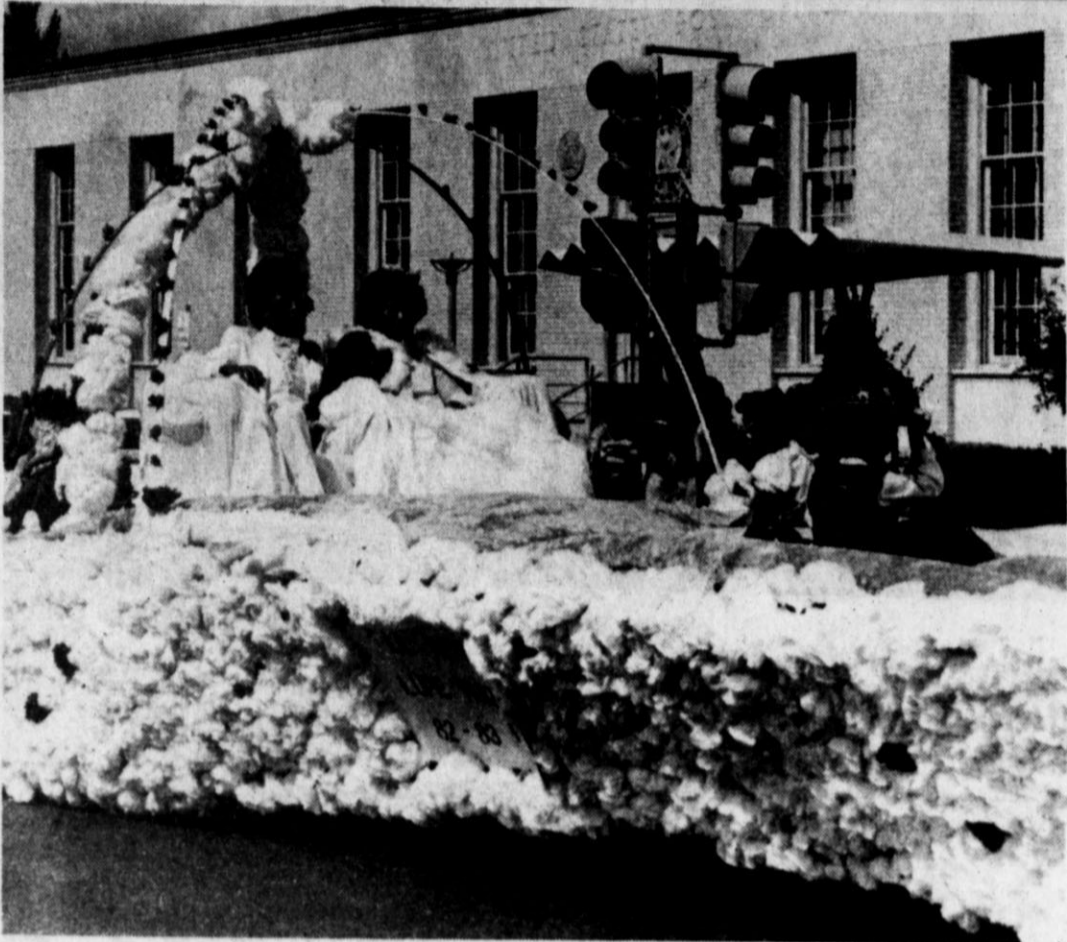

## Board rejects contract with advisor until later

Shying away from an unsatisfactory contract, the Hereford School District Monday night refused to hire a financial advisor for the planning of a special events center though the city and county have approved of First Southwest Company of Dallas for the job.

The city has signed a contract with the firm and the county approved an amended contract Monday.

Trustee Bill Townsend told the board he thought considering a financial advisor before knowing how much is to be spent on the building, what kind of structure and even where it is to be built was like "the cart before the

horse." Wayne Thomas, a Hereford attorney promoting the center, told the board "you have to start some place." He explained that engaging financial counsel is imperative before consulting an architect and getting cost estimates for a facility. He noted that the ultimate question of construction will fall with the voters.

"If the voters say 'yes' all the wheels fall into place," he said. "When the voters approve, then Southwest starts selling bonds.

