Costly Frauds.

The government prints hundreds of leaf the thick are not read by one person in five hundred, and all these are transported in the mails free. Immense numbers of packages of worthless seeds are sent over the country by mail free, and these are as worthless as the "pub. docs." The government awards mail carrying contracts based on heavily padded weights in which thousands of sacks of rubbish are weighed in. Not only does the government pay the railread companies more for transporting pail matter than is charged for any other kind of freight, but in addition mays in rent for the cars that carry the mail, several times the value of the cars every year. And yet there are members of congress and even officials of the postoffice department who would cure deficiencies in the postal returns by increasing the rates on secondclass matter newspapers and periodicals. If contract were honestly awarded, and electioneering matter required to may postage, there would be no deficit in postal revenues. As the tax payers have to make the deficits goods anyways, why not give them the financial favors instead of the railroads and the politicians? And what better favors could they receive than cheap postage on legitimate matter, and universal free delivery? Postal affairs need reforming, but not such reforms as abolish the beneficial features and retain the costly frauds and abuses. - Farm and Ranch.



Dear Sir-I write you for in mation. I am a school trustee district No. 1, Deaf Smith cour Texas. We have a special sch tax of 20 cents on each one hund dollars valuation of property.

Section 52 of the school laws sa in districts that levy a special sch tax, the trustees shall have right to increase the salaries teachers and the scholastic age a longer than six months if it deemed advisable. In this distr No. 1, Deaf Smith county, Tex the first and third propositions habeen accepted, and as proof the the scholastic age has been increas I have been instructed each year the last eight years by the Cour Judge acting as county superint dent to take the scholastic cens from six to twenty-one instead from eight to seventeen. Fifty cent of our school fund is deriv from special school tax. Abo district are from six to eight a from seventeen to twenty-one a whe other sixty are from eight seventeen years of age. So plea tell me whether from six to eig and from seventeen to twenty-or has the same right to attend o schools that those from eight seventeen years of age have or no J. C. WOMBLE.

Mr. J. C. Womble, Hereford, Texas. Dear Sir: In reply to your lette of the 2d inst, I beg to say that the state scholastic age is from eight to seventeen years, and in taking th census, children over eight an under seventeen years of age onl should be taken, and the inclusion of

all other children would be in direc violation of the law. The fact the Section 52 of the school laws allow the trustees to extend the scholasti age in districts levying a special ta ss no bearing whatever upon th state school age. Trustees in to districts can, if they deem it proper permit children from six to eigh years or over seventeen years of agto attend the schools, but that is a matter which must be regulated by the local authorities. I would no advise that trustees admit children into the schools under seven years of age, but certainly would counse them to pay teachers as large sala-ries as the funds will permit in order that there may be some permanency in their employment.

NOTES AND COMMENTS.

Pot Pouri of the Political World at Home and Abroad.

The New York Sun is still trying to explain why there was such a big Tammany vote. Why prolong the autopsy?

The President's message constitutes an able brief for the defense in the case of the People vs. Special Privilege...

Senator Mark Hanna sticks to his guns and announces that there should be no anti-trust legislation as it might disturb the unparalelled prosperity.

In the passing of ex-Speaker Reed the republican party has lost the most brilliant and aggressive debater since Blaine.

A Belgian physician has advanced what he considers a new theory of sex. There is nothing new in it and we doubt it anything comes of it but devertisement for the doctor.

The attempt of Representative Tayler of Ohio to prove invalid the Virginia constitution failed for lack of support in his own party.

An Antwerp lapidary has, after years of labor, cut a perfect finger ring out of a single diamond. Some jeweler will now cut a hole in papa's pocket book with this ring.

The president says, in his message, that some corporations "often with a tendency to monopoly" are not really bad. Monopolies not bad! How white black is, sometime.

The president is clearly the friend of the trusts though, like a loving parent, he would mildly control them, and yet he tells us that the trusts often have "a tendency to monopoly."

There are growing evidences that the people of New England do not welcome that kind of prosperity which increases the cost of living out of all proportion to the increase of income.

That sweet thing, Count Boni Castellane, should congratulate himself that he is out of the French Chamber of Deputies. They are so rude there that the members actually fight, kicking with their feet as is the custom with Frenchmen and mules.

The president, in his message, calls for protection of "game, and wild creatures generally." Probably his trips to Virginia and Mississippi were for "benevolent assimilation" merely.

Senator Lodge will now attempt to secure the gold standard for the Philippines. For monumental indecision and dilletante incompetence, recommend us to the bosom friend of the president.

During the recent British maneuvers in the Mediterranean the opposing squadrons were unable to make effective use of their wireless telegraphic outfits by reason of interference of the messages.

Antonio Maggio landed in New York 29 years ago with a harp, a good constitution and a clear conscience. Today his name is James E. March, he is a banker, has a country house and is republican leader of one of the Bowery wards.

Mr. Roosevelt says "There will undoubtedly be periods of depression the wave will recede." How can that be? Is not prosperity made by the tariff? Then why not prevent periods of depressions by maintaining the tariff? Is Mr. Roosevelt predicting democratic victories?

Members of the House Judiciary committee say there is little in Mr. Knox's recommendations that is of practical value. Is Mr. Knox incapable or are the House republicans unwilling to do anything objectionable to the trusts.

At the last dinner of the Grid-Iron Club, an association composed of Washington newspapermen, Speaker Henderson's resignation was announced and then the Club sang "Praise God from Whom all Blessings Flow," and the Speaker was present.

It is certainly an edifying brand of statesmanship that would refuse to admit Arizona and New Mexico to statehood because they might go democratic. Let Porto Rico and the Philippines take heed. Not development along the lines of civilization and culture is the prerequisite of admission to statehood, but the political views of the inhabitants.

The president says "Every man must be guaranteed his liberty and his right to do as he likes with his property or his labor so long as he does not infringe on the rights of his neighbors." Mr. Roosevelf neglects to say, however, that mo man is at liberty to exchange the results of his labor with his foreign neighbor without paying tribute to the protected interests.

A bill has been introduced into the French Chamber of Deputies providing for the abolition of all French titles of nobility. This is a move in the right direction, but what will become of all the silly American girls who have sold, or are about to sell themselves, for these gewgaws? And how will our Chicago and New York millionaires like this distruction of what they bought and paid for?
