Tornadoes:

Tips On What To Do And Where To Go During This Annual Season

With the tornado season on its way in, there are several tips as how to best protectiones self and family.

First, it helps to know the difference between the words, "Watch" and "Warning". A watch simply means that the weather bureau sees a need to place a certain area in a watch zone, so each can be aware that bad weather may appear. At that time, one has time to place personal belongings in a safe place then go on about as normal, but keeping up with any weather bulletins.

A Warning means that a tornado has been sighted and a person should take immediate action to get to a place of safety.

CHECKING with some of the schools in this area, Roger Huber, assistant principal at La Plata says, "We move the students out into the designated hall ways, which are the ones that are the farthest point from all windows and openings as soon as a warning is given, and we have tornado and evacuation drills and all students know what they are to do."

Charles Duvall, principal of Northwest Elementary, says, "We have all students assigned to designated areas to go to and stay while we are continually listening to the radio. If a tornado is coming in our direction, we then take further precautions such as crouching on floor and books over the head and anything else that might protect every child.

"If there are parents that are planning on picking up their child, they should always come to the office, never go to the childs room. One parent can not pick up another child from another family, unless we have this permission in writing before hand. If either of these are your plans, you need to make arrangements with the office soon."

THE PROCEDURE for Hereford High School is as

Each floor of students are designated a certain place down on the first floor to report, also those that are up on the top floors are assigned which staircase to use to get to the first floor.

Students are to remain quiet at all times and be prepared

for further instructions. Students are reminded to keep away from all windows and openings during bad weather such as hail, high winds, and tornados.

FROM THE Weather Bureau: Tips for everyone that should be followed in case of a

tornado are as follows:

If a tornado warning is issued for this area, move immediately to a cellar, basement, or civil defense shelter. If a person is in a home or other building with no basement, he should go to the lowest level in the center of the house or building. Take shelter in a small room or closet or under heavy furniture.

AT HOME, open a few windows to allow for sudden air pressure changes. Then find shelter.

Stay away from windows and buildings with wide, freespan roofs.

In open country, escape by moving at a right angle to the tornado's path. If there is no time to escape, lie flat in a ditch or ravine but do not stay in a car.

Get far enough away from a trailer or mobile home to avoid injury if it is overturned.

WHEN a tornado is sighted it should be reported promptly to the nearest law officer of National Weather Service Office. Otherwise, officials advise not to make calls so that lines can be kept open for emergency information.

After a tornado, people should always wear shoes and gloves in cleanup operations and damage inspections. Watch for hazards like broken or downed electrical wires and broken gas pipes. When entering a storm-damaged building, watch for ceilings and walls that may be ready to fall.

Never light a match, smoke or carry open flames into a building until it is assured there are no gas leaks:

Do not sight see in disaster areas. Unauthorized persons only hamper rescue and cleanup operations.

Weather officials advise local residents to do everything that is possible to keep from causing panic, and try to remain in a calm attitude so it is possible to hear all further developments.

RESULTS OF the school board election Saturday are not in this issue since, as most readers know, we print our paper on Saturday afternoon. A large voter turnout was anticipated since eight candidates were vying for the two trustee posts, and interest seemed to be running

high.

The school trustee serves a vital role in the community, and performs a non-paying job that often offers little reward except the satisfaction of knowing he, or she, is providing an active voice in the education of our children.

A LADY called our office this week to complain about the traffic hazard at the drive-up mail boxes on 4th street. It's not a new complaint, and the situation has not gone unnoticed by this writer during some trips by the boxes.

People drop their mail in the boxes from all directions — driving up and sliding over in the front seat to reach out the car window, parking and walking around to the slots in the boxes, and parking across the street (either legally or illegally) and dashing across for the mail drop.

And, as the caller points out, it's sometimes dangerous to make a right-hand turn after depositing the mail. Motorists who have pulled around the mail-box line of traffic often take a right turn in the path of cars pulling out from the mail boxes.


A CHECK with Postmaster Nolan Grady revealed that he hears about the situation regularly and frequently, but cannot offer a solution. The postal department turned down a request for a drive in facility and is also opposed to an "island" in the street.

At one time, Grady reports, the possibility of making the alley behind the post office a one-way thoroughfare was considered, with the drive-up boxes. I placed behind the building. However, the unloading zone for the grocery store on the north end of the block made this impractical as the alley would be blocked

much of the time.

A solution that comes to mind is the possibility of making 4th a one-way street going east. Whether this is feasible for Hereford might be a question for some traffic experts, and there are more factors to consider. Would more than one block need to be considered in such a plan? Would firms along the street approve?

