Truck, Train Wreck Kills One Man Here

A 23-year-old Hereford truck driver was killed Wendsday morning when his bob-tail truck was in collision with a Santa Fe train at the FM 2943 railroad crossing two miles east of Hereford.

Jose Luis Cadena, 415 Ave. C, was pronounced dead at the scene about 9 a.m. by Justice of the Peace Glen Nelson, who said the man died of massive head injuries.

CADENA, an employe of McCracken Trucking Co., had just picked up a load of fertilizer at Texsun Feed Yard and was driving north when the truck collided with the west-bound diesel-powered train, engine number 237.

The train's conductor, Billy Sims, said he saw the truck slow as it approached the crossing, then continued to roll until it collided with the engine.

THE ENGINEER, Walker Hopper, estimated the train's speed at 50-55 m.p.h. at point of impact.

The cab of the truck was totally demolished. Cadena was thrown through the metal cab about 50 feet west of the impact point.

School Teacher Found Dead Monday

Funeral arrangements for Alice Eudine Glover, 41, of 707-B N. Lee, are pending at Hammon's Funeral Home in

A neighbor to the deceased, Mrs. Ellis Coombes, found the Tierra Blanca school teacher's body about 6:30 p.m. Monday behind the steering wheel of her car parked in her garage.

Mrs. Coombes said started ame concerned about her friend's welfare after she had not seen her since early Sunday. She said she looked in the garage to see if Miss Glover's auto was there and noticed the still figure sitting behind the steering wheel

Glen Nelson, justice of the peace, pronounced the woman dead at the scene, but declined to make a specific

ruling for cause of death, pending the results of a blood scan. Nelson said. however, all evidence indicated the death was self-inflicted.

Police reported the car's ignition was on and the gas tank empty. All windows were closed, with the exception of the one on the driver's side, which was lowered about two inches. Water and antifreeze were on the garage floor, apparently from the car having overheated.

Although notepads and pencils were in the car, no message was written. Miss Glover was a teacher at Tierra Blanca for the past four years. She had been associated with the Hereford schools for six years, and had taught two years in Somerset County, N.J.

AUSTIN, Tex. - Legislative budget planners recommended nearly \$480 million in pay raises and fringe be-nefits for 116,000 state empovees next year. General revenue cost of

the package (which includes a 23.8 per cent salary boost for lower-scale personnel and higher travel allowances) is about \$285 million.

Legislative Budget Board gave its blessing to the cost of - living catch-up proposals to help planning of the 1976-77 appropriations bill.

Assuming the entire plan is approved by the legislature, more than 90 per cent of the anticipated general revenue surplus will be used on compensation and benefits of 116,000 state work-

One budget executive conceded the action "placed a little strain" on Gov. Dolph Briscoe's pledge of no new taxes next year, although the comptroller's estimate of a \$315 million surplus is viewed as conservative. Further, existing revenues are expected to generate much more money next fiscal period than they do today.

Pumpkin Seed

Males who seek to avoid two common disorders of the prostate gland are advised to eat pumpkin or sunflower seed-by a Chicago expert in the field.


The seed contain zinc, another metal which we are getting less and less of from our processed foods and because of the abandonment of zinc-galvanized cooking pots and pans. (The average intake of iron has like. wise decreased by the abandonment of iron cooking utensils.)

Dr. Irving Bush, chief of urology at the Chicago Medical Center, says the trace metal zinc is found in sunflower and pumpkin seeds and that an intake of these has been found highly effective in preliminary clinical tests with those suffering from two common prostate problems. He suggests a daily dose of 50 to 100 milligrams to shrink swollen prostates-a procedure which often eliminates the need for surgery.

Since almost one in every three men eventually have some prostate problem, the pumpkin seed news is good news for millions.

Man Takes Drink Drink Takes Man

60This article is part of a series on "The Progression of Alcoholism" produced by the Alcoholism Council of San Fernando Valley, Calif. The stories are made available locally by the Deaf Smith Council on Alcoholism.

A Chinese proverb has that 'The man takes a drink, the drink takes a drink and then the drink takes the man."

