# Commission approves cable television proposal

# City to begin crack-down on abandoned vehicles

The city commission this week established a junk vehicle ordinance that will take direct aim at getting rid of old, abandoned vehicles that are cluttering streets and vacant lots throughout the city.

The new ordinance gives the city its first real strangle hold on a problem that has, up to this time, been out of the hands of city officials. In the past the city, because of state law, has been unable to force the removal of junk vehicles.

A new state law, which went into effect in late August, now permits the city to pick up these vehicles. Prior to the passage of the new law, a person or city had to have a certificate of title to move the car.

Now, however, the city can remove a vehicle and obtain a junk certificate of title and have the vehicle hauled off.

City manager Dudley Bayne said there are probably as many as 200 "junk" vehicles around town that now can be moved

a vehicle can be considered a "junk" vehicle.

A "junk" vehicle is defined as any self-propelled motor vehicle which is inoperative and which does not have lawfully affixed thereto, both an unexpired license plate or plates and a valid motor vehicle safety inspection certificate and which is wrecked, dismantled, partially dismantled or discarded.

The procedure that will be taken now will be to have the police department determine if

any vehicle is a junk car and report to the Corporation Court.

The Corporation Court, in turn, will issue all orders necessary for the removal of the vehicle and the police department will give notice to the owner of the vehicle that the vehicle is a public nuisance.

The owner is then given 10 days in which to either have the vehicle removed or file for a public hearing if he does not feel the vehicle is a public nuis-

If the owner does not file for a public hearing and does not remove the vehicle, the police department has the authority to have the vehicle removed and sold, with the money going to

The new ordinance does not apply to vehicles or parts of vehicles that are kept in an enclosed area or building in a lawful manner where it is not visible from the street or other private

The much-discussed and often-tabled cable television issue got a nod of approval Monday when city commissioners agreed to let bids on a franchise some time early next year.

City officials said they expect to have the "specs" figured out by early January and be able to let bids soon thereafter, possibly in early Ferbuary.

The cable television issue has been one discussed by several past city commissions, but the result was always the same-it was tabled for further discussion. It was brought up again about four months ago and the present city commission began investigating a franchise for Hereford.

The approval Monday marked the first time the issue ever got off the ground.

The city, over the past several years, has received correspondence for a large number of individuals and business terested in getting a cable television franchise for Hereford. City manager Dudley Bayne has a folder that is bulging with letters from interesting parties. He told the commission Monday that there are "12 companies, including four major companies across the country," that are interested in bidding on the

Earlier action on a franchise was not taken because of current Federal Communications Commission (FCC) rulings still unsettled. The city wanted to find out what the FCC was going to do before it made a decision.

The cable television industry has been unable to make any forward progress because of disputes over copyrights during the past several years. A recent settlement was reached

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

(Continued From Page One) post Corporation process was time-consuming until finally a product was achieved, but not in volume to be economically practical.

The process consisted of preparing the raw manure, introduction of the innoculum and maintaining proper conditions for the proliferation of the desired micro-life.

The fermentation is largely aerobic and generates a certain amount of heat. A compost concentrate, high in humus and containing billions of specific soil micro-organisms per gram, is the end result.

"With expansion here at Hereford, Compost Corporation will be able to produce sufficient tonnage of B-D Compost to have a significant effect on extending the life of the underground water." Sims said. "Initially, plans are for a 100-ton-per-day operation and as quickly as this is going well, it will be increased to 200 tons per day.





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

With both the defense and state filing rival motions for change of venue, Austin District Judge Tom Blackwell concluded extensive publicity in the capital city area made a transfer of the case advisable.

He sent it to the 104th district court of Judge J. Neil Daniel in Taylor County, along with indictments of co-defendants Rep. Thomas C. Shannon of Fort Worth and S. Rush McGinty of Austin, a Mutscher aide.

tended widespread news coverage made a fair trial of the speaker in the Central Texas area impossible. The indictment grew out of Mutscher's and codefendent's 1969 profits on National Bankers Life Insurance Company stock. State alleges he received the stock tips and loans for purchases in exchange for helping pass bank deposit insurance legislation favored by Houston banker Frank Sharp.

Travis County District Attorney Robert O. Smith turned the defense argument around. He said Mutscher has so much power in Austin, where many citizens work for the state, that finding a jury free to give the state's case open consideration there may be difficult.

Blackwell didn't buy either argument entirely, but conceded Austin newspapers, radic and television stations had covered the case rather enthusiastically since last January. Further, he stated the coverage blanketed