One way may not be the way, but we'd like to see the city commission study the problem. We need the boxes, but they need to be located for a safer, more efficient flow of traffic.

Candidates List Expenses, Name Campaign Managers

Opposed candidates for local political offices this week filed their list of expenditures and contributors for the first part of campaigning for election.

In addition, all candidates for school and county offices, listed their campaign managers along with the detailed list of expenditures.

Under the new campaign laws, this year all candidates who have opponents must file sworn statements listing all their campaign expenditures. Those statements are a matter of public record and are filed with County Clerk B.F. Cain.

THE THREE candidates for county judge have all spent reasonably about the same during early campaigning. All expenditures listed covered initial costs of printing and advertising materials such as cards. Very little media advertising was listed in the initial report., All expenditures for the candidates in

the commissioner races also mainly covered initial campaign material expenses.

Candidates for the school board also filed their initial expense reports with school tax assessor collector Orpha Click and their expenses almost totally covered newspaper and radio advertising

Watson Out To Separate Crimes From Criminals

Larry Watson, Hereford's new Juvenile Probation Officer, with offices in the County Courthouse, came here from Amafillo after serving 2 years in the same capacity.

His training was as an undergraduate at Texas Tech in Social Sciences and is now working on his Masters at Sam Houston State in Criminology and Corrections. He attends the college each summer and will begin his third year this summer. He spends some time writing his thesis on "Run-Away youths."

As for Watson's duties here, he stresses the fact that he is

HIS JOB is broken down into three categories as follows:
1. Delinquent conduct; 2. Children in need of supervision;
3. and habitual violator of fineable misdemeanors.

Watson says, "I supervise caseload of official and administrative probation cases. A child on probation usually reports to me once a week, along with my making home visits, and having school conferences."

He pointed out that the average citizen-seeing what he

believes to be a juvenile committing a crime would not report it to him but report it directly to the police. Law enforcement officers would be the ones to bring it to the juvenile probation officers' attention, if necessary.

"WE HAVE a new policy that I think will help," says Watson, "We will issue a warning ticket in cases for minor infractions. One copy will be given to the child, one copy to the parents, and the other will be in my file."

Probation officers is a coming profession and looking for
people to go into probation work, better known as The Field
of Criminal Justice," says Watson.

THE MANUAL on criminology shows that in 1972 youths 17 and under accounted for 39.9 per cent of all index-crime arrests and about one-half of all burglary theft, auto-theft arrests.

Watson concluded with, "I am out to help all kids of this community and would like to work with these cases to keep kids from being sent to institutions for infractions that could be solved with supervision."

He is married and has one daughter, Rhonda. His wife Judy works at Deaf Smith General Hospital.

Have you noticed the gradual shift in the sales pitch for foreign cars lately? "It's not a matter of price, it's the economy and the quality of construction"

The reason is that the foreign car is no longer competitive in price, and price has been the only really strong thing going for the imported car.

Detroit has pushed the big car for years because the profit margins are substantially higher. The difference in the manufacturing costs of a Cadillac over a Chevrolet are not that significant, but the markup is.

The problem in Germany and Japan has been a high rate of inflation in both countries. The price of raw materials has skyrocketed while labor costs continue to rise. So the importer either cuts his price to compete and sees his profit margins disappear or he raises his prices. to protect his profit margins and loses potential sales.

ONE ANSWER to the problem is for the foreign car manufacturer to make even smaller, more economical cars than the American made compacts. Both Fiat and Honda have cars much smaller than the Ford Pinto, with better than 30 mpg performance.

However, as the fuel shortage eases, the emphasis on fuel economy will not be as critical as it was several months ago



BEEF! BEEF! BEEF! It's really amazing how easy it is to take things for granted or to be almost completely unaware of what goes on right here in our immediate vicinity. The volume of beef production is unbelievable. Just ask someone, you feel should be, in the know, how many head of cattle are fed in the feedlots in Deaf Smith County in one year. The an-

swers you get may surprise you. We did some checking and found that the one-time capacity for feedyards in the county is almost 4000,000. You can use a factor of 2 to 2.4 to determine the number fed yearly. Now that's just in the county can you imagine what kind of figure we'd have in a 50mile radius of Hereford?

Okay, using Southwestern Public Service figures with a 9per cent incerease over 1973, the 'one time' feedlot capacity is 1,587,000-with a turnover factor of only 2, you can see that we are the very center of the cattle feeding industry with an annual campacity of well over 3 million head. That's pretty hard to realize, but it sure is a lot of beef. But there's more to it.

