Tucumcari Again to the Front.

About four weeks ago when we wrote up the Tucumcari killings, we stated that we expected to publish news from Tucumcari that would put that affair in the shade. One day last week Sam Gholson, now located about twenty miles from Tucumcari, but formerly of Lubbock county, became aware that he was being stalked by a band of men who had left their horses in a canyon and hid themselves at a water hole where Mr. Gholson was going to pull out some bogged cattle. Mr. Gholson called one of his men, named Bud Lee, who took a Winchester and rode between the would-be assassins and their horses and Mr. Gholson got to the top of a hill about six or seven hundred yards away from the water hole and with a long range rifle he commenced to pump lead into the men who were in plain sight. Mr. Gholson is a splendid shot so he killed five of the men outright and wounded the other five, two of whom have died since the battle, so the Champion is informed. The battle raged for nearly two hours before the wounded men surrendered too badly wounded to make resistance. The wounded men have been taken to jail and the dead buried. Neither Lee nor Gholson were injured but Lee had a close call as the horn was shot off his saddle as he rode to cut the men off from their horses. This battle is a continuation of the feud of three months ago when two men were killed in eastern New Mexico. We hope to be able to give further particulars next week. It is claimed that this battle virtually wipes out an organized band of cattle rustlers whose depredations extended through the whole of eastern New Mexico and southeastern Colorado.—Amarillo Champion.

Hog Feed.

If the parties who are inquiring about the different kinds of plants for hog pasture will sow a piece of ground, near where they keep their hogs, to barley or barley and oats, they will have a first-class early pasture long before clover or rape should be turned out. The barley should be drilled in, using four or five bushels per acre, so as to make a thick stand. Young pigs as well as older hogs are very fond of barley pasture, and it will last from the time it is three inches high until about the middle of June, by which time clover or rape will come in for a steady diet. Feed a little shelled corn to sows and little pigs until pigs are weaned, and then when peas and sweet corn are ready you will have a good growing ration until your field corn is ripe. Sow a piece of rye in September or earlier and you will have good late fall and early spring pasture for your hogs

Profitable Farming.

Remember that a crop of cowpeas may be grown after small grain or potatoes, and a profitable hay crop secured and the soil greatly benefited. The same crop can be grown among corn by planting when giving the last plowing, though it is better to plant the peas before the last plowing. Then if stalks and vines are harvested there is a fine crop of silage material, or it may be fed to cattle from the stack, if from any cause it cannot be shredded. Having saved a large amount of this sort of feed, be sure to have some good graded young cattle to feed it to, even if you have to buy some from your neighbors, or somebody else's neighbors. Do this and you will find that farming is not so unprofitable after all.—Farm and Ranch.

ONCE more we say, let us incorporate Hereford into a city.

A good rain at this time would be of inestimable value to our farmers and gardeners.

ARE you coming to Hereford the 4th? We will give you a good time and plenty to eat.

THIS has been an unprecedented year in the history of cattle shipping from Hereford, and the end is not in sight.

WORK for the upbuilding of Hereford by patronizing her merchants, no matter whether they advertise in this paper or not.

NEW houses are being built in every portion of the town, many of the newcomers settling here solely on account of the Hereford College.

THE Hereford College will be an everlasting monument to the enterprise and progressiveness of the citizens of the town and surrounding country.

FROM the odor which emanates from some of the out buildings in Hereford it is high time that the town was incorporated and these nuisances abated.

HEREFORD now has another living example of the progressiveness of her citizens, having carried a proposition to increase the taxes for school purposes by a large majority on Saturday last. The rate was raised from twelve cents on a hundred to twenty cents.

WHILE the college is an assured fact our citizens should not sit idly by and see the building of the same be delayed by want of funds. The cash needed for the enterprise should be forthcoming without necessitating the sale of the land so generously subscribed. Parties who are holding back on their investments should bear in mind that the money thus invested will be returned a thousand fold in the education of the rising generation and of the generations to come.

PARTIES who are in the habit of allowing their hogs and chickens to run at large should have inculcated in their brains the duty of doing unto others as they would be done by. The gardens of Hereford are being ruined by this nuisance and should be abated. Incorporation will do it.

WE take pleasure in correcting in another part of this issue the article clipped from the Amarillo Livestock Champion relating to the purported killing and wounding of a number of men near Tucumcari by Sam Gholson. Our informant states that he cannot conceive how the rumor got out, unless it was started by some space writer who was aching for a sensation and incidentally short of spending money.