How true - often tragically true - that is. But because this seemingly hopeless cry of despair can be accepted as a warning and does not have to proceed to frightful death or confinement, the Alcoholism Council has been formed. An active branch is now at Community Action Council. Advice and assistance may be obtained about the killer disease of alcoholism.

In an effort to help keep "the drinker from taking the drink" and to "take the man from the drink," the Hereford Brand is printing a series of articles on progression toward chronic alcoholism. This article continues pointing up symptoms during the acute stage. The problem drinker reaches

the point where, once the first drink is taken he always winds up drunk. Guilt during a return to sobriety prompts excuses. He knows it is not his fault. He often admits to himself he has become a durnk but he'll deny it to others. Self-esteem diminishes and he must devise ways to bolster his waning ego. This leads to extravagant behavior.
The chronic alcoholic needs to

buy good will. Since he has learned to drink to excess, his gestures to family or friends are bombastic. He may buy a set of luxurious furs for a wife whose dresses are shabby and who cannot afford visits to hairdressers.

He will seek to see his children's eyes sparkle at a new television set while they are badly in need of dentistry or even proper food. The gift may be practical, such as the best washing machine availablewhich eventually is reclaimed for non-payment.

The drinker who abuses the use of alcohol feels that being a 'big wheel" makes up for what his drinking is doing to others and himself. Liquor makes this man feel he really is somebody. He exults in the mere act of tipping a waiter, riding in taxis, dialing long distance. The elaborate buying of drinks "for everyone" in a bar is common.

Comes sobriety and he knows self-incrimination and selfpunishment. He is aware what a 'couple of drinks" has done to him. He sets about to "make it up" to others by denying and depriving himself. Recipients of his generosity briefly appreciate his efforts. Some may take But the end is revulsion at the

simple and childish attempts to buy good will. Their reaction, their criticism, has to get through to the drinker who inner anger which smoulders before eruption. Aggression follows. The

problem drinker becomes antisocial. His retaliation need not come in fights, brawls or abuse of his family. The alcoholic is noted for a tendency to develop resentments against person or objects entirely removed from those he believes has stirred up his ill-will. Feeling deeply offended, the alcoholic too often strikes back

by doing such things as kicking in the window of an innocent bystander or charging down a street slashing the tires on automobiles of strangers. Both have been done many times. The drinker whose actions are less flamboyant is not less sick. Kicking dogs and throwing things are relatively just as

Because of the intensity of his actions, the alcoholic at this stage seeks isolation. He will walk out on family, friends and employers, usually to avoid embarrassment at them deserting him.

His foolish and erratic behavior inevitably carries him into increased complications at home, at work, with friends, even with the law. Now the things he once merely regretted

become objects to create depression. He feels that no matter what he does, everything turns out wrong. His best efforts are misunderstood by others. With increasing regularity, he starts out with great expectations and abandons them because another "drunk" gets in the way.

Remorse is a constant companion of all problem drinkers. Why? Why? He keeps asking that and: Why him? Why can't he drink like other people? Always, he finds his answer.

It is not him. The world has handed him a bum trap in spite of the fact he always has "done his best." The answer also lies, he tells himself, in seeking blessed relief in a few hours boozed up. They are hours not to only enjoy, but to suffer and endure. Oblivion for the time blots out all the troubles and the backlashes normally - a build of worries. He keeps trying, always with the same results. Unpleasant picture? But there

is much more for the alcoholic to undergo even before he reaches the chronic stage.

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Ag Income Affects Price Of Farm Land

Does agricultural production demand and prices." and income influence the price of local farm land?

According to Kenneth E. Graeber, economist in real estate for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, it does.

"Despite the varied reasons for purchasing land, such as recreational use, inflation hedge, prestige and speculation, and an apparent discrepancy between land prices and productivity, agricultural income has tremendous impact upon the value of certain lands." says Graeber.

"Prices of crop land, which has little aesthetic value, are more closely related to agricultural productivity than the more appealing wooded and grazing lands," notes Graeber. He points out that produc-

tivity and profits are influenced by the soil type, crop hazards such as drouths, floods, insects and disease, the farm layout, location with respect to improvements. In addition to these physical factors of productivity, management strong influences yields and profits.

