Hereford Can Get It.

R. F. Holloway on Wednesday received a letter from F. T. Ramsey in regard to the establishment of a nursery business at this point in which that gentleman stated that he would be at Hereford in the course of a few days. In the meantime he requested Mr. Helloway to see what could be done in the way of land bonuses. Mr. Ramsey agrees if he comes here to plant at once from 30 to 60 bushels of peach seeds, and 30,000 or more small trees or grafts.

The following is the agreement of Mr. Ramsey, signed by himself, as a basis for Hereford citizens to work upon in order to get the nursery established here:

If I accept the bonus offered by the citizens of Hereford I will plant 30 bushels of peach seeds and 30,000 small trees and grafts or more. Within three years I agree to plant in nursery stock and orchard in and around Hereford as many acres as may now be given me within a half mile of the town line or within said fine but I can accept land a greater distance from the town on the bonus. Bonus should include a tract or block suitable for large packing house and heeling ground near center of the town. will also plant a few hundred trees at once in test orchard.

It can be seen by the above agreement that Mr. Ramsey does not ask

for any specified amounted land-he leaving it to the citizens of Hereford how large or small the nursery establishment shall be, but of course he would want enough to at least make a good showing. By the terms of his agreement he will make this business as large as the people of Hereford see fit by the amount of land the give him.

The Hereford Mercantile Co. Buys the Grocery and Dry Goods Branch of this Well Known Firm.

While it was well known that the Hereford Mercantile Co. has been negotiating for the purchase of the mercantile business of Smith, Wa'ke & Co. for some time past, many thought that the deal had fallen through, and it was not until Wednesday morning that the invoice was completed and the doors of the big store again thrown open to the public under the new management.

Smith, Walker & Co. are among the oldest of business firms in the Panhandle, and their retirement is a cause for regret among their old customers, many of whom looked upon their place of business as a home during their trading days in town. 