Townsend said he was not intending to be antagonistic, but was not sure the idea was in enough concrete form to be considered presently. James Kerley Jr., vice

president of Southwest, said the amended contract could be back in the mail by today after it was run through a computer again. The school board will call a special meeting to consider the contract.

Voicing his perturbation on the mulling of the issue Thomas told the four trustees at the meeting that "we can all sit on this thing and let it go to hell, and let Hereford go to hell with it" and accused the leaders, particularly Townsend, of losing enthusiasm for the project and "dragging your feet."

"I proceed on any project, and that is with caution,"

### With financial advisors

## County irons out contract

Deaf Smith County commissioners, displeased with a contract submitted by First Southwest Company of Dallas for advisory services on the

proposed special events center, declined to sign the contract Monday, and met with First Southwest's James Kerley to get the kinks ironed out.

The action followed a day-

long court meeting, and immediately preceded Kerley's meeting with the HISD board for the same purpose.

First Southwest, which has been recommended as a financial advisor for the county, city, and school district on their respective parts of the events center, mailed contracts to the three entities for their approval.

The contract did not meet with the county fathers' approval, and they decided not to sign the document after being advised on several points by District Attorney Roland Saul.

Saul and the court made revisions to the contract as they felt were needed, and were to contact First Southwest to get the changes made.

Kerley, arriving from Amarillo about 3 p.m., rushed to the courthouse to get the

matter settled.

The county fathers, concerned about not spending any funds for the services unless approved by the voters, pointed out at least four areas of concern to Kerley, who made the requested changes in the contract.

"This is a computerized standard contract," Kerley told the court. "We can make changes as you deem necessary." Areas of concern by the county fathers included a stipulation that the county would not be out any expenses for the advisory services unless a bond election for the county's part of the proposed center was called for and passed. Also, the court deleted a section calling for the county to pay for the services of outside firms consulted during the bond pro-

cess. The court and Kerley, along with Saul, got the document ironed out, and the final approval of the contract was placed on the court's agenda for the Sept. 27 meeting.

## County sets record straight

Deaf Smith County commissioners, treading lightly these days in the wake of a frozen budget, cautioned county constituents Monday that the court has not committed itself to the construction of a special events center for the city of Hereford, despite the signing of a contract with First Southwest Company of Dallas.

The court, asked by the chamber of commerce to construct a \$10 million auditorium-banquet hall as its part of the proposed events center has agreed to employ First Southwest as a financial advisor.

But, the county commissioners point out that the county will be out expenses only if a bond election to finance the project is called and passed.

In a prepared statement, the court said: "The Commissioners' Court of Deaf Smith County has spent no money on the study for the proposed special events center. The action the court has taken in contracting with financial advisors for the center is on a contingent basis only."

"No county money will be spent unless voters present a petition requiring the court to call an election and the election passes. If the election fails, only an election expense will be involved."

"The court has taken no position either for or against this project as the decision is entirely the responsibility of the voters."

All four commissioners Monday said that they had been called by county residents wanting to know why the county was spending money on the events center when the court had voted to freeze the budget for 1982-83.

"We just want to get the record set straight," Pct. 3 Commissioner Bruce Coleman said on behalf of the court. "We have not spent any funds as of yet, and are not endorsing or coming out against the special events center."

## New automobile icing on cake for Mrs. Funk

Getting to drive that Buick Regal to a recruitment meeting Thursday night was pink icing on the cake for Jo Ann Funk.

The icing was having the highest sales earnings for the

past week, sweetened by the privilege of driving the district director's car. The cake was from a basic recipe of loving her job as a Mary Kay Cosmetic consultant.

Only last June she had her first facial using the famous pink-packaged skin care and makeup products. She was sold on the stuff and decided to sell it.

Recruited by Sue White on the spot, Mrs. Funk said the whole idea clicked. Better

than the other cosmetics, brushes and jewelry she had sold. Better than wrapping meat, working at the bakery, making sodas at the drugstore and checking groceries for 16 years.

"I had just been thinking about going back to work, but I just always hated punching a time clock," she said. "I was at a point in my life where I wanted to feel useful within myself."