"However, productivity and management generate only part of gross farm income; price represents the remainder," says the Texas A&M University System economist. "In 1973 agricultural commodity prices began to rise, and the returns to land encouraged land purchases by full-time agricultural producers who wanted to expand. In addition, investors found their holding costs reduced, thus encouraging additional investments. The result was a substantial increase in land point," notes Graeber.

Net income and net returns to land are considered important in determining land value. Net income and net returns are dependent upon production costs, which include operating, fixed and management costs. Thus agricultural investors which include operating, fixed and management costs. Thus agricultural investors must know the costs for major crops within their area to aid investment decisions, points out the economist. These data are available through the county Extension office.

To evaluate agricultural land values. Graeber suggests "capitalizing" the net income to land from agricultural production by dividing the annual net to land by an appropriate capitalization rate. This rate is normally determined by the market, with many farm land owners historically accepting about a 4.5 per cent return on their land values. The capitalization rate markets and roads, and other must be determined by each potential investor.

What can you afford to pay for

good crop land? According to Graeber, there is no one answer. "Not only does it vary with land, management, yield and price expectations, but it also varies with the method of financing, sources of outside capital, expectations of future values, rate of return required and even the tax strategy for the investor.

'However, by considering only one specific case at a time and taking into account the aforementioned factors, you can pretty well estimate what you can afford to pay for the land from an agricultural stand-

Smoke, Water, Fire **Heavily Damage Home**

The residence of Bonnie Wilson was heavily damaged by smoke and water resulting from a fire at 10:40 Tuesday night.

A member of the family returned home to 216 Ave. B at that time and opened the front door to find the inside fogged with smoke. Five units of the Hereford Volunteer Fire Department were called to the scene, but the nature of the fire made it

difficult to extinguish.

According to Fire Marshal

Jay Spain, the blaze began in a closet area in the basement of the home. Some work was being done on the electrical wiring in that portion of the house, and Spain said some wires had apparently been left bare.

Intense heat inside the basement kept firemen from reaching the blazing area, and they were forced to fight the fire through casement windows at the ground level. The lack of ventilation in the basement

made smoke a problem for the firemen at the wirdows.

As water was poured on the fire, smoke belched out the windows, making it difficult for firemen to see or breathe.

Difficulties with the fire kept the firemen at the scene nearly three hours. The home was not severely damaged by the blaze, but Spain said the basement was nearly one foot deep in water and the entire house was heavily smoked.

Riding a two wheeler is relatively easy to learn. Some experienced riders compare riding a motorcyle to riding an MSF estimates that more engine powered bicycle. Some of the same principles apply. The modern lightweight twowheeler in particular is similar to riding a bicycle. The position of the body and the distribution of body weight can and does influence the behavior pattern of the motorcycle while it is moving under power.

The new rider should be familiar with all the coutrols of his motorcycle by sitting astride it while the engine is not running. This accomplished the first step in riding: knowledge, location and function of the

various controls. Next, an accomplished rider who will act as an instructor and the new rider should go to an area appropriate to practice riding. The area selected should be free of traffic and obstacles which could inhibit the freedom

his first practice ride. The area should be level and have suitable surfacing material to good control of the cycle. The structor should next rehearse with the new rider the function of the throttle, brake and shifting methanism before the engine is started.

The instructor should then start the motorcycle and give a demonstration ride by riding around in a small circle, keeping the cycle in low gear. During this demonstration ride the instructor should point out how the motorcycle reacts to the throttle and the brake.


As soon as the instructor is confident the new rider is ready for his first solo ride he should walk with the new rider the first few feet of his practice ride, reminding him not to shift out of low gear or to accelerate past 5 or 10 miles per hour. When the beginner masters

the basic practice ride in low gear he may then be permitted to shift gears and progress in his practice riding until he has used the higher gears on the

the proper method for applying brakes. Brakes should be applied more or less simultancously to the front and year At normal speeds the rear wheel brake should be applied first, then the front wheel brake.