WHILE nearly all the papers along the line of the Pecos Valley railroad are claiming that the new proposed extension of the road to some point on the Santa Fe main line in New Mexico will start from their respective towns, it is our opinion that the road when built will be started from Bovina. Our reasons for this statement are that the XIT owners are anxious to have a good town established at Bovina and as an inducement to have the road started at that point can give the railroad company a right of-way clear through to the New Mexico line and a glance at the map will show that Bovina is the nearest point on the line to Albuquerque, where it is expected the extension will terminate.

Explosion Kills Two Men.

About twelve miles north of Vernon, while doing some blasting on the new railroad, about 200 pounds of powder exploded and our informant tells us it threw Mr. Cannon, one of the workmen, 250 feet in the air. He fell in a pool of water and of course was dead when picked up. Mr. Brooks, another man, was blown about 200 feet and lived but thirty minutes. Mr. Brooks was simply a by-stander and watching the work. He has been a citizen of Vernon for several years. The body of Mr. Cannon was shipped to Kansas City for interment. No one else was injured.—Childress Post.

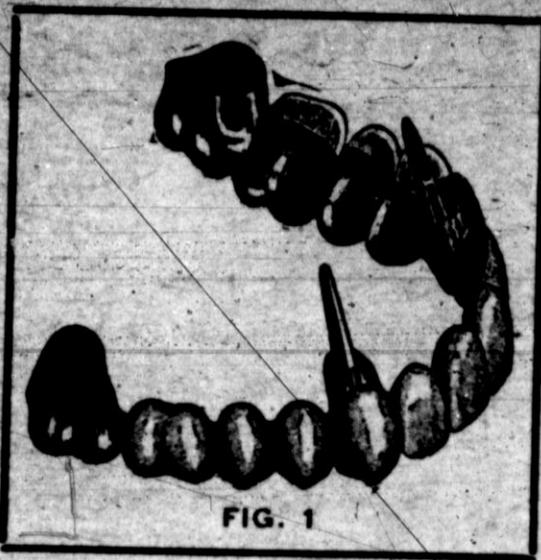

AS THE CUTS I have for this week only illustrate METAL WORK, I will describe how that class of work is done. You often see teeth without Plates advertised. Fig. 1 fully illustrates that class of work. You will readily see that the patient has four natural teeth, the second molars (which are crowned with gold) and the two canines (which are cut off and Richmond Crowns set). Then we set in Porcelaine facings and the piece of work is attached together with gold, which is commonly called a "Bridge." All of this class of work I do with coin gold, which is the toughest gold we can get. Those needing this class of work would do well to call and see my facilities for doing this branch of Dentistry. Figs. 2 and 3 illustrate smaller pieces of work. Fig. 4 shows surfaces of teeth, and is intended for a diagram showing the work done, which I

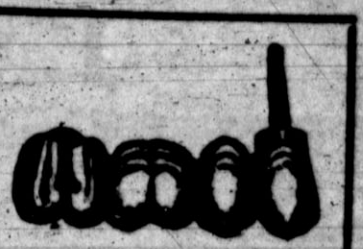

The Boer war has been concluded, and the concessions that the British have made to the Boers form a tribute to the bravery and persistence of the latter. London has gone wild, not so much over the celebration of victory as at the consummation of peace.

President Roosevelt has revoked the order by which the commanding general of the army acts as secretary of war in the absence of the secretary and assistant secretary. This is a direct blow at General Miles to show that he is no longer in the councils of the administration as he has opposed the policy of the war department.

A New York company has been formed to manufacture white lead by a new process. Genuine white lead is an oxidation of lead produced by acid and under the old Dutch process the corrosion occupies several months. The new process is essentially the same except that the lead is heated and separated into hair-like filaments, making the action of the acid more rapid, the whole process being complete in three days.

Secretary Root forwards to congress a statement of the receipts and expenditures of the civil govern-

ment in the Philippines showing an excess of receipts of which nearly \$700,000 is loot. The senate wants to know what the war is costing rather than a financial balance of the public civil revenues.

The country was shocked some years ago at the record of a "billion dollar congress." The present congress will discount that record by appropriating nearly that amount during a single session. Still no one may say that the highest point of republican extravagance has been reached.

President Roosevelt's recent speeches may be epitomized thus: To the Presbyterians; "Be good to your church and support it and the administration's Philippine policy." At Arlington: "Remember the illustrious dead and favor the republican regime in the Philippines."

Ex-President Cleveland has accepted an invitation to address the Tilden club of New York, June 19. This will be his first political speech since he left the White House. Most of the prominent democrats of the country will be present and the meeting points to the greatest harmony in the party.