"Now, I feel I am in business myself and am independent," she said. "It takes ever-how-many hours I want it to. I try not to work under 10. I could put in 40 hours a week and go bananas."

Being her own boss also allowed her to take a break in July to help remodel her home, a project partially financed by Mary Kay profits.

With a son and daughter in high school she isn't as tied down as mothers with younger children, but still juggles her schedule around the family. She said the Mary Kay motto of the Lord first, home second and Mary Kay third is a key to the success of the company and those who want to succeed in it and adds her personal conviction "I've dedicated my business to the Lord, because without Him I wouldn't be able to do it."

In her home, pink boxes are hidden in a hutch, handy for demonstrations around the dining room table where guests might drink tea or nib-

## At least 50 die in DC-10 crash in Spain

MALAGA, Spain (AP) — Four more bodies were pulled from the wreckage of a DC-10 jetliner today, but 27 passengers were still unaccounted for following a fiery crash that killed at least 50 tourists returning to New York from this Mediterranean resort, the civil governor's office said.

The bodies were removed from a charred tail section that had been inaccessible to firemen until today. The search continued and an official in the civil governor's office said more victims were feared still in the wrecked plane's tail area.

Spantax Airlines, the

Madrid-based air charter company that owned the jumbo jet, agreed with the governor's office on the number of passengers unaccounted for, but said they were not necessarily dead.

"They might be somewhere still trying to get recovered from the shock they must have suffered. Neither can we say for sure there are no more corpses in the wreckage," an airline spokesman said.

The Spantax office in New York on Monday said that 332 passengers had escaped the blazing wreckage and only two were missing. A spokesman today said he

could not explain the discrepancies in the figures.

The chartered jetliner plunged to earth moments after the 12:30 p.m. (6:30 a.m. EDT) takeoff, careened across a highway and burst into flames.

Official figures released today said 316 people escaped death, including 49 who were hospitalized and 267 who were unharmed or discharged from the hospital. Nine people are listed in very serious condition.

The cause of the crash was under investigation, officials said. Military sources at the Malga airport on Monday mentioned engine failure as a probable cause of the accident and many survivors said the plane apparently didn't have enough power to take off.

"We are about to crash. We cannot do anything, an engine is failing," a Madrid newspaper quoted pilot Juan Perez as saying just before the crash.

The pilot survived along with six other crew members.

Medical personnel aided by airport officials and relatives of the victims are trying to identify the corpses, some of them said to be burned beyond recognition. The corpses have been taken to an airport hangar and those that are properly identified will be flown home for burial, officials said.

## Surplus cheese available again

Distribution of 3,000 pounds of federal surplus cheese to needy citizens of the county will begin Thursday at 9 a.m. at the courthouse.

Applicants should report to the Deaf Smith County Social Services offices, Room 101 and 100-A, it was announced by Earlene Cook, county social services director.

Mrs. Cook said with the help of the Red Cross workers and Community Action workers, along with county employees, the distribution went well last month.

Recipients will be required to fill out a form to show proof of total average household income, and any sources of

welfare or assistance income as well as proof of residence.

Mrs. Cook said eligible families will receive one 5-pound block for a household of one through four, or two 5-pound blocks for families of five or more.

Distribution of the cheese will be based on the application information and a social service worker's interview with the applicant.

False statements on the application, with intent to deceive, could be punishable by a fine up to \$2,000, a jail term up to one year, or both. All signatures of applicants will be notarized.

## Industrial board updated on contract

Hereford Industrial Foundation directors heard an update on the contract with Haxel Manufacturing Co. and discussed board vacancies during a meeting Monday afternoon at the chamber office.

Troy Waddell, foundation president, reported that Center Stage, Inc., original operator of the sewing plant here, had filed a Chapter 11 bankruptcy in recent weeks. However, the foundation

had agreed last February to sub-lease the building to Haxel Manufacturing. Waddell said the board now negotiates with Haxel on the facilities.

Two board members - Don Lane and Tim Gearn - have moved from Hereford. After a short discussion, directors decided to fill the positions at the board's next meeting in October. Directors also discussed the policy on dues, but decided not to make an assessment at this time.