Proper braking techniques should be mastered on the practice riding course. The estructor should caution the new rider on the proper positioning of the body while

When the new rider achieves should proceed with practice riding through simulated traffic editions such as stop signs, parked cars, pedestrian traffic, oncoming traffic, left hand turns, right hand turns, and proper signalling to indicate turns. He must be able to sit astride the motorcycle while in neutral gear pending clearance of traffic prior to proceeding on through any traffic conditions.

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

Fires In Tents Big Danger

potential deathtraps, according to an article in the July issue of TEXAS PARKS & WILDLIFE

The article, "Danger of Fires in Tents," by Bob Lanier and Sara Bolieu, points out two particularly frightening aspects of the danger — the alarming speed with which fire spreads and the fact that fire invariably strikes when the camper is least prepared, that is, when he is

"Once a flame gets going, it may be only a few seconds until the whole structure is totally engulfed in flames," say the authors. "Some tents have increased risk because of features purposely built in for the camper's comfort. As one man put it in reference to his tent waterproofed with paraffin, "T've been sleeping inside one giant candlestick.' "

According to the authors, tents don't have to be dangerous. Commercial tents for revivals and circuses, for example, have been required by law for about 20 years to be fire resistant.

Unfortunately for the consumer, resistance to flame is not one of the big selling points

manufacturers. The authors say that unless tag on the tent says "Meets flame retardant standard CPAI- 84," a rating by the Canvas Products Association International, the tent is not

sufficiently fire retardant. Especially dangerous, they say, are the cheap, lightweight "play tents," parents buy for their children so they can have a campout in the backyard.

According to the authors, tents with very thick, heavygauge canvas are safer than the more convenient thin tents, but they still burn unless they have been specifically designed to retard flame.

They say finding a flame retardant tent is not an easy matter, and most sporting goods and discount houses won't know what you're talking about

if you request one.

The article points out that the production of flame-retardant materials is not easy, since many of the methods used to make other types of cloth flame resistant are not acceptable for outdoor use. Unfortunately, this situation makes flame-resistant tents both more costly and hard to find.

According to the authors, there is no way to flame-proof the tents we already own because the waterproofing of the fabric makes it impossible to add satisfactory flame retardancy.

They offer some commonsense rules to make your camping trip less dangerous: If at all possible, buy only tents stating they meet CPAI- 84 standards for flame retardancy. Stress that you as a customer want this protection. Never light lanterns or

heaters inside a tent. Keep all sources of open flame out of the tent. Build all fires down-wind

from the campsite. Never use flammable liquids on coasl which have "gone out." Keep extra gasoline or fuel tanks at a safe distance from camp.

Never leave children in a tent without proper supervision. Clear all tall, dried grass from around the tent area, if possible, to reduce this fire







"Smoking is agreeable to those who have the habit. But it is distasteful, and sometimes hurtful, to those compelled to breathe the atmosphere impregnated with tobacco in close and confined

What about the regulation of cigarette vending machines? A city ordinance sought to ban all such machines from public places. A vending company promptly challenged the ordinance in court, arguing that it was aimed at the "lawful business" of selling ciga-

But the city replied that its purpose was simply to prevent the ale of cigarettes to minors. This was a matter of legitimate public concern, said the court, uphold-

ing the ordinance. 'The automatic vendor," the court pointed out, "must sell to any and all who insert coins. It has no powers of discrimination Hence it is condemned."

Bullock Wants Constitution Defeat

Bob Bullock, Democratic nominee for Comptroller, said Friday that the proposed new constitution must be defeated for the good of Texas taxpayers and the state treasury.

Bullock warned that "special treatment promised on a willy-nilly basis to so many segments of our economy by the proposed finance section threatens to break the backs of the taxpayers, their cities and possibly the state."

"Tax relief is as popular as motherhood, and as virtuous, but someone is going to have to pay the bills. The millions of Texans who aren't getting special privileges should remember that," Bullock said.

He said that the total impact of the finance section has been clargely overlooked because of more emotional issues."

