causes no symptoms, and in these cases no treatment is necessary. More than half of all people over 60
have diverticulosis. Only a small have diverticulosis. Only a small
number of these ever develop diverticulitis.
These diseases seem to be connected with the Western diet, which is low in fiber. Serious cases rarely
occur in Africa and Asia, where occur in Arfica and
more fiber is consumed.

although diverticulosis may have no symtoms, passing gas or a bowel movement may bring relief to any abdominal pain or tenderness. Bowel
movements are often small and movements are often small and
hard, but diarrhea may occur occasionally, If the diverticula bleed.

"A combination of Medicare and a can provide exupleent conerage against acute illnesses such as heart

reasonable expectation recovery," concedes Nance. "However, once a person becomes so ill that there is little or no hope of making him or her seli-sufficient,
