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## Showers Make Encore; Dryland Farmers Happy

Thunderstorms which dumped beneficial moisture on Hereford and scattered portions of Deaf Smith County Wednesday made an encore appearance locally Thursday night and early this morning, depositing more good moisture and soaking some areas that were missed in the Wednesday downpour.

AGAIN, IT WAS the dryland areas of the county to the west and northwest of Hereford which derived the maximum benefit from the cloudbursts, with the rains providing planting moisture form some dryland wheat farms in the far northwestern portion of the county.

The storm, which broke over the city late last night and continued into the wee hours of this morning, was punctuated by brilliant lightning bolts and booming claps of thunder, but the rain fell gently for the most part.

In Hereford, KPAN radio logged a rainfall measurement of 1.20 inches in last night's storm, giving the city a total of 3.10 inches of moisture over the past two days.

Holly Sugar Corporation's Merrill E. Shoup plant here recorded .61 inches of moisture last night with a two day total of 1.61 inches.

THE CLINT HOMFELD farm, in dryland country 47 miles northwest of Hereford, recorded only a trace of

moisture from Wednesday's storm, but Mother Nature did the dryland farmers in that area a favor last night catching up by showering 1.60 inches of moisture on the thirsty wheatland in that area.

Mrs. Homfeld reported that a few dryland farmers in that vicinity had completed wheat sowing operations, but many had not started planting their crop due to a lack of moisture, and the Thursday night rainfall gave them just what they needed.

"The rainfall was fairly widespread in our area, and we really needed it," she commented.

The Bruce Coleman farm at the Walcott community recorded an additional .20 inches of moisture from last night's shower to go with over two inches which fell there Wednesday.

"Thursday night gave us a nice little shower to top things off," Mrs. Coleman said.

MOST OF THE western portion of the county remained in the grip of a lengthy

drought during the past year and farmers saw their dryland wheat crops decimated by the lack of moisture. They were justifiably glad to see the moisture which has fallen in the past two days.

At the Easter community, south of Hereford, a total of .50 inches of moisture was recorded in last night's rain, with the week's total standing at .70 inches.

The week's rainfall total reaches 2.50 inches at the H.L. Hershey farm 13 miles northeast of Hereford with the addition of 1.30 inches of moisture which fell there last night.

The Dawn community to the east of Hereford received upwards of an inch of moisture in the Wednesday showers, and the The Brand was unable to obtain an accurate report on moisture accumulation from Thursday night. Mrs. Robert Strain, who was contacted to obtain a rainfall total reported that "a pretty good shower" fell last night at Dawn, and added, "It's too muddy to reach the raingauge."