Just visualize the total effort to support such a monstrous industry the feed required for each animal each day averages roughly 20 pounds. Now miltiply. that by 3 million. Takes a lot of acres to grow that kind of tonnage and to haul it, and to move the cattle first to the pens, and then to the packing plants. And speaking of packing



plants, within a 50-mile radius of Hereford there are eight packing plants and the ninth is under construction (Most of the other eight have recently expanded, are in the process, or

are planning expansion.) The combined daily capacity of these plants, based on one eight-hour shift is more than 10,000 head-that's a whole lot of steaks, roasts, and hamburger.

Down, Down. . . Broilers Not Chicken Feed ... Citrus Crop Report Shows Decline.

For the 17th consecutive month, milk production has shown a decline. In Texas, milk production during February dropped four per cent below a year ago, and seven per cent under a month ago. Milk production in Texas during February totaled 244,000,000 pounds.

Milk production per cow averaged 700 pounds during February. This is 10 pounds below last year and 50 pounds below the previous month.

Nationwide, milk production during February showed a three per cent decline. Production during the first two months of 1974 was three per cent below the corresponding period a year ago.

Milk production per cow on a nationwide basis stabilized during February. Production per cow was 776 pounds; this is the same as a year ago. But it is six per cent below January of this year.

Milk cows on farms during February totaled 11,227,000 head. This is down three per cent from the same month a year ago.

Meanwhile, dairy price supports to become effective April 1, will be at the lowest level permitted by law-80 per

Continued high cost of production is the main reason for a continuing decline in milk production.

For example, Texas dairymen paid an average of \$137 per ton for mixed dairy feed (16 per cent protein) in January compared to \$105 per ton in February of 1973.

Texas dairymen paid an average of \$86 per ton in February for baled alfalfa hay compared to \$71 per ton in February of 1973.

THE BROILER business in Texas is not chicken feed, according to a summary from the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

Gross income from broilers in Texas during 1973 totaled \$146,221,000. This is an increase of more than \$50,000,000 over 1972. Average price received for 1973 was 22.8 cents per

pound liveweight. This is the highest average price since 1955 when it was 25.5 cents per pound. The 1973 average price was 8.6 cents per pound higher than in 1972.

Texas is in seventh place in the nation in the number of broiler chicks placed in 1973, Commercial broilers placed in the state last year totaled 178,991,000. This is a three per cent decrease from 1972.

The weekly high for placements was 3,994,000 during the week of March 31; the lowest was 2,852,000 during the week of October 27.

APRIL: 'A busy month for gardeners.

It brings no let up in garden work. Indeed, there is many tasks waiting to be done. As we tackle these chores it would be well to remember that eternal vigilance and constant abplication to the tasks at hand are the price of later success.

With this in mind and spade in hand I went into the garden to do some digging. As I worked I heard a gush of birdsong, felt the warmth of the sunshine, drank in the beauty of the blooming flowers and frees. smelled the lushness of the spaded soil, watched the green grass as it waved silently in the morning breezes. Yes it was good to be alive.

Today (Tuesday) as I set at the typewriter trying to think, I often look outside, and admit that I agree with the one who wrote, "Spring is not the best of seasons. Aching backs, runny nose, (from spring allergy); warm yesterday, cold and blustery today; wind in strong gusts causing the soil to blow, which makes visibility bad, bad. Whoever said Spring was romantic? Really today the word that best applies is frantic!"

Days like this are good days to read, plan, write and think. One exciting thing I have read is the brochure sent me by a friend in Hopewell, Va. relative to the tours and garden pilgrimages which are to be sponsored by the state garden clubs of Virginia, April 20 through 28.

Nixon Picks Four

President Nixon recently named four possible Republican candidates for the 1976 election-Nelson Rockefeller of New York, Governor Ronald Reagan of California, John Connally of Texas and Vice President Gerald Ford.

The President put their names forward at a breakfast meeting with a group of G.O.P. Congressmen, though he didn't endorse any one.

Mr. Nixon also told the approximately fifty legislators Watergate wouldn't be the issue in this fall's election, but peace and prosperity.

Of the four Nixon picks, Reagan is ahead in many polls.
Ford has moved into contention since becoming Vice President, Rockefeller is considered the dark-horse and Connally the favorite of many business and conservative groups.