## Three police chiefs indicted in Henderson County

ATHENS, Texas (AP) — Three East Texas community police chiefs face charges that they hired unlicensed officers, at least three of whom had criminal records, a prosecutor says.

A Henderson County grand jury handed down indictments against Police Chief Dewey McSwain of Caney City, Police Chief Doug Curry of Seven Points and Police Chief John Roberts of Gun Barrel City.

Curry was indicted on four counts, McSwain on five counts and Roberts on three counts of employing unlicensed police officers, District Attorney Melvin Whitaker said Monday. Bonds of \$500 were set on each count.

The indictments, which came Friday, stemmed from a Texas Commission on Law Enforcement Standards investigation that began in July when the agency learned some officers in the three communities were unlicensed, said commission spokesman Loyd Mathews.

At least two officers in Caney City and one officer in Gun Barrel City previously had been convicted on charges ranging from passing bad checks to felony theft, Whitaker said.

Because the charges do not constitute grounds for automatic suspension of the chiefs, their fates will be left up to the city councils in their communities, Whitaker said.

## Crash

The National Transportation Safety Board in Washington dispatched three investigators to Malaga and McDonnell Douglas Corp., the California-based maker of the DC-10s, said it sent two investigators to help Spanish authorities.

One of the jet's engines was found in a field near the crash site.

Company sources quoted pilot Juan Perez as saying the plane was about 60 feet off the ground when it started vibrating and he tried to power down the engines to abort takeoff.

## Six killed, one injured in East Texas accident

PITTSBURG, Texas (AP) — Four carnival workers traveling from Oklahoma to an East Texas fair were among six people killed in a head-on car-truck collision two miles south of this North Texas community, the Department of Public Safety said.

A car veered across the center stripe of U.S. Highway 271, hitting a pickup truck carrying the carnival workers and bursting into flames about 1:30 a.m. Monday, DPS Lt. Bill Cody said.

Killed were Francis Martin Jr., 25, the driver of the truck; Debra Lee Rogers, 20, of Bartlettville, Okla.; Earl Leon Haynes, 15, and Robert Rollins, 30, both of Muskogee, Okla.; Jackie Carroll McElhaney, 18, of Pittsburg, the driver of the car; and Jeffrey Allen Rhea, 20, of Mount Pleasant.

## Fairchild relocating from Maryland to Texas

HAGERSTOWN, Md. (AP) — About 40 percent of the subcontract work for two Fairchild Industries transportation companies will be moved from this western Maryland town to Fairchild's Swearingen assembly plant in San Antonio, Texas, a spokesman says.

The Fairchild spokesman, Theron Rinehart, said Monday that assembly work for the Merlin and Metro aircraft subcontract, which is about 40 percent of the work done on the planes at the plant here, will be involved in the relocation.

He said the remaining 60 percent of the work, which entails detailed fabrication, will remain at the

Hagerstown facility.

"This is a move by Fairchild Swearingen, the prime contractor, which will consolidate Merlin and Metro manufacturing in one facility to improve over-all cost-effectiveness," he said.

Rinehart said there is no word on how many jobs at the Hagerstown plant would be affected by the move.

## Agents seize \$3.5 million worth of cocaine

HOUSTON (AP) — Federal and county drug enforcement agents arrested two men and seized about \$3.5 million worth of cocaine during a raid on a Houston apartment Monday night, officials said.

Arrested and charged with possession of a controlled substance with intent to deliver were Jair Jesus Hoyos Pelaez, 22, and Julir Gonzales, 20. The pair lived in the apartment house where 10 pounds of cocaine were found, officers said.

Pelaez and Gonzales were jailed in lieu of \$500,000 bond each.

vised people whose relatives did not return on today's flight to Kennedy to contact the airline's New York office later in the day (telephone: 212-582-8267).

Carefree David, a Miami tour broker, said it had booked 208 travelers for a two-week tour of Spain that left Aug. 30 from New York.

Agency President Leonard Lansburgh said most of the tourists were from the New York area, two to four from Florida, and some from Canada. A Toronto tour operator said he had booked 26 Canadians on the flight and that six were reported injured.

The crash was Spain's worst since 585 people perished in Tenerife on the Spanish Canary Islands when a Royal Dutch KLM Boeing 747 slammed into a Pan Am 747 taxiing on the runway. The March 27, 1977 crash was aviation's worst.

