Public Clinic, Low Utilization Costs Absorbed

Hospital Budget Records Surplus Income

Members of the Deaf Smith General Hospital Board of Directors reviewed a financial report for the fiscal year ending Sept. 30, 1976, approved a bid for an operating room light, and discussed a letter concerning emergency room charges at their meeting Tuesday

morning. Hospital Administrator Ron Welty reviewed the financial report of the recently-completed fiscal year, which showed that the hospital wound up with \$11,366 in excess of income over expenses for the period.

THE HOSPITAL'S NET total income for the year was \$1,524,181, excluding \$126,374 tax income for bond requirements while the hospital's expenses totaled \$1,512,815.

The fact that the hospital finished the year in the black was significant,

A significant decline in patient utilization occurred during the first part of 1976, and the death of Dr. C.E. Hicks in February along with the resignation of Dr. J.H. McCrary aggravated an already serious shortage of physicians in Hereford.

In response to the shortage of physicians the hospital began staffing its emergency room on weekends to allow local physicians time off from heavy work loads, and to make physician services more accessible to the community.

Also, the hospital assumed the operation of the public health clinic located on the second floor of the hospital building in January. That move, along with the staffing of the emergency room on weekends increased the outpatient load, while inpatient utilization decreased due to the smaller medical staff.

The cost of the health clinic alone ran \$44,121 since January.

BOARD MEMBER Dr. Hap Cavness offered a word of commendation to Administrator Welty for his guidance during the year. "It's commendable that the hospital finished in the black despite the circumstances," he said.

Despite increases in the hospital payroll, employe benefits and the cost of indigent care, the hospital still reduced expenses by \$26,717 over the fiscal year ending September 1975.

The hospital's payroll increased \$4,524 last year, from \$850,047 to \$854,571. while the employee benefits were increased from \$21,295 to \$33,020 due mainly to an increase in group health benefits, and the indigent care total increased \$10,764, up to \$27,735.

In comparison to the projected revenue

and expense of the year, the hospital did relatively well. A revenue of \$1,592,875 had been forecast for the year, while only \$1,524,181 actually emerged.

On the other side of the coin, however, the hospital spent less than forecast. The total operation expense had been forecast at \$1,487,875 while only \$1,441,674 actually occurred.

A breakdown of professional activities showed that only in surgical procedures, public health clinic patients, outpatient visits, and immunization did the hospital experience increases.

Surgical procedures were up to 784 from 772 the year before while the hospital attended 2,053 public health clinic patients and 6,251 outpatients. About 3,115 immunizations were

The total of patients admitted during the year was down 223 from the year before while total patient days in the hospital were down to 11,998 from 14,285 the year before.

THE NUMBER OF LIVE BIRTHS WAS also down from the previous year, 385-401, and the maximum daily census of patients was down from 62 to 53.

Welty reported that the hospital experienced a loss of \$18,000 during the month of October, but that things were looking better in November.

"Last month the hospital utilization was down from the year before, but we are looking for a change this month since we have been relatively busy," he said. In a review of bids concerning a light for the new operating room, the board approved the sole bid received.

Frank C. Stewart Associates, Inc. of Oklahoma City submitted a bid of \$5,610 for the light. The company is the exclusive distributor of the lights. The bid



The council voted 14-1 in favor of recommending that the General Assembly admit Vietnam to membership, but the dissenting vote from one of the five permanent members- the United States- killed the recommendation.

BRASILIA (AP)- Three cars fueled entirely with alcohol have completed a 5,000 mile tour of Brazil to publicize alcohol as a substitute for gasoline. Technicians for the Brazilian air force, which sponsored the marathon, said the modified engines performed flawlessly in all weathers and got 36 miles to the gallon on asphalt and 30 miles on a 950-mile stretch of dirt road.

WASHINGTON (AP)- The Postal Service says its success in trimming its work force has helped it post its first surplus in four years. Postmaster General Bentamin F. Bailar

Postmaster General Benjamin F. Bailar said Monday that the Postal Service's \$15 million surplus in the quarter that ended Sept. 30 means it probably will not have to raise the cost of mailing letters next year. The government-subsidized mail agency, which lost \$1.2 billion in the fiscal year that ended last June 30, still expects to lose \$500 million in fiscal 1977, which began last month, Bailar said.

City Awards Kids Inc. Funds, Prohibits Lee Street Traffic

The Hereford City Commission was met Monday night with onslaught of varied business including the request by Kids Inc. of Hereford for funds it needs committed to the four-diamond baseballsoftball park it is planning to build.