"Our present constitutional pay-as-you-go provision is already strained to the breaking point by state spending which has increased almost 200 per cent in 10 years and more than 500 per cent in 20 years,

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Bullock said that the "most serious criticism I've heard about the present constitution is that it's too old and too long, but the truth is that it's no older than the last amendment put on it by the voter."

"As comptroller, I would rather work with amendments than with bankruptcy," Bullock

Bullock praised the efforts of the Constitutional Convention, saying that 'the long, hard hours of work and strain endured by the delegates have been worh a fortune by showing us that we don't need change just for the sake of change."

"Their diligent pursuit of every possible alternative has proved that our present constitution is solid to the core and obviously in tune with the wishes of the people. Whatever the Convention cost will pay for itself many times over by giving us a map of constitutional chugholes to avoid in the future," Bullock said.

Woman Prefers Farming To Office Job

For Mae Golden, a farmer's wife living in Hereford, farming is not necessarily man's exclusive domain. The fact is, Mae started her career as a professional farmer almost a quarter of a centruy ago.

When the Goldens arrived in Hereford in 1954 they went to work as sharecroppers for \$75 a month and 10 per cent of the crop. Their first year's net of \$3,000 was hardly encouraging—there were three mouths to feed. But Mae Golden was looking ahead.

"I ENJOYED being able to help out", she said. "I held our two year old daughter in my lap while driving the tractor. I also drove the grain trucks, helped with the harvesting and cooked for the harvest hands as

they're now farming 1,600

acres. Like other farmers in the

well as our employer."
In 1970 the Goldens rented 160 acres and started farming on their own. "Dick had another job", Mae stated, "so I farmed it myself...with Dick's advice". Mae's farming and Dick's advice proved so successful that

area, the Goldens practice crop rotation. Their crops include alfalfa, milo, wheat, lettuce and potatoes; they also raise cattle.

One of the Golden's major problems on their first 160 acres was a shortage of water. "It was critical", says Mae, "but even so I turned out some good yields for a woman...8,000 pounds of milo per acre and 60 bushels of wheat per acre. I'm sure I had help from above".

MAE GOLDEN, like most farmers, enjoys a well-tuned sense of humor. "Dick had good luck sowing 11/2 bushels of wheat per acre and 8 pounds of milo per acre", she reported, "and that's what I tried to do. But I made him set the planter for me so if it didn't turn out right I could blame him." Mae's fears were unfounded since her husband readily admits, "she's a better farmer than I am".

Over the years alfalfa has favorite crops. "A full grown alfalfa field", she exclaimed, 'is a lovely sight. I enjoy standing there, watching the plants bend and sway in the

Mae Golden realizes, of course, that producing top yields of alfalfa requires more than just admiring it. "You begin at the beginning", she says, "and that means selecting the right variety".

Mae attributes much of her success with growing alfalfa to Harold Dillehay of The Far-mer's Elevator Of Dawn, Inc., a seed distributing company, and to Jack Campbell, field

representative for Germain's, Inc., a 100 year old western seed

"Both Harold and Jack advised us to plant WL-306 alfalfa", she reported. "They had observed its yield potential, fast regrowth and extreme leafiness at neighboring ranches. They said that this variety was area-oriented to our growing conditions. They certainly told the truth".

Mae Golden and her husband have established several top yield records in their area with WL-306 alfalfa. "Our first cutting", Mae stated, "averaged more than three and one-third tons per acre. Our yearly average has been right around ten tons per acre", a

significant yield when compared with the local average of five to six tons per acre per year.

In 1969, in addition to her farming and housekeeping activities, Mae started working a few days a week "more or less as a hobby" at The Farmer's Elevator. At first she weighed trucks and tested grain. She now serves as a full fledged, but part-time, secretary.

ALTHOUGH most women would probably prefer a secretary's dress to a farmer's overalls, Mae Golden is not about to forsake farming for secretarial work. "I'm still a better farmer than a

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How High Up Must One Go To Escape The Summer Heat?

ASHEVILLE, N.C. -- How high up in the mountains must one "fetreat" in summer to escape the oppressive heat of July and August? It depends, of course. on the latitude. In the highest mountains in eastern America, in North Carolina, certainly one would like to be over 3,000 feet up, but can go much higher.