U.S. carriers temporarily grounded DC-10s for checks on Federal Aviation Administration orders after an American Airlines DC-10 crashed in Chicago on May 25, 1979 after one of its engines ripped away upon takeoff.

McKeon, 26, of the Bronx, N.Y., said the pilot braked, "but it was too late, he'd run out of runway."

He said he thought the jet hit "about five cars, a wall, went across train tracks and came to rest in a gully."

Spanish authorities did not say how many vehicles the plane clipped or if there were any casualties on the ground.

Several survivors said the plane's rear exits failed to open. Many of the victims apparently burned to death in the tail section of the wide-bodied jet.

"The rear exits did not work," said survivor Hal Lavine of Tamarac, Fla. "People pushed forward. There was screaming and panic. A big cloud of black smoke poured into the cabin."

The U.S. Embassy in Madrid said 210 American citizens and 85 Spaniards living in the United States were aboard the flight originating in Madrid with a stopover in Malaga. The embassy had no names and didn't know how many Americans were killed or injured.

No definitive list of victims was available early this morning.

## Kidnap victim knew suspect a year

LITTLETON, Colo. (AP) — A South Korean who authorities said abducted a beauty queen and tortured her was formally advised Monday that he was being held for investigation of kidnapping, officials said.

But the man, who identified himself as Seung Hee Han, told the editor of a Korean language newspaper that he had lived in South Korea with the woman, Soon Bok Lee, and that she agreed to leave the country with him.

In addition to first-degree kidnapping, Han also was be-

ing held for investigation of first-degree sexual assault, sheriff's Sgt. Ron Beatty said.

Only the kidnapping charge was mentioned during his advisement hearing, at which bond was set at \$50,000, said Arapahoe County District Attorney Ann Mansfield. Han was still in custody and scheduled to be arraigned in district court Thursday, Ms. Mansfield said.

Kang said Miss Lee claimed she accompanied Han only after he allegedly threatened to kill her sister's two babies.

Townsend replied. "I do not think I am dragging my feet."

The board then moved to routine items on the agenda.

Nena Veazey gave an evaluation of the summer school which was part of a pilot project in 14 schools in the state. Students lacking mastery in reading and math basics were enrolled for the six week courses using computers for skill drills.

Ms. Veazey reported that testing after summer school showed 16.2 percent of the students had no improvement, 40.5 percent had improvement of 10 percentage points or less and 43.2 percent had improvement over 10 percentage points.

In math skills, 24.2 percent

had no improvement, 28.1 percent had 10 percentage points or less improvement and 47.7 percent had over 10 percentage points improvement.

Long term improvements will be examined as students take tests through the year and complete results available by next summer.

Assistant superintendent Larry Wartes reported participation is good in the cafeterias, although enrollment was down.

Tax collections were at 93.49 percent.

# Steelers outlast Cowboys, 36-28

## End opening-game win streak at 17

IRVING, Texas (AP) — It was like a rerun of an old movie. Call it the Pittsburgh-Dallas story, starring Terry Bradshaw.

For want of a better title, call it "To Kill A Cowboy."

The Steeler quarterback had been the spoiler for the Cowboys in two Super Bowls during the 1970s plus two other regular season games.

Bradshaw proved Monday night he hasn't lost his magic touch against the Cowboys.

He threw three touchdown passes in an entertaining 36-28 victory that stopped Dallas' record of National Football League opening triumphs at 17.

The co-stars were wide receivers Jim Smith and John Stallworth, who terrorized the Dallas secondary, and cornerback Dennis Thurman in particular.

Stallworth said it was a col-

lision of two different NFL worlds.

He said "We have two different styles of play. We (the Steelers) are a physical team. We hit people—we hit people."

"The Cowboys are geared to finesse. They try to confuse you. We believe that when those two opposing forces clash, the physical team will win."

He also noted that the Cowboys' highly publicized victory streak helped arouse the Steelers.

"We were up for the game, of course. We knew they had that big winning streak...we had been hearing about THAT all week."

Stallworth bedazzled Thurman, catching 7 passes for 137 yards and one touchdown, an 8-yarder.