With all commissioners present at the city hall, the city fathers decided to approve over \$13,100 for the Kids Inc., approved two bids concerning water wells and a water line in Veterans Park, passed an ordinance to halt heavy traffic on Lee Street, heard a budget report and accepted the low bid on a new moving traffic radar detector for the Hereford Police Department.

The bid for the radar amounted to \$1,685 for a unit to be used by the police to feret out speeding motorists. It was the low bid out of three submitted and was awarded to MPH manufacturers.

Chuck Cosper, local game warden and president of Kids Inc., approcahed the commissioners with a total of eight members of the board for the fund request. It followed a presentation/a week ago before the Deaf Smith County Commissioners Court, which Kids Inc.

want to appropriate the same amount. The organization is applying for a federal grant through the state Parks and Wildlife Department. It would pay for half of the proposed \$88,000 recreational park, which is to be built on 30 acres of land already purchased by the county for multi-recreational activities.

The county declined approval until action was taken by the city.

The vote by the commissioners only comits the funds tentatively based on Kids Inc. receiving the grant and raising the other money through local sources. While the city and county would pay for about \$26,000 if all entities agree, Cosper said that local civic groups could be tapped for the rest. The grant is based on half of the money being raised locally.

Commissioner Frank Barrett and Mayor Jim Sears expressed the concern that fund requests ought to be submitted and approved when the budget is formulated, not at other times. Commissioner Emory Brownlow favored the park and supported the Kids Inc.

All vehicles heavier than one ton will

no longer be allowed to travel on Lee Street as a result of the ordinance. Such cars and trucks may not park, drive or be towed on the avenue. A fine is imposed for violations.

The area on Lee prohibited to heavy traffic extends from Highway 60 to 25-Mile Avenue.

The street is currently being repaired and the use of the street by heavy vehicles, especially semi-trailer rigs, caused the road to erode.

The low bid of \$7,132.44 by Wall and Sons was accepted for the extension of four city wells in the city's southwest field. The wells when extended deeper will allow for improved water supply for Hereford. The other bid was from Water Industries for \$7,600.

The other bid accepted from Jordan of Amarillo for a three-inch water line in Veterans Park. It amounted to \$3,764. A \$2,000 grant for the local Bicentennial Committee will finance part of the expense to improve the park area of town.

It was the low bid out of six submitted. City tax collections are at 91 per cent as of Nov. 1 according to the budget report. This compares with 88 per cent at this time last year. City Manager Dudley Bayne said the taxes are just coming in better with a few larger accounts paying



Ann Landers Grime Upsets Wife

DEAR ANN LANDERS: I have been married for nine years to an auto mechanic whose hands get covered with grime. DEAR WIFE: Can your husband work in rubber gloves, the type surgeons wear? Buy him a pair and ask him to try it. Another alternative is a somewhat new product -- a liquid which forms an invisible "glove." After applying this coating the grease and oil wash off with ordinary soap and

Edges Closer

The University of Pittsburgh's still-comfortable lead over UCLA was narrowed slightly in The Associated Press' college football ratings released today.

Meanwhile, Southern California, Michigan and Texas Tech retained the 3-4-5 spots, while Georgia climbed into a sixth-place tie with Maryland, Oklahoma returned to the Top Ten after a four-week absence and unbeaten Rutgers cracked the Top Twenty for the first time this season.

Pitt ran its record to 10-0 with a 24-16 triumph over West Virginia last Saturday. The Panthers received 44 first-place votes and 1,206 of a possible 1,260 points from a nationwide panel of 63 sports writers and broadcasters.

UCLA, a 45-14 winner over Oregon State, got 13 first-place ballots and 1,093 points. Pitt's margin last week was 1,226-1,093 and UCLA also sliced Pitt's edge in first-place votes from 49-7 and 44-13.

Southern Cal, which beat Washington 20-3, received one first-place mention and 866 points, while Michigan, the No.

until a loss to Purdue two weeks ago, rebounded to beat Illinois 38-7 and was accorded two first-place votes and 834 points.



They remember him for Bridget Loves Bernie.

But now Birney has returned to the regular television wars, in a role so diametrically opposed to the character in his last series that he hopes people will recognize his wide scope as an actor. Birney, of course is the star of Serpico, an NBC series (Friday nights at 10-11), bringing to the small screen the further adventures of a former real-life New York undercover cop named Frank Serpico, who was so conscientious, that when Serpico was shot in the face by a punk, his fellow cops took up a collection -- for a lawyer for the perpetrator.

Serpico was first portrayed in a feature film by Al Pacino. The film grossed over \$20,000,000. It was expanded into a TV pilot, with Birney in the role of cop who fought corruption within the department as well as criminals.

When the company came into New York for several weeks of shooting, a police car drove up to Birney one afternoon on a street location, and the cop at the wheel wanted to know what film they were shooting.

