was likely to exert.
In supplying shopping carts to its customers, a store must live up to basic standards of safety. Furthermore, it must keep a reasonably watchful eye on the way the carts are handled.

In another case, a small boy began trundling a cart briskly through the aisles, even though he could hardly see where he was going. Finally, coming around a corner, he slammed into a startled woman shopper.

Here, too, the management was held liable. The court pointed out that the boy had been circulating for more than 10 minutes, time enough for employees to bring him to a halt.

Still, a store is not liable if the accident cannot be traced in some way to its negligence. Take

A woman suffered a sprained finger when the shopping cart she was pushing came to a sudden stop. It seems that a stray piece of string had somehow gotten tangled around a wheel, locking

But when she filed suit for damages, a court could find no grounds for blaming the management. The court said this was the kind of an accident that would simply have to be chalked up to bad luck. As one judge put it:

"The shopper bears some of the hazards of life inside a supermarket as well as outside."

Dozing Driver

Too little sleep, like too much liquor, can turn even the mildest motorist into a deadly menace. If a driver dozes off and has an accident, is he legally liable for



The law starts with the proposition that no one should be blamed for what he does while unconscious. Blame rests on free will misused-and the sleeping person is not using free will at

But one court after another has nonetheless imposed liability on the dozing driver. They find him negligent not for what he does while asleep but for disregarding, while still awake, the telltale signs that sleep was

"It is true," said one court, "that (the driver) can not ordinarily fix the precise moment when he lapses into unconsciousness. But it is not true that ordinarily sleep comes unheralded. It lies within his own control to keep awake or cease driving."

Background factors, contribut ing to the danger, are also taken into account. One driver had been at the wheel continuously for 18 hours: another was exhausted from overwork; a third had kept going after twice almost "fading out." In each case, when the driver dozed off, he was held liable for the results.

Suppose it is the passenger, not the driver, who falls asleep. Does the law frown on that too?

Occasionally the passenger does have a duty to stay awake when he has some special reason to think that the driver needs watching. But as a rule he may nap at will, putting his trust in the driver to take care,

In one case a woman in the back seat dozed off and slumped against the driver's seat, pushing it forward and knocking his hands off the steering wheel. In the crash that followed, the driver was injured.

Could be collect damages from the woman on the theory that her falling asleep was an act of negligence? A court said no, because a passenger could scarcely be expected to anticipate such a freakish accident just from falling asleep.

"(She) was required to exercise foresight," said the court, "not clairvoyance."

State Rep. Bill Clayton of Springlake has been disignated by Texas House Speaker Gus F. Mutscher as one of seven House members to attend the Foreign Policy Briefing for Young Political Leaders being conducted by the U.S. State Department in Washington, D.C. Dec. 2 and 3. Also attending the meeting will be Rep. Ben Bynum of Amarillo, Rep. Joe C. Hanna of Breckenridge, Rep. Dick Mc-Kissack of Dallas, Rep. Dan Kubiak of Rockdale, Rep. Carl A. Parker of Port Arthur, and Rep. Henry Sanchez of Brownsville.

Invited to the briefing are elected state officials from the 50 states, Puerto Rico, the Virgin Islands, and the Dominican Republic. Secretary of State William P. Rogers will discuss environmental and population problems, and the ways which the states and the Federal governments may coordinate their efforts in these areas.



Fine Print

"The large print giveth, and the small print taketh away."

That old joke about insurance policies has often had a good deal of truth in it. Many a crucial clause has been tucked away in typographical obscurity.



But in recent years, the size (sometimes even the color) of the print in insurance policies has been widely regulated by

For example, a common requirement in the field of health insurance is that the exceptions must be printed at least as plainly

as the benefits. Take this case: A man disabled by rheumatism tried to collect on an insurance policy that promised, in large lettering, to pay benefits for six months. But down in the fine print, the policy cut the payments to only one month for certain

diseases - including rheumatism. Was the man bound by the one-month limitation? A court decided that he was not. Because of the substandard size of the print, said the court, that part of the policy simply had no legal

effect. Even if the print is large enough, it will ordinarily not carry as much weight as language that is typewritten or handwritten

into the policy. Another case involved a life insurance policy in which the words "Double Indemnity For Fatal Accidents" had been in-

serted by typewriter. Later, double indemnity was held to be payable, even though there was conflicting language in the printed portion of the policy. The court said that words specially inserted were more likely

to be correct than words buried in a standard form. Of course, anything that clarifies an insurance policy also puts a greater responsibility upon you as the policyholder. The clearer the policy, the less grounds you have for arguing that you did not understand what kind of pro-

tection you were getting.

Accordingly, it makes good sense to examine a policy at the time you buy it, rather than waiting until you have suffered a loss. Not even large print, not even a special notation, can tell you anything unless you read it.



Deadly Dust

When bugs invaded his field of honeydew melons, a farmer promptly sent out a pilot to spray the field. But because of prevailing breezes, the deadly dust drifted to the beehives on neighbor's farm.



Bees languished and died by the thousands. Result: a damage suit filed against the crop dusting company by the farmer who owned the bees.

In court, the company pro-tested that it could not be held responsible for the vagaries of the weather. Nevertheless, the court granted the farmer's claim. The court pointed out that the pilot, if he had been reasonably careful, would have foreseen the danger and delayed his spraying until the wind died down.

Crop dusting zoomed in popularity after World War II. Surplus airplanes were available. So were surplus pilots. And so were new and potent insecticides.

But, like many technological advances, this one has brought legal complications in its wake. Repeatedly, courts have held crop dusters responsible for failing to take reasonable precautions in their work.

One pilot underestimated the carrying power of his spray equipment. Another pilot failed to give fair warning to a neighboring landowner. A third pilot disregarded the special characteristics of the chemical he was using. In each case, a court found enough evidence of negli-gence to impose legal liability on the company.

In fact, some courts have imposed liability even if the pilot took all the usual safety precautions before spraying. They say that, simply by using such dan-gerous stuff, the company automatically takes full responsibility

for the consequences. Occasionally the plane itself, rather than the chemical, will cause harm. In one case, the sudden gunning of a crop duster's motor threw a flock of turkeys into panic. They hurled them-selves against a fence, with many

of them perishing.
Was this also the company's fault? A court decided that it was indeed. The judge said the timidity of turkeys was so well known that the pilot should have known what to expect.