Smith caught two scoring passes, including one over

Thurman.

"They (the Cowboys) are a great team and we are not," said Bradshaw. "We needed this victory. It was more important to us than it was to them."

Dallas led Pittsburgh 14-13 at halftime but saw the game slip away after rookie Keith Willis blocked Dallas quarterback Danny White's punt in the third quarter.

He had four touchdown passes but the blocked punt and two interceptions killed the team that had never lost a regular season game in Texas Stadium (18 games) with White at quarterback.

Asked whether the Steeler game plan targeted Thurman, Stallworth said, "We don't ever have a game plan aimed at one special guy. We look at tendencies not individuals. It may have looked like 'we were picking on

Thurman but we were not conscious of doing that."

Willis' punt block set up Frank Pollard's one-yard touchdown run and the Steelers jumped ahead 20-14.

"The blocked punt was bad judgment on my part," White said. "I started to run. It was a complete shock to me...a terrible mistake on my part."

He added "We just blew it in the third quarter."

Interceptions by Rick Woods and Jack Ham gave the Steelers 10 more third period points on a 15-yard touchdown pass to Smith and rookie Gary Anderson's 26-yard field goal.

The former Syracuse star also had field goals of 43 and 40 yards, making Coach Chuck Noll's decision to get Pittsburgh 6. 7. 17. 6-36 Dallas 7. 7. 0. 14-28

### Club owners will not accept percentage of gross

NEW YORK (AP) — National Football League Commissioner Pete Rozelle says that the league's club owners will not accept the players' demand for a fixed percentage of the gross revenues.

"As much as the owners don't want a strike, they are not going to accept something they feel they cannot live with for the next five years," Rozelle said Monday. "If the players believe that they can get what (Players Association Executive Director Ed) Garvey is asking for, I think they are being misled."

"Ed Garvey has equated a strike with getting 35 percent of the gross. The owners have made the players a sizeable

counter-offer. I would like to see Ed work on that or suggest something else."

A percentage of the owners' gross revenues is the focal point of the NFL Players Association's demands.

Earlier in the day, Garvey said that nothing foreseeable will stop the association from setting a strike deadline at a meeting of the union's executive committee next week.

"Nothing short of a miracle can stop us from setting a strike deadline. No matter whether we (contract negotiators) meet again or not, whatever happens we will set the date when we meet on Monday," said

Garvey.

Previously, union officials have said a strike would probably come during the third or fourth week of the season. The players and the league have been without a collective bargaining agreement since July 15.

Rozelle said that players are "making a big mistake" if they think a strike will get them a percentage of the gross revenues.

Rozelle also reaffirmed that he has no immediate plans to become actively involved in contract negotiations. Garvey has asked that Rozelle or some of the club owners join the negotiations.

### HHS seeks tennis win

## Knocks Cardinals from lead Carlton notches 20th win

The way Steve Carlton was pitching gave Philadelphia Manager Pat Corrales "goose bumps"—and the St. Louis Cardinals goose eggs. "He just got stronger," Corrales said of Carlton after

he pitched the Phillies to a 2-0 victory over the Cardinals with a three-hitter Monday night. "He's the best I've seen. It's amazing too, a man almost 38, pitching like he's 28.

"That's what desire and talent does for you. He

prepares himself. He works hard."

With the victory, Carlton not only became the first 20-game winner in the majors this year, but also knocked the Cardinals out of first place in the National League East. The Phillies moved in front by a half-game.

The NL West race also saw a change of leaders, as Los Angeles beat San Diego 4-3 in 16 innings and moved into first place by a half-game over Atlanta, which lost 5-3 to Houston. In other action, Cincinnati edged San Francisco 5-4 in 11 innings and Chicago trimmed Pittsburgh 7-3.

Carlton retired the first 11 batters before giving up a double to Keith Hernandez. The left-hander, who has won the Cy Young Award three times, struck out 12 and walked none as he posted his fifth shutout of the season and 51st of his career.

The Phillies took a 1-0 lead in the first inning on a one-out walk to Gary Matthews followed by Mike Schmidt's run-scoring double. In the fifth, Carlton homered off Bob Forsch, 14-9, to make it 2-0, but it was his pitching—not his hitting—that had the Cardinals talking to themselves.