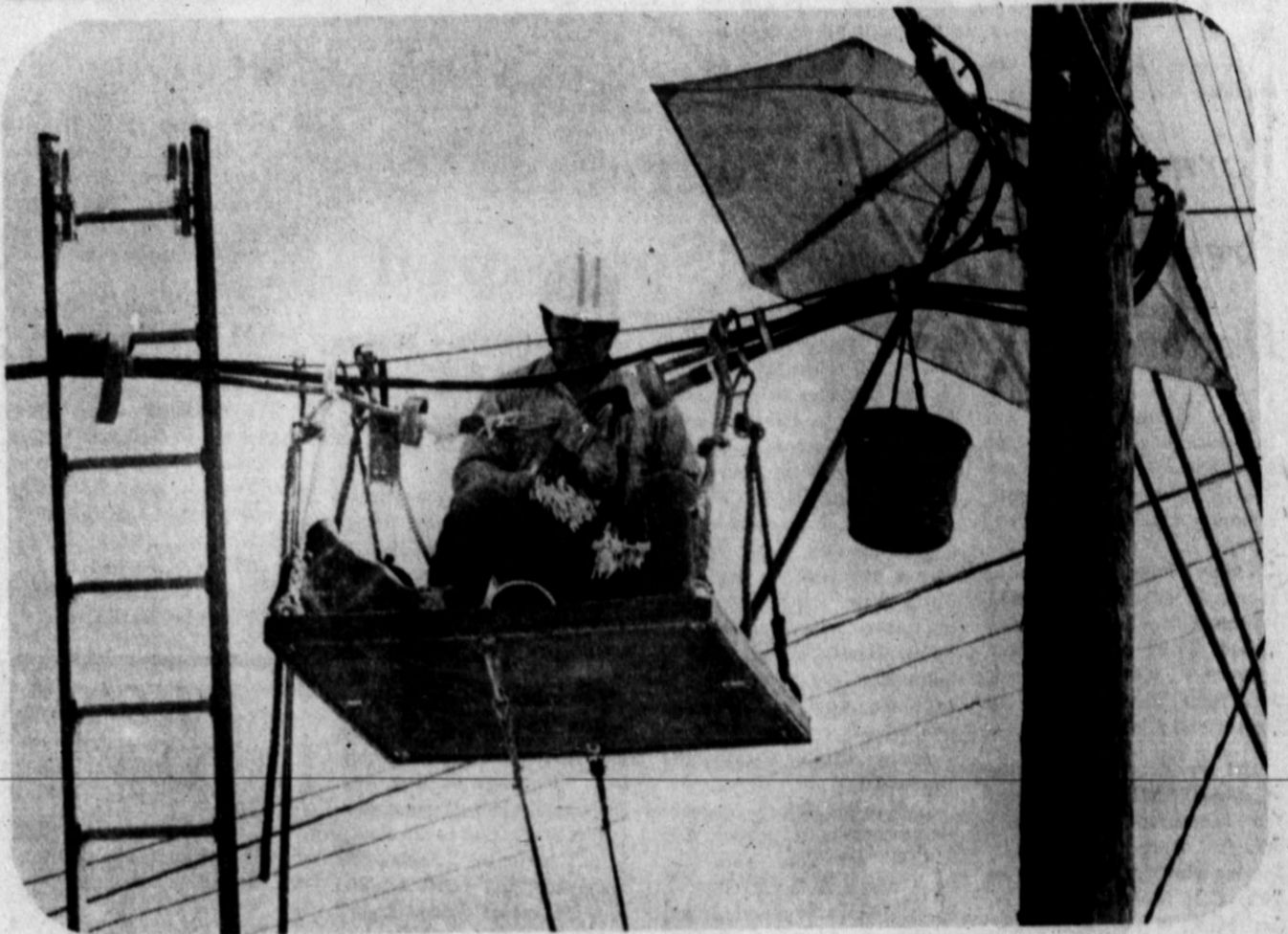

## Country's Wealth Lies In Free Enterprise System, Vet Says

"The great secret of this country's material wealth lies in the free enterprise system, where each individual is rewarded for his own efforts," Dr. W.J. Hill proclaimed during a talk at the Hereford Lions Club meeting Thursday night in Civic Club Center.

The Dimmitt veterinarian was guest speaker for a Ladies' Appreciation Night banquet, with club president Cleite Corlis paying special tribute to wives of Lions Club members. He expressed appreciation for the ladies' help at the annual club

carnival each year, as well as other projects.

During the group singing, led by Charlie Bell, special tribute was also paid Len Carlyle on the occasion of his 85th birthday. Carlyle is a charter member of the Hereford Lions Club.

Dr. Hill and his wife, Sara, presented a two-part program. Mrs. Hill launched the program with a talk on the importance of attitude, and Dr. Hill followed with his discussion of the great benefits of a free enterprise system.

"Some things we can't change, but persons owes it to himself and his family to cultivate and protect a good attitude," Mrs. Hill stated. A person with a good attitude has made a big step on the road to success, she pointed out. "A businessman would rather hire a man with a good attitude than a man who is better qualified but has a poor attitude," she claimed.

Dr. Hill presented a formula for man's material welfare. The formula MMW equals NR plus HE times T, was outlined by the speaker, and he discussed the elements which make up the formula. Natural resources, human energy, and tools are the components, he explained.

Many nations have greater potential with the resources and humans, he pointed out, but the United States has greater material wealth because it places the tools in the hands of the people, not the state. "Everytime the government takes over the tools, it's another step toward socialism," he cautioned.

In socialistic countries, workers are all paid the same the there is no freedom of choice on the type job you do, pointed out Hill. "In our nation, one man can do 1,000 times as much as a man in some nations, because we have the tools of productivity."

Dr. Hill was introduced by program chairman Mark Andrews. The speaker is a graduate of Texas A&M and a past president of the Dimmitt Lions Club.

### Pennies Scattered After Crash

KIT CARSON, Colo. (AP)- A truck carrying 5.7 million freshly minted pennies collided with a cattle truck on a highway west of here. Two persons were killed, some of the cattle were killed and millions of pennies were scattered over the road, officials said.

The pennies, \$57,500 worth, were being transported in 50-pound bags from the Denver mint to the Federal Reserve Bank in San Antonio, Tex., said Betty Hiby, superintendent of the mint.

The Colorado State Patrol said the collision occurred Thursday after a trailer truck carrying 103 head of cattle crossed the dividing line of U.S. Highway 287.

### African Peace Shuttle Continues

LUSAKA, Zambia (AP)- Secretary of State Henry A. Kissinger, on a diplomatic shuttle for racial peace in southern Africa, met with black Rhodesian leader Joshua Nkomo today before flying on to Pretoria for talks with South African Prime Minister John Vorster.

The substance of the talks between the U.S. secretary and the head of the Rhodesian wing of the militant African National Council was not immediately known. But it may have been the beginning of a Kissinger mediation between the black nationalists and the white supremacist government of Rhodesia.