Of the four, Reagan and Rockefeller are completely disassociated with Watergate. Connally and Ford are also, though Connally served in the White House in 1973 and Ford has come to Mr. Nixon's defense on Watergate in 1973 and this year.

Much depends, in the nomination derby, on whether the nation is moving to the right or otherwise, as of 1976. Current indications are that the country is moving rightward in overall sentiment. That drift, of course, favors Reagan, and possibly Connally.

The Democratic Candidates

The tendency for more than a year has been to assume the Democratic presidential nominee in 1976 will have it made.

At the recent meeting of the Democratic National Committee in Washington, however, there were warnings that this might not prove true.

Democratic candidates for Congress this year are conceded fine odds, even by Republicans, but in 1976 not only will two more years have elapsed but the G.O.P. will have a new standard bearer.

And the Democrats, as yet, have no really strong candidate. Senator Ted Kennedy is himself touched by scandal. Senator George McGovern was so badly thrashed in 1972 he isn't a major contender. Senator Henry Jackson failed to catch on in 1972 and is a question mark. Senator Edmund Muskie flopped so badly in 1972 he's not a likely nominee two years hence. Etc. The Democrats too, then, are not well positioned, politically.

A strong, fresh Republican candidate will face odds there are more Democrats than Republicans—but they won't be hopeless odds, and could be very misleading odds.

Subpoenaing Nixon

The business of subpoening the President is now in the farce stage. Even state court judges are now getting into the act. Of course, every judge who does so knows he is instantaneously national headlines.

So we have the spectacle of courts and committees, private organizations and various prosecutors falling overthemselves to subpoena the President to testify in this or that Watergate-related controversy.

There is, of course, no possibility the President could carry out the duties and demands of his office effectively if he were compelled to obey every judge, prosecutor and committee probing Watergate. That is behind some (not all) of the harassment.

Democrats Looking For Landslide

MAIN STREET, U.S.A. By Bert Mills

Congress has not accomplished much this year and it is beginning to look like some major issues will be sidetracked until next year on the theory that a Democratic landslide in November will make passage of controversial legislation easier in 1975.

Democratic leaders of Congress deny any such plan, although they do predict bit gains in the election. However, one important arm of the Democratic party, the AFL-CIO, has announced its intention of following a "wait-until-75" policy:

Liberals have been frustrated for the past five years by the successful tactics of President Nixon in refusing to spend appropriated funds which he considers unwise and in making his vetoes stick. Only once has Congress been able to override a Nixon veto.

Labor leaders have proclaimed plans to elect a "veto-proof Congress" next November. This implies not only retaining Democratic control of the House and Senate but increasing majorities so heavily that a two-thirds vote to override a White House veto will be achieved regularly.

This could happen, as even some Republicans concede. However, the elections are seven months ahead and it is a bit early to be making predictions, chiefly on the basis of a few special elections for House seats.

President Nixon has become more conservative in the recent past. This theory refers to the "33-plus-one" plot that the President is supposed to have devised to save his own job.

This line of thought assumes that the House will impeach the President and that there will be a trial of those charges in the Senate. A two-thirds vote will be necessary to convict

the President. Thus if there are 34 votes of "not guilty", Nixon will remain as President.

There are 42 Republicans in the current Senate but some are anti-Nixon, and a party line vote is not anticipated. Some of Nixon's best friends in the Senate are southern Democrats who could be expected to vote agains his conviction.

One disgruntled Democrat, Rep. Morris K. Udall of Arizona, has said: "I think the President is changing his stand on legislation to placate the conservatives. The President finds himself with his back to the window and his first priority is not to offend his hard-core base."

There is evidence on the other side of this argument. For example, Nixon's \$304 billion budget and estimated \$9.4 billion deficit was hardly pleasing to conservatives, nor was his espousal of a \$2.30-per-hour minimum wage, nor his endorsement of a new Consumer Protection Agency.

RECENTLY THE American Conservative Union sent to the White House statements from 35 conservative Senators and Representatives, all protesting the record spending proposed by the President. A.C.U. charged the Nixon Budget is an Attempt "to assuage your liberal critics who have grown progressively more strident since

The only Senator elected by the Conservative party, James L. Buckley of New York, recently called upon the President to resign. Several other conservatives have sounded a similar note. One theory is that they are concerned that Nixon's presence may cause a liberal landslide in the November election.

Under attack from the left and the right, the President may decide he is on the proper course. It is the middle-of-the roaders who determine the nation's path, not those on either extreme.

Talk Of Texas

TEXANS AT WORK — Joe Surovik is a county agricultural extension agent, but he rarely sees a farm. He spends most of his time at sea.