## Ball named as offensive star

Hereford tailback Alfred Ball, who gained 181 yards on 23 carries and scored three touchdowns in a 31-8 victory over Canyon last Friday, has been selected the Amarillo Globe-News 5A Offensive Player of the Week.

Defensive honors went to Caprock linebacker Scott Brewer for his performance in the Longhorns' 7-6 upset win over Palo Duro.

While Ball was named the offensive player of the week, several of his teammates gained honorable mention nods.

Fullback Raymond Martinez (14 carries for 113 yards and two TDs) and quarterback McDowell (7 of 10 pass completions for 137 yards and 52 yards on four carries) were mentioned.

Defensively, Herd tackle Robbie Christie and end James Payne were mentioned. Christie was credited with 10 tackles—four for losses, while Payne also was in on 10 tackles.

For the season, Ball has gained 260 yards on 35 carries and scored five touchdowns. Martinez has added 201 yards on 23 attempts, while scoring three times. McDowell has accounted for 287 yards total offense. He has completed 9 of 17 passes for 212 yards and one TD, and has added 75 yards on eight carries.

## Washington tops grid poll; SMU ranked sixth in nation

SEATTLE (AP) — Soft-spoken, gentlemanly Don James has guided the University of Washington to a No. 1 rating in The Associated Press college football poll for the first time in the school's history.

The Huskies replaced Pittsburgh Monday at the top of the poll.

Washington destroyed Texas-El Paso 55-0 in Seattle in its season opener after Pittsburgh launched its campaign by squeaking past North Carolina 7-6.

Pitt and Washington were 1-2 in the preseason and first regular-season polls.

James, 50, who is in his eighth season at the Washington helm, reacted as if he had won some kind of booby prize—in the form of extra pressure he doesn't need at this time.

"It really doesn't mean a lot to me right now," James claimed. The ratings are nice before the season starts but the season has started now. I think our concern should be our game each week. I know my concern is Arizona right now."

Washington will open defense of its Pacific-10 Conference championship

against Arizona in Tucson Saturday night. The Wildcats opened the season by beating Oregon State 38-12.

Washington received 28 first-place votes and 1,132 of a possible 1,200 points from a nationwide panel of 60 sports writers and sportscasters. Pitt totaled 16 first-place ballots and 1,078 points.

Last season the Huskies captured their second straight Pac-10 title, beat Iowa in the Rose Bowl, but finished 10th in the final poll.

Pitt Coach Foge Fazio had a reaction similar to that of James.

"It doesn't make any difference," Fazio said. "I never said we were the No. 1 team in the nation. But when the No. 1 team plays No. 5 (North Carolina's ranking last week), it's not supposed to be a blowout by any means. Now that we're No. 2 we've just got to try harder."

Nebraska and Alabama held on to the third and fourth positions. Nebraska received eight first-place votes and 1,073 points for a 42-7 trouncing of Iowa, while Alabama, a 45-7 winner over Georgia Tech, received the remaining six first-place votes and 1,021 points.

North Carolina slipped to 11th, while Florida jumped from 11th to fifth with 886 points in the wake of a 17-9 victory over Southern California. The Trojans fell from 10th to 19th, while Oklahoma fell out of the poll from ninth following a 41-27 upset by West Virginia.

Southern Methodist climbed from eighth to sixth with 872 points by crushing Tulane 51-7 and Georgia slipped from sixth to seventh with 846 points despite a 17-14 triumph over Brigham Young.

Penn State, which outlasted Maryland 39-31, fell from seventh to eighth with 769 points. Arkansas, a 38-0 winner over Tulsa, rose from 13th to ninth with 693 points. Michigan jumped from 12th to 10th with 667 points by downing Wisconsin 20-9.

The second 10 consisted of North Carolina, Ohio State, Arizona State, UCLA, Miami, Clemson, West Virginia, Texas, Southern Cal and Notre Dame.

Last week, it was Florida, Michigan, Arkansas, Ohio State, Arizona State, Clemson, Texas, UCLA, Miami and Notre Dame.