### Ford To Sign Tax Bill

WASHINGTON (AP)- President Ford is expected to sign the tax bill that continues some existing income tax cuts and makes major revisions in the nation's tax laws.

Congress approved the bill Thursday. Multibillion-dollar general income tax cuts enacted last year to fight the recession would be continued through 1977, worth \$180 to a typical family of four making \$15,000 a year. Across-the-board business income tax cuts also would be extended.

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## Local Hospital To Take Part In Therapeutics Series

Beginning Thursday, Sept. 23, at 12:30 p.m. C.S.T., and continuing through May, 1977, local health professionals at Deaf Smith General Hospital in Hereford will participate in a series of 16 therapeutics seminars designed to keep them up to date on the latest treatment concepts and discoveries in health care.

The first seminar will be "Use of Biofeedback" and will survey the clinical uses of the new treatment in which a patient is taught to notice and control bodily processes such as muscle tension.

The series of programs will originate for the seventh year

from The University of Texas Health Science Center at San Antonio and local participants will be able to view slides and ask questions of the San Antonio panel by means of a "teleconference" telephone hookup with the San Antonio school.

For the first time this year, the telephone network, which includes small local hospitals and large medical centers throughout Texas and surrounding states, will be a "dedicated" network, that is, available 24 hours a day for use in continuing education programs.

This full time availability will

allow more programs to be aired on topics in medicine, nursing and allied health.

Moderator for the first seminar will be Dr. Timothy Caris, associate dean for continuing medical education and professor of medicine at the San Antonio health science center.

Panelists from the center will be Dr. Kenneth Gaarder, professor of psychiatry, and Ms. Penny Montgomery, instructor of psychiatry.

Future seminar topics will include heart attacks, Parkinson's disease, foot problems, viruses, pneumonia and other commonly encountered maladies.

## Kiwanis Club Donates \$150 For Electric Wheelchair

A local muscular dystrophy victim is \$150 closer to a much-needed electric wheelchair after the Noon Kiwanis Club donated that amount Thursday.

Joey Mazurek, a junior high school student and MD victim, needs \$1400 for an electric wheelchair so that he can continue to attend public school. John Metcalf, local MD chairman, accepted the check from the Kiwanians on behalf of Joey. Metcalf told the group that Joey is declining in strength and is no longer able to move his wheelchair without assistance. Although the boy has many friends who help him get around at school now, the electric chair would make him much more independent.

Metcalf also said that the local MD campaign netted one of the largest amounts on record, but what does not go to the national foundation for research goes to the MD chapter in Amarillo. That chapter furnishes MD patients with a non-powered wheelchair, therapy and helps pay for MD-related medical expenses. The expense

for an electric wheelchair such as Joey needs would have to come from somewhere else.

Kiwanians were also presented a special Diamond Award from the Kiwanis International Foundation, citing them as the district club that donated the most money to the Tom Duncan Memorial. Duncan was the president of the Texas-Oklahoma district of Kiwanis a year ago, but passed away while still in office. He died during a Kiwanians training conference held here in Hereford. The award is a small patch for the club's banner.

President Ed Coplen also reported to the club that the annual scholarship had gone to Sandra Krueger, a student at Texas Women's University. The scholarship was \$250.

Claude Huard gave the program at the Thursday luncheon, urging Kiwanians to sign up for YMCA programs. Huard outlined some of the programs, some future goals for the organization in Hereford and encouraged the group to support the Y.

### Be A Friend, Have A Friend

This is the first in a series on communication. More specifically, communication between parent and child. Communication between an adult and a child is so very important in order to maintain a productive and satisfying relationship.

Unfortunately, poor communication is common among most American families. We have a tendency to "talk to" rather than "talk with" our children. By "talking with" our children, we are better able to

convince them that we care enough to listen. "Talking to" our children consists of nagging, threatening, criticizing, etc.

Even though these tactics are well meant, they are detrimental to communication. Think of the ways that you want people to respond to you when you are angry or upset. Don't you think your children have the same feelings?

We have roles that we play when responding to our children, simply because this is what we have been taught.

Examples of these roles are "Commander in Chief," "The Moralist" and the "Know-It-All."

The Commander in Chief demands that his child immediately dismiss all negative feelings. He will use such tactics as orders, commands and threats in order to keep a firm upper hand. "Johnny, if you don't stop crying, I'm going to give you a good spanking."

The Moralist is the parent that preaches to his children. He will tell his children what they "should or should not do". The Moralist is very much concerned about the "proper" feelings that the child should have. "Good little girls don't do things like that!"

The Know-It-All attempts to prove to his child that he has all the answers due to infinite experience. This type parent will lecture, advise and make appeals to a child's reason in order to prove the superiority of the parent. "When I was a kid I walked three miles to school, and you're whimpering about walking three blocks!"