As the first marine county agent in Texas history, he travels the Gulf coast helping fishermen in their search for shrimp, oysters, crabs and other marketable seafood. Although he is officially attached to Calhoun County and headquarters at Port Lavaca, the entire Texas coast is his assignment.

TEEPEE FIREWATER — The Tigua Indians, who still live at Ysleta, an El Paso suburb, believe that good whiskey, like charity, begins at home.

They call their product "tesweeno" and it really is a kind of home brew made from corn. However, those who have sampled it say that it has the potency of 100 proof bourbon, and then some.

The manufacturing process begins in a shallow four-by-six foot trench that has had a thin layer of sand spread over the bottom. The sand is then covered by a layer of corn and topped with more sand. A piece of burlap is then spread over the whole thing and watered regularly until the corn sprouts.

When the corn sprouts are an inch high, they are removed, cleaned and dried. The seedlings next are finely ground and five pounds of the resulting meal is mixed with five gallons of water and cooked. After cooking, raw sugar and orange peel are added and the product is set aside to ferment.

The result? Wow!

Fringe benefits like sick leave,
hospitalization insurance and coffee
breaks were unheard of for workers
in Texas a century ago.

Under an Act Regulating Conhacts for Labor passed by the Legislature in 1866, an employe bound himself to work for the duration of any agreement he signed with an employer. He couldn't break the contract unless he could prove that he was treated harshly. The employer could cancel it at any time.

If a worker became ill, he forfeited all wages. If he refused to work for any reason (or if his employer accused him of laziness), he lost double his wages for a period of up to three days. If he still refused to work, or failed to produce to his employer's liking, he was in real trouble. The law empowered the courts to sentence him to work on "roads, streets or other public works, without pay, until the offender consents to return to his labor."

No employe could be absent from his job without permission. If he was, he was fined 25 cents an hour or \$2 a day. And entertaining visitors on the job was strictly prohibited by

America Needs A Two Party System

Will we sin have the Republican party to kick around after the 1974 elections? A lot of people are speculating that we might not, and the preliminary evidence is hardly reassuring.

Still, Americans have a habit of greatly exaggerating political obituaries.

After the McGovern debacle — which many commentators ascribed to a "takeover" of the Democratic Party by its extremist left wing — there were predictions aplenty that the Democrats were "committing suicide."

Same prediction about the Republicans, following Goldwater's race against Johnson.

AND HOW'S this for a chronicle of political failure: Failed in business in '31 . . . defeated for legislature in '32 . . . again failed in business '33 . . . elected to legislature '34 . . . had nervous breakdown '36 . . defeated for speaker '38 . . . defeated for elector '40 . . . defeated for Congress '43 . . . defeated for Congress '48 . . . defeated for Senate '55 . . . defeated for vice president '56 . . . defeated for Senate '58.

What kind of political future would you give

a man like that? Well, in 1860 Abraham Lincoln finally won one. The big one.

So I don't think there is much danger of the Republicans becoming extinct, even if they have a terrible year at the polls.

THERE IS another danger that concerns me more. Historically, when either party has been overwhelmingly dominant the result has been much bad legislation. Indeed, it is usually public reaction against the excesses of the dominant party that ultimately breathes life back into its moribund opposition.

Our fendency to react against political excess is one of the greatest bulwarks of our liberty. But rapid swings between political extremes exact a price we would be better off avoiding. The man with one foot on hot coals and the other on a block of ice may feel fine "on the average," but he's suffering burns at one extreme and frostbite at the other.

When the ruling party is confronted with an opposition of healthy size, it is forced to proceed cautiously and to compromise reasonably. That's the way it should be.

I KNOW are executive—a Democrat—who likes to suggest to his fellow executives that more businessmen should join his party. His audience usually responds with the observation that the Republicans are supposed to be more "pro business." "If that's true," he answers, "then the Democrats need more members from the business community so they will have the benefit of their views, too."

Whether or not these simplistic assumptions about the orientation of the two parties is true, it is undeniably true that both encompass within themselves a wide diversity of political philosophy. That fact sometimes makes choices frustrating, but it also has a stabilizing influence that has served the country well.

Practically everybody seems to be in a "throw the rascals out" mood right now, and no wonder. But first, let's count to ten and then take a close look at the record of each particular rascal. Some of them may be worth preserving. And remember, too, no matter what party you support, it's a good idea to have enough of the other party around looking over their shoulders to keep your boys on their toes.
