

Nothing is put down for show, every item in the courses is approved by experienced and conscientious teachers.

The department of Mental and Moral Science and History includes Psycology, Logic and Christian Ethics. History is considered valuable only as it furnishes useful lessons of life. The aim in this department is to bring into the student life the principles that will develop symmetrical character.

DEPARTMENT OF SOCIOLOGY AND CHRISTIAN EVIDENCE On these subjects Dr. A. Clark will deliver two lectures each week. These will embrace the science and pedagogy of ethics and the why of Christianity.

DEPARTMENTS OF MATHEMATICS AND SCIENCE

A thorough course in mathematics is offered including arithmetic, algebra, geometry, trigonometry, surveying, and analytical geometry. The science course embraces physiology, zoology, botany, physical georgraphy, chemistry, physics, and labratory work

DEPARTMENT OF ANCIENT LANGUAGE AND LITERATURE

Two years' work in Greek is offered. The Latin course covers four years, including first book, grammar, composition, Cæsar, Cicero, and Virgil. The English embraces four years, including rhetoric, composition, history of literature and critical study of authors

INDUSTRIAL DEPARTMENTS

Practical training in horticulture can be had in the Hereford Nursery, near the College, and as fast as they learn the business can get pay for their work

DOMESTIC SCIENCE

This is recognized as one of the most important departments in the school. It is hoped a teacher will be secured before the next issue of this paper

DEPARTMENT OF ART Courses include free hand drawing, crayon, pastel, water colors, oil, and china painting

DEPARTMENT OF ELOCUTION AND PHYSICAL CULTURE
This department offers training in correct breathing, vocal

culture, reading, literary interpretation, oratory, and physical culture

DEPARTMENT OF MUSIC

In the different branches of the Music Department the pupil is not only taught to know correct rules of position, technique, etc., and given a thorough knowledge of the rudiments of music in the Theory and Harmony Classes, but to be able to render, in an intellectual and pleasing manner all selections whether of a simple or difficult degree.

PIANO—The piano course includes five years' work—each year being so extensive as to require diligent application to complete it in the given time, and the whole course is as thorough and extensive as is offered in the best conservatories in America.

VIOLIN—A thorough course in violin and other string instruments is offered, the ensemble work making a prominent feature in this department.

BUILDINGS AND EQUIPMENTS

The buildings and equipment are in all respects first class. The college building now being completed is of stone and brick 117 by 70 feet, two stories, with basement for heat and light plant and work shop. In the planning, construction and furnishing of the building the convenience for study, the comfort and health of the students have been constantly in mind. The Girls' Home is finished and furnished after the most approved modern style with steam heat, bath rooms and all conveniences necessary for comfort and health. The young men will be furnished offices on their own campus and will take their meals with the teachers and young ladies at the Girls' Home.

A study hall for all students will be in charge of a teacher through all the study hours of the day and from x to 9 p. m.

IF natural advantages and a moral community, together with a substantial bonus, will land the Baptist college Hereford has got a cinch.

WE regret that one of Hereford's greatest needs is a water works system for fire protection. One fire like the last one would more than pay for a good fire fighting system. It is said that most people "lock the door after the house is stolen" if they were not in the habit of so doing, but this does not apply to the citizens of Hereford, evidently.

THAT the members of the Baptist college locating committee will be well treated in the different competing towns goes without saying. Come to think about it we would not mind being on it ourself. Just think of the fine drives and good eatings that will fall to their lot. But we had forgotten about the criticisms that will be passed by some of the unsuccessful competing towns.

Report of Committee On College.

1. Agitation-We thought from the first that a good deal of agitation was necessary to arouse and develop a wholesome interest upon the subject of Christian Education in general, and a Baptist College in the Panhandle in particular. With this end in view, we arranged for a series of educational rallies in connection with the fifth Sunday meet-These rallies have been held at Amarillo, Memphis and Claude, and appropriate addresses have been made. In addition to these special meetings, others have been held in Clarendon, Canyon City and Hereford. The chairman has visited all these places, and addresses have been made at each by him, or other members of the committee and executive board.

Co-operation-Your Executive Board, while in session during the fifth Sunday meeting in March, adopted resolutions inviting the Boards of Red Fork and Staked Plains Associations to appoint each a committee of five to co-operate with your committee in the matter of "establishing and maintaining" a college within the territory of this Association, these committees to meet in the town of Clarendon, June 23, 1903, for the purpose of hearing the claims of competing communities desiring the location of the prospective college. The Boards of these sister associations accepted the invitation of your Board, and on the day appointed two committeemen from Red Fork and four from Staked Plains Association met three of your committee at the place designated. A. E. Baten of Amarillo was chosen "chairman, and A. J. Tant of Vernon secretary of this joint meeting. The meeting opened with prayer at 2 p. m. Representatives and visitors were present from the following competing points: Canadian, Canyon City, Clarendon, Hereford and Memphis. The greater part of the afternoon was devoted to hearing the claims and bonuses offered by these towns. The joint committee then went into business session. It was agreed to recommend to Paloduro Canyon Association that the matter of location of the college be left to a joint committee of fifteen, five from each of the above named associations.

Bonuses—The following communities offer bonuses : Canadian, Canyon City, Clarendon, Goodnight, Hereford, Lakeview, Memphis and Ama-

rillo. Recommendations-We mend that this association appoint a committee consisting of eight, to be nominated by the messengers of the eight competing towns, to act with committees of not more than eight each from Red Fork and Staked Plains Associations; that these committees be styled The Panhandle Baptist Educational Commission: that this commission be clothed with plenary powers upon the question of locating and building the college; that the whole matter of bids, bonuses and location be left open for fifteen days, or until on or about August 8, 1903; that on or about that date the commission meet at some place easy of access within our associational territory; that all. communities desiring to bid for the college location be invited to present their claims before the commission; that after a full hearing



these claimants, the Commishold a business session, pass upon the claims presented, and decide where the college shall be located; that the commission shall then secure and adopt plans and specification for the building or the buildings to be erected, and appoint a building committee to prosecute the work; provided, that any member of this education committee shall have the right to appoint from his own association his proxey to attend any meeting of the commission in case the said member shall not, himself, be able to attend, the proxey to have all the rights and privileges of his principal.

Your committee are unanimously agreed upon everything in the foregoing report, except as to the time to be given for the location or the college.

A. E. BATEN, J. B. COLE. A. J. LIPSCOMB, Proxey for C. R. Moreman, J. L. SMITH.

That part of the above report, refering to the creation of a committee to select a location for the college, was amended by the unanimous adoption of the following resolution:

Resolved, That the location of the Baptist College be left to a committee composed of five disinterested members of this Association, to be appointed now by this body, and one person from each town or place competing for the school, with the committee of five each from Red Fork and Staked Plains Associations.

Resolved further, That this committee shall be required to personally together visit each place having a bid, and personally inspect the location, security and property of fered.

Resolved further, That this committe shall proceed at once with the investigation herein provided for, and after having made a thorough investigation of each place and its bids, that they shall then meet and award the college to the place that they, in their judgment, consider the place for the school.