Do you see yourself "communicating" in any of these three ways?

Next week we will look at more roles that adults assume in relating to kids.

Today marks the 189th anniversary of the adoption of the Constitution of the United States by the Constitutional Convention and this week, Sept. 17-23 has been designated Constitution Week.

DEAR DR. FRY: Thank you for setting the record straight. And who could do it better than the man himself?

How reassuring to know it really DOESN'T hurt when you laugh -- especially when there aren't that many things to laugh at these days.

DEAR ANN Landers: Your

column is discussed frequently at our church guild meetings, PTA and my weekly bridge club. I've heard loads of people say they have written to you: some three and four times but their letters never get into the paper.

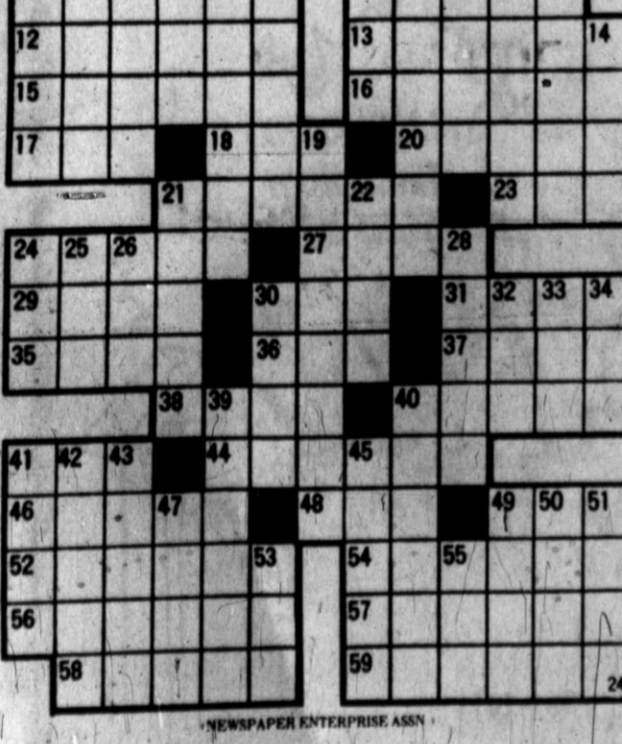

Last year the Shockers grabbed a 13-7 win in Wichita, with two Buffs fumbles paving the way to two Shocker field goals that proved to be the difference.

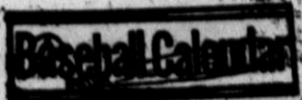
Even though it's the season opener, the Buffs do have some question marks due to injury.

# SWC Has Attractive Schedule Saturday

The Southwest Conference may find itself hard-pressed to bat .500 this week in eight attractive intersectional football jousts, including four on the road in the deep south.

Baylor is at Auburn, Southern Methodist is at Alabama, Houston is at Florida and Texas Christian is at Tennessee as the SWC goes four-on-four against the Southeast Conference. In every game, the SWC is the underdog.

Auburn is a 5 1/2 point favorite over Baylor, Tennessee is an 18-point choice over TCU, Alabama is a 22-point nod over SMU, and Florida is an 8-point selection over Houston.

In other games, 11th ranked Texas A&M is a 19-point favorite over Kansas State at College Station, 19th rated Texas is a 15-point favorite over North Texas State in Austin, 12th ranked Arkansas is a field goal selection over Oklahoma State at Little Rock, and the Rice-Utah matchup at Houston is rated pick 'em.

A good deal of the SWC word world revolves around injury situations.

Will fullback Earl Campbell be ready to play for Texas?

Can untested quarterback Mike Scott do the job for Arkansas in the absence of injured Ron Calcagni?

Can tailback Cleveland Franklin go all-out for the Baylor Bears with his bruised knee?

Then there's SMU Coach Ron Caprock.

Meyer's flat-out prediction: "We're going to beat Alabama. I told nobody to get on the plane unless they believe that... just stay home if they don't."

And there's the intrigue of North Texas' first meeting in history with the University of Texas. The Mean Green will be greeted with less than open arms by a Texas team shocked 14-13 by Boston College last week.

Texas Coach Darrell Royal said of North Texas "They are a good football team. They are about like we are. They have two outstanding quarterbacks, and they put a lot of people up on the line of scrimmage

defensively."

For the record, Royal has closed Texas practices to the public for the remainder of the year.

"The reason is obvious," said Royal. "There are some people we don't want knowing what we are doing, mainly our opposition."

North Texas Coach Hayden Fry said "Boston College winning is the worst thing that could have happened to us. They have lost only eight home openers in more than 80 seasons. I believe they haven't lost at home since 1967. It will take a super, super effort against Texas."