One gets different estimates of the cooling of the air per thousand feet of altitude gained. In the Air Force years ago the general rule was that for every thousand feet one climbed a drop of two or three degrees could be expected.


Some believe the difference is often four degrees in the mountains--because the hills cut off some of the sunshine and help produce winds. Whatever the scientific fact, it seems that by moving some 3,000 feet up one can lower the thermometer eight or ten degrees, on an average

Four thousand feet may be even better in the southeast, where the summer sun

is long and hot. That much height ought to reduce the temperature more than ten degrees on many days. Recently, while visiting Mount Mitchell, the writer noted a sign which claimed the temperature there had never been above 81 degrees.

Mount Mitchell, of course (correctly measured for the first time by a Connecticut minister who was teaching at the University of North Carolina in the last century), is 6,684 feet up. It's the highest single peak in eastem America, topping New Hampshire's highest by about two hundred feet.


Asheville, the only city of any size in the western North Carolina mountains, lies just above 2,000 feet up. (Denver, by contrast, is over three times that elevation.) It gets uncomfortably hot even in Asheville occasionally, though in general the city's climate is pleas-

Cost of "convenience" food has risen more than cost of the food itself, one expert said this

Mrs. Gwendolyne Clyatt cited use of completely prepared convenience foods as one of the reasons for higher food costs

today.

The consumer marketing information specialist, Texas The Texas A&M University System, said consumers can counter this trend with selective

shopping.
"One way to shop selectively is to change from a higher cost grocery list to one with lower costs," she said.
"For example, on the higher








the "lady" as "tough-minded and cold-'blooded'. Prime Minister of India since January 1966, she is a brilliant politician and inheritor of the love the Indian masses gave her

father, JawaharlalNehru. 

Texas Tech University home economics education Prof.

People are investing in ivory, it appears; many are a holding on to the raw tusks. And last year the price of ivory of hit an all-time high. Men have been killing elephants for thousands of years, mainly for their tusks. This report nightlights recent dramatic changes.

If there is no source of money other than wildlife, the poacher poaches for money. He has to have money and the conso (conservationist) who condemns him is a nitwit."

The heart of the matter, as Mr. Parker sees it, is human over-population. Elephants are normadic and are given to wandering hundreds of miles in search of food and wafer. Being confined in parks prevents their doing this. And the parks are getting smaller as humans encroach upon the animals.

Gun Control

CBS REPORTS: "Murder and the Right to Bear Arms," a 10 1964 investigation into the explosive issue of gun control—or lack of it—will be presented on this summer's "CBS News he Retrospective" series on Sunday, August 4 (5:00-6:00 p.m.), on the CBS Television Network.

Originally broadcast on the Network on June 10, 1964—just pr months after the assassination of President Kennedy—"Murder and the Right to Bear Arms" presents sharply divergent interpretations of the constitutional guarantee cathat "the right of the people to keep and bear arms shall not Aube infringed." Prof. Arthur E. Sutherland of the Harvard the Law School discusses the meaning of the Second Amend—will ment, and a spokesman of the National Rifte Association co

explains the position of that organization.

"A number of things have changed since this broadcash was made 10 years ago," says CBS News Correspondent John Hart, host of the retrospective series. "In 1948 Congress passed the Gun Control Act, which controls all interstate shipment of guns and prohibits most sales across the counter to anyone who doesn't live in the dealer's state. It outlaws firearms sales to convicted felons, fugitives from justice, addicts or people with certified mental desease."

"Murder statistics have changed, too." Hart goes on to say. "They suggest that the laws or their enforcement are inadequate—maybe both. Ten years ago there were roughly

10.000 murders, half of them with guns, Last year there were nearly 20.000 murders, two-thirds of them with guns. There has been no new Federal legislation since 1969."

On the broadcast in 1964, CBS News Correspondent Robert Trout reported that "the world's greatest arsenal of privately held small arms, consisting of 196-to 200-million guns, is owned by citizens of the United States."

The broadcast highlights the case history of one gun—a .38 caliber pistol—which was used to kill two policemen in Los Angeles.