### Texas students killed in wreck

CLOVIS, N.M. (AP) — Three Texas Tech students were killed and three others critically injured when the car carrying them home from a college football game collided with a pickup truck, state police said.

The accident occurred at about 2 a.m. Sunday on U.S. 60-84, about 10 miles west of Clovis, said Lois Snyder, a state police dispatcher.

The students' car was east-bound and collided with the westbound pickup truck, Ms. Snyder said.

Residents of the Texas Tech dorm where all but one of the students was living have scheduled a memorial service for them at 8 p.m. today.

Roddy Boggus, president of Hulien-Clements dorm, said all the students were freshmen.

Killed were Walter Black, 18, of Houston, Patricia Marchbanks, 18, from Cresson, Texas, and Christopher Heller, 18, from San Antonio, Texas, authorities said. The three victims were pronounced dead on the scene by Bob Morgan, a medical examiner, officers said.

Listed in critical condition Sunday night at Clovis High Plains Hospital were the driver of the car, Lisa Perich, 19, of Clovis; Lisa Owens, 19, of Garland, Texas; and Gary Nordstrom, 19, of Arlington, Texas, a hospital official said.

### PUBLIC NOTICE

BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS GENERAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 2, 1982

**PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT**

House Joint Resolution 1 proposes a constitutional amendment that prohibits any state ad valorem tax. Receipts from previously authorized state ad valorem taxes that are collected after the effective date of the proposed amendment shall be deposited to the credit of the general fund of the county collecting the taxes and may be expended for county purposes. Taxes collected before that date shall be distributed by the legislature among educational institutions eligible to receive those funds under prior law. The proposed amendment also repeals a section of the Constitution levying an ad valorem tax for a construction fund for 17 state colleges and universities.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment repealing the state property tax."

**PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT**

House Joint Resolution 62 as amended by Senate Joint Resolution 10 proposes a constitutional amendment that would eliminate the \$8,000,000 ceiling on state welfare aid during any fiscal year.

The amendment would set the state welfare spending limit at \$160,000,000 for the 1982-1983 biennium.

The amendment further provides that, for each subsequent biennium, the maximum amount spent for state welfare shall not exceed one percent of the state budget.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to provide assistance through the appropriations process to needy persons and to place a ceiling on payments for needy dependent children at one percent of the state budget."

**PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT**

Senate Joint Resolution 8 proposes a constitutional amendment that would exempt machinery and equipment used in the production of farm and ranch products from taxation. No dollar limits would be imposed and the exemption would apply to corporations and partnerships as well as to families and individuals.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment exempting implements of husbandry (agricultural machinery and equipment) from ad valorem taxation."

**PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT**

House Joint Resolution 77 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the Legislature to set a four year maximum term of office for board members of certain water districts and conservation and reclamation districts.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide terms not to exceed four years for members of governing boards of certain water districts and conservation and reclamation districts."

**PROPOSITION NO. 5 ON THE BALLOT**

House Joint Resolution 119 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize Tarrant and Bee counties to hold county-wide elections to abolish the county treasurer's office by majority vote.

Should the county treasurer's office be abolished, the duties, powers, and functions of that office would be transferred to the county auditor or the successor to the auditor's functions.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to abolish the office of county treasurer in Tarrant and Bee counties."

**PROPOSITION NO. 6 ON THE BALLOT**

Senate Joint Resolution 6 proposes a constitutional amendment that would raise the constitutional interest rate limit on state general obligation bonds from 6% to 12%. The new 12% ceiling does not, however, apply to bonds issued by the Veterans' Land Board.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment increasing the maximum interest rate allowed on state general obligation bonds to a weighted average annual interest rate of 12%."

La enmienda establecería el límite de gastos de asistencia pública estatal a \$160,000,000 para el bienio 1982-1983.

Además la enmienda provee que para cada bienio subsiguiente la cantidad máxima que se pueda gastar en asistencia pública no será en exceso de 1% del presupuesto estatal.

"La enmienda constitucional que exención los implementos de producción agrícola (maquinaria y equipo agrícola) de la imposición de impuestos por avalúo."

**PROPOSICION NUMERO 6 EN LA BOLETA**