"It's a television series --Serpico," Birney answered. The cop in the police car made a sour face, raised the

back of his fingers to the underside of his chin and flicked them out in a wellknown gesture of contempt. They're not too crazy about Serpico around New York police circles.

Serpico wrote a book about his experiences in New York, which Birney read."I wanted to get a feel of the character," Birney

What was his reaction to Pacino's portrayal in the film? "Pacino is a good actor, too," Birney said with a smile. "But there are certain things that will come out differently.

Birney's reaction to his Bridget Loves Bernie experience is mixed. The show did have good ratings. Why not? It was sandwiched be tween All in the Family and Mary Tyler Moore Show on Saturdays. It was a false security, and the network (CBS) realized that. Unfavorable reviews were universal and the show was cancelled after just a single season, although it ranked in the top 20 most of the season.

"But I had a complicated reaction," Birney confesses. I enjoyed doing it, I was disappointed in the level of achievement. It was no relief when it was over."

But the biggest bonus from that series was that he won a wife. He married the young lady who played Bridget, Meredith Baxter. They now have a little daughter, (Meredith has two children from a previous marriage).



Now In Session

The Supreme Court of the United States is now in session! And of the cases to be decided, a significant several involve the rights of women.

The United States Supreme Court, since 1970, has been consistent in affirming the rights of women.

The court has forbidden job discrimination against mothers with preschool children, has struck down mandatory maternity leave for pregnant teachers, has upheld ordinances forbidding newspapers to designate help-wanted ads by sex.

But there are enough additional sex discrimination cases now before the court to revolutionize the role of women in American society and industry.

Women working for General Electric in four states contend that they are entitled to disability payments for preg-

General Electric claims that pregnancy is a "voluntary disability" and a desirable condition, rather than an illness or an accident.

The high court must decide. Another thing: In Philadelphia women veterans are excluded from membership in the Veteran of Foreign Wars. The high court must decide-and that consideration is not quite so simple as it sounds.

The court must also resolve two more abortion controversies: the refusal of some municipal hospitals to perform elective abortions and the denial of Medicaid money for that

Among the civil liberties issues before the court are the free speech rights of homosexual employees who may be threatened with dismissal for

advocating gay causes. The court docket includes a number of children's rights cases, asking the justices to set legal guidelines for corporal punishment in schools, for commitment to mental institutions and for the sale of nonprescription contraceptives to juveniles.

Ruling Could Put Teeth In **Gun Regulations**

BROWNSVILLE, Tex. (AP)-An assistant U.S. attorney says a ruling handed down in federal district court case here will put "some teeth" into the laws governing the sale of firearms and ammunition.

Charles Lewis said Monday the ruling signed last week by U.S. District Judge Owen Cox of Corpus Christi holds a "corporation responsible for the acts of its employes."

Specifically, Gibson Products Co., Inc., of McAllen was found guilty in connection with the illegal sale of firearms to foreign

The firm was charged and ruled guilty on 19 counts involving falsifying records on federal firearms sale forms.

Sentencing was set for Dec. 13 with a maximum penalty being a \$5,000 fine per count.

Paris Court Denies Yanks Extradition

PARIS (AP)-A Paris court Monday denied extradition of four Americans accused of hijacking a Delta airlines plane to Algiers in 1972, but ordered them tried in France on the hijacking charge.

The court accepted the pleas of the four, residents of the Detroit, Mich., area, that they had acted for political reasons. In its extradition request, the United States claimed the two men were fleeing prosecution for common crimes and the two women had only followed them.

The prosecutor recommended that George Brown, 28, Joyce Tillerson, 25, Melvin McNair, 30, and Jean McNair, 30, be turned over to the U.S. authorities. The four were arrested in Paris on May 28 and have been held on charges of using false passports. George Wright, listened as a member of the hijack party, is still at large. Three small children were aboard the plane when it arrived in Algiers but were turned over to relatives in the United States.

The United States said Brown and Wright escaped from the Leesburg, N.J., state prison in 1970. Brown was serving a term

sentence for murder. McNair is

wanted as any army deserter. The plane was hijacked while in a flight from Detroit to Boston and forced to land at Miami. A ransom of \$1 million was put aboard there before the flight to Algiers. Algerian authorities confiscated the money and returned it to the Untied States.

Defense attorneys argued that the four had proven their political motive by saying ransom money was to be turned over to the Black Panther office in Algiers.

The decision that the four should be tried in France on the hijack charge marked a change from a previous case involving accused American hijackers. The court also denied extradition of Willy Holder and Catherine Kerkow, who hijacked a plan to Algiers a month before the Detroit group, but did not order their trial on the hijack charge.
